#### 6. MATTERS ARISING FROM MINUTES 17 NOVEMBER 2016

- 7.4 It was noted that strategic outcomes and goals, Safer Systems or reference to the Road Safety Action Plan were missing from the draft Terms of Reference. After discussion a few minor changes were made to the draft copy.


11.1 Regional Road Safety Update – A Mazey

- 11.4 Councillor Alexander has noted that there is confusion over which footpaths are shared and which ones that are not.
- 11.5 Councillor Reid noted the excessive use of cell phones while driving. The Police advise that they take this seriously as it is a huge factor in crashes.
- 11.6 A speed limit review is on the next portfolio meeting agenda along with a speed management review for discussion.

# SELWYN DISTRICT ROAD SAFETY COMMITTEE TERMS OF REFERENCE

Adopted (date)

#### **PURPOSE**

The Selwyn District Council Road Safety Committee is established by the Selwyn District Council (SDC) to inform, coordinate, and progress matters relating to road safety in the District for the benefit of all Road Users. The Selwyn District Committee is charged with the following responsibilities:

- To receive input, consider issues raised and provide leadership to Council on road safety matters
- Identify campaigns for promotion, education and advertising road safety matters in line with Selwyn District Council's Road Safety Strategy and Safer Systems approach
- Address road safety issues specific to Selwyn district including pedestrian and cycle crossings
- Identify crash risk points within Selwyn District and discuss viable solutions
- Identify funding requirements to support the committee's actions
- Give reference to decisions on proposed roading works throughout the community
- Consider the consistency and appropriateness of directional signage
- Co-ordinate with regional initiatives as and when required

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

The core membership of the Selwyn District Council Road Safety Committee comprises the following Elected Representatives, and endorsed representatives of the external agencies listed below:

- Councillor N Reid (Chair)
- Councillor R Mugford
- Representation from the New Zealand Police
- Representation from the New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA)
- Representation from the New Zealand Trucking Association

The Committee will invite other external agencies to appear and / or co-ordinate with the Committee from time-to- time, or as requested by those agencies to be heard as it may relate to specific areas of road safety interest.

Only the core members have voting rights. The Council staff listed below shall have speaking rights.

A quorum of three members must be present in order to run a formal meeting of the Selwyn District Road Safety Committee.

The Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson will be selected from the two Councillors appointed to the Committee, as voted by the Committee.

#### ADMINISTRATION, REPORTING AND MEETING FREQUENCY

The Committee's activity and administrative requirements will be supported by the following Council staff:

- Road Safety Co-ordinator
- School Road Safety Co-ordinator
- Roading Engineer

- Asset Manager Transportation
- Asset Administrator Roading

The Committee will hold four meetings per year, every three months.

The agenda and minutes of each meeting of the Committee will be made available on Selwyn District Council's website.

The meeting commenced at 10.05am:

#### 1. Welcome, introductions, apologies

Mayor David Ayers opened the meeting and welcomed attendees. Apologies were noted.

#### 2. Minutes of the previous meeting

The following correction was noted by Kathy Graham: Item #6, Intersections: Safe Assistance to be amended to Safe <a href="System">System</a>.

The Minutes of the meeting held 10 November 2016, including the correction noted above, were accepted as a true and accurate record.

#### 3. Vehicle safety in riverbeds

Deferred to next meeting; led by Al Stewart.

#### Additional item to circulated Agenda

#### Safe Roads Alliance

Mayor Ayers welcomed Bryce Carter and Rachel Stokes to the meeting. Bryce Carter introduced the item and presented "Canterbury Regional Road Safety Working Group – Introduction to Safe Roads".

An electronic copy of the presentation, as well as contact details, will be circulated with the Minutes.

#### Of note:

- Alliance includes NZTA, Beca, BBO, Northern Civil, Corban Consulting
- South Island focus is on Canterbury and the West Coast in terms of casualties on the road network and safe speeds.
- Projects are primarily on national or regional strategic roads.
- The Government plans to spend \$600M over the next six over the national highways network.
- Five main projects in Canterbury range from Waipara to Timaru on State Highway #s 7, 1 and 74.
- Looking to engage with transport teams, councillors, community boards and user groups, as well and source assistance of local authorities and other agencies to ensure key users are being engaged with.

