## Last week to have your say on the Annual Plan

Next week is the last week to have your say on the Council's plans for the next 12 months.

Consultation on the Council's Draft Annual Plan is open until Thursday 19 May

The majority of the proposed work plan was set in consultation with the community through last year's Long-Term Plan 2021-2031.

To deliver those services and facilities the plan proposes committing \$91m to capital projects over the next 12 months - including \$20.2m in water supply projects; \$21.6m in wastewater projects; and \$20.4m in transportation projects across our growing district.

The Draft Annual Plan is a chance to check in with the community about those plans and seek your feedback on four new or changed projects:

- a change in proposal for the funding of the Hororātā Community Hub,
- closure of parts of the Upper Ellesmere Water Race.
- · changes to water race rating across the district, and
- a proposal for investing in biodiversity through a \$20 Ecological Enhancement targeted rate and harmonisation of Land Drainage rates

The proposed average rates increase is 6%, slightly higher than the 4.9% increase forecast in the Long-Term Plan. Since the Long-Term Plan was agreed the increase of inflation and other pressures on supply chain, changes in government legislation and an increased demand on services have increased the cost of delivering the services agreed with the community.

The exact rate rise will vary for each individual property, but you can find out more examples of how the proposed rates rise would affect you in the plan or the consultation documents available online at selwyn.govt.nz/annualplan22 or at our libraries or the Council offices in Rolleston.



If you own a residential home in Rolleston with a new CV of \$790,000:

- your rates will increase 7.5% from \$3,115 to \$3,350
- that's an extra \$235 a year
- · or about \$4.50 a week.



If you own a residential home in West Melton with a new CV of \$975,000:

- your rates will increase 5.7% from \$3,300 to \$3,489
- · that's an extra \$189 a year
- · or about \$3.60 a week.



If you own a rural property in Darfield with a new CV of \$11.3m (with water races and water units):

- your rates will decrease from \$15,019 to \$14,026
- that's a decrease or \$993 a year
- or about \$19.10 a week.



If you own a lifestyle property with a new CV of \$840,000:

- your rates will increase 5.2% from \$1,769 to \$1,861
- that's an extra \$92 a year
- or about \$1.80 a week

### Historic railway jigger unveiled at Council offices in Rolleston

A bright red railway jigger has taken pride of place in the foyer of the Council offices in Rolleston, commemorating Selwyn's rich railway history.

The 1960s jigger was unveiled at a ceremony last week, jointly organised by the Council and KiwiRail. It will be housed at the Council premises temporarily, before being moved to a permanent home in the new Rolleston town centre.

Mayor Sam Broughton says the jigger is part of an important project celebrating Selwyn's history and cultural heritage.

"Rail is a huge part of Selwyn's story. Many Selwyn towns sit alongside the railway line. Rolleston is the junction of the Midland and main south lines and traces its foundation as a town to the opening of the railway terminus in October 1866. As we've been developing the new town centre we've had a focus on capturing Selwyn's history - and the railway is a key element.

"We've been delighted to partner with KiwiRail to see the jigger restored and presented to the district.

The jigger has been painstakingly restored by KiwiRail engineers, and local residents, Graham Lawn, Ian Dixon and Danny Leonard.

The restored jigger is Graham's pride and joy. He comes from a rail family and remembers travelling up and down the rail line with his father on the jiggers.

"My Dad worked in rail as a signals maintainer, and both my sisters and my two sons have also worked in rail. Very soon with my service we will be celebrating 100 years in rail as a family," he says.

"That's why when I was asked to do this project, I didn't hesitate.

It's an icon for Rolleston, as well as for KiwiRail. I want families to be able to view the jigger and read and learn about the history of rail."

Jiggers have been part of rail history since the early days of rail in New Zealand, providing transport for workers undertaking repairs and inspections.

This jigger was built for use on the Midland Line in the 1960s. It was withdrawn from service in the late 1980s and was stored at the famous Cass railway station until it was recovered in 2019.

### On the Roads

### **Darfield Kirwee Wastewater Pipeline project**

Burnham Road between SH1 and Burnham School Road will be one way until early June. Aylesbury Road between SH1 and Burdons Road is one way northbound from SH1 until end of May.

Ansons Road between Miles Road and Pole Road is closed until early June.

Courtenay Road between Miles Road and Kirwee (SH73) is closed until End of June. Miles Road between Aylesbury Road and Courtenay Road is closed until mid-May.

### Weedons Ross Road seal widening

Weedons Ross Road is one-way open to traffic travelling south (towards Rolleston), for the duration of the project. A one-way system is in place on Gerald Street between Vernon Drive and West Belt for pavement repairs.

Swamp Road Bridge between Bluff Road and Pig Saddle Road is closed for repairs.
