

Council raising questions on government's water reform proposal

The Council is seeking more information from the government on its three waters reform proposals, before deciding on its response.

The Council has released a new suite of information online at selwyn.govt.nz/threewaters and in today's Selwyn's Times on what is known so far about the government's proposal to reform drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services and the potential changes for Selwyn.

It has committed to consulting with the community before the end of the year on the government's proposal to reform drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services, provided the government retains the option for Councils to opt in or out of the reforms.

Mayor Sam Broughton says the Council is finalising its initial feedback to government and will be asking further questions of the Department of Internal Affairs before the end of this month. Selwyn has also taken a lead in calling for a pause in the government's reform process.

"We're asking the government for clearer information and for time as we are committed to consult with our community once the reform proposals are clarified. We will be making it clear in our feedback to the Government that we fully expect to consult with our community before we make any decision. We all want to know what happens next – and that's in the government's hands."

The Council's focus is to make sure communities continue to have secure, safe access to water services – and that future services are to the same quality standards that they currently enjoy, or better, he says.

The Council will be asking for more information about how projected future costs have been calculated, how local community input into decision making will be retained, and how local planning priorities will be protected under the proposed changes.

Events will include a Filipino cooking demonstration and language lessons, Japanese Budō, a Mexican Fiesta and a Family Cultural Diversity Day with Nigerian Hair Braiding, African Markets and International Games. The events will kick off on Tuesday 28 September with a demonstration on making Henna Candles at Leeston Library, Darfield Library on Wednesday 29 and Thursday 7 October at Lincoln Library.

Indonesia's rich history will be on display through books, musical instruments, puppets and other beautiful items collected by host Dewi Bealing, who says she is really excited to share her culture with Selwyn and the wider Canterbury.

"The books will shed light on the untold history of Indonesia. For me, it was an eye-opener and it's important because some of this I didn't learn in school in Indonesia. People will learn that there's more

to Indonesia than holiday destination Bali."

Dewi says she will wear traditional Indonesian clothing during the display's debut on Wednesday at Lincoln Library and is hoping others will dress up too.

An Indian cooking demonstration will teach how to transform fresh seasonal vegetables into a healthy dish full of flavour and spice. Host Monika Rastogi says she pleased her cooking demonstration can still go ahead.

"I am looking forward to meeting everyone and explaining more about all the foods. It feels very good to be involved with CultureFest because it involves multicultural, multi-ethnicities and inclusion and this is what I demonstrate in my Indian cooking classes. It is open for everyone, without any age restrictions so even children can come and be a part of it."

The many stories of Selwyn migrants will also be told through the new Faces of Selwyn podcasts playing 5pm every Tuesday to Thursday on PlainsFM 96.9FM, from 28 September until 14 October.

Opportunities to find out more about proposed Council representation changes

Selwyn residents will have another chance to ask questions and learn more about the changes to how they are represented at the next local elections.

The Council is hosting drop-in sessions around the district this week for people to learn more about the representation proposal that is out for consultation, and to give their feedback.

The proposal, which would apply from the next local elections in 2022, would adjust the ward structure and reduce the number of councillors to 10. It is part of the Council's representation review required at least every six years.

The Council's initial proposal for consultation retains a four ward structure but with changes to ward boundaries, and reduces the number of councillors from 11 to 10. The Selwyn Central ward would be replaced by a smaller Rolleston ward with three councillors rather than the current four. The other wards would retain their councillors.

The key changes in the proposal for consultation include:

- West Melton would move from the current Selwyn Central ward to the Malvern Ward
- The area between Burnham and Rolleston would move from the current Selwyn Central Ward to the Ellesmere Ward
- · An area east of Rolleston would move from the current Selwyn Central Ward to the Springs Ward.

The Malvern Community Board would be retained, with five members, elected from the existing subdivisions of Hawkins (2) and Tawera (1), and a new subdivision covering West Melton (2).

The Council is now inviting public submissions on the representation proposal. Submissions are open until 5pm, Monday 4 October. A hearing will be held on Wednesday 13 October for those who wish to be heard on their submissions.

Southbridge Hall and Library restoration project restarts

The next stage of the Southbridge Memorial Hall and Thompson Memorial Library Restoration Project is under way.

The external restoration includes replacement of the existing 26 Crittal style windows with identical steel replicas, including hardware and fittings, re-plastering and painting the exterior walls and general external maintenance. The project got under way last week.

A renewed driveway was also part of the project and was completed earlier this year.

Southbridge Memorial Hall and Thompson Memorial Library are Selwyn District Heritage buildings, built in 1930 to replace the former timber constructed Town Hall which was unfortunately lost in a fire.

Its Crittal style windows are quite a rare find now in New Zealand - particularly in Canterbury following the earthquakes. Retaining these uncommon architectural features is a key part of the restoration project, along with work to repair and protect the remainder of the hall for the long-term.

The project has been delayed by impacts from the pandemic including disruptions to steel supplies and lockdowns in Auckland that caused delays in the supply of the replacement steel windows from the manufacturers.

The project is expected to be completed by the end of this year, depending on weather and alert level changes.