A discussion followed the presentation, of note:

- The Safe Roads Alliance has been approached to assess specific rail crossings and engagement will take place with the relevant local authorities. Mayor Ayers noted a particular rail crossing located on State Highway 71.
- Intersections, as well as wider corridors, will be assessed. It was noted that there will be
  no simple solution but all options and interventions available will be reviewed, including
  short-term operational options for quick wins. Programme business cases will have a
  recommended programme of work for the entire programme or interim steps.
- Non-engineering interventions, e.g. speed management, will be required to go through a
  business case process. Corridors being focused on have a high crash rate so
  engineering as well as speed management will be considered.
- The Alliance offered to visit councils to workshop problems/issues in their district and discuss community feedback around road use on focused corridors.

Bryce Cater and Rachel Stokes left the meeting at 10.47am.

#### 4. Road Safety Implementation Plan

Len Fleete spoke to the item, providing a brief review of the Plan review process. The draft Plan will be presented to RTC on 24 February 2017 and, following sign-off from RTC, will be published. The Group was requested to provide feedback or comments directly to Len before Friday 10 February 2017.

### AP: RRSWG to provide final comments on the Road Safety Implementation Plan to Len Fleete before Friday 10 February 2017.

#### 5. Speed management

Len Fleete spoke to the item on behalf of James Newton. Len noted the Speed management workshop held earlier this week in Christchurch, and the message out of that workshop that consideration be given to regional leadership in this area.

A discussion took place, noting the need for central government to take a lead in areas relating to national speed rules, as well as a desire for consistency in speed control and road condition requirements across the country and the Canterbury region. Discussion also touched on the reliance on drivers to drive to the conditions versus driving to the default speeds or speed advisory signs, and educating the community about why speeds are amended and enforced. It was also noted that councils have the ability to be flexible with road speed change within their area following consultation.

The road management programme is keen for regions to have leadership in this area in the form of a regional speed reference group; however, it was agreed that the Canterbury region is consistent and is working to ONRC regulations, therefore, the Regional Road Safety Working Group will work with the National Speed Reference Group and will continue to use the ONRC approach to develop speed plans.

Len Fleete referred the Group to the Road Safety Implementation Plan in terms of speed management planning. The following amendments were discussed and agreed in relation to the use of the word "regional":

#### Ensure that speed enforcement is well resourced and risk-targeted

- Develop a regional speed reference group
- Work with the national speed reference group through the safe speeds workshop. Using a 'one network' approach, develop a regional speed plans that considers speed limits, public education campaigns, risk targeted enforcement and engineering recommendations.

The Group will now need to consider appropriate options to ensure a Canterbury voice is heard at national level and NZTA.

Len will update and re-circulate the draft Road Safety Implementation Plan for comment in relation to regional and national speed management.

### AP: Len Fleete to update and re-circulate the Road Safety Implementation Plan to the Group for comment in relation to regional and national speed management.

#### 6. Intersection safety training update

Len Fleete spoke to the item. A training course was held in December 2016 relating to high risk intersections. Feedback received was positive from participants in terms of the ability to

better high-risk intersections. Today was an opportunity to discuss how the draft intersection business case can be completed.

After a discussion that noted the original purpose of the business case being focused on rural intersections, the need for consistency in the approach to intersection improvement and upgrades, and the need for a collective strategy to give councils the ability to request additional funding from NZTA when required, it was agreed that all councils (and possibly ACC) will contribute towards the engagement of a consultant (based on stock truck effluent proportioning), to work on the Group's behalf by drafting an intersection business plan for the region, outlining a 10-year strategy to improve and upgrade intersections and achieving consistency in the region.

Len will look into this further and will circulate an update to the Group.

### AP: Len Fleete to investigate the engagement of a consultant to work with the Group and draft an intersection business plan for the region.

#### 7. Update on the regional road safety working group review

Len Fleete spoke to the item on behalf of James Newton. James has requested the Group reconsider its role and whether the review should be reviewed.

The value of looking back on what is being delivered was noted; however, it was agreed that Len will schedule the next review at an appropriate time in the future.

### AP: Len Fleete to schedule a future Road Safety Working Group review into the Group's timeline.

#### 8. Regional Land Transport Plan update

Lorraine Johns spoke to the item. The RTC is scheduled to meet on 23 February 2017, with an RLTP workshop planned for 8 March 2017. An outline of a TOG sub-group reviewing the region's priority issues for inclusion in the RLTP was provided, and an update on those priorities tabled, with an invitation for the Group to provide feedback directly to Lorraine.

#### 9. Any other business

#### Agency representation at road safety committees

The issue of the lack of NZTA, Police and, to some extent ACC, representation on council road safety working groups was raised, including concerns of the groups' inability to draw knowledge from NZTA on an operational level. The need for these committees to have consistent engagement with agencies to gain traction on their profiles and input into what they are wanting to achieve, was noted.

