Kickstarting Selwyn businesses

Every time a new business opens in Selwyn it brings job opportunities to our community and contributes to the local economy. At the last count it was calculated that our Selwyn economy grew almost 2.3 % more than the average district's economy in New Zealand. New businesses also enrich our lives by bringing services closer to our doorstep and by providing something new, interesting or useful to our communities. Getting a new business off the ground doesn't happen by accident. We have a team here at the Council who work hard with individuals, our partners at the Ministry of Social Development, the Canterbury Employers Chamber of Commerce and ChristchurchNZ, to give new businesses the kickstart they need to get their ideas up and running.

Recently I've met with several new businesses to Selwyn, like Christchurch RV Centre. Their story is similar to many other new businesses – they say that Selwyn offers a real opportunity to succeed, a solid and growing customer base and is a great place to set up shop. This month we have been running our Learn Earn and Grow seminars, offering tips and advice to budding entrepreneurs. If you have a business idea and want to know what help is out there get in contact with one of our amazing community, economic and business advisors.



A step on the employment ladder

Our population in Selwyn is comparatively very young, with 22% of us under 15. That's about 16,000 young people. I'd like every one of them to think that Selwyn is the place where they can live their best lives. It's my job to lead a Council that creates opportunities to help our young people realise their full potential, and all this month we've been doing just that. We've teamed up with various organisations to run a series of events to help young people find support in employment, education and training. Sadly our planned Employ-Ability Expo linking employers with job seekers of all ages has had to be postponed to later in the year. In May we kick of the third of our Council's six-week Trailblazer Internships, giving 10 young people some real work experience in Council roles from sports co-ordination to event planning. If you are quick you can still submit your application to be a Trailblazer before the closing date of 31 March.

I love seeing how the opportunities we create boost the confidence of our young people and stimulate interest and enthusiasm in areas they might not have considered was something they could do. Together we are all able to contribute and support our children as they grow through their childhood and teenage years with our outstanding schools, and loving neighbourhoods and families.





Community news

I'm always pleased when hard work pays off. This month we've made headway on two important community issues. I know that road safety on the main street through Lincoln has been a concern for the community. We'd planned to fix this with an upgrade in 2027 which would cost \$6 million, and were looking for funding to try and bring the work forward. Initially we fell outside the application criteria for Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency's funding as part of their "Streets for People" initiative. However we pressed our case and eventually they accepted our application. We'll find out in July if our bid has been successful. If we are we would be in a position to start the work next year.

In Hororata councillors and staff have been working hard with the community to agree a way forward for the new community facility. I'm pleased that our Council has agreed to support the excellent local work to undertake a feasibility study on the possibility of creating a community hub by upgrading the existing community hall and the site. This is a change from the the original plan from last year and would result in the community hall and surrounding land reverting to community ownership. Subject to final confirmation the council would also contribute \$1 million to the project. Go Hororata!


CORDE – new brand for Council-owned Company

News in Brief



New Youth Council

Our new Youth Council has come together for the first time this month, and it's great that we have widened the age range, with the youngest member being 12 years old. The Youth Councillors help our Council and staff bring a youth perspective to our decision making.



Biodiversity

We've just received close to \$800,000 Government boost to restore the 81 hectare Tārerekautuku/Yarrs Lagoon – a significant wetland close to Lincoln. This will create new employment opportunities and revitalise this natural asset.



Swim safe

Learning to swim is important for safety and for staying active. I'm delighted our swim programme has expanded into the Darfield pool, and that the former main pool in our Aquatic Centre is now dedicated to teaching our residents this lifesaving skill.



Springfield flooding

Springfield was the hardest hit in the flooding last year, with a number of families displaced from their homes. A door-to-door assessment of every house in Springfield, combined with a specialist flooding study is helping us to plan possible future flood protection options for discussion with township residents.



Springs reserve

The first bike tracks and buildings are taking shape in the new park at the Springs reserve. The wooden tracks are coming along as part of the first 10-hectare section of the park. Look out for the sports fields and a dog park to follow.
