

A highly anticipated celebration of Selwyn success is returning this year.

The Selwyn Awards — held every two years — are back for 2023, to celebrate the successes of businesses, not-for-profit organisations and individuals who live or work in the Selwyn district.

Nominations for the 2023 awards are open until 31 May, with this year's awards expanded to 11 categories including a new heritage category.

The awards have been a growing highlight to the calendar and after a sold-out gala dinner in 2021 with over 500 attendees, this year the dinner is expanding to a bigger venue, held at the Selwyn Sports Centre on 5 August.

The Selwyn Awards are a unique celebration of both our businesses and community, Mayor Sam Broughton says.

"In Selwyn district, community is at the heart of many of our businesses and businesses are a cornerstone of our community. So it's great to have awards that celebrate so many who help build our community through the jobs they sustain and the important part they play in preserving our history and environment, and support the diverse community that makes Waikirikiri Selwyn such a special place to live."


Businesses, groups and individuals can enter themselves for awards, while anyone from the public can also make nominations. There are categories for all sizes of business and for a wide range of activities, from environment and sustainability to diversity, sport, innovation and tourism, Council Group Manager Community Services Denise Kidd says.

"The awards are a good chance to take stock of what you're doing, or make a special note of the hard work of other. For a category like Environment and Sustainability people often don't realise how much they're contributing, and that even a small contribution makes a difference."

Stop and give way: save your life

Selwyn residents are being reminded to take care for your lives and others at intersections on local roads.

Intersections have been identified as a hot spot for crashes around Selwyn, with 57 per cent of all accidents in 2022 happening at road crossings. Onethird of Selwyn crashes were attributed to drivers failing to stop and give way.

Council Group Manager Infrastructure and Property Murray Washington says driver behaviour plays a big role in keeping road users safe.

"Being alert, obeying road signs and taking extra care can be the difference between making it to your destination safely, and being involved in a serious crash. Stopping and giving way may seem such a simple task, but it only takes a momentary lapse of judgement for something to go very wrong."

In 2022, 155 crashes were reported in Selwyn, with poor handling, judgement or observation contributing to 76 per cent of these crashes on local roads.

Mr Washington says having the attitude that 'it won't happen to me', or that other drivers are the problem, are both dangerous beliefs for motorists.

"Think about your own habits when you approach intersections; do you always stop, or do you only slow down a little? Are you always giving yourself enough time to fully observe in both directions before pulling into the intersection?"

Council will soon begin installing advanced stop warning signs and red road markings at selected high-risk local intersections to help alert drivers. Mr Washington says while signage like this will give drivers advanced warning of the intersections ahead, it is up to the driver as a road user to stop and give way.

"Every driver has a responsibility to themselves and others on the road. Make sure you are correctly stopping and giving way, every time."



Selwyn Sounds collects for Giving for Gisborne

Selwyn residents have been giving generously to help Tairawhiti Gisborne as it begins its recovery from Cyclone Gabrielle.

Councillors, staff and Civil Defence volunteers were at Selwyn Sounds on the weekend collecting for the Give for Gisborne campaign, encouraging Selwyn residents to support the Tairāwhiti Mayoral Relief Fund.

Gisborne was among the regions hit hardest by Cyclone Gabrielle, with thousands of houses silt damaged an ongoing water crisis and roads needing rebuilding, and suffered further flooding last week.

Councillor Phil Dean, who coordinated the collection at Selwyn Sounds, said people had been extremely generous in their donations. "People donated around \$5000 in cash and we had another around 300 people take down the details to donate later. We had Councillors, staff and volunteers from the Civil Defence Selwyn Response Team who came out to collect, so it was a great team effort."





Help shape the future of Greater Christchurch

A workshop is being held today 8 March at Te Ara Ātea for people to discuss what Selwyn might look like in the future, as part of the Huihui Mai (let's come together) engagement.

The Whakawhanake Kāinga Komiti (Urban Growth Partnership for Greater Christchurch) is inviting people who live in Selwyn, Christchurch City, and Waimakariri District to participate in helping shape an ambitious growth and transport plan as part of Greater Christchurch, where our population is set to double in the next 60 years.

Residents can share their thoughts by completing a short survey to answer some important, futurefocused questions about where will people live and work? How will people get around without increasing congestion and travel times? How can people protect the environment and ensure this remains a great place to live?

Feedback will be used to inform plans about transport, infrastructure and urban planning in Greater Christchurch area, which will then go out for public consultation later this year.
