# **COASTAL ENVIRONMENT**

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### 1 Scope of Report

- [1] This Recommendation Report relates to the Coastal Environment chapter of the PDP and contains the Hearing Panel's recommendations to Council on the submissions and further submissions received on that chapter.
- [2] The Hearing Panel members for the Coastal Environment chapter were:

- [3] The initial Section 42A Report and the end of hearing Section 42A Report (Reply Report) for this topic were:

- [4] The above reports were also informed by technical information provided by Mr James Bentley, landscape expert from Boffa Miskell Limited.
- [5] Prior to the hearing the reporting officer also provided a report entitled 'Officer's Response to Questions from The Hearings Panel'.
- [6] The Hearing Panel's recommended amendments to the notified provisions of the Coastal Environment chapter are set out in Appendix 1. Amendments recommended by the Section 42A Report author that have been adopted by the Hearing Panel are shown in strike out and underlining. Further or different amendments recommended by the Hearing Panel are shown in strike out, underlining and red font.
- [7] We note that some of the numbering of individual clauses in the rule and rule requirement provisions will need to be consequentially amended and not all such amendments are shown in Appendix 1. We understand that will occur in the amended version of the entire PDP that will accompany the release of all of the Recommendation Reports.
- [8] Readers should also note that we have, at their request, amended all references to 'Trustpower' to 'Manawa Energy'.
- [9] Further submitters are not listed in the tables in this Recommendation Report because further submissions are either accepted or rejected in conformance with our recommendations on the original submissions to which they relate.

### 2 Hearing and Submitters Heard

[10] A combined hearing was held on the Natural Features and Landscapes and the Coastal Environment chapters with submitters for the CE Chapter being heard on 5 July 2022. The submitters who appeared at the hearing (either in person or via Zoom) are listed below, together with an identification of whether they were an original submitter, a further submitter, or both.

- [11] Some of the submitters had expert witnesses appear on their behalf. The witnesses we heard from are listed in Appendix 2. Tabled evidence we received is also listed in Appendix 2. Copies of all evidence (expert and non-expert) received are held by the Council. We do not separately summarise that material here, but we refer to or quote from some of it in the remainder of this Recommendation Report.
- [12] We record that we considered all submissions and further submissions, regardless of whether the submitter or further submitter appeared at the hearing and whether they were represented by expert witnesses.

### 3 Sub-topic Recommendations

[13] In this part of the Recommendation Report we assess the submissions by sub-topic, using the same headings as the initial Section 42A Report.

#### 3.1 Definitions

[14] For the following submitters and their submission points on these provisions we adopt the recommendations and reasons of the Section 42A Report author.

- [15] The request by HortNZ for a separate definition for 'Ancillary Rural Earthworks' has been addressed through the report of the Panel on the Earthworks chapter, and we note that the submitter did not appear to present further evidence on this at the Coastal Environment hearing. We agree there is no need for a definition of 'Coastal Environment' as requested by DoC's submission, and we heard no evidence to counter that.
- [16] We agree that an amended definition of 'hapua' is appropriate and responds to the submission point of Jill Thomson and this change does not require a s32AA evaluation.

### 3.2 General Submissions on the Coastal Environment chapter

- [18] We agree that it is not appropriate to preclude limited or public notification for controlled and restricted discretionary activities on a chapter wide basis. The RMA contains a specific process for determining notification on a case-by-case basis and in our view that statutory process should only be circumvented where there is absolute certainty that potential adverse effects will not affect any other party. Having made this finding, we assess requests for non-notification for individual rules on their merits but in this case concur with the officer that they are not appropriate in such a broad fashion, and unsubstantiated by evidence, across all rules in this chapter.
- [19] We generally accept the points made in submission by ESAI and NCFF regarding the description in the Overview of 'intensive farming' being inappropriate and favour the amendment requested by ESAI, as supported by the Section 42A Report author. The minor change in wording does not require a s32AA evaluation.

- [24] This results in a minor amendment in order to give effect to NZCPS Policy 13 and the requirement to preserve and protect natural character. A change is also required consequential to our recommended restructuring of the policy framework to give effect to new Policy CE-P8 for National Grid infrastructure (see section 3.4.3 of this Decision Report).
- [25] These minor changes requires no s32AA evaluation.

- [27] Transpower's submission point was to exempt activities associated with the National Grid from CE-P3. In its place the submitter proposed a new policy specific to the National Grid, which is to 'seek to avoid' adverse effects on outstanding natural character and avoid, remedy, or mitigate effects on other values in the coastal environment. We heard reasons in support of that submission by Ms McLeod, consultant planner for Transpower. The main thrust of her evidence was to ensure the provisions will give effect to the NPS-ET.
- [28] The Section 42A Report accepted there is a need for a new policy to better reflect the intent of the PDP to provide for important infrastructure whilst ensuring appropriate safeguards to assess the potential adverse effects of this activity. The changes recommended by the officer at that time were to delete clause 'a' from CE-P3 and insert a new policy CE-P8 that mirrored parts EI-P2 in the Energy and Infrastructure chapter including the operational or functional requirements of that infrastructure to locate in outstanding natural landscapes.
- [29] Following the presentation of evidence at the hearing by Ms McLeod, the officer in the Reply Report retained the recommendation to amend CE-P3, but also then recommended a

restructuring and amended wording for the new policy CE-P8. This was to maintain consistency with the recommendations in the Reply Reports for the ECO and NFL chapters to rely upon EI-P2 for consideration of the effects of development of important infrastructure. The recommended changes to EI-P2 would then effectively exempt the effects of important infrastructure on the identified natural character values described in CE-SCHED2 and 3 of the CE chapter, and those effects would be managed by the EI chapter.

