

Inspiring young people to follow their passions is the goal of the latest initiative from the Selwyn Youth Council.

The Youth Council is launching a podcast series featuring interviews with 14 inspiring Cantabrians talking about their passions, from designing for London and New York fashion weeks to looking after endangered sheep.

Youth Council member Laura Hann says they aimed to make the podcasts a quick burst of inspiration to encourage other young people.

"We thought it was good to have young people who have succeeded in their passions to talk about them and how to achieve their goals. They were all really talkative and interesting and a 10-15 minute podcast is a really easy thing to listen to on the way to school. We're hoping people will take inspiration for their hobby, or hear something and think, 'that sounds interesting I could take that up and look at it further'."

Their interview with cinematographer John Ross certainly achieved that for her, Laura says, inspiring her to turn her passion for videography into a career.

Episodes will be released weekly starting on Thursday 23 July with an interview with Anton Phillipson on the fascinating places his passion for drawing cars has taken him.

Activities include bowls, raffles, board and card games, bingo, guest speakers and guizzes. Volunteers prepare a hot lunch and afternoon tea is provided.

The club has proved very popular, providing valuable connections and activities for members, and even a global pandemic couldn't dampen their enthusiasm, coordinator Rita Tipples says.

"The majority of the group were really keen. Everyone was so happy to come back."

# Thousands love Selwyn Directory

Thousands of residents have been searching for Selwyn businesses on the Selwyn Directory.

The Council-run directory offers businesses a free listing providing the opportunity to advertise their details including a map location, contacts, website and social media links and a summary of their business. It also allows businesses to advise customers about their online sales platform and let people know if they are able to deliver.

Figures show the directory is visited more than 7000 times a month and sees up to 2000 people each month in the Selwyn and Christchurch area checking out business listings.

The directory has seen a boost in popularity since the end of the Level 4 lockdown, more than doubling its average number of visits a day as Selwyn residents look for local business options.

Restaurants and cafés were the most searched for businesses, followed by sports and recreation and accommodation.

The directory also has a job vacancies page, where businesses can list job openings and advertise direct to Selwyn residents.

# ON THE ROADS

### On the roads

Due to the Lowes Road and Tennyson Street intersection upgrade, Lowes Road is one way on both sides of the intersection, with lanes open for traffic heading away from the intersection, but not towards

it. A stop/go system and speed restrictions are also in place on Tennyson Street.

Leeston Road and Old Bridge Road intersection is being upgraded. Traffic management is in place.

Trents Road is closed heading south east away from Springs Road while upgrades are made to the sewer system.

Road works are in progress on Norman Kirk Drive, with stop-go controls and lane diversions in place.

Repairs are being carried out on Hartleys Road and Bleakhouse Road. Traffic management is in place.

## From milk to beer

Param Kaur came to New Zealand for the dairy industry, but stayed for the malt and lifestyle.

Param moved to New Zealand four years ago to study at Lincoln University hoping for a gateway into the dairy industry. But after completing a Graduate Diploma in Science in 2017, Param found herself working at a company producing not milk, but beer.

She received a phone call from malt growers Gladfield Malt in December 2017 about working as their lab technician. "It was like an early Christmas present, I can't express in words.

Since her first day of work, Param says her kiwi and migrant co-workers have been welcoming and accepting. "It feels like an extended family for me. Sometimes I get a text from Gabi saying, 'Drive safely,' and if they think you are feeling low, they ask if you are okay."

From her lab window at Gladfield, she can see the mountains. In winter they have snow on them - a sight she never saw in India.

In fact, when she first arrived in February 2016, she found it freezing compared to the 40 degrees Celsius she was used to. "February is not a cold month, but when you come from India you do feel cold. I had to wear an extra layer of clothing." she laughs.

While she misses Indian food and her family, Param enjoys cooking her own Punjabi dishes and volunteering at Canterbury's Holi and Diwali festivals. Now settled in Lincoln, she is hoping to get New Zealand residency.

She enjoys that everything is in walking distance and on her walks she often notices how welcoming everyone is. "When people pass by, they smile at you and say, 'hi,' and ask how you are. You don't find that in many countries.'
