

Selwyn residents are being asked to help design proposed new community public spaces in the redevelopment of Rolleston Reserve.

The proposals are part of the wider Rolleston town centre project, and over the past year we've been consulting with the community about options for the reserve.

We're now proposing to include a sensory garden and a youth space in the reserve, along with open green space with new trees and paths. Consultation on these proposals is open till Wednesday 21 October.

For the proposed youth space, the Selwyn Youth Council surveyed students at the district's high schools for initial ideas, which include a dance floor, outdoor climbing wall, parkour balls, and a media space.

The sensory garden is planned to be a space that is accessible to everyone including those with diverse needs. Students at Waitaha School helped with initial ideas, such as wheelchair-friendly access, quiet spaces, scented flowers and colour used for wayfinding and paths.

The Council is keen to hear thoughts on these ideas for both the spaces, to help design spaces everyone can fully enjoy and embrace as their own.

The Council is also consulting on proposed roading changes in the town centre. Hearings will be held in November, if required, where people can present their submissions on both the roading changes and those to the reserve, the youth space and sensory gardens.

New Rolleston Drive intersection work beginning

Work to extend Markham Way and create a new intersection at Rolleston Drive and Dryden Avenue will begin next week.

Work will begin at the Markham Way end of the extension on Monday 21 September and move towards Rolleston Drive, with the new intersection as the final stage of construction.

The work is expected to be completed by February 2021, depending on the weather, or other work restrictions due to Covid-19.

Rolleston Drive and Norman Kirk Drive will remain open throughout the upgrade, with short periods where each street will be reduced to one lane. This will be done outside of peak hours and we will keep users updated on this via the Council Facebook page, website and Council Call.

The site will be fenced and a fenced pedestrian access way will be in place from Rolleston Drive to Rolleston School to ensure safe pedestrian access around the site.

The new intersection and extension of Markham Way will help with traffic flow into Rolleston, easing congestion on Rolleston Drive, provide additional access to the new town centre and Selwyn Health Hub and improve safety for pedestrians, particularly school pupils and families.

Opportunity for students to follow their dreams

The Council is offering Selwyn students support to follow their dreams and achieve.

Applications for the Council's Tertiary Scholarships are open till the end of September. Scholarships of up to \$3000 are available for year 12 and 13 students who live and study in Selwyn and are planning to undertake full-time post-secondary school education or training at a recognised New Zealand university, polytechnic or training institution next year.

Scholarships will be available for students who have achieved outstanding success in academic, sports, cultural, arts, social responsibility, or other areas, or have overcome barriers or hardships to achieve.

The scholarship provides payment towards fees and costs associated with buying books and equipment required for their study or training.

NZDF connects to Selwyn District wastewater network

The New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) and the Council have signed an agreement enabling Burnham Military Camp to connect to the Council's wastewater network.

As part of the agreement, NZDF will build a new wastewater pump station, pipeline and emergency storage tanks at the Burnham Military Camp. Wastewater from the camp will be pumped to the Pines Wastewater Treatment Plant on Burnham School Road. NZDF will pass ownership of the pump and pipeline, once built, to the Council. Construction on the pump station and pipeline will commence in September, with commissioning expected in March next year.

NZDF will also make an upfront development payment for the connection and will pay ongoing charges equivalent to the standard sewerage targeted rates.

Until now, Burnham Military Camp has been treating and disposing of its own wastewater using an oxidation pond and border dyke irrigation system which had, in recent times, struggled to fully meet the requirements of its resource consent.

Head of Defence Estate and Infrastructure Mark Brunton welcomed the agreement. "I am delighted we have been able to reach an agreement with Selwyn District Council that benefits Burnham Camp, the wider community and the environment. It will secure effective and reliable wastewater management for Burnham Military Camp into the future, and take advantage of economies of scale to achieve a higher level of treatment at Council's state of the art Pines wastewater treatment plant."

Council Group Manager Infrastructure Murray Washington says the agreement strengthens the important relationship between the Council and New Zealand Defence Force.

"We're pleased to support the community at Burnham Military Camp through this agreement, which will help with the ongoing maintenance and growth of the district's wastewater networks. It is a good example of the ongoing investment that NZDF makes into our district and the partnership approach we take to working with them."

SADD Students leading road safety in Darfield

Darfield students are leading the way to help make Selwyn roads safer.

SAFER September is a national SADD (Students against dangerous driving) initiative to provide an opportunity for students to actively engage with their community, by spreading positive messages and encourage road safety awareness.

Darfield High Schools' Issy Kennedy and Emily White are among a team of SADD students helping keep their school mates safe on the roads.

The team has made it their job to raise awareness about SADD and road safety within their school with a variety of activities, Issy says.

"We have made a change to the way students and staff enter and exit the school by encouraging them to take an alternative route. After school you'll see us standing outside the main entrance encouraging everyone to follow the chalk arrows that mark the correct path to take when crossing the road. It has taken a while but everyone is now seeing the benefits rather than seeing the route as an inconvenience.

Over lockdown the team ran an online challenge testing students' knowledge of road safety and are holding a 'dress up your door' competition between classes to raise awareness of SADD principles, Emily says.

"We have also planned an expo as part of Safer September to encourage the students to interact and get to know the local emergency services and the Council, SADD and Proactive Drive representatives. We plan on holding this event once Level two restrictions are removed.'
