HOW MANY INDOOR POOL OPTIONS?

The indoor swimming pool proposal in our Draft Community Plan has excited a lot of comment. It proposes two indoor pool facilities – one for Lincoln, costing nearly \$6 million

It also proposes a new rate to pay for the pools – a graded rate. Those living near the pools would pay \$200 (about \$4 per week) while those more than 30km away would pay \$25 (about 50 cents a week). Those in between would pay intermediate amounts.

Some people have wondered whether these are "take it or leave it" options or whether other options are still possible – such as just one pool centre, or some other rating system.

The short answer is that any alternative option which stacks up financially and socially will be considered. So after you have read the full proposal in the Draft Plan (available from our libraries, offices and website) please write your preferred options down and send them to us by Friday, 8 May 2009.



Please note:

- Rolleston microchipping is at the council's head office in Norman Kirk Drive (off Rolleston Drive).
- Microchipping will not take place if wet.
- Working dogs and dogs registered before 1 July 2006 can be microchipped for \$20 per dog. If, because of distance or dog numbers, you can't get to a clinic, you can ask for an Animal Control Officer to carry out the microchipping at your place. Come and celebrate with us in Leeston this Saturday and join in the all-day activities and family entertainment when Mayor **Kelvin Coe** formally opens the new Leeston library. Leeston is the first library to benefit from the council's tenyear strategic plan for library services. Darfield library will follow next year.

For decades, Leeston's library was housed in a small building

which used to be a dance hall and meeting room. Books had to be stacked on the floor for lack of space. But now the books have a new home just over the road in the renovated former council offices which they share with the Leeston Medical Centre, the Plunket Society, council archives and the Ellesmere Historical Society.



Facing north, the spacious, well-lit, new library has been refurbished to the NZ Public Library Standards. It covers over 600 square metres, holds 20,000 borrowable items, has two bookable interview rooms and a large community meeting centre. It includes free broadband internet and a range of council services (e.g. rates, dogs, recycling bins).

SUBMISSIONS INVITED

ECAN's Community Plan

Submissions close 4pm, 28 April.

Our regional council, Environment Canterbury, also has a Draft Community Plan which it would like your thoughts on. Among other things, the draft Canterbury plan proposes:

New public transport rates for Selwyn

This would extend ECAN's public transport rate for Burnham, Rolleston and Lincoln-Prebbleton to the whole Selwyn District (except the more remote western areas). Town ratepayers would pay 90% and rural ratepayers would pay 10%.

User Pay Charges for Water Management

This would recover 30% (\$2.2m) of ECAN's water investigation and monitoring costs from water resource consent holders, reducing the general rate component from 100% to 70% (\$4.9m).

New Uniform Annual General Charge

This would shift the funding of ECAN's councillor representation and public information (\$2m) from the general rate to a uniform household charge, regardless of property value. Higher valued properties would pay less and lower valued properties more.

New Resources Consent Charge

This would replace ECAN's hourly cost recovery charges for resource consents with a single flat charge.

Decrease rating for Bovine Tb control

This would halve ECAN's targeted rate for bovine Tb control.

Reduced funding for waste exchanges

This would reduce from \$87,000 to \$67,000, the funding of council and community waste exchange schemes for the reuse and recycling of waste materials.

FROM ENVIRONMENT CANTERBURY ~ TOXIC ALGAE UPDATE

Large amounts of the dark-brown, dog-killing algae, Phormidium, are still present in the Selwyn River around Coes Ford and Chamberlains Ford. Small to moderate amounts are also in the upper reaches of the river, from Whitecliffs downstream to where the river becomes dry.

River users should assume that all of the Selwyn River is dangerous to dogs and keep dogs out of the riverbed.
