# PROPOSED DISTRICT PLAN VARIATION 28

# Industrial and Business Activities

# Selwyn District Council

Clause 5 of the First Schedule, Resource Management Act 1991

Proposed Variation 28 changes the policies, rules and definitions in the Proposed District Plan to manage the potential adverse effects associated with industrial activities in all zones and business activities in the rural zone. The key changes made by the variation are:

- 1. A new policy and alterations to existing policies to ensure that any significant adverse effects arising from industrial activities are avoided.
- 2. Expanding and clarifying the definition of an industrial activity. A distinction is also made between "rural based" and "other" industrial activities in the Rural Volume of the plan.
- 3. A hierarchy of control for 'small' to 'medium-large' scale "rural based" industrial activities and a listed activity status for all "other" industrial activities that seek to establish in the rural area.
- 4. A new rule to manage the scale of other business activities in the rural area.
