Annual Plan Submission 2021/22

Please consider this a submission to the council's annual plan. I am writing to bid for \$5,000 to assist with delivery of the New Zealand Chinese Language Week (NZCLW) being held across New Zealand 26th of September to the 2nd of October 2021.

Background

The New Zealand Chinese Language Week Charitable Trust was established in 2015 to enhance New Zealanders' understanding of Chinese language and culture. Since then, New Zealand Chinese Language Week has grown in reach and exposure year-on-year and had strong support from current and previous governments, as well as many Councils, schools and businesses.

Building linguistic and cultural skills of New Zealanders not only provides a crucial underpinning of our educational and social strength as a country and community, but will increasingly be a necessary foundation for New Zealand business, government and society to engage with China. Such skills will be needed to rebuild our tourism industry, to support local governments and their sister city initiatives, and to promote trade and investment.

As acknowledged already through Sister City relationships and the China New Zealand Mayoral Forum, the relationship with China is an important one. Many local businesses have found the support of their council has helped them to do business in China.

Supporting NZCLW is another practical way to get more local businesses and communities exposed to Chinese language and culture leading to more trade and exchanges. The week is growing in popularity and becoming an annual fixture on the calendar, however we require sponsorship and partnerships to deliver the initiative – hence we are asking for your financial support.

NZCLW 2021

This week NZCLW will build on its past successes engaging schools; government and local government; local communities and commercial enterprises. We do this through supporting the delivery of a range of fun and practical activities – exposing Kiwis to Chinese culture and encouraging Kiwis to “give Chinese a go”. Planned activities include:

- Events to promote Chinese learning in schools, including activities with schools in China;

- Publishing a trilingual children's book for distribution to schools and libraries across New Zealand;

- Challenges to promote basic Chinese skills in business and the community, with supporting printed material;
- High level promotion of the importance of building Chinese language capacity – from the Prime Minister, Mayors, Ministers and business leaders;
- Media promotion; and
- Ongoing engagement and activities via social media.

In terms of council involvement, many Mayors have taken up the #5Days5Phrases Challenge; libraries have held a range of activities including book readings in Mandarin, China-themed displays and dances, calligraphy demonstrations and other events.

We believe supporting New Zealand Chinese Language Week is an investment in New Zealand's future and its prosperity. It is a means of acknowledging our multi-cultural character and the contribution made by New Zealanders of Chinese ethnicity to our business and society. As we emerge from Covid-19, having a society that has enhanced linguistic and cultural capability to engage with China will become ever more important. All parts of our community – government and business in particular – need to build knowledge and understanding of China and its language and culture.

