

A sustainable community is the primary vision for Selwyn residents over the next decade.

Almost 800 residents gave feedback on their priorities for the next 10 years, to support the development of the district's Long-Term Plan 2024-34, which will be out for consultation in April.

Residents highlighted the importance of a 'sustainable Selwyn', where the district is self-sufficient with services and facilities for people at all stages of life and the environment is cared for

"The community has been clear in its ambitions and it's an exciting vision for the future," Mayor Sam Broughton says. "Now we need to work together with our community on a plan for achieving those, including what the realistic costs are and what trade-offs may be required."

To make this possible, people indicated a desire for the district to become more economically innovative, and a better spread of infrastructure and services, Council Chief Executive Sharon Mason says.

"People love what we have, with 86% of people saying they have a positive experience of living here. There's also a strong desire for clear planning, to protect that."

Residents also indicated an openness to necessary funding decisions including increasing rates if it was to achieve their priorities.

"We've got the direction for where people want to go, now the task is to nail down a plan to achieve what we can. To achieve the outcomes sought by the community will require extra funding. It's good to see people are realistic about that. We are conscious of affordability and we're looking at different ways to cover those costs, which could include significant rates increases. We'll put those options out to community to consider."

Special guests included Major Lawrence Field from the Defence Force, Deputy Mayor Malcolm Lyall, Councillors Elizabeth Mundt and Phil Dean, and Dr Surinder Tandon, President of the Christchurch Multicultural Council.

Mayor Sam Broughton who led the event, encouraged the group to bring enriching elements like their traditions, language, culture, history, and faith to the wider community, all of which adds a rich layer to our district and nation.

Don't run dry this summer

The hot weather is coming and it's time to make sure we're being smart with our water use and make sure we don't run dry this summer.



With El Niño here NIWA is forecasting a hot, dry, windy summer for Selwyn. That's why we're reminding residents to use water wisely through simple habits that help your garden, save you money and help keep water flowing for everyone without water restrictions.

Now is the time to get into good habits, Council Acting Executive Director Infrastructure and Property Murray England says.

"Everyone has a part in making sure we have enough

water throughout summer. With the winds we've had things are drying out fast, but the good news is there's lots of simple things we can all do that are good for your garden, the environment, your wallet and the wider community. Things like watering efficiently and using the water clock to water outside of peak times, it all adds up to a better summer for everyone."

Tips for saving water at home

· Skip some days watering to keep your plants strong.

Water your garden and lawn every few days rather than every day. Watering every day encourages roots to develop at the surface, making them more vulnerable to hot dry spells.

Water for shorter.

For example, watering for three 5-minute intervals over a couple of hours lets the soil absorb more water than watering for 15 minutes continuously.

· Use a watering can on your garden.

It uses less water and gives you more control to water at the roots, where the plants need the water to grow strong — not on the leaves.

· Water what needs it.

Your driveway, footpath, or buildings don't need watering. Consider not watering your berm or your lawn too — let it die off during summer to save money on your water rates and wear and tear on your lawn mower.

Mulch or cover.

Covering the soil with mulch or organic matter keeps moisture in the soil, protects roots from sun and wind and reduces weeds.

Check for leaks.

Inspect hoses and taps.

Continue on to Knockdolian in Darfield on land once owned by members of the Dean's family. See the established rock, rose, vegetable, native and woodland gardens. There are some great eateries to choose from located in the township after your garden visit.

Malvern Principals building Sister Schools relationships in China

In a two-week journey through China, a delegation of Malvern Primary School Principals, along with Darfield High School's Principal and International Director, deepened their understanding of Chinese culture and established Sister School relationships.

The Council as part of the Sister Cities Committees, supports educational links through the Sister Schools initiative, which seeks to contribute to global networking, cultural enrichment, and the development of international perspectives for students, educators, and communities.

Joined by colleagues from high schools and area schools in Christchurch and Dunedin, the delegation's primary goal was to explore the enduring legacy of Rewi Alley.

Born in Springfield in 1897, Alley was known for dedicating his life to establishing schools and cooperatives for the rural poor in China, and through his writings on Chinese industry and philosophy.

In Gansu province, the delegation visited schools in Shandan and Lanzhou, with a special focus on Shandan Bailie Vocational College, a Sister School with Darfield High School for nearly 26 years.

Darfield High School Principal Andy England presented a traditional Māori weapon, the tewhatewha, to Principal Peng, symbolising the unity of their two peoples across distance and connecting earth and sky - a sentiment deeply inspired by Rewi Alley's legacy.

The delegation, led by Allison Rosanowski, expressed gratitude for the warm welcome received.

"It was gratifying to observe the way the delegation was welcomed wherever they travelled. The school visits were particularly memorable, offering a glimpse into the rich cultural heritage of Chinese education" she said.

Other highlights included seeing the Great Wall, the Summer Palace, Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, and a moa skeleton donated by Roger Duff of the Canterbury Museum.

All of the delegation came to understand the huge impact Rewi Alley made in China and how he is still very much revered.
