

The first Rolleston Fields shops and new roads are opening this week as the latest milestones are marked in completing the new heart of Rolleston.

Burgerfuel, Lone Star and Majestic Tea will become the first commercial spaces to open in Rolleston Fields – the commercial area of the Rolleston Town Centre - opening over the next month. More commercial spaces are on the way early next year, commercial developer Tennyson 21 has confirmed.

The Council is also opening two new roads this week, Christensen Parade and Rōhutu Way, along with new car parks to support access to the town centre, while the Youth Zone is on track to open in December, Council Acting Major Projects Manager Phillip Millar says.

"This is a huge step for the town centre, and helping create a hub and a heart for the community. It's exciting to see these buildings and roads opening and the community spaces taking shape. Seeing the way people have embraced and enjoyed using Te Ara Ātea and the Sensory Space has been fantastic and with these developments and the Youth Zone we're really starting to see the vibrant community heart we've been planning and looking forward to for so long."

Access to the town centre will be available via Christensen Parade off Rolleston Drive next to the Rolleston Community Centre or from Moore Street at the Wordsworth Street intersection. There also will be one-way entrance off Tennyson Street to the new car park south of Te Ara Ātea, with the exit onto Rōhutu Way and then Christensen Parade.

Work on the next stage of the skateable area in the reserve is under way. This means some of the temporary skate park has been fenced off for construction work, with the remaining area open to use until the new skate features are complete.

The car parks will include six electric car charges, which will be installed by Meridian Energy early next year as part of a partnerhsip with the Council to install more chargers in public parking spaces across Selwyn.

Biodiversity protection in the Rakaia Gorge

An intensive weed control project in Rakaia Gorge is helping to protect the area's rare and precious native plants and trees.

The weed control project is being carried out over four years, and after Selwyn District Council, Environment Canterbury and landowners undertook an assessment of the gorge's ecological values, and the weeds that threaten them.

The Gorge is rich in native biodiversity, with diverse mixed hardwood species, bluff shrublands, tussock land, grasslands and two large wetlands.

At least 16 threatened and at-risk native plant species have been recorded - including Canterbury pink broom, and Rōhutu/Myrtle - both nationally critical, along with others that are regionally uncommon.

According to Council's Senior Biodiversity Advisor Andrew Spanton, the project recognises Rakaia Gorge's special role in maintaining local biodiversity.

"Because of its steep banks and high cliffs Rakaia Gorge has been relatively free of grazing and fires, making it something of a safe haven for native plants," he says.

Along with sycamores; cherry, cotoneaster and wilding conifers have been identified as causing significant issues in the Gorge.

"These species are highly competitive and will usually outcompete our native plants. In our first year of work we were playing catch up to remove the most obvious and harmful weeds," he says. A contractor is now being engaged to start on the second year of weed control.

"While weed eradication is our top priority, there are also complementary trapping and planting projects underway," Spanton says. "The weed control in the Gorge is a great demonstration of a biodiversity partnership project that includes input and funding from Gorge landowners, Ministry for Primary Industries, the Trustpower Rakaia Catchment Environmental Enhancement Fund, Land Information New Zealand, ECan, Ashburton District Council and Selwyn District Council."

Selwyn Gets Ready to ShakeOut

Get Ready to ShakeOut. Our national earthquake drill and tsunami hikoi is about to take place on Thursday 27 October.

At 9.30am, drills will be held in workplaces, schools, marae, and homes across the country, reminding people to Drop, Cover and Hold in an earthquake. In coastal areas people will also be taking part in a tsunami hikoi (evacuation) to practice their 'Long or Strong Get Gone' response to an earthquake.

There are lots of ways to help prepare for an earthquake and/or tsunami, Selwyn Emergency Management Officer Jason Flewellen says. "These include visiting getready.govt.nz to refresh your knowledge of what to do, picking up a Selwyn Are You Ready booklet from a Council office or library, and visiting selwyn.getsready.net to sign up for our free emergency alerting system for Selwyn residents."

The alerting system sends texts and emails to subscribed households, warning of events including tsunami, wildfires, and severe weather.

While we can't predict earthquakes, scientific research indicates there is a

75 per cent probability of an Alpine Fault earthquake happening in the next 50 years and it is likely to be a magnitude 8+. A great deal of work is going into mapping what the likely impacts would be on Canterbury, Jason says. In the meantime it's important everyone takes steps to prepare to look after themselves and their families.