NZTA confirmed that this issue is being considered and noted the need to engage.

To determine whether this is a trend across the region, the Group was requested to discuss this issue with their road safety committees, and for a watching brief at meetings that take place before the next RRSWG meeting. The Group will report back at its next meeting.

#### RECOMMENDATION

#### SAFE SYSTEMS

#### Safe Speeds

**safe speeds** that suit the function and level of safety of the road - road users understand and comply with speed limits and drive to the conditions.



**Rural Speed/Loss of Control**: We obtained the approval to use the Police campaign "Check your speed" billboard design. The billboards were installed at our 8 road safety sites on local roads.

We are currently planning the 2017 Winter Driving campaign. A media release will be complted, with billboards, print and radio advertising and community resources will be distributed from 22 May.

#### **Safe Vehicles**

**safe vehicles** that help prevent crashes and protect road users from crash forces that cause death and serious injury.



Supported by Driving Instructors at Leading Learners.

#### Safe Road Use

**safe road use** ensuring that road users are skilled and competent, alert and unimpaired, and that people comply with road rules, choose safer vehicles, take steps to improve safety and demand safety improvements.



**Drink Driving:** The annual drink drive campaign commenced on 24 November. This will run through December and January. Radio and print advertising, bar Mats, posters and pens are all part of the resources being utilised during the campaign. The billboards were installed on our local roads and were displayed until early January.

**Motorcycles**: We held a "Ride Forever" training promotion to encourage more riders to participate in training. The voucher offered was accepted by 37 local riders with 21 having completed motorcycle training to date. The balance of the training costs for these courses is met by ACC.

Planning has commenced for the 2017 Motorcycle event, "Kickstart", which will be held on Sunday, 01 October. We are working jointly with CCC and

WDC, Ride Forever trainers, motorcycle retailers and clubs to deliver a safety based motorcycle event.

**Mature Drivers:** Age Concern delivered four more Confident Driving Courses for Mature Drivers across the district. The last one for this financial year will be in Lincoln on 11 May. We hope to hold a CarFit event on 18 May in Prebbleton if there is enough confirmed interest.

**Fatigue:** A short campaign commenced prior to Easter and ANZAC weekends.

**Young Drivers:** The Leading Learners course were held on 26 January and 26 April, which brings the number of courses delivered this year to seven. We have 15 names on the waiting list for the next course which is planned for 10 July.

The trial Young Driver Mentor Programme in Lincoln is almost at the end. An evaluation exercise will be completed with the view to make decisions about the future delivery of this programme. Four of the original six students 6 have achieved their restricted licence and a further young driver has commenced driving with one of the mentors.

**Distraction**: Nothing to report, although it is noted cellphone use while driving continues to be of high concern.

#### **Council Road Safety Programme:**

#### **Community Road Safety Fund:**

Funding applications received and granted as follows:

- Selwyn Carseat Champions: Additional supplies for Child Restraint Checking Event in January
- Selwyn Womens Issues Group: Funding towards safety vests for Lemonwood Grove, Greendale and Tai Tapu schools.

**School Safety:** The Back to School campaign ran in January which involved print media, radio advertising, poster distribution and visiting all the primary schools with collateral and a colouring competition.

Bus Safety Champion fluro caps were designed and distributed to Sheffield, Hororata, Greendale and West Melton schools in an effort to raise our newly trained Bus Monitors' profile and increase their conspicuity.

Clearview Primary is running an Active Transport initiative in Term 2 which we have supported with reward prizes of safety and sports equipment (back pack covers, fluro snap bands, bike locks and drink bottles).

Actively working with Rolleston Christian School, West Rolleston Primary, Lincoln Primary and Lincoln High School to develop their School Travel Plans.

Ongoing support of the Rolleston Drive Kea crossing with provision of PPE. **Child Restraint activities:** Two child restraint checking clinics were held in Rolleston with over 80 child restraints checked.

Ongoing support to our trained volunteer technicians with the supply of consumables.

**SeatSmart:** The SeatSmart car seat recycling iniatiative was launched in conjunction with solid waste in March with 24 expired or damaged car seats recycled to date.

**SADD Workshop:** We provided the venue for the first Selwyn SADD workshop since their 2016 restructure. It was attended by reps from Lincoln, Ellesmere and Ashburton College. Selwyn is a focus region for SADD this term and we have offered our ongoing support as see value in the programme.

