A new six-month long exhibition, just opened at Te Ara Ātea, has completely changed the 'vibe' in the building.

Pahū! is inspired by the observations of visitors who have visited Te Ara Ātea in Rolleston for the first time. It opened on Thursday and holds some surprises, according to Co-Leader of Te Ara Ātea, Mat Logan.

Pahū means burst or pop, so visitors to Te Ara Ātea will encounter unexpected artworks in unexpected places; in glass cabinets but also exploding from the walls and ceiling.

Mat says it's an exciting opportunity to show just how well Te Ara Ātea can blend art exhibitions, a public library, community spaces and heritage experiences in one place.

"Some people might not normally visit a public art gallery but do visit Te Ara Ātea, so they will get the chance to see significant contemporary New Zealand art of the highest standard," he says. "We think visitors will really enjoy the exciting and surprising artworks on display."

Pahū! features works by Janna van Hasselt, Judy Darragh, Miranda Parkes, Turumeke Harrington and Clara Wells, each responding to the multi-use nature of the showcase building with an air of mischief.

Pahū! curator Chloe Cull, Arts Programme Coordinator at Te Ara Ātea, says that the artists have approached this exhibition with a sense of celebration, hoping to surprise visitors with bold colours, shapes, and materials.

Clara Wells and Turumeke Harrington have even used Te Ara Ātea to inspire some new works. Wells' work spans 20 metres of curved wall from the main entrance and transmits messages across an ethereal background.

Harrington's work Hei Aho acts as a place marker. It is underpinned by cultural stories and taonga species like flounder (pātiki) and the cabbage tree (tī kōuka). Tī kōuka was used by her Ngāi Tahu ancestors as signposts on the Canterbury plains. Her work is a glowing beacon in the first-floor window of the building.

Mat says the plan is for exhibitions at Te Ara $\bar{\text{A}}$ tea to rotate about every six months.

The key to safer driving in Selwyn

The rain poured down outside Te Ara Ātea last Tuesday, as the keys to the new Community Driver Mentor Programme (CDMP) vehicle were handed over to Proactive Driving Instructor, John Langan by Lions member, John Benefield (photo, centre left).

This event hosted by Proactive Drive who run the CDMP, achnowledged the Council's sponsorship of the car, alongside other sponsors including Selwyn Lions, Rolleston Lions and Faringdon Rolleston.

The CDMP helps new drivers in Selwyn to obtain their restricted

or full licence, by overcoming barriers stopping them from learning how to drive — such as cost and access to a vehicle or lessons.

The Council supports each learner with three driving lessons from a driving instructor from Proactive Drive. This sponsorship significantly reduces the cost for the learner.

Faye Lammers, Selwyn's CDMP Coordinator says it is a privilege to be involved with a programme which has so many positive outcomes.

"The sponsorship of this vehicle is incredibly important. Having a licence not only increases confidence and the ability to be independent, it also opens up employment opportunities and reduces the isolation often experienced in a rural district."

Currently there are about 30 driving mentors involved with this programme throughout Selwyn.



The Selwyn Stars for 2022 have been crowned. The talent search finals held at the Rolleston Community Centre featured 12 finalists as young as 5, performing a range of acts from singing and dancing to playing the bagpipes, drums and violin.

First place went to 13-year-old Maddison McDonald who performed Lost, a lyrical dance choreographed by Chloe Levings. Maddie has been working with Chloe since the age of 9, inspiring her to perform whenever she can.

Second place was Belle Switalla, aged 12. She performed Circus, a jazz solo. Belle dreams of being a professional dancer. Her goal is to go to New Zealand School of Dance and hopefully one day dance on Broadway.

11-year-old Libby Houghton took third place, singing and tap dancing Naughty, from the Broadway musical Matilda, based on the popular book by Roald Dahl. The song celebrates the idea that sometimes you have to cause a little mischief and be a bit naughty.

More than 40 competitors entered Selwyn Stars this year. The winners took home prizes including an iPad mini, Instax mini camera and UE Wonder Boom.

Other winners included Ethan Jack, a magician, and drummer Natalie McKay. The audience engagement prize went to Amelia Albin performing a Bollywood dance, and the prize for enthusiasm was won by dancer Carys McDonald.







Local elections - do you know what ward you're in?

Selwyn voters at the upcoming local elections are being encouraged to familiarise themselves with new ward boundaries – as most of them have changed.

Unprecedented population growth has resulted in a new Rolleston Ward replacing the former Selwyn Central, with three councillors instead of the current four.

All other wards keep the same representation, but West Melton is now part of the Malvern Ward, while an area between Burnham and Rolleston moves to the Ellesmere Ward.

The Malvern Community Board keeps five members elected from the Hawkins and Tawera subdivisions, plus a new subdivision covering West Melton.

The total number of councillors drops from 11 to 10, elected from the four wards, with the mayor to be elected across the entire district.

Nominations for Council, Community Board and Mayor opened on Friday and close at midday on Friday 12 August. Voting packs will go out the following month, with postal voting open from 16 September to election day, Saturday 8 October .

On the Roads

Darfield Kirwee Wastewater Pipeline

Ansons Road is now reopened.

Courtenay Road from the railway lines to SH73 is expected to be closed from late July until early September, to allow installation of pipes under the rail.

Burnham Road will be reopened this week.

All completion dates are approximate depending on weather

Weedons Ross Road seal widening

The road is now fully open to two-way traffic from Kingsdowne Drive to Maddisons Road. A shoulder closure is now in place for Orion contract works, on the Newtons Road intersection through to early August. Manual four-way stop/go will be required on some days. Please follow signs and controls for the safety of all road users and workers.

Other repairs and upgrades

Guardrail repairs are scheduled on Bealey Road, Darfield, between Greendale Road and Clintons Road. Stop-go is in place.

Soakhole construction is continuing on Genesis Drive, West Melton, from Sandy Knolls Road. Culvert repairs are under way in Rakaia Terrace Road between Te Pirita Road and Ardlui Road. Drainage maintenance is in progress at Hummocks Road, from Greendale Road to Kowhai Drive. Please pass with care at these locations



Flood repairs - repairs to recent flood damage on roads are continuing in multiple locations across the district.
