

Summer in Selwyn is back with more events and ways than ever to enjoy your summer.

The Summer in Selwyn guide was delivered to Selwyn homes over the weekend (rural delivery arriving this week), providing information on more than 90 activity and event options available around the district until March.

For the first time, the Council has included guided walks, along with a list of activities families can do in their own time such as good walking and fishing spots, cycling tracks, playgrounds and picnic places.

"Selwyn has loads of organised activities over summer, but also plenty of natural features locals have been telling us about and we think this guide is a good way to let newer residents know more about teh district and encourage people to make the most of them," Council's Community Services and Facilities Group Manager, Denise Kidd says.

"We are also really proud of the huge range of organised activities and events that are on offer, with something happening most days – from craft or technology experiences to music and outdoors fun."

Council events include two outdoor movies and two drive-in movies starting with a sprinkling of Christmas magic with *The Santa Clause* at the Lincoln Green on Sunday 15 December.

The popular Teddy Bears' Picnic is back, along with Pool Parties in Sheffield, Darfield and Southbridge and a special Pool of Rock party at Selwyn Aquatic Centre.

Our Libraries team has joined with Christchurch City Libraries to run a Whānau Fun day with stories, craft, technology and a Faerie Party in Lincoln in January.

There's also a great line up of community organised events including fêtes, fitness events, picnics, Christmas parades along with Children's Day activities around the district on 1 March.

Economic growth helps build for future

Population growth, construction and spending confidence continue to fuel the strong performance of the economy in Selwyn.

Quarterly figures from economic analysts Infometrics show Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in Selwyn grew by 5.2% in the year to September 2019, compared to a 2.4% growth nationally and 1.9% growth across Canterbury.

The continuing population growth is a key part of the GDP increase, Infometrics say, along with "stellar" growth in consumer and tourist spending.

Statistics New Zealand's annual estimates show Selwyn's population has grown by 5.3% in the year to March 2019, well ahead of national growth of 1.6%. Consumer spending was up 9.3%, and tourist spending grew by 8% in the year to September 2019.

The economic growth is also underpinned by the strong construction sector with Council figures showing 312 new residential consents issued in the September quarter, down slightly from the 334 issued in the June quarter, but up by 18% from the same time last year.

House sales also increased by 3.7%, similar to the 3.3% growth across Canterbury and bucking the national trend where sales fell by 0.7%.

The district's unemployment rate remains at 2.3% compared to 4.2% nationally and 3.2% across Canterbury.

The strong economy was part of a positive picture for a district that is looking to the future, Mayor Sam Broughton says.

"These figures back up what we're seeing and hearing from people around Selwyn. We're in an exciting time as we build on the good foundations set by those who have gone before and build for those yet to come."

Selwyn Awards – Building a sense of community

Continuing our series profiling the Selwyn Awards 2018 winners. Stephen Clarke and Lesley Barlow won the Environmental Award.

In 2002, an opportunity arose for Stephen Clarke and Lesley Barlow to purchase a piece of Council-owned land next to their property. Avid environmentalists, they saw the chance to fulfil a long held dream.

"We wanted to create a 'green spot' by planting natives to encourage the return of insects, which would in turn attract local native birdlife and provide a place for them to rest, recuperate and feed as they make their way from Banks Peninsula to the mountains. It really worked and last year we even saw the return of a tui, which we haven't seen in this area for 20 years," says Stephen.

Recognition at the Selwyn Awards has helped them connect with people who also want to plant natives, but couldn't afford the costs to get started, he says.

"We got to the point where we had so many trees that we were able to start donating some for other planting projects."

When asked if he would encourage others to become involved in the awards
Stephen said he absolutely would, "the awards really build a sense of community as it makes people aware of what others are achieving.
They give people—particularly volunteers—recognition for their hard work. We really need people who are willing to step up for the community and the awards really recognise and reward this."



Don't fail this summer

Don't end up with a fail this summer.

The Council is launching its annual anti-drink driving campaign.

Every year in New Zealand more than 400 people are seriously injured or killed from drink driving. Nearly two-thirds of the alcoholaffected drivers in these crashes are males aged 25 years and older.

The Council's 'That's a Fail' campaign is encouraging people to not run the risk of harming themselves or other people or ending up with a drink driving conviction.

Summer, and particularly Christmas, is a time when people enjoy catching up with friends and attending functions, but a drink driving conviction or causing a crash has lifelong consequences, Council Chief Executive David Ward says.

"This is a time to enjoy and celebrate with the good weather and we're reminding people to take a moment to think about how you're getting home. Don't let a few drinks spoil the celebrations, don't end up with a fail this summer."

That's a fail. Drinking? Don't drive.

Reminder to be prepared for emergencies

Selwyn residents are being reminded to stock up before an emergency hits.

The Selwyn Civil Defence team are reminding people to get ready, to have a plan and an emergency kit of the essentials, particularly food and water.



Council Emergency Management Officer Jason Flewellen says it's important for people to be able to look after themselves for a number of days after an emergency, or when normal services are disrupted.

"Interruption to services like power and water can happen at any time for any number of reasons. Disruptions could last just a few hours due to a mechanical breakdown, or a number of weeks following a large event like an Alpine Fault rupture. We're all responsible for looking after ourselves and our families to ensure we're prepared. We get to decide now how comfortable we'll be during an event by putting a few things together to make sure we have the basics."
