

Twelve schools from around Canterbury recently participated in a student-led tour of three Selwyn schools who are part of the Enviroschools programme.

The tour showcased environmental projects that students from Ladbrooks, Springston and Broadfield Schools brainstormed, designed, and implemented as a part of the Enviroschools programme.

This was the second Enviroschools tour in Selwyn, and future tours will be held once every two years.

Teachers and students had the opportunity to view Enviroschool worm farms, rainwater collection, scrapmetal recycling, artworks, edible gardens, an insect habitat, and the first stages of riparian restoration. Students who had worked on these projects were able to guide their visitors around their school and explain their projects to them.

Enviroschools Canterbury Coordinator Andrea Taylor says the tour provided an opportunity for young people to share their success with others.

"Providing an opportunity for young people to plan and lead a tour connects and strengthens the Enviroschool network as well as inspiring other school communities to become more sustainable. These tours are a great example of 'empowered students' which is a guiding principle of the Enviroschools programme."

Enviroschools gives children and young adults the opportunity to learn about eco-systems and create their own projects that benefit the environment.

Reducing waste and recycling is a focus of the programme and fruit and vegetables from the gardens are either sold to the community with the money going back into their Enviroschools programme, or used in the schools for cooking classes.

Enviroschools help build knowledge about sustainability, and help children and young adults develop leadership skills and work together on environmentally sustainable projects within the school and the community.

The programme in Selwyn is delivered in partnership with Environment Canterbury, Selwyn District Council and the Department of Conservation, who provide funding for the programme.

Easter hours for Council services

Water Restrictions lifted for most areas

Lawn watering restrictions in place for Doyleston, Kirwee, Leeston, Lincoln, Prebbleton and Rolleston have now been lifted, but remain for West Melton and Springfield

The restrictions have been lifted as recent rain has helped reduce the demand for water, and water use is expected to be less during autumn as the weather becomes cooler than in the summer. While residents in these townships can now water their lawns and gardens at any time of the day, the Council still encourages people to consider watering after 9pm and before 6am as this is the time of lowest demand for water and provides the best opportunity for water to soak into the ground, reducing the amount of water needed for irrigation.

Lawn watering restrictions remain in place in Springfield and West Melton, and mean that properties connected to these supplies can't water lawns between 6am-9am and from 4pm-9pm until restrictions are lifted.

In West Melton, several months of low rainfall have depleted groundwater levels. The Council is asking residents to reduce water use in order to avoid more stringent watering restrictions being introduced. While Council infrastructure has the capacity to supply West Melton with more water, the Council like other resource consent holders, has limitations imposed on water use through the consent conditions imposed by Environment Canterbury which it must comply with.

In Springfield, water is drawn from the Kowhai River and treated to supply the town. This river is experiencing low flows due to the dry weather of previous months and water restrictions remain in place.

In Doyleston, a second pipe has now been constructed which connects the town's reservoir to the pipeline supplying the town from Leeston. This is helping to provide Doyleston with more constant water pressure. In Leeston an upgrade to the well will soon start which will provide both Leeston and Doyleston townships water supplies with more capacity.

One additional bore will also be developed to supply Lincoln and another to supply Prebbleton later this year. In Rolleston, two new bores will come online this year to provide extra capacity. A fourth bore is planned to be added to the existing three bores supplying West Melton as part of the Whitfield subdivision.

Selwyn looks towards '25

Consultation on Selwyn District Council's draft Long Term Plan will start next week.

The plan sets out what the Council is proposing to do over the next ten years, how the Council is planning to fund projects and how much rates will be.

Consultation opens on 2 April, with submissions closing at 5pm on **Monday 4 May**. Copies of the submission form and consultation document for our Long Term Plan (called *Towards '25*) will be available online at www.selwyn.govt.nz and at Selwyn libraries from 2 April.

Hearings on the draft plan will be held on 21 and 22 May and the Council will then adopt the plan, with any changes as a result of submissions in late June.

Public Notice by the Minister of Education

Partially Operative Selwyn District Plan, Section 173, Resource Management Act 1991. Under section 172(1) of the Resource Management Act 1991 Selwyn District Council has received a decision from the Minister of Education on the Notice of Requirement for the alteration to Clearview Primary School.

The decision is to designate an additional 1.285 hectares of land, in Rolleston immediately north of, and adjacent to, the existing

Rights of Appeal on this decision are outlined in Section 174 of the Act but are only available to the Council, submitters and the land owner. Appeals must be lodged with the Environment Court within 15 working days of this notice of decision.