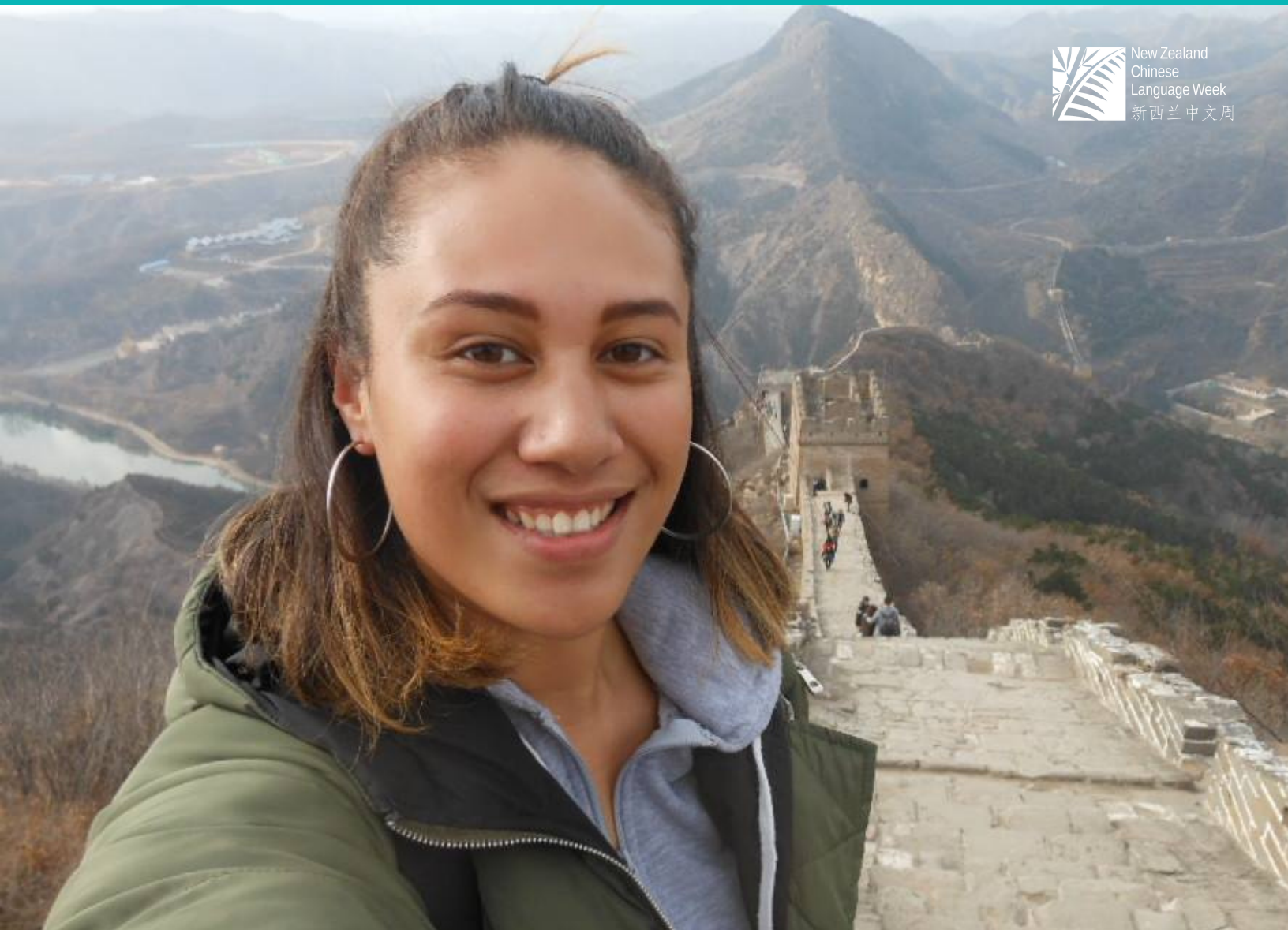

Staff Recommended Action That the submission be acknowledged.

Staff Comments The submitters opposition to the proposal to develop a new wastewater system in Darfield and Kirwee is acknowledged.

There were around 496 responses to this question, of which 158 were from the Darfield or Kirwee area. Of the Darfield and Kirwee residents who responded, 13% support the proposed wastewater system and 86% want to keep the septic tanks.

From a district wide perspective (excluding those who had no preference), 45.5% of respondents supported the proposed wastewater system and 54.5% wanted to keep the septic tanks.

Staff have read through the submissions in opposition to the proposed scheme. The submission points were categorised into common themes as follows: • Affordability and fairness, • No compelling reasons for the scheme, • The charging mechanism is unfair, • The scheme boundaries should change, • More growth is unwanted, • The proposed pipeline is a less resilient wastewater solution, and • Council haven't provided enough alternative options or done enough consultation.

A summary of the concerns under each theme are provided below.

Affordability and fairness

Submitters concerns included: • The cost is unaffordable for ratepayers and is higher than the cost of a septic tank system • There will be hidden costs including decommissioning septic tanks • The rates increase is coming at a bad time for the community • People who have recently paid for new septic tanks will have their investment wasted • The charging mechanism is unfair and seems to benefit

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developers more than ratepayers • There may be discrepancies in property values • Some submitters asked why Council are pursuing this project now, given that Central Government is underway with water reforms.

A number of options were proposed by submitters. These, along with staff considerations include: • Council could consider a range of options to bring the cost down for ratepayers, including arranging a mass building consent for the drainage works on private property; offering subsidized low-pressure sewer systems for properties that are set far back from the road; organizing a contractor for the works on private land, to bring the cost down through economies of scale; etc. Any arrangements for works on private property could include the cost of decommissioning the septic tank, so that there are no 'hidden costs'. • Council could consider different financing mechanisms, potentially including the sale of the Creyke Road land to subsidize the scheme and bring the cost down for ratepayers. Council would need to do further public consultation before spreading any costs district-wide. • Alternatively, Council will consider excluding properties with existing septic tanks or allowing a long notice period (20 - 30 years or the remaining life of each septic tank) before connection.

In terms of 'why now': Council had the opportunity to access \$10.66 million of stimulus funding from Central Government. Council are proposing to use the stimulus funding to subsidise the Darfield/Kirwee wastewater pipeline. The stimulus money must be spent by March 2022. Council chose the pipeline project because it was able to be completed quickly, to meet the Central Government timeframes. Council also recognise that there is significant development potential for both Darfield and Kirwee, so it is worthwhile putting the wastewater scheme in before further development occurs.

Some submitters are concerned that there may be a property value discrepancy emerging between properties that are on septic tanks versus properties on reticulated wastewater. Council have commissioned Ford Baker Valuation to compare the value of an average priced house in Darfield with and without reticulated wastewater. This suggested that reticulated wastewater would add \$10,000 to \$15,000 to a property's value in Darfield. Council consider that there is unlikely to be a significant discrepancy in property values given that large blocks of houses on similar-sized lots would be connected at one time. Larger rural-residential lots would be excluded from the scheme, but these are considered to appeal to different buyers and so are not directly comparable to smaller lots near central Darfield or Kirwee.

It may seem like developers are paying less than ratepayers, but this is not the case. Developers will pay the Development Contribution (\$6,085 per Housing Unit Equivalent) and the cost of installing any sewer reticulation within their subdivision. The total cost to developers will be similar on a per lot basis to existing ratepayers.

No compelling reasons for the scheme

Submitters concerns included: • Septic tanks are not having a public health or environmental impact • Septic tanks allow people to take responsibility for their environmental impact, whereas a centralised wastewater system is 'out of sight, out of mind' • There is perceived to be no strong driver for the project, other than to facilitate development • The money for the project could be better spent

elsewhere • The community are opposed to the scheme, as evidenced by the consultation results²⁷

Staff acknowledge that groundwater monitoring has not measured any contamination attributable to septic tanks. We note that the monitoring programme looks at deep wells, which would not necessarily pick up a contaminant plume from septic tanks if there was one. Council acknowledge that septic tanks allow more individual responsibility for wastewater treatment and disposal, compared to a reticulated wastewater system. However, a distributed network of septic tanks also means there are multiple points of failure, increasing the risk of water contamination and subsequent waterborne illness.

