

The impact of the latest adverse events like Cyclone Gabrielle, have reminded us all that emergencies can happen at any time, anywhere, often with little to no warning. Have you had the talk about getting prepared?

It is important to make plans so you know what to do when an emergency happens. The good news is there are easy steps we can take now to get ready, starting with a simple prep talk with your whānau.

Before Cyclone Gabrielle hit the North Island last month research showed only around one third of New Zealanders had taken steps to get ready for a disaster event.

To get you started and guide you, the Selwyn Emergency Management Team has produced a booklet of tips to help residents prepare. You can download the 'Are you Ready?' booklet at selwyn.govt.nz/areyouready or pick up a copy at one of our libraries or the Rolleston Council offices.

Council Emergency Management Officer Jason Flewellen says it's important for people to be able to look after themselves for a number of days after an emergency, or when normal services are disrupted.

"You get to decide now how comfortable you'll be during an event. It just takes a short time to make sure you have the four top tips sorted — make a plan, store some water and other basics, get to know your neighbours and sign up to Selwyn Gets Ready at selwyn.getsready.net to receive emergency alerts. Just those four things will go a huge way to helping you get through.

"Interruption to services like power and water can happen at any time for any number of reasons. Disruptions could last just a few hours due to a mechanical breakdown, or a number of weeks following a large event like an Alpine Fault rupture. We're all responsible for looking after ourselves and our families to ensure we're prepared."

Bringing the community to dinner

Laughter, new friendships and "enough food to feed an army". That was the takeaway from the district's 'Dinners of Selwyn' event held on 21 March.

Forty people spanning 15 different nationalities attended the potluck dinner at the Lincoln Event Centre, in celebration of Unity Week.

Council Community and Economic Development Advisor, Kirstin Dingwall-Okoye says the event was a wonderful occasion to meet new people and share cultural experiences with one another.

"There was a really diverse mix of people around the tables. Some had only been in Selwyn for a few weeks, while others were long-time residents wanting to meet new people. We'd supplied conversation-starter cards to help break the ice, but there was really no need; the room was full of chatter and laughter."

Attendees heralded from places all over the world including Myanmar, Malaysia, Indonesia, China, Pakistan, Ghana, India and France. Each person brought their favourite dish to share amongst the group as a way to celebrate the district's diversity and bring communities together.

"There was everything from homemade chicken pie, prawn fried rice, dumplings and potstickers. Dessert was just as scrumptious, with sticky date pudding, lemon meringue pie and lemon semolina cake. There was so much food, we could have fed an army," Kirstin says.

Dinners of Selwyn was held during Unity Week, an initiative started by the Sakinah Trust which was established following the 2019 Christchurch mosque shootings. Members of the trust also attended the potluck dinner to share the kaupapa of Unity Week.



"Thank you to everyone who came along and made the night such a

success, especially the student army volunteers from the Lincoln University Students' Association who helped host the event," Kirstin adds.

Council staff member earns Prime Minister's Award

A Selwyn District Council staff member has this month been recognised for her contribution to the country's COVID-19 response.

Sanku Vyakaranam, a senior business analyst at the Council, has received the Prime Minister's Award for her service during the pandemic in 2020 and 2021, when she worked at the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment, helping families who were stuck overseas to reconnect with their loved ones.

Sanku was presented the award on 6 March, and says she is humbled by the recognition.

"It has been a pleasure to serve the country during the pandemic, and I feel blessed that I could help families in need and support the COVID-19 response team."

In her role as an emergency allocation analyst, Sanku was tasked with reviewing applications for emergency spaces in managed isolation facilities. She was able to help hundreds of people reunite with their families in New Zealand.

"The whole thing was unprecedented. I got to work in a hardworking team in what was a stressful, high-pressure environment."

In addition to helping reconnect families, Sanku used her data analyst skills to provide daily reporting to senior leadership. This information was important for Government officials in their decision-making during the response.

Since then, Sanku joined Council,

supporting the organisation to enhance its digital products and services.

Finding a place as Kiwi

Newcomers and long-term residents took a new step together, officially becoming Kiwi, at the Council's latest citizenship ceremony.

The ceremony in Tai Tapu last week saw 96 people receive their New Zealand citizenship — the latest of 806 people from 61 different countries who have got their citizenship in Selwyn in the past year.

Te Taumutu Rūnanga Chair Liz Brown welcomed the new citizens and led karakia and a waiata, and Lt Commander Caitlin Wiseman RNZNR spoke about her role representing the New Zealand Defence Force at the event.

Selwyn's newest Kiwi came from 18 different countries from Chile to Germany, Vietnam and beyond, and were welcomed with a gift of a native kowhai to mark the moment. After taking the oath some of the new



citizens were invited to share their stories about becoming Kiwi, with those ranging from people who had been in Aotearoa for 40 years to those just starting a new life on these shores.

They were among people from every continent who became New Zealand citizens in Selwyn over the past 12 months. While the majority of the new citizens came from the United Kindgom (172 new citizens), South Africa (159 new citizens), India (133) and The Philippines (88), others came from all corners of the globe. In total over the past year, new citizens came from 61 different countries ranging from Jamaica to Oman, Serbia, Zimbabwe, Samoa, Fiji and Uruguay.
