

Selwyn is a district with a rich and diverse environment, which is also exposed to a number of natural hazards.

The Proposed Selwyn District Plan - currently out for public consultation - maps natural hazards areas across Selwyn, based on the latest data and to meet regulatory requirements.

"It's important we know what natural hazards we face in the district, so we can make informed decisions on future property, land and infrastructure development", says Council Planner Rachael Carruthers—part of the team that has developed the Proposed District Plan.

All councils in New Zealand are required to identify and manage areas at risk from natural hazards.

"Canterbury councils must assess the risks from more extreme weather events than those covered in the current District Plan. We also need to take into account climate change effects over the next 100 years, such as increased frequency and intensity of rainstorms", says Rachael.

"As a result we have now identified that during a one-in-200-year flood event around 80 percent of properties in the district are at risk of flooding that would potentially be at least five centimetres deep."

In addition to providing landowners with the information of where on their property is at risk of flooding, the Proposed Plan includes rules on how this risk should be managed.

"We're proposing to manage flood risk with similar restrictions to what's in the current District Plan."

"For most properties the proposed changes won't make much of a difference. The changes will only affect those who want to do something new on their land, such as build a new house or subdivide," Rachael says.

The key proposed change is for the district-wide minimum building floor height to increase to 300 mm above a 200-year flood level event (instead of the current requirement of 300 mm above a 50-year flood level event).

Hundreds enjoyed 10 days of events celebrating the many cultures in Selwyn.

For the first time the Council organised or supported 18 cultural events from martial arts to language lessons, cooking and arts, to run over 10 days around the popular CultureFest day at Lincoln Domain.

Popular events included a Kirant cultural evening, which saw 60 people enjoy food, music and dance from the Kirata culture of Nepal, while a group of 49 women attended the women's only swim event at Selwyn Aquatic Centre.

Six instructors ran swimming lessons and an aquafit class at the evening, which attendees said gave them a sense of belonging and were keen to seen it run more regularly.

The Aquatic centre also ran a splash time, and other events included Mandarin for Beginners, Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, a Singaporean cooking demonstration, Tai Chi, Henna workshops, belly dancing, Highland Dancing and Chinese calligraphy.

The potluck Dinners of Selwyn evening drew 25 residents from a wide range of cultures, who brought their favourite dishes to share.

Dishes included Persian lentil rice known as Adas Polow, a Chinese cold dish of seaweed, Sri Lankan fried rice, ratatouille and a few Kiwi classics.

Simon Kouch, who arrived in Selwyn from Auckland only two weeks ago said the event was a great way for new residents to meet people. Student Eva Zhou said it was an unforgettable experience and she enjoyed meeting a range of people from different cultural and professional backgrounds.

Faces of Selwyn - "Meant to be" in Lincoln

On her 22nd birthday, in February 1990, Archna Tandon sat her final exam for her PhD in Biochemistry at the Indian Institute of Technology.

By the time she heard she'd passed, a month later, she had met and married Surinder Tandon and moved to a new life in Lincoln.

Her knowledge of New Zealand came from a book Surinder gave her, but Selwyn already felt like home when Archna arrived.

"People talk about déjà vu, I experienced it, when I arrived in Lincoln and saw the Liffey Bridge on Edward Street. I told Surinder while driving over it, 'I feel like I have been here'," she said.

Thirty years ago there were few Indian people in Canterbury, but this didn't stop Archna from celebrating traditional Indian festivals including Karva Chauth in October when married Hindu women fast and pray from before sunrise till the moon rises.

In India the moon rises around 8pm in October. "We used to drive to New Brighton beach to see where the moon is and after a couple of years I looked in the paper and found out the moon rises around midnight – so at least we know now!"

In 1998, Surinder and Archna pioneered Canterbury's Diwali festival and in 2004 they helped set up what has become the Selwyn CultureFest.

Archna worked for 20 years as a chemist at the University of Canterbury before deciding to try something different two years ago, and is now employed as a Corrections Officer at Christchurch Women's Prison.

She was the first ethnic woman to become a Justice of the Peace and registered marriage celebrant in Selwyn, and is national president of the New Zealand Federation of Multicultural Women's Council.

Archna and Surinder have two children, born and raised in Lincoln. After 30 years she says she will never leave.

"We haven't moved out of Lincoln, we have just moved three streets. It's the place to be, it's peaceful, it's friendly and it just feels like home."

Tourism facilities get funding boost

More than \$200,000 of funding has been secured for camp ground maintenance to support summer tourism in Selwyn, alongside further toilet upgrades already nearing completion.

Two toilet block upgrades should be open in mid-November with a new eight toilet block built at Lakeside Domain and a new public toilet added to the Springston Public Toilets. The new facilities cost \$537,000. Half of the cost was funded by the Tourism Infrastructure Fund.

The Council has also received \$219,834 of funding from the Camping Infrastructure Fund for a variety of maintenance projects over the camping season.

The funding will cover servicing recycling and rubbish stations and signage improvements at Council camp grounds, along with operating caravan dump stations and waste water tanks, and toilets at camp grounds and freedom camping sites.

The upgrades will continue a series of improvements to tourism infrastructure in time for the summer camping season, with the Council camping grounds all opening late last month.


On the Roads

Pavement repairs are being carried out on Telegraph Road and Wards Road. Traffic management is in place.
