

An epic afternoon of events with a skate comp, hip hop, basketball, street art, a nerf war and so much more will celebrate the opening of the new youth space in the Rolleston town centre.

A packed afternoon of food and fun on Saturday 11 December will mark the official opening of the youth space at Rolleston Reserve next to the new town centre.

Youth Council Chair Rue Jeche says it will be great to see such a fantastic space open. "The youth space is an awesome place for us to be able to come together and engage in fun and inclusive activities that are local to Selwyn."

Throughout the event there will be skateboarding, professional demonstrations and competitions by Nelson Creek Skateboards and Outsiders skate shop. Street art, demonstrations and have-a-go hosted by Canvas Arts, inflatables, horizontal bungee, sumo suits, nerf war, food and music will also light up the space.

The youth space's half basketball court and netball zone will get a workout with Mayor Sam Broughton opening the proceedings with a shoot out comp and Selwyn Hawks basketball team finishing the day off with skills, drills and 3 x 3 games. The gaga ball pit will also be a site of fun rivalries with an interschools competition.

The area, designed in collaboration with input from students at Selwyn's four high schools, also features a range of hang out areas, and a large 'Eagle Claw' basket swing.

The youth space opening will be the second of two events in Rolleston town centre, with a market day from 9am-1pm run by Rolleston Fields with stalls, face painting, balloon art and more showcasing the new businesses in the town centre.

Council and Te Taumutu Rūnanga forge new path together

Te Taumutu Rūnanga and the Council have agreed a new era of partnership, signing a relationship agreement at a formal ceremony at Te Pā o Moki, Taumutu.

The agreement builds on an already strong relationship between the Rūnanga and the Council, laying down a marker for future collaboration where both parties can work to benefit the whole district, Te Taumutu Rūnanga Chair Liz Brown says.

"This is a pou whenua that we are putting in place to mark the significance of Taumutu and our relationship with Selwyn District Council. While we have a good relationship, we need something

formal that doesn't rely on individuals. This sets that marker in the ground for us and future generations and gives us something to go forward with together."

The agreement acknowledges both parties' commitments to grow a new era of Local Government reflecting the role of mana whenua as a Treaty partner of the Crown. It acknowledges their roles and responsibilities and sets out structures for working

together to deliver the best possible environmental and community outcomes.

Mayor Sam Broughton says it builds on a history of working together. "The fruits of that partnership are evident in so much of what is great about our district, the most recent examples of this being Te Ara Ātea and Kakaha Park; two facilities embraced by our community. It's fantastic that we are now formally recognising our relationship and I'm looking forward to the new opportunities our agreement brings for the wellbeing of our communities, our environment and for our continued prosperity.

"Te Taumutu Rūnanga is already successfully involved in joint decision-making processes with the Council through the Canterbury Water Management Strategy and the District Plan review. The is another milestone on the relationship journey between the Council mana whenua and tangata whenua for Waikirikiri Selwyn."

Greendale's 160-year-old cottage protected for future generations

When TW Adams began planting trees at Greendale in the mid-1800s, he wanted to provide shelter on the windswept Canterbury Plains, now a new installation is sheltering his 160-year-old sod cottage.

The Greendale Community Trust has finished building a canopy to protect the cottage Alfred Albert Thomas William (known as TW) Adams built at his arboretum in 1865 – part of the trusts' work to restore the historically significant arboretum.

Trust Secretary Ruth Warren says she's delighted with how the neglected site has been transformed.

"When we began working on the arboretum in 2016, it was completely overgrown and inaccessible. After TW died in 1919, there had been no funds to maintain it. Now it is open for people to enjoy and learn about its history."

Adams - an international authority on forestry - settled in Greendale in 1862 and started an arboretum growing 800 tree species and 500 fruit tree varieties. Some are now the only ones of their kind in Aotearoa, and several are extinct or endangered in their countries of origin.



To make a home, Adams dug down into the ground and used the earth to build his cottage.

The cottage's protective shelter was made possible thanks to volunteers from the Trust and community, as well as a \$4,000 heritage grant from Selwyn District Council. The grant will open again for applications in June 2023.

"It's been a great project, and I'd like to thank all the people who've donated their time and skills to preserve our history," Ruth says.

Biodiversity projects making good progress

Restoring and planning the creation of new wetlands, and assessing and protecting more significant biodiversity sites were among the Council's work to enhance native flora and fauna this year.

The Council's biodiversity work programme has been making good progress in the past 12 months, and Senior Biodiversity Officer Andy Spanton says the efforts will have long-term benefits.

"Right across Canterbury, there's been a proactive focus on managing and protecting our indigenous biodiversity, and we're really proud to be partnering with iwi, our neighbouring councils, landowners and our community to make a difference."



Animal pest control and weed management are a key focus

for the Tārerekautuku Yarrs Lagoon restoration project, near Lincoln. The Council received almost \$800,000 from the Government's Freshwater Improvement Fund last December to restore the significant wetland, and restoration activities began in autumn 2022.

After purchasing land above Coes Ford in 2021, the Council has been working closely with manawhenua, landowners and Environment Canterbury to design a water cleaning wetland and recreation space that may connect Coes and Chamberlains Fords. These designs are being finalised, and a Mātauranga Māori cultural assessment will be carried out.

Ongoing biodiversity assessments have seen four more sites added to Council's list of Significant Natural Areas in 2022. There are now 73 Significant Natural Areas. Landowners, managers and community groups have been helped to protect and restore some of these sites through the Council's Significant Natural Environment Fund.

"The progress we've made to preserve and enhance biodiversity values this year has been promising," Andy says.

SH1 Rolleston plans progressing

Waka Kotahi has provided an update on the latest stage of the State Highway 1 Rolleston upgrade.

Thank you for your feedback

Thank you to everyone who took the time to give feedback on the recommended plans for SH1 Rolleston earlier this year. In total Waka Kotahi received 756 pieces of feedback. The community engagement summary is now available on the project website, including an overview of the feedback received and responses to key concerns. The project website has lots of helpful information such as a 'frequently asked questions' tab. The publications tab features project maps and a transport investigations document summarising the options Waka Kotahi considered and reasons for the recommended plan.

Next steps and coming up

Findings from the second round of public consultation have been incorporated into the concept design - expected to be finalised in 2023.

Once the business case is approved, Waka Kotahi will begin work on more detailed designs, gaining consents and progressing talks with affected property owners.

Working in partnership, Waka Kotahi and mana whenua - Te Taumutu Rūnanga and Te Ngāi Tūāhuriri Rūnanga - have started to explore opportunities on how cultural narratives could be incorporated into the project. While it's early days, we look forward to sharing more with the community as mahi progresses.
