

From carnivorous plants to customised camper vans - an innovative group of Selwyn entrep

Minister for Seniors Ayesha Verrall dropped in to hear from 12 Selwyn residents who have been part of a first of its kind programme in New Zealand, helping late in life entrepreneurs bring their business

The Starting a Business Later in Life programme was organised by the Council together with business coach and mentor Dr Chris Kirk and received funding from the government's Te Tari Kaumātua, Office for Seniors

Minister Verrall visited Te Ara Ātea to meet with course members and organisers to learn how it worked, with a view to possibly funding the programme to expand beyond Selwyn.

The course involved the group meeting weekly for four weeks for group workshops as well as working with a business mentor on researching and planning their business. With the workshop phase over, the course members will continue to be supported through an enterprise hub where they can meet with each other and their business mentors weekly to discuss ongoing issues

The ideas included plans for Selwyn's first authentic Mexican taqueria, massage therapy and support for people recovering from depression and anxiety, a lawn care business, an art retreat, customised picture frames, a bed and breakfast and converting a historic home to an event space.

Helen Pidwerbesky, who is planning a business as a professional organiser, told the Minister the group had been a huge support.

"I particularly found working with people around the same age important. Quite often we don't know what the young ones know so it was good to be with people with the same questions and

The group has put a huge amount of work into the course, Dr Kirk says and he has high hopes for them.

"I have spent a good deal of my life teaching and workshopping with under graduates and graduates and I have been very impressed with the attitude of the people in this programme. Age and experience is your edge to getting started, but I'm looking for 12 businesses out the end."

Next stage of Kirwee Reserve extension under way

A new playground, cricket nets and other upgrades are being installed at the Kirwee Reserve as the next stage in the reserve upgrade, which started last year.

Two new pedestrian entrances are being added from the Tramway Road side of the reserve in addition to other tidy ups to the Tramway Road side of the reserve and some ground levelling. New cricket practice nets are being built to support the use of the reserve for cricket over the summer months.

Construction of the new playground has also begun. The new playground will replace the existing playground and be located in a new central area in the reserve and is due to be open in mid-June. It

will feature a mix of equipment designed for a wide range of ages, including a basket swing, slides and a see saw, along with shade sails, picnic tables and a bike rack.

The first stage of the Reserve Development Master Plan saw a cricket oval, new irrigation, new sports field lighting and a pump track installed last year

The Kirwee Recreation Reserve Management Committee and the Council have worked together on the Master Plan. Project Manager Sandrine Carrara says "it's great to progress this second stage of works, and really exciting for the local children of Kirwee get to spend time on a new fantastic playground in the near future"



Dog registrations start soon

If you're a dog owner, a dog re-registration notice will arrive in your inbox or letterbox by 1 July. If you have changed your email or postal address since last year's registration, please contact Animal Control on 0800 SELWYN (735 996) or contactus@selwyn.govt.nz, so your details can be updated

All dogs older than three months must be registered every year (July-June period) as per the Dog Control Act 1996. There's a \$300 fine for an unregistered dog.

Dog registration fees help fund community education and the Dog Smart programme in schools, our free microchipping for the district's dogs, the Council's 24/7 dog control operation and the dog pound.

If paid before 1 August 2022, the discounted registration fee is \$45 for one dog. If paid after, the full registration fee is \$60.

Last year, we introduced a new metal tag - One Tag - which is designed to last a dog's lifetime and means you won't need to swap a plastic tag every year. You can find more information on dog registration and the One Tag at selwyn.govt.nz/dogregistration.

On the Roads

Darfield Kirwee Wastewater Pipeline

Aylesbury Road between SH1 and Burdons Road is one way northbound from SH1 until 1 July. Courtenay Road between Miles Road and Kirwee (SH73) is closed until 22 July. Miles Road between Aylesbury Road and

Courtenay Road is closed until 27 May. Burnham Road between SH1 and Burnham School Road will be one way until 1 July. All completion dates are approximate depending on weather.

Weedons Ross Road seal widening

Weedons Ross Road is one-way open to traffic travelling south (towards Rolleston), for the duration of the project. The work area is currently from Johnsons Road to Finlays Road and will move south as sections are completed. Finlays Road and Johnsons Road will be closed at the intersection with Weedons Ross Road this week for intersection upgrades. Detours are in place. Please follow the one-way system for the safety of all road users and workers.

Other repairs and upgrades

A culvert is being constructed on Colliers Road from Bluff Road. Stopgo systems are in place for these works.

Swamp Road Bridge between Bluff Road and Pig Saddle Road is closed for repairs.

Repairs and maintenance are taking place on Boultons Road from Kimberley Road to Tramway Road, Wards Road from Telegraph Road to Greendale Road, Sleemens Road from Rakaia Terrace Road,

Auckenflower Road from Deans Road to Kimberley Road, Railway Road from Jones Road and Blakes Road from Springs Road to Elmwood Drive.

Stay safe on the roads this winter

Winter is back, with a new set of challenges for driving - we're encouraging drivers to take a few simple steps to drive safe.

As the weather changes driving challenges can change quickly with fog, ice, snow, rain, shorter daylight hours and sunstrike. The district has many shaded areas, which prevent roads from thawing on cooler days. Staying alert and taking extra care is essential, but winter driving does not have to be dangerous or intimidating. Especially not if you remember the four key tips for winter driving:

Plan Ahead - Stay Alert - Slow Down - Drop Back.

Prepare your vehicle before you start your journey. Make sure your wiper blades, headlights and tyres are in good condition and your windscreen is clear inside and out. Before winter really sets in, ensure any necessary maintenance for your vehicle has been completed so you don't get stranded.

Prepare for your trip, know your route, check for weather conditions, road closures, road works. Plan for food, water, kids and pet's needs. Better to have supplies and not need them than get stuck and be hungry.

Make sure you can see clearly through your windows in all directions to enable you to see at risk areas on the road. Scanning further ahead gives you time to assess any risk. Be alert for other road users preparing for and anticipating other's actions can help reduce the need to make emergency manoeuvrers in poor weather conditions

Be alert to what's in front of you. Don't get caught out by a stop sign that just appears. Stay alert, plan ahead, keep your driving smooth and controlled - this helps reduce the risk of loss of traction.

SLOW DOWN


Slowing down slightly will greatly increase your ability to react and control your vehicle. We all know that time someone flew past and you're only two cars back from them at the next town. It's not worth the risk.

DROP BACK

Dropping back gives you more stopping distance, time to react and better line of sight to assess the road conditions. Following too close may cause panic in the driver you are following, creating an unexpected behaviour which you may not have time to avoid.
