

Voting is now officially open in the 2019 local council elections.

Most Selwyn electors will have received their voting papers in the mail by the end of this week – and voters are being encouraged to get their completed voting forms in the post as early as possible.

Everyone who is enrolled as a parliamentary elector should receive voting papers automatically, says Deputy Electoral Officer Stephen Hill, but anyone who hasn't received their papers by the end of the week should contact the Council on 347 2800.

Local elections are held by postal voting, and voting papers must be received by the Council before midday on Election Day, Saturday 12 October. "The sooner people can get their papers into the post, the more certain they can be that their vote will be counted," Mr Hill says.

"We're also providing ballot boxes at several Council locations across the district including Council headquarters in Rolleston, libraries at Darfield, Leeston, Lincoln and Rolleston, and at the Selwyn Aquatic Centre, Lincoln Event Centre and West Melton Community and Recreation Centre.

"It was great to see the first votes cast last Friday as residents dropped their voting papers in to the ballot box at Council HQ."

Magical creatures spotted at McHughs Park

A touch of magic has descended on McHughs Forest Park.

Blown in by the nor'west wind, a magical community has moved into the forest near Darfield just in time for the school holidays.

From Friday 27 September families can find 20 magic doors hidden in the forest. Look out for the signs and see if you can spot the dragon sleeping.

The magical community will also be visiting Darfield Library to support a magical storytime on 27 September at 3.30pm and a Faerie Party on Friday 4 October, 10.30am–12pm, including dancing, face painting, and a treasure hunt.

The idea for the doors had been used internationally and in other Canterbury districts, but with the creative genius of the men at Darfield Menz Shed, which built and decorated the doors, it has been adapted to something special for Selwyn, Community Services staff member Kelsey Waghorn says.

"They bring a bit of joy in a different way and give people another reason to visit one of the many really cool outdoors spots that Selwyn has to offer."

To help the magical creatures feel welcome it is important visitors respect their space and take only photographs and leave only footprints.

If you do take photographs Darfield Library will print these for free, to display in the library and a copy to take home.

Work begins on Aquatic Centre extension

Work is beginning this week on the extension to the Selwyn Aquatic Centre.

The Council has appointed Armitage Williams Construction Limited to carry out the extension and refurbishment of the existing pool.

The new 10-lane, 25-metre pool will more than double the lane capacity at the aquatic centre and accommodate increasing demand from aquafitness, casual swimming, deep water and other activities. There will also be additional changing rooms, foyer and administration space and the option for a possible café in the future.

The extension is expected to be open to the public in late 2020. The total cost of the project will be \$13.8 million.

The work will be completed in stages to minimise disruption to pool users. From Monday, traffic management will be in place along Broadlands Drive when required to allow truck access in and out of the site.

Aquatic Facilities manager James Richmond says the centre is one of the most popular destinations in the district with more than 380,000 visits per year. "We know people wanted more lane space and learn to swim capacity and we're looking forward to a fantastic pool at the end that will serve everyone in district."

Swim School instructor wins national award

Selwyn Swim School instructor Jenny Heaton's outstanding contribution to teaching swimming has been recognised nationally.

Ms Heaton won the Outstanding Contribution to Learn to Swim award at the New Zealand Swim Coaches and Teachers Association national awards for her 14 years of teaching, including six at Selwyn Aquatic Centre, where she is the Preschool Coordinator.

She also set up Splash Time, a free class for parents and children, trained and mentored six volunteers to become qualified swim instructors, and championed the introduction of the popular safe boating programme.

Council Aquatics Facilities manager James Richmond says the career award was a huge achievement to win against people who had been working in the industry all their lives.

It is well deserved for a teacher who is loved by children and parents, he says. "Jenny is attentive to all 570 children enrolled in the preschool programme. She engages with and tracks them all."

Originally a preschool teacher, Ms Heaton first got into teaching when she was taking her children to swimming classes and doing some lifeguarding.

She says she loves seeing children grow and learn about being safe around water. "It's my happy place in the pool."

She did not know the team had nominated her for the award until a few weeks before the awards ceremony.

"It was a bit of a shock to hear my name called out. It's a pretty cool award to get, but it's not something you do on your own, it's a team effort."

Selwyn Swim School based at Selwyn Aquatic Centre was also a finalist in the Outstanding Swim School category.

Faces of Selwyn celebrated

At 8.30 on a Sunday morning, Gabi Michael is tucked away in her home brewery trying to brew the perfect beer.

Gabi moved to New Zealand in 2003 from Campo Grande, Brazil, and is the co-founder, sales and marketing manager at Gladfield Malt. Her story is part of a new project by the Selwyn District Council celebrating the diversity of the district and the things we have in common as the many Faces of Selwyn.

The Faces of Selwyn project will begin with an exhibition at Lincoln Event Centre from 2–9 October showcasing 10 stories of recent arrivals to the district and those who have been here much longer.

In the past 10 years the population of Selwyn has nearly doubled. "Each person brings different stories that enrich us, but they also have many shared links. These things weave together to give us such a vibrant culture and we want to celebrate that," Council Community Services Group manager Denise Kidd says.

Following the exhibition the 10 stories will be used in displays at Selwyn Libraries. Along with further stories to come they will also feature on the Council website and in other Council publications.
