

The first Summer Skate Jam of the year kicked off at Glentunnel School last week with more than 60 people enjoying skateboarding, scootering and other wheeled fun.

The Glentunnel event was the first of eight skate jams this year, with the next one being held at Tai Tapu Primary School Wednesday 19 February, 3.30–5.30pm, followed by the Darfield Summer Skate Jam on Wednesday 26 February 3.30–5.30pm at the Darfield Skate Park.

A place to finally call home

In 2000, two strangers from Iceland and China got chatting at Melbourne airport and then found themselves sitting next to each other on a flight to Auckland.

It was the start of Sam and Lillian Ragnarsson's 19 year journey to calling New Zealand home.

Sam left Iceland aged 23, and until he moved to Prebbleton six years ago, he had never stayed in one place for more than a year. Lillian had lived in Japan and the United States of America.

Following that first airport meeting, they reconnected online and married in 2008. After a year each in Japan, the USA and China, the two project managers sat down with a spreadsheet to decide where to settle down. They listed everything they wanted from a country and New Zealand came out on top.

"We always laugh that we met on the way to New Zealand and then we ended up in New Zealand, so many years later," Sam says.

They chose Christchurch to help out with the post-earthquake rebuild and settled in Prebbleton.

They have kept links to their birth lands and Sam says there's now even an Icelandic flag flying at their daughter's school. But both were very happy to gain New Zealand citizenship last year.

"For someone living in seven countries, five continents and who's moved this often, to find a place and be accepted was really important," Sam says.

For Lillian, it was a milestone giving up her Chinese passport and visa, but made her feel part of her new home.

"I am ready to fight for New Zealand, that's how I feel."

The pair considered leaving Prebbleton and buying a lifestyle block, but their girls Nicole and Caitlin said, "We love this house, we love this place, why should we leave?"

"And it made us think, they're right, why would we leave?"



Bin tagging project nearly complete

The project to stocktake and tag the district's 51,000 bins is well on its way to being completed.

More than 70% of rubbish, recycling and organics bins have now been fitted with a Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) tag through the project which began in September.

The RFID tags will allow the Council to easily and remotely maintain accurate records of the numbers and types of bins at each property, ensuring fair charging for all and allowing for a more efficient service.

The scanning equipment is in the process of being fitted to collection trucks. The tag, about the size of a thumb tip, will be automatically scanned each time the bin is collected. A final sweep of any bins that have not been tagged will take place before the contractor will cease collection of any untagged bins.

Community Fund helps star dancers

A brand new dance workshop for children and young adults living with disabilities has started in Lincoln, running during school terms.

The workshop is run by The StarJam Charitable Trust to give young New Zealanders with disabilities a chance to feel like a star and develop life skills and friendships through music and dance.

It is supported by the Selwyn Community Fund. Established in 2018, the Council fund supports groups and organisations that contribute to community wellbeing. The fund is available for Selwyn – based not-for-profit community groups that are looking to run a project, event, or initiative in the Selwyn district.

The Council supported StarJam by providing the Lincoln Event Centre for the workshop "Southern Groovers," run by one tutor and three volunteers.

The free workshop is already booked out with 12 young people or 'Jammers' already signed up. It is the second StarJam workshop alongside one run at the Rolleston Community Centre on Tuesday evenings.

StarJam are extremely grateful for the funding which will open opportunities for more workshops in the area, trust grants writer Fiona Rouse says.

"This funding will ensure the safe and successful delivery of StarJam's workshops, performances and community social events benefiting young people with disabilities who attend the Lincoln weekly workshops."

StarJam host lots of other free workshops weekly up and down the country, teaching youth aged 6 to 25 with disabilities how to dance, play drums, guitar and sing.

One of the previous workshop's participants, Katrina, said StarJam

makes her feel cool and like she's a superstar.

These workshops enable 540 youth to participate every year, regardless of their disability.

Reconnect project under way at Pines Resource Recovery Park

Work has begun on the first round of improvements at the Pines Resource Recovery Park.

The developments include an enhanced recycling and reusables drop-off area with a canopy, parking and operational area, as well as all underground services for the planned future stages. The \$1.85 million works are being carried out by CB Civil and Drainage and the new area is expected to be open by June this year.

Council Solid Waste Manager Andrew Boyd says the developments are catering for future growth as well as enabling improved recovery of materials currently entering the waste stream. "These upgrades will improve the experience of customers at the Recovery Park as well as increasing diversion of materials from landfill. Having the ability to drop off items that can be reused by others is something that the district has needed for some time, so we are pleased to see this project starting to take shape."

The current works are the first stage in a wider project named Reconnect that will take place from 2021 to 2024. Reconnect is an innovative and ambitious project aimed at getting people thinking differently about waste, recovering materials from the waste stream and showcasing alternative options to landfill. This includes a reuse shop and salvage yard, as well as an environmental education centre (with a focus on waste) intended to be an interesting, interactive and fun space for people of all ages to visit. Other developments include a multipurpose waste hub, a community garden, and microenterprise units focusing on making products from waste materials such as wood, metal and fabrics.

New Council customer service centre opens

A blessing and a ribbon cutting have marked the official opening of the new customer services centre at the Council headquarters in Rolleston.

Te Taumutu Rūnanga led a blessing of the new area on Wednesday morning, before Mayor Sam Broughton and project manager Sandrine Carrara officially cut the ribbon ahead of the first Council meeting of the year.

The new space, where visitors to the Council building are welcomed, is part of a series of changes to the Council's customer service to provide a one-stop location for people to contact the Council. As well as providing face to face help for customers on all types of enquiries, the new centre also handles enquiries through the 0800 SELWYN (735 996) Council contact number, and email and web contacts.

The changes will allow the Council to build on the high standards it sets for supporting residents, Group Manager Communication and Customers Stephen Hill says.

"It's great to have reached this milestone in our ongoing goal of making it easy for people to do business with us," he says. "We now have a great space for customers to come to, and a dedicated team supported by excellent systems to help our residents access the services and information they want."



On the roads this week

Speed restrictions are in place on Springs Road between Birchs Road and Trents Road due to maintenance work on the water system. Tennyson Street between Markham Way and Moore Street is one-way, open to southbound traffic only. Lowes Road is one way both sides of the Tennyson Street intersection, open to traffic travelling away from the intersection, due

to the intersection upgrade. Traffic management will also be in place on Tennyson Street from Bronte Way to just south of the intersection. Footpath construction is taking place on Lowes Road from Masefield Drive to Tennyson Street and on Durrel Way and these footpaths will be closed during construction.

Pavement seal repairs are taking place on Wards Road. Resurfacing is taking place on Leaches Road, Blakes Road and Telegraph Road and a culvert is being constructed on Coleridge Road. Traffic management will be in place for each of these works.

NZTA has advised that Hoskyns Road is left in and left out only at Main South Road. The Weedons Interchange is now fully open and Berketts Road is open for left turn in (southbound) traffic only from Main South Road.
