



Thousands of residents have been enjoying Summer in Selwyn events around the district, halfway through the summer fun.

This year's packed events calendar has seen a huge range of events from crafts to sports, movies, and markets—with the Council still looking to run as many events as possible under the Red setting, right up to the end of March.

Among this year's new events, ninja training was a hit, providing big smiles for the aspiring ninjas.

The annual Teddy Bears' Picnic saw 1200 children and adults and even more teddies enjoying a fun day out in the sun. Along with pony rides, face painting, bouncy castles and the annual teddy bear parade children and bears were excited by a visit from Spiderman and a host of Disney princesses.

New events to come include social sport taster sessions at the Selwyn Sports Centre, learning archery with the Ellesmere Archery Club, events about our environment with sessions on the migration of Selwyn's bird flocks and native plant propogation, a Star Wars quiz and learning the art of mixing your own mocktails for the adults among others.

The Council is reviewing all events and the possibility of these continuing under the Red setting. With vaccine pass requirements in place it is hoped that many events can still continue, but some may need to be cancelled, or will have capacity limits in place.

### Council services and facilities at Red setting

All Council services and facilities are now operating at the Red setting of the Traffic Lights COVID-19 protection framework. All services and facilities will be open as normal. However, there may be some changes to capacity limits at some facilities, based on 1m distancing.

Events are being reviewed and some may be cancelled. Masks remain mandatory in public areas. Vaccine pass requirements at public facilities remain unchanged.

### Water wisely and save


With the hotter, dryer weather we're encouraging people to get smart with your water use to save money and ensure we can all keep enjoying a reliable water supply.

Getting smart on when and how we water our gardens through simple habits improves garden growth and means paying less on water rates, which have increased this year from .50c per cubic metre to .60c per cubic metre. Smart watering and managing water use includes watering every few days rather than every day and watering for shorter periods, for example watering for three five-minute intervals over a couple of hours to let the soil absorb more water.

Checking for leaks in taps and hoses, using a watering can or hose rather than a sprinkler system and ensuring sprinklers or watering systems are watering the garden or lawns not the pavement also help with improving the effectiveness of your watering, to help your garden grow better while using less water.

### When to water your lawn

Don't irrigate: Between 6–9am or 4–9pm daily.

## Opportunity to make a difference with Selwyn Response Team

A chance to make a difference to people's lives during emergencies is being offered by the Selwyn Response Team.

The team, which responds on the front-line to Civil Defence emergencies, is recruiting for new members and will be holding an information evening from 7.30pm on Wednesday 9 February at the Rolleston Council Offices.

Team member Robert Love says members will talk about how they respond to Civil Defence emergencies such as earthquakes, fires and floods and what's involved in being a member.

"There's a role for people from all walks of life to be doing. We're not asking for superhero stuff. Everyone brings their own unique skill set and it's great to have a range of experience. The team is very keen to expand its diversity of responder to reflect the local Selwyn community."

It is part of the Council's Civil Defence Emergency Management structure and members are trained to a national standard in light urban search and rescue, flood response, storm response, communications, and other specialist tasks.

The team responded to floods in Selwyn and Buller in May and July last year, helping with evacuations, welfare checks and building assessments. It has also responded to the 2019 Nelson fires, the Christchurch mosque shootings and during the 2020 COVID-19 Level 4 lockdown helping people without places to stay, those living in campgrounds, foodbanks and the wider community.

"It's a great role for helping in the community, challenging yourself and being part of a team that's pretty driven to provide for the community and learn new skills," Robert says.

### Love of Selwyn stays strong

Selwyn residents continue to rate the district as a great place to live with a strong sense of community. For the fourth year in a row the Council's annual residents survey shows over 90% of people rate Selwyn as 'a great place to live'. The survey was released in December.

In the 2021 survey, 92% of residents reported the district was a great place to live – the same result as 2020 and consistent with the results in 2018 (91%) and 2019 (93%).

Despite being the fastest growing place in the country, the sense of community remains strong in the district, with three quarters of residents saying they felt a sense of belonging and community.

Overall, 66% of residents rated the Council's performance as good or very good, up 6% from 2020 and consistent with the ratings from 2017-2019

Residents were also asked to rate a range of services and facilities the Council provides, with rubbish collection (93% rated good or very good), playgrounds (90%), libraries (88%) and sewage and wastewater services (88%), the highest rated.

Community facilities continue to be well used and enjoyed by residents. Public halls have been used at least once in the past year by 76% of respondents, while 85% have visited a park or reserve and 63% have used the public library network.

In questions about customers' experience in interacting with the Council, 80% of customers found it easy or very easy to deal with the Council.

### Widening of Weedons Ross Road begins

Weedons Ross Road between West Melton and Maddisons Road is being widened over the next five

The work will be completed in four sections starting with the section from Kingsdowne Drive to Johnsons Road and moving south, with the work due to be completed by the end of June, weather permitting.

While this work is under way a temporary one-way system will be in place on Weedons Ross Road through the works area, with the road open to traffic travelling south bound (towards Rolleston). The one-way system is scheduled to be in place between Kingsdowne Drive and Johnsons Road until early March.

Detours will be in place while these works are taking place.

### On the Roads

Tennyson Street is closed from south of 75 Tennyson Street (the Police Station) to 78 Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive is one-way westbound for the upgrade of the Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive intersection. Detours are in place.

Wordsworth Street is closed from Shelley Street to Moore Street until 6 February for a watermain renewal. A detour will be in place.

Burnham Road is closed to northbound traffic north of the Burnham School Road intersection to State Highway 1 from 10 January to 26 April. A detour will be in place.