**SADD Conference**: We encouraged local SADD representatives by offering a subsidy for their conference fees and attended the final morning of the SADD conference. We were impressed with the presentations and our local representatives positive attitudes.

**RYDA at Lincoln:** We attended the RYDA programme at Lincoln Event Centre on 1 May. It was attended by 170 Lincoln High School students from year 11, 12 and 13. They participated in 6 various sessions related to road safety for young drivers/passengers during the day. We are keen to support this event throughout our colleges in the future.

**Crash Bash:** We also attended the 2017 Crash Bash presentation at Riccarton High School. This programme is coordinated by CCC and Police and is taken to a large number of schools in Christchurch and is also offered to our Selwyn school. It is targeted at year 9 through to 13.

### Safe Roads & Roadsides

**safe roads and roadsides** that are predictable and forgiving of mistakes - their design should encourage appropriate road user behavior and safe speeds.



**Intersections:** The "Check, check again" intersection campaign was delivered during April. A community questionnaire was offered with a prize draw for those that responded. There were 254 entries received which was very acceptable and initiated some interesting comments. A media release, radio, print advertising and resources were utilised during the campaign.

Goal: To progressively reduce the number and severity of road crashes in the Selwyn District









#### Safer Journeys 2010 – 2020 National Road Safety Strategy

Safer Journeys is New Zealand's Road Safety Strategy 2010–2020. The strategy has a vision:

"A safe road system increasingly free of death and serious injury"

#### A Safe System Approach

The vision is a safe road system increasingly free of death and serious injury, which challenges us to see road deaths and serious injuries as preventable.

The Safe System differs from traditional approaches to road safety. Rather than always blaming the road user for causing a crash, it acknowledges that even responsible people sometimes make mistakes in their use of the roads.

Given that mistakes are inevitable, the Safe System has objectives to:

- make the road transport system more accommodating of human error
- manage the forces that injure people in a crash to a level the human body can tolerate without serious injury
- · minimise the level of unsafe and risky road user behaviour

The Safe System focuses on creating safe roads, safe speeds, safe vehicles and safe road use.

- Safe roads and roadsides that are predictable and forgiving of mistakes. They are self-explaining in that their design encourages safe travel speeds.
- Safe speeds travel speeds suit the function and level of safety of the road. People understand and comply with the speed limits and drive to the conditions.
- Safe vehicles that prevent crashes and protect road users, including pedestrians and cyclists, in the event of a crash.
- Safe road use road users that are skilled and competent, alert and unimpaired. They comply with road rules, take steps to improve safety, and demand and expect safety improvements.

#### Selwyn District Crash Statistics 2012 – 2016 All crashes – Overview

- 1,283 crashes (515 injury, 768 non-injury) resulting in 43 deaths and 177 road users seriously injured
- 84% of all crashes happened on open road area, 41% of all crashes were at intersections
- 46% were lost control/head on type crashes (22% on bends and 24% on straight roads)
- The three most common crash factors were poor handling (33%), poor observation (35%), and failed to give way/stop (29%)
- Speed (15%) and alcohol (16%) were also common factors involved in crashes in the Selwyn District
- ₱ 29% of the at fault or part fault drivers in injury crashes were under 25 years old and 19% were over 60 years old
- ACC: Canterbury Motor Vehicle claims (2010-2014) 16,421 with a 5 year average of 3,264 showing a 2% upward trend since 2010
- **ACC:** Canterbury Motorcycle claims (2010-2014) 2,641 with a 5 year average of 528 showing a 7% downward trend since 2010

#### **Selwyn District Road Safety Strategy 2020**

Road Safety – A long term plan for Selwyn District – Vision: "Zero road deaths and serious injuries on Selwyn roads"

The aspiration of "Vision Zero" road deaths and serious injuries applies a long term, ultimate level of aspiration for the implementation of the Safe System in Selwyn. It takes into consideration our unique roading network that consists of 2,400 kilometres of mainly long, flat straight roads with over 1,000 intersections.

The district will continue to experience a sustained level of high growth that is continually increasing the number of vehicles on our roads ranging from those originating from our expanding townships close to Christchurch, and heavy trucks, dairy tankers and agricultural machinery on our rural network.

