

Selwyn Libraries celebrates growth in memberships and loans

More than 10,000 new members have signed up to Selwyn Libraries in the past year.

Both memberships and loans grew, with library members increasing to over 28,000 people, an increase of 39%, compared to around 17,000 in the previous year.

Digital and physical loans were also up by 27.5% over the same period, with over 500,000 issues.

Manager Arts, Culture and Lifelong Learning, Nicki Moen attributes the result to providing welcoming spaces, inclusive programming and a growing focus on digital content.

"We've focused on being good hosts regardless of whether our members are visiting us online or within our spaces," says Nicki.

"It's nice to see more people using our libraries, which is heartening considering the Covid-19 lockdown and the associated restrictions it placed on our service. It really confirms the importance of libraries as places to come together as a community. Our diverse and talented team provide a wonderful service."

Despite the lockdown, the Libraries team ran over 2,500 programmes at its four libraries and in outlying communities via the Edge Connector Vehicle.

"The result also reflects our commitment to reaching all corners of our district and bringing newcomers into our spaces. We're also very keen to welcome people back that haven't visited us in a while. We're currently working to remove some historic fines to make this easier too," says Nicki.

Selwyn Libraries are located in Rolleston, Leeston, Lincoln and Darfield. Rolleston Library will close in November this year to coincide with the opening of Te Ara Ātea on Tennyson Street—which will house the new library as part of its services.

Support to help young people follow their dreams

Support is available once again for Selwyn young people to achieve in higher education.

Applications are open for the Council's annual Tertiary Education Scholarships, supporting Selwyn young people who are leaving school and heading into higher education or training next year. Scholarships of up to \$3000 provide payment towards fees, and costs associated with buying books and equipment required for their study or training.

The scholarships are available for year 12 and 13 students who live and study in Selwyn and are planning to undertake full-time post-secondary school education or training at a recognised New Zealand university, polytechnic or training institution next year.

Applications are encouraged from students who have achieved outstanding success in academic, sports, cultural, arts, social responsibility or other areas, either at school or in their community. Those who have overcome barriers or hardships to achieve are encouraged to apply.

Applications are open until the end of September.

For the first time this year, young people will have the option to make a video submission talking about their passion and goals.

On the Roads

Traffic management is in place on these roads.

Selwyn launches Flood Relief Fund

Selwyn residents who suffered hardship or damage to their property during the recent floods can apply to the Council for financial support.

The Council has opened the Mayoral Relief Fund for Selwyn residents affected by recent flooding who have not been able to access other support such as insurance or government funding.

A funds allocation panel, including Mayor Sam Broughton and Selwyn Recovery Manager Al Lawn, will assess new applications and allocate funding through August. The fund will close once the total has been allocated.

Mayor Sam Broughton says the fund is a further way for the Council to help those affected by the flooding.

"Our Civil Defence teams and local volunteers did a fantastic job of looking after people during the flooding and afterwards. We have also seen government and other agencies providing support. This fund is limited but will support those who have suffered hardship."

The \$4 million Canterbury Flood Relief Fund has also opened to support farmers through the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI). If you believe you are eligible, please apply.

Sharing space on shared paths

You may have noticed more of these signs popping up on certain paths around the district. This sign shows that the path is a 'shared path'.

A shared path is a path that can be used by pedestrians, cyclists, mobility devices and wheeled recreational devices (such as skateboards and scooters).

Shared paths are wider than a standard footpath to safely accommodate more user types. Next time you are using a shared path please be considerate of others using the path. It is important that you look out for others, slow down, and pass with care.

Cyclists should use their bell to let others know that they are approaching and all users should keep left unless passing, to give other users space.

A gathering place at Darfield Recreation and Community Centre

Continuing our occasional series putting the spot light on some of our community halls and the great service they provide, this week with Darfield Recreation and Community Centre.

Darfield Recreation and Community Centre is becoming something of a star after an increase in people using the hall this year, including a huge Matariki event.

The popular hall decorated in art from surrounding schools and preschools set the scene for Two Rivers Trust's third Matariki in Malvern event at the end of June with 500 people enjoying kapa haka, a Matariki Macarena, a hāngi and hands-on activity stations.

Organisers Kelly Maude and Kay Kala said the cost of hiring the centre was affordable and they were super proud of how the event went, saying it was the best of the three Matariki events they've had.

"It was a fantastic turn out from a very supportive community."

Kay said the kitchen space at the centre worked well for the large event and there was enough room for the four large groups of performers to prepare before they went on stage. She said the layout of the stage helped make the night run smoothly and there was an easy set up and pack down.

The Matariki event was the latest in a series of new events, including many from the Council, driven by a community survey last year, where over 200 people gave feedback on what they wanted to see at the hall.

Events have caused an increase in usage of the centre by community members for everything from Zumba classes to line dancing, bowls, business meetings and craft days.

Fleur Earl, one of two Malvern-wide facilities caretakers says the feedback she received around these events was really positive.

"People said it's nice that we can just go down to our local hall to these events. It's like having a bit of your own open day at your local hall, getting to know where your local hall is and the different spaces it has to offer.