- [30] However, the Reply Report also recommended some changes would be required to EI-P2 in order to further address the tensions between higher order documents (i.e. the NZCPS, NPS-ET and CRPS). The Reply Report noted that the NZCPS requires the <u>avoidance</u> of adverse effects on outstanding natural character and outstanding natural landscapes and features in the coastal environment and this has been interpreted in strict terms through previous court decisions. However, the NPS-ET creates tension by requiring an <u>enabling</u> approach to electricity transmission infrastructure, principally outside of the coastal environment. Ms McLeod's evidence also acknowledged this tension. We accept it is the role of the PDP to provide a framework for decision makers to be able to reconcile these higher order documents when assessing proposals for important infrastructure in the Coastal Environment.
- [31] In considering the evidence on this, we do not consider it is appropriate, in the Coastal Environment in particular, to defer the consideration of effects of important infrastructure to the EI Chapter where in terms of EI-P2 there is a 'minimise effects' approach. We are conscious of the very clear direction provided by the NZCPS, in particular, to avoid adverse effects on natural character and outstanding natural landscapes and features in the coastal environment. It is however necessary to give effect to the NPS-ET which enables electricity transmission infrastructure including in the Coastal Environment.
- [32] Accordingly, we consider the appropriate response is to:
  - amend CE-P3 to delete the reference to enabling activities and development where they
    have an operational or functional need to locate in these areas (as recommended by the
    Section 42A Report author and as supported by Ms McLeod and by the submitter
    Department of Conservation);
  - amend CE-P3, CE-P4, and CE-P5 to exclude National Grid infrastructure from those policies;
  - include new CE-P8 exclusively for National Grid infrastructure which has a 'seek to avoid' approach, consistent with the NPS-ET, in relation to Outstanding Natural Landscapes, areas of Outstanding, High and Very High Natural Character, and areas of significant indigenous vegetation and habitats of indigenous fauna; and
  - include within new CE-P8 what we understand from Ms McLeod's evidence are some of the relevant considerations for interpreting the 'seek to avoid' language when assessing proposals for National Grid (and also as recommended in the Section 42A Report).
- [33] Structural amendments are also required to be made to CE-P2, CE-P3, CE-P4, and CE-P5 in order to make this amended policy framework work.
- [34] We consider this is an appropriate response to resolving the tension between these higher level documents and will maintain consistency in the general approach with our recommendations on the EI and NFL chapters. Whilst the National Grid activities have been

- given special attention (as required by the NPS-ET) we still consider a high bar has been set for these activities to locate in the Coastal Environment.
- [35] We note also that DoC's submission point was to delete clause 1(a) from CE-P3. Whilst our recommendation is to delete that clause it also includes a new policy (CE-P8) that relates only to the National Grid infrastructure, and so this may be considered to grant partial relief to this submitter.
- [36] In terms of s32AA, we adopt the evaluation in Section 5 of the Reply Report in terms of the general direction we have taken in providing an appropriate policy framework for reconciling potentially conflicting policy direction in higher order documents.

#### 3.4.4 CE-P4

[38] A change is also required consequential to our recommended restructuring of the policy framework to give effect to new Policy CE-P8 for National Grid infrastructure (see section 3.4.3 of this Recommendation Report). Therefore our recommendation is to 'accept in part' the CRC and the DoC submission points which were to retain CE-P4 as notified.

[40] We note the recommendation of the ECO Hearings Panel was to amend ECO-R1 to give effect to CRC's relief, which would have the effect that the ECO rules apply to all Significant Natural Areas as defined, not just those listed in ECO-SCHED4. Consistent with that, we agree that an amendment is required to be made to CE-P5.1, which is essentially a consequential amendment.

[47] As described in the Section 42A Report, the PDP takes a graduated approach to managing natural character in the coastal environment, recognising the direction in the NZCPS. In that regard, plantings proposed in outstanding natural character or the highly important Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere High Natural Character area are a non-complying activity, and in areas of very high natural character a discretionary activity. For all other areas within the

coastal environment, the rule mandates a restricted discretionary activity. We agree that in general this is appropriate, and that the inclusion of plantation forestry in the rule is also consistent with the NES-PF which allows district plans to be more stringent where the matter relates to Policy 13 of the NZCPS.

