# Thousands of batteries already recycled in new scheme

A new battery recycling programme in Selwyn has seen a huge uptake in the first three months since it launched.

The Council partnered with electronics recycling company E-Cycle to provide the recycling scheme where people can drop off used household batteries of all kinds at four drop off points.

Since it started in December 819kg of batteries have been recycled. That includes just over half a tonne of batteries dropped off for recycling off at the Pines Resource Recovery Park and over 250kgs dropped off at New World Rolleston, New World Lincoln and Darfield Library, Council solid waste manager Andrew Boyd says.


"We know that battery use is increasing and that people are looking for ways to reduce their rubbish and to recycle more. It's fantastic to see the way people have embraced the programme and to see all those batteries diverted from landfill and being recycled. We hope to be able to add more sites in time."

The majority of the batteries recycled were Alkaline batteries such as AA and AAAs, but there was also a mix of Lithium-Ion batteries such as those used in laptops, mobile phones and tools. This is good to see, Mr Boyd says, as these batteries can cause fires if disposed of through kerbside bins.

The recycling programme also accepts button cell/coin batteries (used in watches, hearing aids) Nickel-cadmium (used in portable electronics, tools, toys) and Nickel-metal hydride batteries (used in digital cameras, laptops, mobile phones).

The batteries are sent for recycling in Australia – where 70-90% of the battery is recycled into new batteries or ingredients used in roading mixes and fertilisers. Nickel-cadmium and Lithium-ion batteries are forwarded on to a specialist recycling plant in South Korea.

# Cricket in Selwyn celebrated for World Cup


Selwyn's cricketing wahine are being celebrated in Selwyn sport centres and libraries as part of the Women's Cricket World Cup.

# Rolleston Transport Improvements Project Community update



# WORKING TOWARDS A SOLUTION

Talking with communities is an essential step informing Waka Kotahi transport project planning and design. This step gives everyone an opportunity to have a say on the project and helps the design team to deliver the best possible solution for the community.

We've listened, and consequently over the past few months the Waka Kotahi team has been reassessing and investigating several alternative ways the residential and industrial sides of Rolleston could be connected using a flyover or other options as highlighted in last year's community feedback.

Top of mind is preventing people from being killed and seriously injured on SH1 and rail crossings in Rolleston. This is a high-risk section of a major South Island freight corridor, intersecting with rail. (There have been around 40 near misses at Hoskyns level crossing in the past ten years.)

The investigation process involves reassessing options and testing how they perform against key criteria – including how they fit with the district's transport system, the short and long-term effects on how the state highway and local transport network fit together to best serve the community and economy, as well as safety, environmental and cost considerations.

## **GETTING BACK TO YOU**

We've been refining the options to enable us to determine a solution that we think fits community needs better. There's still a bit more work to do yet however, with partners and stakeholders including the Council and KiwiRail.

The team is expecting to have a revised draft plan with a preferred option ready for community feedback around mid-2022.

## **SPEED REVIEW UPDATE**

It makes sense to check speeds are right for the highway while we are talking with the community about major transport infrastructure projects.

As part of engagement last year, we asked the community about the current SH1 speed limits from Hoskyns Road right through to Dunsandel.

We asked if speeds felt safe and right for the road, if they had experienced near misses or found it hard turning on or off the highway and if there were any places where lower speeds could mean people feel safer.

The Waka Kotahi team has reviewed community feedback on highway speed limits alongside their technical assessment and determined the current speed limits can remain for the time being, while planning for infrastructure upgrades are underway. (The summary of feedback is available on the project website.)

A safe and appropriate speed limit recommendation will be included as part of the project design. The project will also factor in safety improvements in the pipeline for the broader corridor from Templeton through to the Selwyn River. (This includes roundabout options for Burnham.)

Safe speed limits and infrastructure improvements work together to create a safe road system. Vehicle safety, good road user choices, transport system management and work-related road safety are equally as important and are our internationally proven focus areas.

Action in these five key areas will help us meet our Road to Zero target of 40% less deaths and serious injuries on our roads in the next ten years.

# On the Roads

# **Tennyson Street Rolleston Drive Intersection Upgrade**

Tennyson Street is closed from south of 75 Tennyson Street (the Police Station) to 78 Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive is one-way westbound for the upgrade of the Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive intersection. Detours are in place.

# **Darfield Kirwee Wastewater Pipeline project**

Burnham Road is closed to northbound traffic north of the Burnham School Road intersection to State Highway 1 from 10 January to 26 April. A detour will be in place.

Aylesbury Road between SH1 and Two Chain Road is reduced to one-way only. Traffic will be able to enter from SH1 and move north past the one-way site. The one-way system will be in place until late April. Aylesbury Road between Wards Road and Miles Road also remains closed as pipeline project works continue.

### Weedons Ross Road seal widening

Weedons Ross Road will be one-way open to traffic travelling south (towards Rolleston), through the work area for the duration of the project to widen the road. The work area is currently from Kingsdowne Drove to Johnsons Road and will move south as sections are completed. A detour is in place.

Pre-seal repairs are taking place on Hororata Dunsandel Road between Hunters Road and Burgess Road, Dunns Crossing Road between Brookside Road and Boulez Mews, Coleridge Street from Brookside Road, Fyffe Road from Sandy Knolls and Dynes Road from Goulds Road to Hungerford Drive. Repairs are also taking place on Hororata Road between Bridge Street and Plantation Road and on Telegraph Road between Courtenay Road and Highfield Road. Repairs are taking place on Andrew's Bridge, Mt White.

Culverts are being built on Branch Drain Road from Stewarts Road to Smythies Road and Lyndon Road from State Highway 73. Footpaths are being built on Ballinger Street from Vernon Drive to Crowder Street and Goh Street from Ballinger Street to Te Waikere Street.