It is recognised that it is probably not possible to prevent all crashes. However, by taking a total view of the combined factors involved in road safety, "Vision Zero" aims to implement an improved road transport system that, in the longer term, will protect road users and prevent crashes that result in death and serious injury. The aspirational "Vision Zero" is underpinned by the overall goal to:

"Progressively reduce the number and severity of road crashes in Selwyn District"

#### Police enforcement - the "Fatal Five"

Canterbury: 80% of all tickets will be issued for the "fatal five" offences as shown below. There is an expectation that 50% of all speed tickets will be for speeds between less than 15kph in excess of limit. The introduction of the lowered tolerance around schools and during holiday periods has widened the target.

#### **Alcohol**

#### Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016 (Local Roads and State Highways)

Between 2012 and 2016, there were 156(16% of all crashes) crashes that involved alcohol, 80 injury 76 non injury. These crashes resulted in 8 deaths and 40 people being seriously injured.

#### **Target groups**

All road users

#### **Reason for Action**

Alcohol crashes have been identified as a high risk area in the Safer Journeys Strategy 2020. It is also included as a priority action in the Selwyn Road Safety Strategy to 2020.

#### Measures

#### **Intersections**

#### Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016 (Local Roads and State Highways)

There were 520 intersection crashes, which is 41% of all crashes in the Selwyn District. There were 225 injury and 295 non injury. The injury crashes resulted in 12 deaths, 84 people seriously injured, Failure to give way/stop and poor observation were the most common crash factors.

#### **Target groups**

All road users

#### **Reason for Action**

Rural intersections have been identified as a high risk area in the "Communities at risk" register for Selwyn, it is also given a high rating in the Safer Journeys 2020. Addressing Intersection crashes is a key action in the Selwyn Road Safety Strategy to 2020. In Selwyn District there are many long straight roads, with a high percentage of rural road intersections located in 100kph speed limit areas.

#### Measures

#### **Motorcycles**

#### Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016 (Local Roads and Highways)

There were 47 injury motorcycle crashes in Selwyn District resulting in 5 fatalities, 27 serious injuries. These crashes represent 7% of all crashes in the Selwyn District.

#### **Target groups**

All motorcycle riders, new and return riders, both male and female

#### **Reason for Action**

Safer Journeys and the NZTA Strategic fit shows motorcycles as a high priority. The Communities at Risk Register shows that Selwyn is at medium risk.

Selwyn District is a popular destination for riders wanting to do day trips out of Christchurch, most weekends see large numbers of motorcyclists travelling through the District, either alone or in large groups. The roads of choice for motorcyclists seem to be either hilly or winding roads like those in our district travelling towards Akaroa, the Rakaia Gorge and the West Coast.

#### **Driver Distraction/Fatigue**

#### Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016 (Local Roads and Highways)

There were 72 crashes with fatigue recorded as a contributing factor. Of these 29 were injury crashes resulting in 3 fatalities, 20 people receiving serious injuries. There were 303 injury crashes with distraction/attention diverted recorded as a contributing factor. Of these 128 were injury crashes which resulted in 3 fatalities and 46 serious injuries.

These 2 factors make up 30% of all injury crashes in the Selwyn District. It is noted that 183 minor injuries were recorded for these two road safety concerns.

#### **Target groups**

All drivers and their passengers.

#### **Reason for Action**

Driver Distraction and Fatigue has been identified as a Medium Risk area for the Selwyn out of the Communities at Risk Register and also given as a medium concern in the Safer Journeys.

There is growing concern that many crashes have distraction as a contributing cause. Cell phone use, eating, passengers, altering vehicle controls while driving are some of the commonly known types of distraction.

It is felt fatigue in drivers is not easy to detect and may be under reported and not openly admitted after a crash.

Note: Distraction and Fatigue have been combined into one activity to encourage a continued focus and local injury prevention strategies and awareness campaigns to be delivered to our residents and visitors throughout the year.

#### Safe Speeds – Loss of Control

#### Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016 (Local Roads and Highways)

There were 164 crashes where speed too fast for the conditions and loss of control was a factor. The 78 injury crashes resulted in 12 fatalities, 32 people receiving serious injuries. These made up 15% of all crashes in the Selwyn District. There were also 86 non injury crashes

Loss of control on bends featured highly with 59% of these crashes, with 23% being straight road loss of control.

NZ Police: An expectation that 50% of all speed tickets issued will be issued for speeds 1-15kph in excess of the limit. Focusing on these "low end" speed offences is considered to be key in reducing the overall speed distribution and consequent road trauma. The introduction of lowered tolerances around schools and holiday periods has widened the target.

#### **Target Groups**

All drivers

#### **Reason for Action**

Selwyn District can experience severe weather and road conditions during the Winter months. To increase driver awareness to make appropriate changes to their driving behaviour during Winter conditions. Crashes where loss of control was a factor were not necessarily drivers exceeding the limit, and were also attributed to not adjusting speed to suit the conditions.

