









Work on the youth zone, which is being built by Isaac Construction, began in mid March, and aims to be completed by the end of the year. The area will feature a skate park, half basketball court and netball zone. There will also be a gaga ball pit – a game similar to dodge ball and played in a pit area, where players throw the ball with the aim to touch other players' legs.

There will also be an eagle claw basket swing, and outdoor furniture along with hangout zones.

The skate park will include a pool bowl, flow bowl and snake run and will be built by skate park design and build specialist Nelson Creek Skateboards, led by experienced skateboarder David North. The company most recently built the West Melton skate area.

The youth zone was designed with input from students at Selwyn's four high schools.

It will add another vibrant and different space to the town centre, Council Acting Major Projects Manager Phil Millar says.

"Our aim with the town centre area is to make this a space for all Selwyn residents, with something for everyone. The youth zone will be a fun space designed with the help of Selwyn youth to be somewhere that is theirs to enjoy alongside all the other areas the town centre has to offer."

Due to this construction, access to the tennis and netball courts on Rolleston Reserve will only be via the main reserve car park north of Te Ara Ātea for the next six weeks. Access from the Wordsworth Street extension should be restored after this. Signage will be in place to direct people on how to safely access the courts.

Support for starting new businesses in Selwyn

A first of its kind business series will be running in Selwyn to support people looking to start new businesses.

Applications are now open for the 'Starting a business later in life course' which will be running over four sessions throughout May, supporting people over 50 who are considering starting a new business.

The course has been designed by business mentor Dr Chris Kirk, a former deputy vice-

chancellor of Lincoln University and founder of the 'Later-in-Life Innovators' Group in Christchurch, which also supports older people starting businesses.

The idea for the series came after the Council organised a mature workers event supported by MSD and Connected, which included advice and support from agencies and mentors including Dr Kirk.

During those workshops there were repeated questions from attendees who were looking for ways to keep busy or supplement their income in retirement as well as those looking for new challenges or with hobbies that with a little support could become businesses, Council Community and Economic Development Advisor Kirstin Dingwall-Okoye says.

"He said, 'I've never had so many people coming to me asking about this', and I said, 'Let's put on a seminar'."

The idea quickly developed into a four-week course, the first of its kind in Aotearoa, which was successful in receiving funding from the government's Te Tari Kaumātua, Office for Seniors.

Held each Monday in May the series will cover the process of starting a new business, from the idea stage through launching a new business, as well as connecting participants with expert coaches, mentors and potential funding opportunities.

Council advocates for better for Selwyn in water reforms

The Council will keep advocating for a better outcome for Selwyn residents than is being offered by the Government's three waters reforms.

The Council has confirmed it will advocate as an independent voice to get the best outcome for Selwyn.

It continues to oppose the direction of the proposed reforms and is concerned about their impact on water services for Selwyn residents.

"We accept there needs to be change, however we don't agree the current three waters proposal is the best or only way forward," says Mayor Sam Broughton.

"The government has done a poor job at communicating the need for change in Selwyn and we publicly expressed our disapproval to them last year.

"We are disappointed at the government's disregard for councils and local communities in the way it has run this process so far. We are also frustrated by the poor response over key questions we have raised with Government about the reforms.

"We will continue to be a strong, independent voice speaking out to make sure Selwyn people get the best outcome from these reforms."

Mayor Broughton says the Council's focus will be on ensuring its concerns are addressed and shaping theoutcome of the reforms. It has also committed to working constructively with mana whenua, to ensure the best possible outcomes for Selwyn.

Water is our most important asset and communities need to be able to have a say in how their services are delivered, he says.

"We have over 30 water supplies each with unique challenges. We have invested heavily in water infrastructure and overall we have an excellent service. When we get individual challenges, such as the complex ones we face at the moment in Springfield, we can work directly with local residents, using our local knowledge and we are directly accountable to see through the long-term work required to address those issues.

"We need to see accountability in the reforms to ensure Selwyn residents don't lose that local voice and assurances that our people will see their needs met. That is what we will be working for – for Selwyn residents to get a service that continues to deliver for them."

On the Roads

Tennyson Street Rolleston Drive Intersection Upgrade

Tennyson Street is closed from south of 75 Tennyson Street (the Police Station) to 78 Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive is one-way westbound for the upgrade of the Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive intersection. Detours are in place.

Darfield Kirwee Wastewater Pipeline project

Burnham Road is closed to northbound traffic north of the Burnham School Road intersection to State Highway 1 from 10 January to 26 April. A detour will be in place.

Aylesbury Road between SH1 and Two Chain Road is reduced to one-way only. Traffic will be able to enter from SH1 and move north past the one-way site. The one-way system will be in place until late April. Aylesbury Road between Wards Road and Miles Road also remains closed as pipeline project

Weedons Ross Road seal widening

Weedons Ross Road will be one-way open to traffic travelling south (towards Rolleston), for the duration of the project to widen the road. The work area is currently from Johnsons Road to Finlays Road and will move south as sections are completed. A detour is in place. Please follow all traffic management signage in place for these works. Disregarding the one-way system puts road users and workers at risk.

Pre-seal repairs are taking place on Hororata Dunsandel Road between Hunters Road and Burgess Road, Dunns Crossing Road between Brookside Road and Boulez Mews, Oaktree Lane from Manor Drive to Goulds Road, Dynes Road from Goulds Road to Hungerford Drive and Old West Coast Road from Highfield Road to Halkett Road.

Repairs are also taking place on Hororata Road between Bridge Street and Plantation Road and on Bluff Road between State Highway 73 and Swamp Road.

Repairs are taking place on Waimakariri Gorge Bridge.

A sump is being built on Brookside Road between William Street and Elizabeth Street. Footpaths are being built on Ballinger Street from Vernon Drive to Crowder Street and Goh Street from Ballinger Street to Te Waikere Street.

Red setting requirements for Council facilities changing

The Council is updating its requirements for accessing facilities following the national changes in requirements for Red settings.

Selwyn District remains in the Red traffic light setting.

As of Saturday 26 March:

- Indoor gathering capacity limits have been increased to 200 (check with individual facilities as some limits may still apply)
- · Outdoor gathering limits are removed
- · QR code tracing is no longer required
- Face masks are still required in public areas in most facilities

The Council is reviewing vaccine pass requirements ahead of the changes to government requirements for vaccine passes on 4 April.