Staff acknowledge that the reticulated wastewater scheme will benefit new developments, including commercial/industrial and residential developments with smaller lot sizes. Recent subdivisions with large lot sizes are not included in the proposed scheme because these are not cost-effective to service. At this time and that larger land area provides for larger disposal area opportunities.

Staff note that a \$10.66 million subsidy from Central Government has been applied to reduce the overall cost to ratepayers and developers.

Staff acknowledge that many of the existing ratepayers who responded during LTP consultation were opposed to the proposed wastewater scheme for properties with septic tanks. Council could consider excluding existing properties with septic tanks, or allowing a long lead-in time for connection (20 – 30 years or the remaining life of each septic tank). The scheme boundaries should change

Submitters concerns included: • Large sections have been excluded and this is perceived to be unfair • If the benefits are township-wide or environmental, all residents should pay

Large lots (>5,000m²) have been excluded from the scheme as these properties are more sustainable for septic tanks (having adequate land for backup disposal fields, for example) and are more expensive and difficult to reach with a reticulated system. Extending the scheme to these properties would raise the cost of the overall scheme, with little benefit.

For existing ratepayers, Council could consider spreading some of the cost of the scheme across the district-wide wastewater rate, although this may require further public consultation.

More growth is unwanted

Submitters concerns included: • Darfield will grow too fast if sewers are connected. Sections are already getting too small, and with reticulated sewer there will be even more rationale for decreasing lot sizes and ruining the rural feel of the community.

Council acknowledge that the reticulated wastewater system may facilitate smaller lot sizes in Darfield and Kirwee. Council will continue to apply minimum standards for subdivision through the district plan, including minimum site sizes. The appropriateness of minimum site sizes is subject to a range of factors, of which the ability to service is just one.

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The minimum average site size in the Living 1 zone at Darfield is 650m², while the equivalent Low Density Residential Zone in the Proposed District Plan is 750m². The appropriate zone for what is currently the Living 1 zone of Darfield, and the appropriate associated minimum site size, are subject to submissions on the Proposed District Plan and are outside the LTP process.

The proposed pipeline is a less resilient wastewater solution

Submitters concerns included: • Earthquake risk to the pipeline • More spillage of wastewater due to a reticulated system • Septic tanks are perceived to be more resilient than a long pipeline • The project may overwhelm the Pines wastewater treatment plant, which may not have capacity and has odour issues • The proposed wastewater system perpetuates a water-based system in a water-short future

The pipeline will be designed as a modern, flexible piece of infrastructure which is either resilient to earthquakes or easy to repair (whichever is most appropriate). Council note that there was very little pipe damage in Selwyn District despite the thousands of earthquakes experienced since 2010. Unlike Christchurch, Selwyn generally has excellent ground conditions and relatively new infrastructure, which were factors in reducing how much damage our pipes sustained in the earthquakes. The Darfield/Kirwee pipeline would include odour treatment both along the pipeline and at the treatment plant, to ensure that it does not exacerbate any existing odour issues. The pipeline will also include significant storage capacity to avoid spillage/overflows.

The Pines WWTP will be designed to treat wastewater from up to 120,000 population equivalents with the land available. There will be planned upgrades to the treatment plant to facilitate this growth. There is enough land at the existing treatment plant to dispose of treated wastewater for up to 120,000 population equivalents. Treated wastewater sludge is trucked to the West Coast and applied beneficially to land as part of Council's normal operations of the Pines wastewater treatment plant.

Composting toilet facilities are permitted under ECan's Land and Water Regional Plan, for some properties that meet the criteria of rule 5.16 (see <https://www.ecan.govt.nz/your-region/plans-strategies-and-bylaws/canterbury-land-and-water-regional-plan/> page 93 for more information). Where a property falls within the wastewater scheme boundaries, the property owner would still be required to pay for the wastewater service even if a composting toilet facility was used. Composting toilets are not considered viable community-wide or for small lots, for public health reasons.

Council haven't provided enough alternative options or done enough consultation

Council have considered a number of options, with work on the Darfield/Kirwee wastewater scheme dating back to 1996. A summary of work completed to date, including public consultation, is available at: <https://www.selwyn.govt.nz/services/water/wastewater/darfield-wastewater>

Council have considered the option of building a wastewater treatment plant at the Creyke Road site, to serve Darfield and Kirwee. This option was discarded as it would have more consenting, environmental and operational challenges. Cost was also a consideration.

Submissions in support²⁹

Staff note that along with the submissions in opposition to the proposal, a number of submissions were made in support. Submissions in support from three key stakeholders are summarised below:

Malvern Community Board The Board supports the continuation of a new wastewater system in Darfield and Kirwee and notes the advantages that this system will bring to their Ward and the manner it will continue to support growth of residential and business properties.

Environment Canterbury Environment Canterbury strongly supports the Council's proposal to develop a reticulated wastewater system for Darfield and Kirwee. They look forward to seeing improved environmental outcomes as this infrastructure project is completed.

Canterbury District Health Board

The CDHB strongly supports the connection of the Darfield and Kirwee townships to the WWTP in Rolleston. They note that the risk of water contamination and subsequent waterborne illness is increased by multiple points of failure with multiple individual septic systems.

Re: Submission to the Selwyn District Council (SDC) for the Regimental History Centre (RHC).

