

Selwyn District Council is offering an opportunity to spend a month in China travelling, learning and meeting people from around the world.

Applications have opened for the Gansu Sister Cities Fellowship programme. Each year the Gansu Provincial Government hosts delegates from their sister cities, including Selwyn and Christchurch, with the aim of promoting mutual understanding and fellowship. Based in the city of Lanzhou from 20 August to 20 September, delegates will have the opportunity to travel and to study Chinese history, culture, political system, tourism, technology and economic development, plus agriculture and sister city works.

Applicants must be between 22 and 50 years of age and live or work in Selwyn. The Gansu Fellowship programme pays for international air fares, accommodation and local transport plus an allowance. Delegates pay for their own food, travel insurance, medical expenses and internet.

# Citizenship ceremony welcomes newcomers

A love story was at the heart of the journey for some of the country's newest citizens.

A group of 23 people from eight different nationalities became New Zealand citizens at the citizenship ceremony held at the Council last week. Many of the new citizens spoke about falling in love with New Zealand and three new citizens spoke of joining partners or falling in love here.

Among them was Giovanni Tubo, who moved from the Philippines in 2012 to be closer to his now wife, who moved here in 2007. The pair, who work at Christchurch Hospital, met while studying nursing together in the Philippines and now live in Rolleston.

"We found New Zealand a really good place for welcoming other nationalities. We heard this [Rolleston] was a great place to build and the community is really good and we love the place—it's a really good place here.

It was also a special day for Brett and Anna-Jean Gravett, with the ceremony falling on Mr Gravett's birthday. "When I saw the day I couldn't believe it," he says.

Mayor Sam Broughton led the room in singing Happy Birthday as Mr Gravett came up to take the oath of allegiance

Mrs Gravett said the couple, from South Africa, fell in love with New Zealand on a holiday here. They seized the chance to move when Mr Gravett was offered a job working on the earthquake rebuild and have travelled every corner of the country apart from the Chatham Islands, she says

For the first time each new citizen was given their own small New Zealand flag to mark the day.

# Rolleston town centre upgrade the promenade

As part of the Rolleston town centre upgrade, a promenade is proposed which will encourage walking and cycling.

A main promenade is proposed to run between the Tennyson Street entrance and the Wordsworth Street extension. A detailed design of the promenade as well as for the rest of the town centre development, is now available for the public to view. Pedestrians will enjoy a leisurely walk through landscaped gardens, comfortable seating areas, grassy 'urban islands', outdoor kids' educational zones as well as a vegetable garden.

The promenade provides the transition between the town centre/ square and the reserve. This will be an attractive link for pedestrians and cyclists as they travel in to both of these areas. The promenade is intended to be used as a shared-space environment where pedestrians, cyclists and service or emergency motor vehicles can move at slow speed.

Some proposed key features of the promenade include flexible spaces for sitting, playing music, enjoying a coffee or reading. It will have variable width to encourage a wide range of activities. There is a minimum width of 4m throughout, with additional paved zone adjacent to the town square and Te Ara Atea Library and Community Centre.



## Winter's almost here – how healthy is your home?

With much colder weather on the way, now is an important time to plan how to keep your home dry and healthy over the winter months.

Ventilation is key to preventing moisture building up inside a home during winter. During this time homes are often locked up all day and night, trapping moisture from cooking, showers and from

Council Building manager Vanessa Mitchell says the best way to ventilate your home is to open up all windows and doors for about half an hour when you get home from work.

"Aim to have cross-ventilation by opening doors and windows on the opposite sides of your home for maximum benefit. While it may seem a bit cold while you do this, the benefits are huge – your home will be drier and warmer and you will be surprised by how any thermal gain stored throughout the day in concrete floors is not lost by doing this," she says.

As it gets colder, unwanted guests such as insects and rodents may also be looking for somewhere warm to live.

Checking the perimeter of your house to ensure any potential entry points are blocked is important, Mrs Mitchell says. "With brick veneer cladding weep holes in brick work are required for drainage of the cavity, so do not block these. If they appear to be wide enough for a mouse to get in, wire mesh can be formed and secured in the weep hole to prevent vermin entry, while still allowing for ventilation and drainage.

It's also a good idea to check weep holes are not blocked and clear out any dirt or debris.

## Winter tips:

Did your plumbing pipes freeze last winter? Now is a good time to add additional insulation around and over pipework, particularly in your ceiling space, to ensure your water keeps flowing this winter. Make sure new insulation has at least a 25mm gap between the top of the insulation and the underside of the roofing, to prevent moisture issues from condensation on the underside of the metal roofing.

Do you have a log burner in your home? There is still time to get your chimney cleaned to ensure your burner operates cleanly and efficiently during winter, and to prevent chimney fires. Pellet fires, gas fires, boilers, and multi-fuel burners/fires also need maintenance, so check with the manufacturer to know the specific requirements.

# Lime Scooter trial to come in Rolleston

Selwyn District Council has agreed to trial Lime Scooters in Rolleston once safety concerns and other


The Council has agreed to a six month trial, but only once staff and Lime Scooters have worked through issues around where the scooters will be able to travel and how fast, as well as public education, costs and legal requirements under the Council's bylaws.

The proposal by Lime is to introduce 200 scooters to the Rolleston town area. It would make Rolleston the fifth place in New Zealand and the first rural town to allow the scooters.

Mayor Sam Broughton says the decision fits well with the district's forward thinking attitude, while being realistic about the concerns. "We're an active community that likes to have fun, to look to the future and give things a go and trialing Lime scooters is a part of that. I'm looking forward to taking one out for a spin and seeing whether they're something that works to benefit Rolleston and the district.

Some of the attractions of the scooters, he says, include ease of use, particularly for people who don't drive, sustainability and fun. However, concerns were also raised about people taking the scooters on roads with higher speed limits and pedestrian safety on narrow footpaths.

The Council agreed that Lime and Council staff would work together to address these concerns before the trial could go ahead.
