

Major upgrades to the Tennyson Street/Rolleston Drive intersection will begin in the new year to install traffic signals at the intersection and other upgrades.

This work will require some temporary road closures and one-way lanes while the work is completed.

From Monday 10 January

- · Rolleston Drive will be one-way westbound. The one-way restrictions will be in place until these upgrades are completed, which is expected to be in late April, weather permitting.
- · Tennyson Street will be closed either side of the intersection for five weeks. From mid-February weather permitting this section will be open to a one-way system southbound (towards Lincoln).

From Sunday 16 January

· The intersection will be closed from 9pm-6am daily for about two weeks.

Signed detours will be in place and temporary safe access for pedestrians and cyclists will be maintained throughout works. Temporary bus stops will be in place on Rolleston Drive and Lowes Road for the affected bus stops for the 820, 85 and 5 bus routes.

Along with the new traffic signals the upgrade will include a new lane layout with right hand turning traffic lanes and cycle lanes, linking to the pathways recently installed to the north on Tennyson Street, along with signal crossings for bicycles and for pedestrians.

Rolleston Drive, west of Tennyson Street as far as the Rolleston Community Centre, will be upgraded to improve access to the future Rolleston town centre.

Opportunity for more young people to blaze a trail

A Council internship programme to help young people into work is already having an impact just weeks after the first intake.

The first six interns for the Council's Trailblazers internship have graduated with two interns already getting into full-time employment thanks to the programme.

Trailblazers is a collaboration by the Council and Youth Pathways, with support from the Ministry of Social Development (MSD) for people who are unemployed or working less than 30 hours a week.

It includes 25 hours of placement hours with the Council including working in libraries, the Selwyn Sports Centre and events planning.

The programme also focuses on fitness and health, cultural wellbeing and exploration, and life skills development. It includes presentations from a number of guest speakers in local business.

Two of the interns gained full-time employment following the six-week work readiness course including placement, while others are actively seeking employment in Selwyn.

Council Community Services and Facilities Group Manager Denise Kidd says it was great to see the success for the first intake and the Council is excited to see the continued impact of the programme over the next year.

"We've tested and refined the programme over this intake and it's been fantastic to see how the interns enjoyed their time and how positive they were about the benefits. Local government is a great place to work and it really does improve community life. Skills and experiences gained through these roles are also hugely relevant to a wide range of other jobs in the community."

Applications are now open for Intake 2 which starts on Monday 14 February 2022. Applications close on Friday 31 December 2021. Battery recycling programme launches in Selwyn

The Council and E-Cycle have partnered up to bring a battery recycling programme to Selwyn.

It will be the first easily accessible battery recycling programme across the district covering everything from laptop, smartphone and tool batteries to batteries for common household devices.

The free recycling programme will divert batteries from landfill – with batteries previously being either disposed of as rubbish in kerbside bins, or taken to the Pines Resource Recovery Park for disposal as hazardous waste.

New World supermarkets are supporting the initiative with drop off points at New World Rolleston, and New World Lincoln, as well as at the Darfield Library and Service Centre and the Pines Resource Recovery Park. The Ministry for the Environment has assisted with some of the initial set up and processing costs.

Council Solid Waste Manager Andrew Boyd says it is another opportunity to make a difference with our waste and to improve our environment.

"It's great to have support from Kiwi companies and to make the most of international technology to help our community recycle these batteries and keep them out of landfill.

Thousands of tonnes of batteries are imported into Aotearoa New Zealand every year.

As the demand for battery-powered devices increases, it is increasingly important we maximise recycling and recovering these resources by keeping them out of landfill."

Improper battery disposal is also a fire risk in kerbside collection trucks and at the recovery park, he says.

The batteries will be sent for recycling in Australia – where 70-90% of each battery is recycled into new batteries or ingredients in roading mixes and fertilisers. Nickel-cadmium and Lithium-ion batteries are forwarded to a specialist recycling plant in South Korea.

The service accepts household quantities of the following battery types:

- · Lithium-ion (used in laptops, mobile phones, tools)
- · Alkaline, drycell and zinc (used in flashlights, radios, remote controls, smoke detectors)
- · Button cell/coin (used in watches, hearing aids)
- · Nickel-cadmium (used in portable electronics, tools, toys)
- · Nickel-metal hydride (used in digital cameras, laptops, mobile phones)

ACCESSING COUNCIL FACILITIES AT ORANGE SETTING

Selwyn district is operating at the Orange setting of the national Traffic Lights (Covid-19 Protection) Framework. At Orange, vaccine passes are required to visit many Council facilities. For more information on accessing our services at Orange visit selwyn.govt.nz/covid19.

COUNCIL SERVICES HOLIDAY HOURS

Here is a summary of Selwyn District Council services and opening hours during the holiday period.

The Council's Rolleston Offices will be closed from midday Friday 24 December, reopening 8.30am Wednesday 5 January. Rubbish and recycling collections will proceed as normal.

Pines Resource Recovery Park is closed Saturday 25 December and Saturday 1 January. Open standard opening hours for the rest of the holiday period (9am–4.30pm).

All Selwyn Libraries and service centres will close at midday on Friday 24 December, reopening 10am–4pm on 29, 30 and 31 December and closed 1–4 January. Normal hours resume from Wednesday 5 January.

All Council-managed community centres are closed from midday on Friday 24 December, reopening Monday 10 January with shortened hours based on bookings and group fitness timetables. Facilities will be open between these dates for pre-arranged events or bookings. Selwyn Sports Centre will be closed from midday Friday 24 December, reopening with reduced hours from Wednesday 5 January to Sunday 9 January. Normal hours resume from Monday 10 January.

Selwyn Aquatic Centre will be closed on public holidays: Saturday 25 December, Sunday 26 December and Saturday 1 January and Sunday 2 January.

Darfield, Southbridge and
Sheffield community pools
will be closed Saturday
25 December, Sunday 26
December and Saturday 1
January.

Sheffield Pool will also be closed on Sunday 2 January.

All three pools will be open normal hours (1–7pm) on all other days.

Animal Control services are available, operating 24 hours 7 days a week.

The last full day of building inspections is Tuesday 21 December. Normal hours resume from Tuesday 5 January. The Council's customer contact line will be operating 24 hours a day over the Christmas and New Year break for urgent issues, phone 0800 SELWYN (735 996). I love serving as the Mayor of our incredible district, full of passionate, creative and flexible people and families who look out for one another



On the Roads