This submission requests the Council's assistance to find a new home, in Rolleston, for the RHC's extensive collection of militaria dating from 1845 to present day. This reflects the longstanding military association between the Burnham camp and the SDC. The Centre tells the story of the citizen soldier drawn from, and trained primarily in, the District, i.e. at Burnham. It represents the generations of young men and women who have given service to our country and the district in particular. The Centre is now located in Burnham Camp and the is housed a 110 year old building subject to an EQC yellow certification. The building leaks and requires strengthening and/or a significant rebuild for the long term. This does not appear on Burnham's long term building plan. The Camp's security protocols inhibit the public's ability to be able to 'walk in off the street' and view the Centre and its significant heritage/historical contents. Community interest in those areas represents untapped potential for both educational and tourist development. It would be a drawcard for schools, local residents and visitors to Rolleston alike as it would be a 'one of a kind' military museum in the South Island. It represents an opportunity to develop a 7 day heritage attraction and destination in the District.

The soon to be vacated existing Library in Rolleston could be ideal as new home for the Centre. It would require some modification, for an armoury, to house the weapon collection.

The move of the Centre to Rolleston has the provisional support of the Chief of Army, Maj Gen Boswell, 2/4 Battalion (the local reserve battalion), the Waiouru Army Museum, RSAs in Canterbury, and is in line with the Memorandum of Agreement between the Council and the Army. This submission will secure for the District for the long term an increasingly valuable resource reflecting the region's military history and heritage, and provide a focal point for visitors, and residents, that is unique in the South Island.

With the impending opening of new community facilities in Rolleston it is difficult to gauge the impact on current space at Rolleston CC (RCC) and, for this reason, it is proposed to make RCC (and the former library space) available for a variety of alternative community uses and to monitor use in the short term to fully understand how all the facilities will best work together for the community. It is known that some of the existing RCC users will continue to require space and there is also a need to provide space for Council's own requirements (library material storage). There will be an opportunity for groups such as the Regimental History Centre to express interest in utilizing space at RCC in the next few months (noting that exclusive use occupations could potential be considered). Tap water treated with chlorine produces toxic carcinogens, study finds

A new study from Johns Hopkins raises newfound concerns about the most common water treatment found in American tap water.

Researchers identified new toxic and carcinogenic byproducts that are produced when chlorine is added to regular drinking water. Their findings were published in the peer-reviewed journal *Environmental Sciences & Technology*.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) suggests 4 milligrams of chlorine per liter of drinking water as a safe level.

Carsten Prasse, an assistant professor of environmental health and engineering at Johns Hopkins and the lead author of the study, wants to be clear that chlorination itself is not detrimental to human health.

Chlorine is frequently used because it's effective, affordable and easy to administer, explained Ngai Yin Yip, an assistant professor of earth and environmental engineering at Columbia University.

Adding chlorine to drinking water, per the CDC, kills germs and bacteria – and significantly reduces waterborne diseases such as cholera and typhoid.

Yip, who is unaffiliated with the study, also told USA TODAY that “it leaves a residue that keeps the bugs at bay while the water is traveling down distribution pipes to the consumer.”

When chlorine is combined with phenols, which are chemicals that are both naturally-occurring in water and exist in pharmaceuticals

and personal care products, the mixture produces disinfection byproducts.

Some, such as chloroform, are already treated by most local water systems. Many others, however, are not being regulated at the local or federal level.

“We regulate only a small number of byproducts, which have been regulated since the ’80s,” Prasse said. “Unfortunately, despite all the advances that have been made over the last two or three decades, they haven’t found a way into regulation.”

More alarming, the study finds, is that other compounds that aren’t detected may be detrimental to long-term health.

This includes two forms of the toxic compound and known carcinogen BDA, which haven’t been discovered in drinking water until this study.

Yip explained that BDA molecules are so small and lightweight that they tend to be hard to differentiate from other molecules present in water.

“In other words, the signal ... is drowned out by the noise from everything else that is present,” he explained.

Prasse’s team deployed a method that isn’t typically used in water testing for their research, adding an amino acid akin to lysine, which is found in the human body, to chlorinated water. They then inspected the samples for electrophiles, or free radicals.

He points out that the earlier disinfection byproducts are the reason, he explained, that some European countries such as Germany and the Netherlands have cut back or eliminated chlorine in their water supply systems.

Yip says that the American public should be more aware of how their water – from the treatment plant to the faucet – runs, and “press their local government to keep their drinking water infrastructure updated.

“Now that we have alternatives and tools to assess how water could negatively impact us, we should revisit the approach,” Prasse said.

Type 2 diabetes has reached epidemic proportions in New Zealand and will get much worse unless action is taken now, according to a new [report](#) on the economic and social cost of the disease.

Already 228,000 New Zealanders (4.7% of the population) have type 2 diabetes. The estimated annual cost is NZ\$2.1 billion — a staggering 0.67% of GDP.

The report projects that if nothing is done to change the current trajectory, the number of people with type 2 diabetes will increase by 70-90% (to 6.6%-7.4% of the population) in 20 years. Costs are expected to rise by 63% to \$3.5 billion by 2040.

Hospital care is the biggest cost to the public purse but losses from tax revenue, personal income and unpaid labour contribute to overall economic losses. The human cost of lives cut short cannot be quantified. Māori, Pacific and Asian communities bear the brunt of the [disease burden](#).

The scale of New Zealand's type 2 diabetes epidemic underscores the urgent need for prevention at a population level. It is a societal problem that needs a societal solution.

While individuals' lifestyles must change if their health is to improve, New Zealanders need a supportive environment to make changes that stick.

A public health approach

A range of approaches would help to reduce the risk of developing type 2 diabetes. Re-introducing a national healthy eating and activity policy for schools and young people would likely also benefit parents and carers. At school, children should be free from harmful drinks and foods which are packed with sugar, fat and salt. Our children must be protected from being bombarded by junk food advertising in their homes and neighbourhoods.

