

Funding available to protect our natural environment

Support is once again available for restoring and protecting our unique Selwyn environment with applications open for the Selwyn Natural Environment Fund.

At the bottom of the Otahuna Valley, a three-hectare wetland area is growing on the land of Colin and Denise North, restoring an historic wetland and bringing back their beloved birds.

The couple began planting the site in 2019 and have been helped with funding from the Council's Selwyn Natural Environment Fund (SNEF) to plant further and develop the area, Colin says.

"It's restoring it to what it was hundreds or maybe thousands of years ago. It's something I'd had at the back of my mind for years that I'd love to do that. It appealed to take it back to what it was."

Their wetland is one of 62 sites that the fund supported for protection, planting and maintenance of biodiversity across Waikirikiri Selwyn in the past year.

The Fund is open for applications until 20 October providing funding to encourage and assist landowners, individuals, community groups, and mana whenua to protect, restore, and enhance the natural environment.

For the North's their restoration is bringing back birds to the area and is working in well with others who have joined them to protect Waikirikiri Selwyn's unique environment, Colin says.

"One of the appeals for us of our area was that there were others in the area that are developing these sites and it's creating a pathway for birds out to Te Waihora."

A large crowd of family, friends and supporters gathered at the Tai Tapu Community Centre to celebrate each individual as they received their New Zealand citizenship.

Over 940 people have become New Zealanders at Selwyn citizenship ceremonies this year. Citizens have come from 75 different countries with South Africa being the most common location, followed by India, the United Kingdom, and the Philippines.
