

More than 300 cubic metres of concrete have laid the foundations for a fresh start on health in Selwyn.

The first concrete pour for the floor slab of the new Selwyn Health Hub took place on Wednesday last week.

Over three hours, 55 concrete trucks poured 330 cubic metres of concrete at the site on Norman Kirk Drive in Rolleston. It is the first of three concrete pours for the floor slab.

The \$14.8 million building will be paid for through commercial investments, which will see rent from tenants covering the cost of the building.

The Canterbury District Health Board (DHB) has partnered with the Council as the primary leaseholder, with Pacific Radiology also confirmed.

The hub will comprise a primary birthing unit, plus DHB community health services, a General Practice, radiology and other community health and social services.

Mayor Sam Broughton says the project is a long-term boost to the district.

"The Selwyn Health Hub will provide new medical services without the need to travel to Christchurch. It complements existing medical centres and pharmacies and sets us up for the future growth of the district."

As Selwyn recovers from the COVID-19 global pandemic, the Selwyn Health Hub and other major Council infrastructure projects underway across the district will be an important part of the long-term recovery by creating jobs, and by improving wellbeing and continuing to make Selwyn a great place to work, live and play, he says.

The building is on track at this stage to be completed in March 2021, when it will be handed over to the lease holders to fit out, before opening later in the year.

Record demand for building consents

The Council is receiving record numbers of building consent applications, and bookings for onsite inspections since lockdown.

The Council was receiving an average of around 220 new building consents a month prior to the COVID-19 Level 4 lockdown, which rapidly increased to 258 applications in May and is well on track to reach that number again in June.

The consent team has gone from carrying out 1400 building inspections a month, or around 70 a day, to almost 1600 inspections in May, or around 80 a day. In June the numbers look like they could top 1800 inspections, Council Building Manager Vanessa Mitchell says.

Over 60% of applications have been for new buildings, she says, although a drop in applications is still expected in the future due to the impacts of the pandemic.

The consents team continued to receive and process consents through all alert levels, with digital and some on-site inspections able to take place for the start of Level 3.

Staff from Napier City Council have been helping process applications, but the level of demand means some consent processing times may be slower than usual, Mrs Mitchell says.

"We've been able, at this stage, to keep to our commitment of a 48 hour turnaround from booking to us carrying out inspections. We're doing our best to keep up, but people may see some slippage in the timeframes for code compliance certificates.

"This workload also places our planning team under pressure to assess district plan compliance and respond to your enquiries as people contemplate new business ventures and activities."



New dog park for Darfield

Darfield will be getting a new dog park, with an off-leash exercise area at McHughs Forest Park opening next month.

The fenced area at the southern end of the forest is due to open for dogs to run and play, on mid-July.

A dog park or off-leash exercise area received strong support during a public consultation day about future developments of McHughs Forest Park.

Work on the 275 metre long park began early this year. Fencing is being installed ahead of the opening and a rubbish bin and drinking fountain with a dog bowl will also be added.

Access to the park will be provided through gates at the north and south ends of the exercise area.

McHughs Forest Park will remain as an on-leash area for dogs as outlined within Council's dog control bylaws.

Heritage Funding helps preserve our identity

Preserving our identity and the history that shapes who we are is a key part of the Council's Heritage Fund.

The Heritage Fund is open for applications from Wednesday 1 to Wednesday 22 July for projects aimed at supporting the preservation of heritage buildings or trees in Selwyn.

Louise Deans of Homebush says the fund has been 'wonderful' in helping maintain the nine category one listed structures on the historic farm near Darfield. Looking after the buildings is expensive and the fund is a key support in maintaining sites of huge value to the district and its identity, she says.

"We have been extraordinarily grateful for the help it's given us. Funding is the only way to keep our heritage alive and well maintained so we can say, 'this is our history and who we are'. They're our identity long term, because they often last longer than people and give an enormous amount of pleasure."

The Heritage Fund has helped the family with restorations of an earthquake damaged well on the property, servicing a historic water turbine. The turbine was brought from Dayton, Ohio and installed in 1879.

"It was the height of the industrial revolution really. You have to see it to believe it, because it involved an enormous amount of engineering for the water from the Waianiwaniwa River to be harnessed to run the turbine."

The fund had also helped with maintenance of the historic woolshed, built in 1879 and one of the most well-known heritage buildings in the country, she said.

Youth helping shape district's future


Young people are being given the opportunity to help design one of Selwyn's biggest development projects.

Selwyn Open – Meating the need

This week we talk to Darfield Village Meats owner Blair Wards.

Blair Wards, had just moved back from America when he saw a butchers in Darfield that was closing. With 30 years' experience as a butcher he decided to take a chance.

"The opportunity arose and I thought there was a need for a butcher shop there. It's probably been more work than I anticipated," Blair laughs.

Blair met his wife while playing rugby and league in the states. The family moved to Darfield two and a half years ago to raise their kids, choosing Selwyn because Blair spent his youth in West Melton.

One of the few butchers in the area, Darfield Village Meats specialise in home kill where farmers can send their livestock to be processed.

On 1 April Darfield Village Meats would have celebrated a year of being open, but they were shut because of lockdown.

Supplying the Darfield Food Bank, their Home Kill service, deliveries during level three and support from the local Selwyn community kept them going.

The company is active in the community, supporting sports clubs and events, offering meat discounts and supplying sausages for BBQs.

Blair and his family also support local businesses, which he says is crucial for the survival of a community.

"If you don't rally around these local businesses, like the local pubs, fish and chip shops and bakeries, they'll just dissolve."



On the roads

ON THE ROADS

Tennyson Street is closed from 43 Tennyson Street to Markham Way due to the Rolleston Town Centre infrastructure upgrade. Due to the Lowes Road and Tennyson Street intersection upgrade, Lowes Road is one way on both sides of the intersection, with lanes

open for traffic heading away from the intersection, but not towards it. From Friday 25 to Monday 28 June Lowes Road will be closed on the west side of the intersection for resurfacing, weather permitting. A stop/go system and speed restrictions are also in place on Tennyson Street.

Leeston Road and Old Bridge Road intersection is being upgraded. Traffic management is in place.

Trents Road is closed on the south east side of the Springs Road intersection while upgrades are made to the sewer system.

Leeston Road and Brookside Irwell Road intersection is being upgraded. The intersection is closed to traffic looking to exit Brookside Irwell Road and a stop/go system is in place for traffic looking to turn from Leeston Road into Brookside Irwell Road.

Update on Proposed District Plan notification

The Council expects to notify the Proposed Selwyn District Plan for formal public consultation in early October. This follows the initial delay of the notification in the middle of this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. More detail on the public consultation will be available at the time of the notification.
