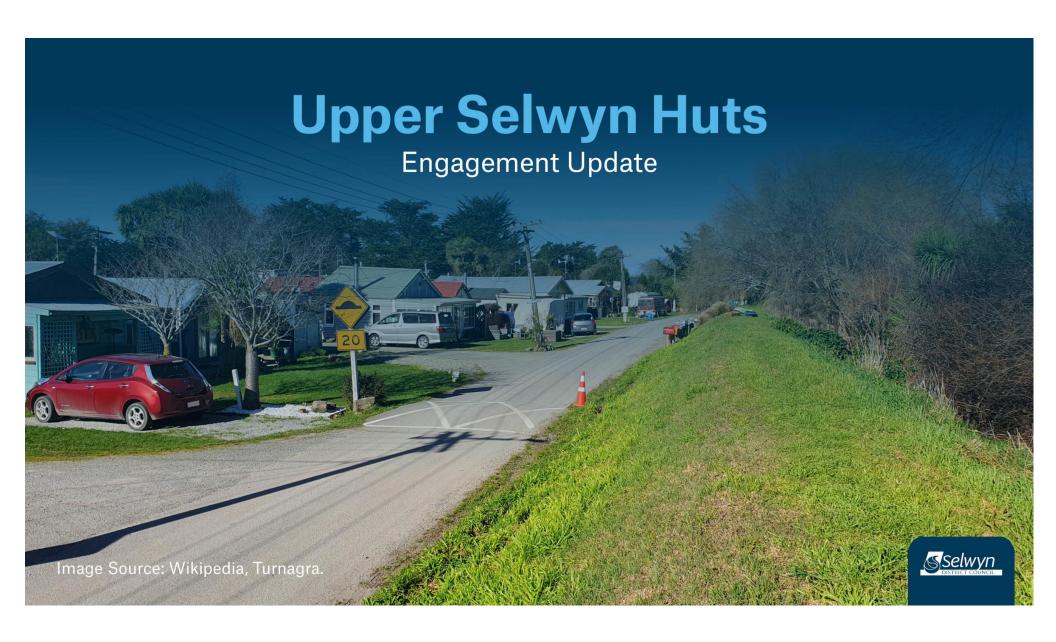

Background

Fisherman's huts were constructed in 1888 and generally used for limited numbers of days per year, over time and accelerated by the Canterbury Earthquakes there are now many huts used as a permanent place of residence. The land is Crown land and Selwyn District Council is responsible for administering this on behalf of the Crown.

Following discussions from December 2017 – May 2019 connected to wastewater conversations at the time Council unanimously determined on **8** May 2019, that 'Hut licences and subsequent renewals are short term and ultimately for a finite period' ¹.

Safety concerns led to a decision to remove the Upper Selwyn Huts, These concerns include:

- The huts were not designed for permanent habitation and are not set up for safe permanent residency. There are challenges with compliance and safety for the residents which needs to be addressed.
- Over time rising sea levels will make safe permanent habitation in this location problematic.
- Expected increased weather events will limit access into and out of the area. This poses a danger to the USH Community being cut-off from support during emergency events and increases the risk to Civil Defence teams.
- The two other lakeside communities face similar challenges and there is merit in having an approach that has some consistency.

Since May 2019, there have been ad hoc conversations and ongoing extensions to the Deed Of Licence, until 14 July 2024 when the decision was made by this Council to work through a consultation and engagement process with the community.

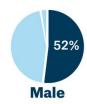


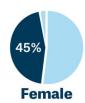

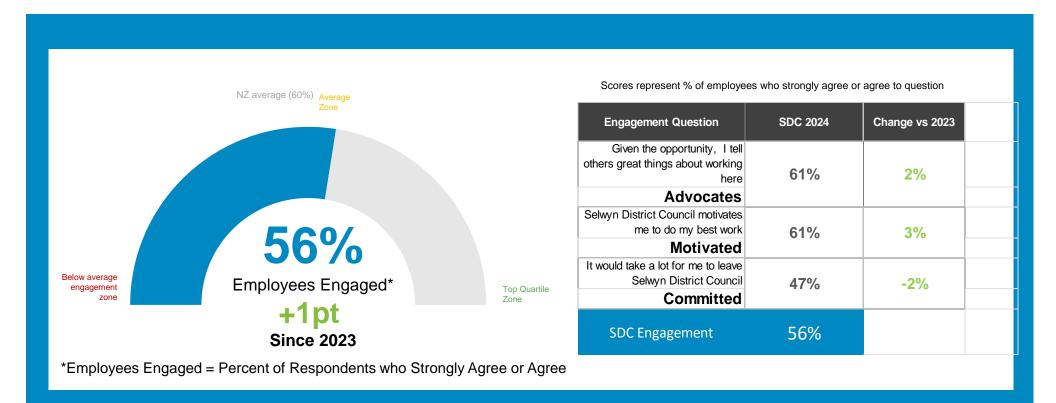
