

The Council has laid a marker for all Selwyn residents as the first local government authority to produce its own accessibility charter.

Mayor Sam Broughton signed the Te Arataki Taero Kore Accessible Selwyn Charter at a ceremony last week attended by disability groups and organisations.

Anne Hawker, Principal Disability Advisor to the Ministry of Social Development told the audience of around 50 people it was a first for New Zealand.

"You are the first local government authority to sign an accessibility charter," she told the audience at the signing.

The Charter is based on the Ministry of Social Development's Accessibility Charter, and along with the associated Accessibility Action Plan is the beginning of an ongoing commitment to all Selwyn residents, Mayor Sam Broughton says.

"It's a start – we're not going to be perfect at the very beginning, but by 2025 we want to be well down the road and by 2030 this will look different again. It is a document that has been designed for Selwyn and needs to be flexible to meet the needs of our community. Diversity strengthens our community and this document is part of the Council's commitment to lead on issues of making Selwyn a great place to live for people of all abilities."

The Council also values feedback on accessibility issues, Mr Broughton told the representatives from IHC, Selwyn Launch Group, Waitaha School, Rolleston Star Jam, New Zealand Disability Advisory Group, Deaf Aotearoa, Brackenridge, New Zealand Sign Language Interpreters and Aspire Canterbury.

The signing ceremony opened with a performance by Jolt Dance Group – a group supporting opportunities for everyone to dance and find their creative voice.

The charter commits the Council to working in the areas of leadership, education, technical expertise and health and wellbeing. It builds on accessibility work such as equipment and classes at the Selwyn Aquatic Centre to assist people with access to the pool and the Rolleston Town Centre design which was carried out with advice from accessibility groups.

Consultation opens on new Springs Reserve

The Council is planning a new reserve development for the Springs Ward on Birchs Road, Prebbleton, and we want to hear what you think.

Last year we carried out local community consultation and identified a number of elements that people were looking for, including off-lead dog areas, diverse play experiences, and safe biking and sporting opportunities.

From this consultation, we've put together a draft design and now we want more input from the local community. The plan includes pathways, seating and picnic areas, shade trees, a waterway, open grass and play spaces, bike tracks, and an off-leash dog exercise area.

We also want to know if you have any ideas on what we can name the new reserve.

This park was initially proposed in the Council's 2015–2025 Long-Term Plan which was adopted by the Council following public consultation in 2015.

Consultation on this part of the project closes on Friday 13 December.

Dr Surinder Tandon came to New Zealand to work with textiles and developed a passion for weaving communities together.

Originally from New Delhi, Surinda and his wife Archna moved to New Zealand in 1988. He'd just completed his PhD in textile engineering and landed a job at the Wool Research Organisation of New Zealand (WRONZ) in Lincoln.

"They were doing a lot of interesting work in textile engineering and fabric product development," he says.

Combined with his love for cricket, he thought it was the perfect opportunity to mix career and sport.

"But of course, New Zealand is far away from India. It was quite new, but it was exciting and challenging."

Work colleagues helped him settle and connect with other Indian families and he and a group of new migrants from India and formed a "potluck social group" to meet up during the weekends for picnics and other family activities.

In 1998, they formed the Indian Social and Cultural Club (ISCCNZ)—now the major Indian association in Christchurch—and Surinder played an important role in founding Selwyn's popular CultureFest.

It's a festival where various ethnic groups can showcase their music, dance and food, he says. "Its culture galore!"

It has become an important vehicle for encouraging social inclusion and equality and helping to prevent cultural and ethnic divisions, he says.

He also went on to represent the Indian community on the Christchurch Multicultural Council, and has been its president for 10 years.

"I grew a lot of passion for serving ethnic communities. Not just Indian communities, but all communities, including migrants and refugees."

Christchurch has over 180 ethnicities, he says.

"I realised that the needs of all migrants are the same for settlement, such as culture, language barriers, employment challenges and homesickness, of course."



Council building team praised

The Council's building team has been praised for its work following its accreditation assessment to continue issuing building consents.

The Council's building team was congratulated on its processes during the accreditation assessment by International Accreditation New Zealand (IANZ) which conducts the review on behalf of the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment. The review is required by law every two years.

The IANZ assessors praised the Council for having the best complaints process for building practitioners it had seen in the country and for its excellent training programme and its 'continuous improvement' system which regularly audits the team's work to make sure it is up to standard and suggest improvements which could be made.

Council building manager Vanessa Mitchell says the assessment was a huge positive for the team managing an extremely high work load averaging 200 consents a month and working in one of the fastest growing districts in the country. "It takes all of the staff doing their work to the highest standards to achieve that compliance level. It shows that we can have confidence in the team and that the procedures in place are ensuring we run like a well-oiled machine."

The process will be completed once three minor issues are addressed which the team is already working on. The IANZ team found seven general non-compliance issues, four of which were addressed immediately. This is an improvement on its last assessment in 2017 which found 10 non-compliance issues and was alongside some of the best results for Council accreditation assessments this year.

A group of 31 people from 10 countries stretching from Canada to Kazakhstan took the oath to become

For Ganga Ram Chapagai, a refugee from Bhutan, who became a citizen with his wife Kamala Rai and daughter Srijana Chapagai Bhattarai, the ceremony was the end of a 30 year journey.

"For 30 years I was without an identity and the government of New Zealand has been so kind to me to grant me an identity and I'm really proud to become a Kiwi.'

For Beatrice Chua, it was a return after her family moved to New Zealand from the Philippines when she was seven and later moved back. She returned to New Zealand for university and work and committed to making the country her home.

Among the others who became New Zealanders were Kulmira Alieva from Kazakhstan, and Englishmen Patrick Holland and Damian Holmes who all married New Zealanders. Mr Holmes was among a number of people in the group who first came to the country on holiday.

"I came here nine years ago and loved it, met a girl and I loved her and now we have got our own house and little Kiwi. It's a great place and that's why I wanted to become a Kiwi.'

Daniel Dilkes, originally from Canada echoed the words of many of the new citizens who described finding a sense of home here.

"I came here for a holiday in 1996 and got a job, years later I've lived and worked all over this country. It's a beautiful country, I fell in love with it and it's an absolute honour to become a citizen of this country, because it's my home.'
