Awards celebrate the best of Selwyn

A Rolleston youth worker has taken out the inaugural People's Choice honour at the 2018 Selwyn Awards.

Courtney Forrest, from the Youth South West Trust (Hope Trust), won the award which was voted on by Selwyn residents.

He was one of 10 Selwyn businesses, groups and individuals who were recognised for their excellence at the Selwyn Awards Gala Dinner, held at the Lincoln Event Centre on Saturday evening [5 August]

More than 330 people celebrated the success of the region at the event, which also featured a range of entertainment, food and beverages originating from Selwyn.

Nearly 2,400 votes were cast for the People's Choice Award, which was introduced for the first time this year. Mayor Sam Broughton says it's great to see the community supporting local people working for the good of Selwyn.

"We have so many amazing people in Selwyn giving up their time to help others, building thriving businesses which support our district's economy, and working to improve our environment and community wellbeing," he says.

"I am very proud of all our winners, as well as the other runners up and nominees - it just shows what a wealth of talent and creativity we have in Selwyn."

The award winners are:

People's Choice: Courtney Forrest - After volunteering as a youth worker, Courtney moved to a full-time paid role with the Youth South West Trust (Hope Trust). From 2012 to 2017, Courtney developed the youth programme in Rolleston, to a level which required additional professional youth workers and community volunteers. In 2018 he developed infrastructure for greater expansion within Rolleston and wider Selwyn. Courtney is the full time youth worker and team leader for Rolleston School and Rolleston College.

First runner up: Quickenberry Guesthouse

Second runner up: Busy Bumbles LTD

Arts, Culture and Heritage: Church Property Trustees - The Trustees have one of largest portfolios of heritage listed buildings in New Zealand. 56 of its 77 listed

buildings were damaged during the Canterbury earthquakes. Church Property Trustees has developed innovative answers to extremely complex repair issues. The Recovery Team have developed unique skills in relation to heritage conservation and implemented unique solutions as demonstrated by the work on St Paul's in Tai Tapu.

Community Services: Chris Allen - Is passionate about helping our community and has dedicated the past thirteen years to working with the vulnerable and underprivileged young people of Canterbury and Vanuatu.

Environmental: Lesley Barlow and Stephen Clarke - The recently retired visual arts teachers, have taken their passion for the environment and education from the classroom to the community. In 2010 they took over a patch of Council land proposing to return it to its pre-European state. Since taking over the land they have built a nursery, as well as gifting all excess trees to a range of other projects.

First runner up: Plastic Straws Suck

Innovation Excellence: Plastic Straws Suck - The family combination of Nathan (father), Tui (daughter) and Mana (son) Martin, came together after Tui decided she wanted to make a difference reducing plastic use, after completing a school project at Lincoln Primary. So the eight-year-old decided to enlist her family to help rid Lincoln of plastic straws. Their vision is to have the village plastic straw-free by 2020, and learn about business and social enterprise along the way.

Large Business: Eurofins ELS - Working with councils across New Zealand testing drinking water supplies, as well as supporting them if public health emergencies strike. Celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2017, Eurofins ELS donated \$1.6 million globally, as well as \$40,000 to causes around Selwyn District.