More effective food labelling would help consumers to better understand what they are putting in their supermarket trolleys, and encourage food producers to forge ahead with reformulating products so they contain less harmful ingredients.

Many other countries have introduced policies to protect their populations, including the UK's 2018 [soft drinks industry levy regulations](#). It's time for New Zealand, which has among the highest rates of [adult](#) and [childhood obesity](#) in the western world, to catch up with our international peers.

We must not forget that in some parts of New Zealand, families experience [food scarcity and insecurity](#) and buy cheaper, less healthy foods. We must remedy this by tackling the root causes of poverty.

Cost-effective health programmes

In addition to public health measures, there are also things we can do immediately to improve the treatment and care of people who already have type 2 diabetes and to prevent people with pre-diabetes from progressing further.

The report recommends rolling out four cost-effective programmes which could help thousands of New Zealanders:

- lifestyle interventions that reduce the risk of progression from pre-diabetes to type 2 diabetes (sustained changes in diet and exercise)
- intensive lifestyle interventions to achieve remission of type 2 diabetes (clinical nutrition therapy)
- “gold standard” medications to better manage type 2 diabetes
- optimal foot screening and protection services.

Two new medications for managing type 2 diabetes have recently been funded by New Zealand’s medicines-funding agency PHARMAC. This is a great start but we can do much more.

Pre-diabetes is being identified in many New Zealanders as part of screening for heart disease risk factors. Healthy lifestyle support programmes have been shown to halve the risk of progressing to type 2 diabetes. Culturally appropriate support should be made widely available to people with pre-diabetes.

International evidence has recently shown that it is possible to achieve remission of type 2 diabetes through clinical nutrition therapy. Investment in such services could save our hospital system from becoming overwhelmed by serious medical complications arising from type 2 diabetes, including kidney failure, heart attacks, stroke and blindness.

We could avoid around 600 diabetes-related amputations each year if all District Health Board foot screening and protection services were operating at an optimal level. Some are already close to achieving this.

Such measures, along with a public health approach to disease prevention, are essential if we are to prevent health costs from escalating out of control and our healthcare system from being overwhelmed.

Lessons from the COVID-19 response

New Zealand’s response to the COVID-19 pandemic has shown us how effective a co-ordinated, government- and science-led approach can be in tackling a major health problem.

In New Zealand we have seen how aiming high — for elimination of an infectious disease — has saved lives and livelihoods. Excellent communication has been key to New Zealanders’ enthusiasm for playing their part.

We need a similar approach and resolve to tackle the type 2 diabetes epidemic. This problem is too big to leave to individual district health boards, which are dealing with competing health problems on strained budgets.

We urgently need a national strategy for tackling type 2 diabetes to change the trajectory New Zealand is currently on. If we don't act now the scale of the problem in 20 years' time is almost unimaginable.

Virtual Diabetes Register (VDR)

Published online: 30 September 2020

Note: The VDR algorithm was updated in 2017 resulting in a small reduction in the number of people estimated to have diabetes. It is important that the updated numbers are not compared with numbers derived using any previous version of the VDR. Any comparison may result in artificial and inaccurate trends.

Each year the New Zealand Ministry of Health releases national estimates of the prevalence of diabetes based on the VDR. The VDR is an important tool to monitor prevalence of diabetes and support national and local clinical quality improvements.

The VDR contains data about people suspected as having diabetes, identified through their use of diabetes health services. The VDR uses an algorithm to identify these people in data extracted from hospital inpatient and outpatient, laboratory test, and pharmaceutical dispensing data collections. The VDR is collated annually at the end of March. National and regional diabetes prevalence estimates are calculated based on the number of people on the VDR as at 31 December of the previous year – in this case 31 December 2019. People with diabetes who were deceased and those not enrolled in a PHO are excluded from the totals.

Virtual Diabetes Register 2017 revision

In 2016 the algorithm used to create the VDR was assessed against the Auckland TestSafe repository of actual glycaemic test results (for more information read the [published article](#)). As a result, improvements to the algorithm were made in early 2017 to create the latest version of the VDR. A comparison of the numbers from the old VDR and the latest version (v686) is shown in the chart below.

The training wicket block could be used by premier club teams and/or CCCA representative teams. Also Canterbury Cricket have issues finding enough training facilities for their various rep teams so Canterbury may look to use the training block facility if they are of a high enough spec.

Any level above premier club cricket should be played on Kakanui wicket blocks (Hawke Cup type level cricket). So we suggest that the main oval block and training block be done in Kakanui and the three outer grounds could be done using an alternative clay that Mike Robins suggests in order to still be suitable for top level club cricket (possibly Benanite or Ward for the three outer grounds). Kakanui is expensive (\$430 a cubic meter).

