

The Tennyson Street and Lowes Road intersection in Rolleston will reopen this week following a major upgrade and installation of traffic lights.

The traffic lights and additional traffic and cycle lanes have been added during the upgrade, along with new adjoining footpath and cycleway connections, new streetlights, and drainage improvements.

The intersection upgrade was needed to meet the demand from extra traffic entering and exiting Rolleston via the State Highway 1/Weedons Road Interchange and along Tennyson Street.

Council Transportation Asset Manager Andrew Mazey says the upgraded intersection is a critical part of a long-running series of projects to fully upgrade Lowes Road to prepare for this.

The intersection is also the main connection between the growing residential areas in the southern part of Rolleston and the town centre and 11,000 vehicles per day travel across the Lowes Road intersection to and from Tennyson Street.

The upgrade will improve links between the town centre and Foster Park, Selwyn Aquatic Centre, schools and new residential areas to the south of Rolleston, Mr Mazey says.

It will also provide more safety for pedestrians and cyclists, particularly the large and growing number of Rolleston School students who cycle to and from school through the intersection.

The Council is grateful for the road users' patience with the road closures and diversions required to do this major work safely and effectively, he says.

Minor landscaping and tidy up work around the intersection will be completed over the next few weeks.

Aquatic Centre sees millions of visits over seven years

The Selwyn Aquatic Centre just gets more popular with age as it celebrates its seventh birthday.

More than 2.2 million people have visited the Aquatic Centre since it opened in June 2013. The number of people using the centre is growing each year, rising from 258,000 in its first year to 403,088 in the 2018/19 financial year. The centre was on track to top that number again this year before COVID-19 intervened.

Its popularity was proved by a rapid resurgence in visitor numbers after lockdown, with numbers higher than the same time last year and over 1000 people a day coming through during the school holidays.

The swim school has also seen steady growth, from 1,100 children taking lessons each term when the centre opened to around 2,200 enrolled each term for the past two years. Over 5,800 people a year also take part in the centre's aqua fitness classes.

Over the years the centre has hosted Swim Canterbury swim meets, provided space for scuba diving clubs, sports clubs and teams, physiotherapists and their clients, Burwood Hospital patients, disability groups and regularly hosts social events.



E-Scooters to stay in Selwyn

Selwyn has become the first New Zealand location outside a major urban centre to grant e-scooter licences.

The Council has issued an initial one-year licence to e-scooter operators Lava and Lime following a successful six-month trial that saw people taking around 3,800 rides a month pre-lockdown.

Lava and Lime will have a total of 220 scooters operating in Rolleston, Lincoln and Prebbleton, and on cycleways between the towns. The companies will pay an annual licence fee of \$72.79 a year per scooter.

With people taking 22,677 rides on scooters by mid-July, Mayor Sam Broughton says the scooters are another sign of Selwyn as a forward-looking district that embraces new ideas.

"It's great to see the scooters have been used by the community as an alternative to hopping in a car. I'm delighted that we now have a permanent environmentally friendly and convenient option for getting around our towns."

The Council granted a six-month trial to the companies to operate a total of 300 scooters, starting in mid-December last year. The trial was due to end in June, but was extended to the end of July because of the Level 4 lockdown period.

For the trial to mid-July people were using the scooters at an average of over 3,800 trips a month. There were no accidents or significant injuries reported over that time.

During the trial, there was one substantiated complaint of an e-scooter left on the road. The scooter in the road was rapidly removed and the company apologised.

There were two complaints of scooters blocking footpaths and Council staff found both scooters were correctly parked. Council also received 11 complaints from people who said they did not like the scooters.

The Councillors noted that the companies had been professional and accommodating of Council requests and have endeavoured to provide a quality service for e-scooter users within the district.
