

Thousands of people enjoyed the day out as the Selwyn Sports Centre was officially opened on Sunday.

Sir Richard Hadlee officially opened the building, before leading a group of local school children on the first tour

The opening was followed by a family day out where people could try out the new facilities as well as enjoying the Selwyn Aquatic Centre directly opposite, along with bouncy castles, pony rides and food trucks. Thousands of people enjoyed the day, and made donations to the Halberg Trust.

The \$21.5 million centre features New Zealand's first interactive digital playground, along with eight sports courts, a 240m indoor walking track and space for community sports groups to operate.

It was a joy to see the building so full and people having such a good time enjoying it, Selwyn Mayor Sam Broughton said.

"It's great to see the community able to get in here and to see so many people embracing the opportunity and having so much fun. It's a fantastic facility that will be a huge asset to our district now and long into the future, giving people more opportunities to get active and have fun together all year round.

The Sports Centre opening is the start of an exciting new chapter for the district as long-term plans for the dynamic, growing district begin to open, he said.

"This is a big year for us as this is the first of four major long-term projects worth over \$70 million that we'll be opening. The Sports Centre is a really fun way to start, knowing in 12 months' time we'll have the new extended pool, the health hub, Te Ara Atea and a new Rolleston town square as well.

Selwyn Netball, Selwyn United Football, local schools and the Selwyn Sports Trust will be among the key users and regional and South Island-wide tournaments are already booked.

There will also be a community house for community sports groups to run sports services from.

The four hard floor courts will be able to host community events such as markets or car shows.

Selwyn's say on next Long-Term Plan finishes

The Long-Term Plan for the next 10 years in Selwyn has got people talking with over 600 people having had their say.

Consultation on the Council's work programme over the next 10 years closed on Friday 30 April. We received more than 600 submissions from the time the consultation on the Long-Term Plan opened on 29 March. This is over 40% more submissions than were received during the last Long-Term Plan consultation in 2018.



A trip to go skiing turned into a new life and a new home for one proud Kiwi, welcomed at last week's citizenship ceremony.

Originally from England, Alistair Kerr was among 25 people from 10 different countries including Ukraine, the Philippines and Namibia who became citizens of Aotearoa at the latest Council citizenship ceremony.

Mr Kerr, who co-owns Gnomes Alpine Sports in Darfield, says he fell in love with New Zealand and Darfield in particular when he came on a visit to go skiing in 2001.

Fortunately, when he returned to Europe for the next ski season he met and fell in love with a woman from Darfield, Leith, who shared his passion for the snow. After a few years of going back and forth, taking in the winters in both hemispheres and working on ski fields, the pair decided to settle back in Darfield.

"Her father started the ski shop here in 1982 and in 2005 we agreed to buy the business. We were still going back to Europe for winters at the start, but we settled back permanently in 2007. I have always enjoyed it here, halfway between the city and the mountains. I like to go that way, up into the mountains, to go mountain biking or skiing. It's a really nice community with a local feel. People are really down to earth and everyone knows each other."

With the area being firmly home, the business booming despite the global pandemic and with a five year old son Brockton here he decided last year that it was time to finally officially become a Kiwi.

"It's home, I love it and I wasn't going to go anywhere else."



Libraries fill with music in May

Selwyn's libraries will be full with the sound of music over the next month.

Gigs, lessons, talks and more will all be on offer as part of the libraries' celebration of New Zealand Music Month.

Senior District Arts, Culture and Lifelong Learning Coordinator Mat Logan says there will be activities for all ages with live music, lessons and workshops to give people a taste of what was out there in music, and an opportunity to be involved.

"It's about being accessible, giving a space for anyone who's interested to get involved in or learn more about the arts. And to promote New Zealand Music Month and New Zealand music generally."

While the Level 4 Lockdown silenced the libraries over Music Month last year, live music will ring out again each weekend with Selwyn artists performing acoustic sessions at each library from 11am–1pm every Saturday over the month.

"That was really popular with people in 2019. We weren't able to run last year because of the lockdown, so it's cool to be able to bring that back and highlight local artists again this year," Mr Logan says.

The Christchurch Symphony Orchestra will be bringing another music month favourite back with its popular annual music trail visiting each library, aimed at introducing children to the orchestra with their fun, family-friendly sessions.

Internationally acclaimed Christchurch folk singer and songwriter Adam McGrath is among the star billings and is hosting a free short course on song writing at Lincoln Library on Thursday 6 May. Described by the NZ Herald as 'NZ's toughest minded songwriter', McGrath will be sharing his tips and experience in an evening for anyone with an interest in the process of song writing or a desire to add some new perspectives to their own song writing.*

Selwyn musician and seasoned busker Lynette Diaz will also be hosting an interactive introduction for anyone interested in busking in Lincoln and there will be guitar lessons for adults and children at all four libraries.*

On the Roads

From Monday 10 May until the end of June a new sewer line is being laid in Leeston along D'Arcy Street, Pultney Street, May Street and Pennington Street. There will be stop/go controls in place around the work site as it moves along this route, starting at the junction of