Staff Comments The submission lists a number of "very high" priority projects and "high" priority projects. Many of these are already incorporated into the draft LTP but if the full suite of projects was included additional capex budget requirements in the vicinity of \$100,000 would be required and a moderate increase to opex for improving the turf standards. In preparing the LTP financial programmes, work was undertaken to understand the growth in participation in various sports. Cricket (especially junior grades) was identified as a sport with increasing levels of participation. To this end a number of projects were included to support this sport based on information available at the time. Projects included in the draft LTP or already in train are: Leeston Park cricket nets 2021 (VH priority); Leeston Park toilet/change facility 2023/24 (H priority); Foster Park additional artificial wickets 2021 from existing budget (VH priority); Darfield Domain cricket block 2020/21 - completed; Sheffield Domain renew artificial wicket 2022 (VH priority); Prebbleton new park - cricket pitches planned - development starts in 2021/22 (H priority - want them for Lincoln Cricket); Southbridge Park - replace nets turf 2021 - completed (H priority); Dunsandel Domain - resurface artificial wicket 2025/26 (H priority); West Melton Domain artificial cricket wicket 2021/22 via carry forward of development budget (VH priority) West Melton Domain Cricket nets 2022/23 (H priority); Lincoln Domain resurface artificial wicket 2021/22 (not prioritized but needed); Lincoln Domain extension development planned from 2024 - additional space for cricket (H priority); Kirwee Domain new fields with provision for cricket and can accommodate use from nearby towns 2021 (H priority)

The projects not included in the LTP that were indicated as very high or high priority include: New artificial pitch at Southbridge (VH); New artificial pitch at Darfield Domain (H); Dunsandel Domain Cricket nets (H); Various grounds/turf challenges and improvements (VH); It is recommended to include an additional budget of \$30,000 for the artificial wicket at Southbridge Domain in the LTP in the first 3 years (as this is growth related it could be largely funded from reserve development contributions).

Staff also recommend meeting with CCCA to discuss the challenges in looking after grounds to see what additional support can be provided.

The CCCA submission has also sought inclusion of a significant cricket development as part of the District Park. It was always envisaged that part of the park would provide for district sports activities. Initial planning for this park is

due to start in 2021 and²¹⁸ it is recommended that the CCCA is included in the needs assessment work to be undertaken as the first step in the planning process.

Dear Sir/Madam of the Selwyn District Council

I am writing to inform you of the impending crises that will come of Raineys Road. What was once a quite back road has turned into a haven for those who live in total ignorance of others. The following issues that I shall refer to must be addressed and cannot be ignored anymore.

I am referring to the reckless driving by drivers that frequent this road, raising imminent concerns for the safety of the residents and pedestrians alike that regularly use Raineys Road. This is my submission with the backing of the neighbourhood to propose immediate action in the sealing, or alteration of the structure of Raineys Road.

In my submission I will outline the councils guidelines and principles on the matter and why, in line with these guidelines and principles, action should be taken in the manner I propose. Throughout I will make reference to the forms of activities that are taking place, why they are taking place and why mitigating actions should be taken to reduce said activities. I will also attach appropriate photo evidence of drivers negligence and submission support from the neighbourhood who have kindly enough drawn on their experiences with the issue.

Submission

The Selwyn District Councils (SDC) responsibilities include;

*“Maintaining and upgrading roads and footpaths”*¹

This will be my first citing of the Councils white paper on community standards, which I believe are being breached. Rainey's Road is in need of considerable upgrading. This road has stood as it is for a very long time and has become of some concern recently with the increased activity. The increase in activity that I refer to is the population growth of these suburban Selwyn districts which has led more motorists out to back ‘country’ roads to exercise some form of hooliganism.

It is outlined in the councils Long Term Plan that;

*“At cost of \$150,000 per km upwards to do this it is not financially viable for the Council to undertake this unless on perhaps some very key links.”*²

This is wholly accepted as unreasonable in normal circumstance, however in the face of imminent injury and likely death, Council must amend and take action as outline in other areas of the Council Plan to which I will refer. Further, the Council has recognised the need that;

*“There is an ongoing need to convert and upgrade existing rural roads as our townships expand into their adjoining rural areas.”*³

The Lincoln region is in a period of hypergrowth and what once was a ‘decent’ commute into Lincoln, now is significantly reduced with developments creeping out into the paddocks surrounding the district.

The danger of concerns is not linear and is growing at compounding rates as a result of the population growth in the area, bringing even more people to Rainey's Road for illicit purposes. Selwyn population has increased by 42% in the last six years, which equates to an annual growth rate of 6%. The population is expected to double to over 100,000 by 2048. The investment that would be made in Rainey's Road is inevitable and to undertake this project at the soonest available time would ensure that between now and the period at which it is done, there won't be any accidents which can be attributed to nothing being done.

In the Government Policy Statement on Land Transport (GPS) by the Ministry of Transport (MoT) they state;

“The current 2018 draft is guided by four priorities and areas for investment for the transport system.”

Where number one is a ‘safe system, free of deaths and serious injury’. This must be upheld, and in the wake of this email, the council has now been made aware of the imminent danger that Rainey's Road poses. Subsequent death will likely give rise to severe legal consequences to the sum far outweighing the initial investment in Rainey's Road that I propose. Action then, must be taken in the wake of this submission.

In the latest dicta from the Councils Safety Strategy Plan, it must be cited that;

*“They work together to give effect to Council's ‘2014 Selwyn Road Safety Strategy to 2020’. The strategy includes an aspirational vision to have: “Zero road deaths and serious injuries on Selwyn roads”*⁴

In lieu of not being able to find the updated Safety Strategy, I have had to refer to the now outdated one, yet it is most likely that these core principles will be taken over to be implemented in any updated strategy. The core point here is the zero road deaths. I commend the Selwyn District Council for all they do to keep the community safe and now I am extending an arm where more valuable work can be undertaken in line with the core principles that the council holds dear as shown above.

Further, in the Councils goal for transportation activity, we may cite the activity goal and aims;

“To maintain, operate, and if necessary, improve the road network and other transport activities to achieve a range of facilities that provide for the safe and efficient movement of people and goods to a standard that is both acceptable and sustainable.”