There are two parts to this project, one targeted at Winter driving conditions and other for speed/ loss of control on rural roads.

#### Measures

There will be a reduction in the number of crashes where drivers drive too fast for conditions and lose control.

# **Mature Road Users**

There were 139 injury crashes in Selwyn District involved drivers over the age of 60 years. These crashes resulted in 19 fatalities and 56 people receiving serious injuries. There were 40 crashes where drivers were over the age of 75 years, resulting in 5 fatalities and 19 serious injuries.

## **Target groups**

All mature drivers, with a focus on those aged 60+

# **Background**

In Selwyn District here is a need for mature drivers to continue driving for longer to enable them to access services, shops and health requirements. Mature drivers are a high concern for Selwyn in the Communities at Risk Register. It is a key action in the Selwyn District Road Safety Strategy. Older drivers feature as an emerging trend both locally and nationally.

#### Measures

The number and severity of crashes where the mature driver is either at fault or part fault is reduced.

# **Young Drivers (16-24)**

## Selwyn Statistics 2012 - 2016

Young drivers were involved in 194 crashes resulting in 15 fatalities, 69 people receiving serious injuries. These crashes make up 38% of all crashes in the Selwyn District.

#### **Target groups**

**Overall:** drivers aged between 16 and 24 years old, utilising local young driver programmes, resources and engagement opportunities.

**Leading Learners:** drivers on a Learner or restricted licence who are a resident in Selwyn (aged 16-19).

**Teen Coach:** drivers and their parent/caregiver who are on or preparing for a Learner Licence (aged 16-19)

#### **Reason for Action**

The reason for this action is to reduce the number of young people involved in crashes, driving offences and Graduated Driving Licence System breaches. Encourage participation in other driving programmes to increase experience and support 120 hours of supervised driving before applying for a Restricted Licence.

#### **Measures**

There will be a reduction in young driver crash and enforcement statistics. A reduction in breaches of learner and restricted licence. Evaluation forms from Learners and parents, and feedback from instructors after attending courses and activities.

**SUBJECT: Annual Plan Submissions** 

During the Annual Plan submission deliberation process there were a number of issues identified for reference to the Road Safety Committee. These are as follows:

- 1. Turning bay on Leeston Rd/Brookside Irwell Rd
- 2. Reactive flashing stop sign warnings
- 3. Courtenay Road widening
- 4. Glentunnel School parking
- 5. Fairhurst Place addition to footpath network

Below are brief details and comments on the issues for discussion by the committee.

#### 1. Turning bay on Leeston Rd/Brookside Irwell Rd

Seal widening to create a right turn bay for traffic turning into Brookside Irwell Rd. Is a minor improvement project. Right turn bays are effective in providing a defined area where vehicles can wait before turning.

#### 2. Reactive flashing stop sign warnings

Request for more active signs warning of intersections. We have three intersections with active stop ahead warning signs which are in trial phase. The final report for the trial is due in October 2017. NZTA will then assess whether the signs will be approved for general use.

# 3. Courtenay Road widening

Seal widening at the access to the Field Days site to repair and avoid the damage caused by traffic turning into and out of the site. A traffic management plan is submitted and approved but this covers the management of traffic flow rather than the effect on the network. It was suggested that the Road Safety Committee, Kirwee Community Committee and the Field Days Committee should get together to discuss issues around road frontages and other issues.

## 4. Glentunnel School parking

A request to upgrade the school frontage for roadside parking. The frontage is on SH77 and Council policy is:

- a. The use by schools of road reserve for parking facilities requires approval by the Council.
- b. Before application of engineering improvements the school must consult with the Council's Road Safety Co-ordinator, as the issues may be improved via behaviour change.
- c. If the application is approved, the Council shall provide engineering services, arrange construction and assume responsibility for ongoing maintenance.
- d. School boards may apply through the Annual Budget process for funding of the construction of parking areas.
- e. Projects shall be considered on a discretionary basis.
- f. All works on road reserve shall be undertaken to Council standards and the Asset Delivery Manager shall be given discretion to provide engineering advice.

#### 5. Fairhurst Place – addition to footpath network

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New footpath requested as a connection to Carrick PI. It had previously been advised that there was a lack of support for this by the residents. Also just a footpath construction is problematic to fit in the berm as it would clash with both the side drainage swales and/or trees. It needs to fit in behind a kerb and associated drainage upgrades to create a berm and space for a footpath.
