

Traffic signals will be installed at the intersection of Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive in Rolleston in the coming months to replace the existing roundabout.

The Council has awarded a contract to Isaac Construction to upgrade the intersection including installing traffic signals to improve traffic flow and safety in the area.

During the early stages of construction, the intersection will need to be closed at times to allow the installation of services and pavement construction at the intersection. The exact dates and timeframes for this work will be confirmed closer to the time.

A new lane layout with right hand turning traffic lanes and cycle lanes will be part of the upgrade. Wider shared cycle and pedestrian paths will be installed, linking to the pathways recently installed to the north on Tennyson Street, along with signal crossings for bicycles and for pedestrians.

Rolleston Drive, west of Tennyson Street as far as the Rolleston Community Centre will be upgraded to improve access to the future Rolleston Town Centre and continue the lower speed environment in this area. New planted media islands and paved footpaths will be installed that will also improve pedestrian safety for those crossing from the adjoining Ambrose Estates reservers and walkways to the south.

The intersection will be a raised table intersection, lifted to the level of the kerb with the approaches rising gently as a traffic calming device to improve safety.

Council Transportation Asset Manager Andrew Mazey says the upgrade is an important step in ongoing upgrades to cater for traffic growth.

"It's great to get underway with this key roading project for Rolleston. We've planning this for a while and it will join a series of important intersection upgrades that have occurred to improve traffic flow and safety for all road users while also supporting the new town centre access into the future."

Community History Fund established

The Council has agreed to set up an interim fund to protect the district's history while a strategic heritage plan is developed.

Under the Long-Term Plan 2021-2031 the Council agreed to work with mana whenua and heritage groups to develop a strategic heritage plan.

Funding from the interim Selwyn Community History Fund is intended to support kaitiaki (guardians, conservators, and protectors), communities and community groups and their heritage activities while the plan is being developed.

It will support protecting, promoting and celebrating Selwyn's history and making it more accessible for residents and visitors.

The Council also agreed to establish the Selwyn Community History Committee to oversee the development of the heritage plan.

Council Group Manager Community Services and Facilities Denise Kidd says it is the start of a process to make real change in the way heritage is supported in Selwyn.

"We have many hard working, passionate groups in the Selwyn community who are dedicated to preserving our heritage and what has made us who we are as a community today. The Council has supported these groups individually over the years through various funds, but this partnership process will bring these groups together with a vision to preserve our past together."

Long-service to Selwyn farewelled

The Council said goodbye to almost four decades of experience when one of its longest serving staff members was farewelled last week.

The Selwyn District did not even exist when Mark Chamberlain began on a cadetship in the infrastructure team with the former Ellesmere County Council in May 1983, based in Leeston.

He worked in water and roading, before moving full-time to the roading team, becoming the Council's Transportation Asset Delivery Manager. Mr Chamberlain is leaving to take up a similar role at Ashburton District Council closer to family.

After 38 years he said he was leaving with fond memories of working in and for the district he grew up in.

"I'm always proud to say I work for the Council because I work for the community."

Council Infrastructure Group Manager Murray Washington said Ashburton was gaining a dependable, loyal, and extremely hardworking staff member.

"You have lead a team that has continued to deliver amidst significant growth," he said.

His care for his staff, knowledge and dedication to doing the best for Selwyn would be missed, Mr Washington said.

Faces of Selwyn – a sense of belonging in Selwyn

Catching a two-hour subway to work in Beijing and visiting his four year-old daughter at his parents' home on weekends, wasn't the lifestyle Jian Liu and his wife wanted.

"Every day we spent lots of time on the commute and then one day we said, 'This is not the life we want to experience," says Jian.

Together the couple started looking for a new country to call home.

"We did a little bit of research and because we studied agriculture, three countries came in at the top."

Canada was too cold and Australia seemed to have less of a focus on agriculture study, which lead them to choosing New Zealand, moving to Lincoln in November 2013.

Moving to New Zealand was a big culture shock, he says.

"I couldn't speak a whole English sentence when I came to New Zealand, so I had to go through a three month English course."

After completing his postgraduate diploma in agriculture science, Jian accepted a position with Plant and Food Research in Hawke's Bay.

He didn't really feel like he belonged in Hawke's Bay and missed Lincoln, he says.

Jian talked to his manager who gave him an opportunity to work at Plant and Food Research in Lincoln.

After visiting his parents in China, Jian realised Lincoln felt more like home than his birth country.

"When I got off the plane I just felt a little bit overwhelmed. 'Oh, this is so crowded compared to New Zealand'. Then I felt everything is a bit rushed, because I'm used to this slower lifestyle. When I came back to New Zealand I felt a sense of home. It really made me think, 'Oh which is my real home?' So I had a bit of struggle during that time, but I think I choose Selwyn as my home town now."

"Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer in men worldwide, but catch it early and the prognosis is good, I hope our team helps alerts men to the signs to watch out for."


Mayor Sam will follow a route through some of Selwyn's tough back country over three days.