The repeated fundamental that I have picked up on from the Council is SAFETY. Where there is an issue with safety, it would prudent that the council continue with their mission by addressing these issues head on. In terms of funding, this seems a small cost of around \$150 000 as the gravel area is few meters more than 1km in a budget which outlines;

“Funding provided by the NZ Transport Agency through the National Land Transport Plan (NLTP) has resulted in Selwyn’s subsidised maintenance and renewals program increasing by 25% from \$32 million to \$40 million over three years. This will assist in meeting the increasing maintenance requirements on the transportation network arising from sustained growth in population and traffic volumes. Pressure on the roading programme may require us to review funding in the future, including the level of rate contribution.”⁵

In terms of the cost/benefit analysis, it would be incredulous to now allow this small project in the face of the potential danger it poses if not undertaken. The above paragraph from the SDC 20/21 Annual Plan clearly outlines that such projects as Rainey’s Road are what should be recognised by the budget. Ignorance of this request would be contrary to the outlined and well reserved decisions of the Selwyn District Council itself.

Continuing, it is outlined in the SDC Annual Plan 2020-21 that;

“Unsealed road metalling \$1.1 million (funded by general rates and NZTA subsidy)”

This money, although most likely allocated already shows that there is specific funding set aside for such works. Not undertaking my proposal with the ability to is likely to justify a breach of the Local Government Act 2002 s 191 where a nuisance would be present and a claim of negligence where an accident does occur may ensue.

The law relating to Nuisance can be found in Tort and has been applied as being to restrict one from a reasonable use and enjoyment of land. The neighbourhood has changed considerable in the last year from population growth. Increased activity on the road is likely to be considered reasonable in all circumstances. However the increased illicit activities should not be tolerated. Objectively, one cannot reasonably be expected to walk their neighbourhood streets in fear of the next Subaru to come unjustifiably fast and blindly around a corner waiting to be crashed into.

In the Councils Long Term Plan (LTP), you justified a hazard *“The use of roads can be hazardous”* by undertaking that you will;

“Identify hazards and risks and attempt to reduce these through a combined effort of engineering improvements, education, behaviour change and enforcement. Ensure speed limits are appropriate and carry out repairs and renewals in a timely manner.”

This response would be in line with the proposal of resealing the road where repairs and renewals are concerned. I will now outline why sealing would be the most efficient and cost effective plan of attack.

Sealing

Sealing, as outline by the councils LTP costs around \$150 000 per km. Sealing would, in my view, completely eliminate the issue in that the issue is the misuse of the road based on the attraction of gravel.

The make-up of Raineys Road makes it a very rare piece of road, able to be utilised in such a distinct way. The road is one of two 90 degree bends which has provided the perfect opportunity for more and more people to come and test their vehicles or to impress their friends. The ditches have on multiple occasions been frequented by a variety of cars whom quickly ring a friend with a 4WD to pull them out. These events have gone reported to Police, but of no interest have they shown in the activities due to their lack of serious harm up until this point. This *ticking time bomb* must be addressed and I may refer to the University of Canterbury Sonoda Hall death as reference of what can happen when concerns over peoples wellbeing is left unattended.

Sonoda Hall had a conscious awareness of mental health concerns throughout their hall and had even contacted public speaker Jake Bailey months before the determined death of Mason Pendrous. They had arranged for Jake to come and speak on the topic, and to enlighten the residents of whatever position they may feel themselves to be in. They later cancelled on Jake, to which he was not surprised when the newspaper read that a student of theirs had been decomposing in his room for a prolonged period of time. I make reference to this as I have now aired my concern on the potential for something serious to occur on Raineys Road to which the Council is responsible. The implementation of a sealed road would eliminate the people who seek to skid their vehicles without thought of others and would greatly reduce the potential for there to be fatal accidents.

In conclusion

I have attached submissions from residents of Raineys Road who wished to air some of their experiences and concerns with the issue at hand. The weight of these submissions must be viewed in light of the overarching issue that is the potential for someone to lose their life on this road.

I have also attached photos showing the gravel being displaced on Raineys Road. This has, ever since formulating this email, become even more rampant and vicious occurrence as people seek out this road for their personal driving pleasure. In the last photo you can clearly see the skid marks which have been left around a blind corner. This is clear evidence that if something is not done soon, there will be an accident and it would be with great sadness if this accident was to be fatal.

Thank you for taking the time to read my submission and I look forward to your reply.

To whom it may concern,

With the declining number of gravel roads, it is of concern to see the increasing number of "hoons" using Raineys Road as a gravel race track.

On a number of occasions I have come head on with vehicles sliding around the corners. With both corners being completely blind there is very little time to react when confronted with a sliding oncoming vehicle. Not only is the hoon putting themselves at risk, due to the nature of the road there is little us residents can do to avoid a crash. Personally I have had two near misses due to the above, both of which could have ended with a potential loss of life should I have been on the scene slightly earlier. Most users are cautious when approaching the blind corners, however, these hoons are not only on the wrong side they are also traveling at a speed far too fast to be able to react to an oncoming user.

As mentioned above the road is a hot spot for hoons. There have been two instances where vehicles have lost control on our corner and ended up in the ditch. The latter of which being barely 20 metres from our mail box. In both cases the occupants were not locals, instead transiting Raineys Road to use it as gravel race track.

