

Faces of Selwyn returns to the air waves this month with seven stories from residents sharing their journeys to Selwyn and how to cook their favourite dishes.

And on Thursday 15, try peda for dessert with Farin Nisa, as she shares her journey from Fiji

Next week, turn on your stove, get out your pots and pans, and tune into 96.9FM at 5pm on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

Hear how to make Samoan Saka from Keith Morrison, discover Razi Syed's simple side dish of Indian Naan, find out what Mafatty and an African Braai is from Rue Jeche and lastly, learn a Palestinian family fatteh recipe from Hiba Elhanafy.

Voting papers are on their way

Watch out for voting papers in your mailbox later this week – as voting gets under way in Selwyn's local elections.

Voting papers will be mailed to all enrolled voters over the next few days, and the official voting period opens on Friday (16 September). Voting is by postal vote and closes at 12 midday on Saturday 8 October.

"This is a really important opportunity for Selwyn residents to have a say on the district's future – and it only comes around once every three years," says Deputy Electoral Officer Stephen Hill.

"We encourage people to take time to find out about the candidates in their area, then complete the voting forms and drop them into the post."

Voting papers can be posted at any NZ Post postbox, and the Council is also providing ballot boxes at the Council offices all Solvey libraries and many of the Council offices all Solvey libraries and many of the Council of the Coun

As well as Selwyn council elections, voting papers will also include candidates standing for your Environment Canterbury constituency. Voting papers include instructions on how to cast your vote.

If you don't receive voting papers, it may be because you're not enrolled, or have recently moved into the district or changed address – but you can still vote by special vote.

"I'd encourage anyone who hasn't yet enrolled or updated their details to do so and cast a special vote."

Name and location confirmed for new Leeston Community Centre

A name and location have been decided for the new Leeston Library and Community Centre, which is expected to open within the next three years.

The facility, which is one of Selwyn District Council's major projects in its Long Term Plan for 2021-2031, will be built next to Leeston Reserve. The decision was confirmed at the Council's August meeting, after consultation with the local community.

The community centre and library building will be called Whata Rau – a name that has been generously gifted by Te Taumutu Rūnanga. It references the food platforms that could historically be seen by travellers on the flat landscape of Kā Pākihi Whakatekateka o Waitaha (the Canterbury Plains). The platforms signalled pā and the likelihood of food and manaaki/hospitality.

In gifting the name, the rūnanga noted that the name recognises the many platforms and storage houses of knowledge and resources to be found throughout the district. Whata Rau were the epitome of manaaki – care, respect and hospitality – which is at the heart of venues such as community centres and libraries. The name also references the abundance of resources from Te Kete Ika a Rākaihautū, Te Waihora (Lake Ellesmere).

"Whata Rau is a very generous gift from Te Taumutu and I would like to wholeheartedly thank the Rūnanga," Council Group Manager Community Services and Facilities Denise Kidd says.

Construction is planned to take place in the 2024/2025 financial year.

Last week for feedback on medium density rules

This week is the last opportunity to have your say on new housing intensification rules and how they will apply in Selwyn district.

New legislation requires five of the largest urban environments in New Zealand – including parts of Selwyn – to enable an increase in housing supply, through a new Medium Density Residential Zone in relevant areas.

"While changes set out by the Government to encourage housing supply are not optional, people have the chance to shape the details of what is affected," Council Group Manager Development and Growth Tim Harris says.

"Anyone can make a submission about new land that is proposed to be rezoned from rural to residential. There are also places that the Council can deem inappropriate to have the new medium density standards applied to. This includes protecting significant infrastructure or the history, cultural or ecological value of a place," he says.

The new housing intensification rules will allow for more housing and at greater heights in current residential areas in Rolleston, Lincoln and Prebbleton. Within these areas, landowners will be able to build up to three buildings at a maximum of three storeys high without requiring a resource consent.