[48] However, in the Reply Report, the officer advised that:

"Based on Mr Bentley's advice, I therefore agree with ESAI that restrictions on horticultural plantings and shelterbelts can be lifted and become permitted activities in the CE Overlay, with the exception of areas that are identified as having high, very high or outstanding natural character values. These areas are subject to higher levels of protection under the NZCPS, are largely unmodified or have a limited amount of modification, and horticultural planting and shelterbelts should be restricted in these generally uncultivated areas".<sup>4</sup>

- [49] We consider the amendments recommended to CE-R2 in the Reply Report, as based on Mr Bentley's expert advice, are an appropriate response to the submissions of ESAI and NCFF.
- [50] In terms of s32AA, we adopt the evaluation in the Section 5 of the Reply Report.

### 3.5.3 CE-R3 Buildings and Structures

[51] For the following submitters and their submission points we generally agree with the recommendations and reasons of the Section 42A Report author, but do not consider a change to CE-R3 is required. Some additional comment is provided below.

- [52] We accept the changes recommended to be made to CE-R3 to address the submission points made by SDC.
- [53] We also agree that the definition of 'ancillary structure' includes poles up to a height of 8m and 1m in diameter which is permitted under CE-R3.4 and that this would apply to Orion's infrastructure. Therefore, we see no need to make a change to exempt network utility poles from CE-R3.4.
- In the Reply Report, attention was drawn to Transpower having proposed amendments to El-REQ5 and El-REQ12 to resolve any inconsistencies along similar lines to that proposed for ONL and VAL by the submitter. The officer agreed with the principle that the National Grid (and important infrastructure in general) be a discretionary activity rather than a non-complying activity, but that in areas of Outstanding Natural Character (and Outstanding Natural Landscapes) in the Coastal Environment, a non-complying activity status is more compliant with the direction in NZCPS Policy 13 and 15. We consider this is appropriate and it would then be for (new) CE-P8 and CE-P8A to provide an appropriate policy framework, reconciling the

NP-SET and the NZCPS. We accept that scope for these changes comes primarily from Transpower's relief seeking a discretionary activity at most for activities associated with the National Grid and changes to CE-P3 in the CE Chapter. ESAI have also, through general submission point (DPR-0212:056), sought that there is a rationalisation of provisions and maps particularly in the area around Lake Ellesmere/Te Waihora and the mouths of the Rakaia and Selwyn Rivers.

[55] In terms of s32AA of the RMA, we adopt the author's evaluation contained in the Section 42A Report and in the Reply Report.

- [58] The Reply Report noted that whilst not addressed in the Section 42A Report, Kāinga Ora, in general relief sought across the PDP, had requested that all of the earthworks provisions are consolidated into the Earthworks chapter to give effect to the National Planning Standards. In response, the recommendation, which we accept, was to locate the rule triggers in the same chapter (i.e. the Earthworks chapter) with appropriate cross referencing to a rule requirement located in the CE chapter. This would be more compliant with the National Planning Standards.
- [59] The evidence from the Section 42A Report author, and from statements from ESAI and NCFF were that some allowance should also be made for earthworks required for underground infrastructure consisting of pipes, cables and drains associated with farming which are not classed as network utilities.
- [60] We also concur with the deletion of prohibited activity status (and replacement with NC status) for the earthworks standard in CE-R5.8 for earthworks within 10 metres of the bed of Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere for the reasons stated in the Section 42A Report.
- [61] In terms of s32AA of the RMA, we adopt the author's evaluation contained in the Section 42A Report.

#### 3.5.6 SUB-R25 Subdivision and the Coastal Environment

- [63] We consider the Section 42A Report author's response to submission points by ESAI and NCFF, regarding subdivision in the coastal environment, is appropriate.
- [64] This will result in SUB-R25 being amended to delete the discretionary activity status for subdivision in the coastal environment outside of mapped natural character (reverting to the underlying zoning activity status, unless another more restrictive overlay applies) and subdivision in the mapped natural character overlay being amended from non-complying to a discretionary activity status.
- [65] In terms of s32AA of the RMA, we adopt the author's evaluation contained in the Section 42A Report.

### 3.6 Rule Requirements

#### 3.6.1 CE-REQ3 Building Coverage by Buildings and Structures

[67] We agree with the officer's interpretation of the rule. That is,

"If the building is in the Coastal Environment then the building coverage rules of the Coastal Environment Overlay will apply (taking into account the site area covered by the overlay) and if the building is outside of the overlay then the building coverage requirements of the underlying zone apply (GRUZ or MPZ) taking into account the whole site area."

[68] We consider this does not require an extensive explanation in the rule, as it is self-evident.

- [73] The recommended amendments to the PDP provisions contained in Appendix 1 are those that result from this Hearing Panel's assessment of submissions and further submissions. However, readers should note that further or different amendments to these provisions may have been recommended by:

- [75] In undertaking that 'consistency' exercise, care was taken to ensure that the final wording of the consolidated version of the amended PDP did not alter the intent of the recommended amendments contained in Appendix 1 of this Recommendation Report.
- [76] There are no other matters arising from our consideration of the submissions and further submissions or that arose during the hearing.