With Lincoln rapidly expanding towards us, I have noticed a substantial increase in both pedestrian and horse rider traffic. It goes without saying that this translates to an increased risk of a serious collision between the hoons and other users. I will say 'when' because it is only a matter of time, when an incident does happen it is likely there will be serious injuries or a loss of life.

To Whom It May Concern

I am writing in support of Dalton Ewing's proposal for the Selwyn District Council to give some consideration to the sealing of Raineys Road. I rent a property at 119 Raineys Road, and the house on this property is very close to the road. I have listed below a number of issues that I personally experience to back up the proposal.

- During the summer months, the dust clouds created by vehicles using this road drift into my property, right into my front porch/kitchen door. When cars pass by, I often have to move into the house and shut the doors and windows to avoid breathing this dust in, not ideal on hot summer days, and detrimental to my health. There is a fresh coating of dust all over the windows and sills every day. After I raised this with the council previously in 2018, a 30km No Dust sign was erected, which I greatly appreciated. However, the majority of drivers ignore this sign, including your own council rubbish trucks and the local school bus.
- I find that drivers do not drive at an appropriate speed on this stretch of road, despite the gravel and the fact that the suggested speed limit for the bridge on the bend only about 100 metres away from my house is 15km. Many of them take this corner far too fast and accelerate away very quickly. Someone clearly took exception to the 30km sign, knocking it over repeatedly (of which I'm sure the council is aware!), and one driver in particular now seems to make a point of driving as fast as he possibly can down this road. I have watched him fish-tail his vehicle all the way down the gravel, apparently for fun. I have also observed the same driver on more than one occasion take this corner too fast and come very close to losing complete control of his vehicle on the gravel. I believe it's only a matter of time before he causes a serious accident, as you cannot see what is coming around that bend until you are right on the bridge, and we have many dog walkers, runners and horse-riders who frequently use this road.
- Recently, this stretch of road appears to have become a favourite playground for some of the local youth in the area, who like to perform burnouts on the gravel and drive up and down the road at great speeds, fish-tailing dangerously. Aside from the obvious dangers of their behaviour, this is a major disturbance of the peace on what is normally a quiet road. There is no police presence on these roads that I have seen, and despite having reported some of these car registrations via the police website, nothing has been done to discourage this behaviour.
- The gravel is of a fairly large size and when vehicles travel past at a fast speed, the grass berm outside my house is showered in it, with pieces being flung as far as my fence-line. Before mowing the berm I have to spend a lengthy period of time raking and picking this gravel off so as not to damage my mower blades. It has become a costly exercise to keep replacing mower blades.

Thank you for your time and I look forward to your considered response to Mr Ewing's proposal.

Dear Dalton

Thank you for your recent letter delivered to our mailbox re your presentation to the SDC re the possible tar sealing of Raineys Road.

Most of the local residents are considerate drivers and slow down to pass an oncoming vehicle.

However, we certainly find the following issues:

1. A lot of dust drifting on to our house and garden from vehicles driving round the road, including vehicles driving at reasonable speeds. This is exacerbated when it is windy, and is worse when cars come sliding round the corner, going too fast for the corner. This dust covers the garden, and in NE conditions, which is the prevailing wind, we can't have windows open to air the house, as the dust comes in and covers everything.
2. Reckless drivers, driving too fast for the corner by the bridge, particularly late at night, are a disturbance, and a danger to other traffic.
3. Stones on the roadside that we hit with the lawn mower. This seems to be caused by the grader throwing stones on to the grass for about a meter from the edge of the road.
4. When the grader comes round, it moves a lot of shingle to the side of the road, especially on the bridge at the corner. Vehicles coming round the corner then spread that shingle which falls into the creek, so new shingle is then required. The middle of the road has no shingle, it's just bare dust, which then is blown away from the road onto the garden etc, as above. This seems a waste of council funds as the grading takes the shingle off the road, and it falls into the water, so is wasted.
5. The general quality of the road is often corrugated in places.

You seem to have gathered most of these issues already, although the shingle issue is not on your list.

The other approx. 760m section was sealed in 2007/8 as a condition of resource consent for an adjoining rural residential subdivision. At the time Council had the ability to request this through the provisions of the RMA. The unsealed section includes two 90 degree bends and across a narrow bridge. A traffic count in 2020 was 60 ADT. It is considered there is no mitigating circumstances that warrant Council deviating from its Seal Extension Policy. This allows adjoining property owners to fund the seal extension themselves and after 10 years the Council takes over the maintenance of this section of road. It is considered that by sealing the road this could actually increase its use and exacerbate problems considering its alignment.</p> |

The long term trend of water levels in aquifers around Selwyn is downwards (as evidenced by data from reference wells) as more water is drawn by an ever increasing number of well bores. The impending plans to greatly increase populations in various townships around Selwyn is of great concern for the Lifestyle block dwellers who rely on their own well bores.

Three years ago many wells ran dry in the wider West Melton area and some well owners were forced to invest in re-drilling a second well to deeper depths on their properties. As a result of this, a group was formed called "The Concerned Well Owners group". We met with Ecan over several meetings highlighting several issues to do with limited access to water due to over allocation of irrigation consents. Our main concern is that the water that will be extracted to service these greater populations will depress the water levels in aquifers around the district and more households that rely on well bore water will be faced with the large expense of drilling deeper wells to be able to continue to live on their land. Although the wells to service the expanded townships will be to deeper aquifers than household wells, there is evidence of a certain amount of vertical interconnectness between the deeper and shallower aquifers so that levels will be depressed in the shallower aquifers by the draw down of the deeper aquifer water.
