Keeping Dogs Safe this Summer

At this time of year toxic algae starts appearing in our waterways. Dog owners should be aware of it if they are walking their dogs by rivers, streams, ponds and lakes.

Potentially toxic algae (also called cyanobacteria) is a naturally occurring algae with the potential to bloom in our waterways, producing toxins that can harm or even kill dogs, people and other animals.


Animals can get very sick if they ingest cyanobacteria. Unfortunately, dogs love the musty smell of potentially toxic algae and are naturally drawn to investigating it — usually by licking or eating the material. It can be quick acting and fatal to dogs. The best way to keep your dog safe is to keep them out of water that may have toxic algae in it

The algae typically presents in rivers as dark brown or black mats, with a slimy or velvety texture and a musty smell. These mats can detach and cause rafts in the water. In lakes, it is often suspended in the water. The algae can make water look cloudy, discoloured, or like it has small globules in it.

Cyanobacteria poisoning symptoms

Symptoms of cyanobacteria toxin poisoning in animals include lethargy, muscle tremors, fast breathing, twitching, paralysis, and convulsions. If you suspect your dog is suffering from cyanobacteria poisoning, contact your vet immediately.

For humans, if you have been in contact with water containing cyanobacteria, you may experience tingling or numbness around the fingertips and/or mouth, breathing difficulty, gastrointestinal symptoms, or skin rashes. If you feel any of these symptoms after contact with a waterbody, seek medical advice from your doctor or contact Healthline on 0800 611 116.

Council Services and Facilities Holiday Hours

Here is a summary of Selwyn District Council's services and facilities opening hours during the holiday period.

The Council's Rolleston Offices will be closed from 5pm Friday 22 December, reopening 8.30am Wednesday 3 January.

Rubbish and recycling collections for Monday collections, this will be the Saturday prior (23 instead of 25 December and 30 December instead of 1 January).

Pines Resource Recovery Park is closed both Monday 25 December and Monday 1 January. Standard opening hours operate for the rest of the holiday period (9am-4.30pm).

All Selwyn Libraries and Service Centres will be closed on Monday 25 December and reopen from 10am-4pm, 27-29 December, normal hours 30-31 December. All libraries and service centres will be closed 1-2 January with normal hours resuming from Wednesday 3 January. There will be no late night at Lincoln Library and Te Ara Ātea on Thursday 4 January.

All Council-managed Community Centres are closed from 5pm on Friday 22 December and will reopen on Monday 8 January.

Selwyn Sports Centre will operate with reduced hours on Saturday 23 December and close at 1pm on Sunday 24 December, reopening with reduced hours from Wednesday 3 January to Sunday 7 January. Normal hours resume from Monday 8 January.

Selwyn Aquatic Centre will be closed on public holidays: Monday 25 December, Tuesday 26 December, Monday 1 January and Tuesday 2 January.

Darfield, Southbridge and Sheffield Community Pools will be closed Monday 25 December, Tuesday 26 December and Monday 1 January. Sheffield Pool will also be closed on Tuesday 2 January.

Animal Control Services are available, operating 24 hours 7 days a week.

The last full day of building inspections will be on Thursday 21 December. Inspections resume from Wednesday 3 January.
