REQUEST FOR FUNDING SUPPORT FOR NEW ZEALAND MEMORIAL MUSEUM & VISITOR CENTRE, LE QUESNOY, FRANCE

Background

In the closing days of the First World War, our soldiers on the Western Front, exhausted survivors of battles on the Somme, Messines, Passchendaele and from halting the 1918 Spring Offensive, had one last wall to climb – literally.

The small town of Le Quesnoy in northern France had been under German occupation since August 1914 and this was November 1918. Surrounded by a moat and a 17th century wall complete with ramparts, the medieval town was like a fortress that had survived many an invasion in the preceding centuries. It had one more force to reckon with. The New Zealand Division had arrived to liberate the town from the German occupiers, who continued to defend the ramparts using howitzers, machine guns and rifles. Orders had been given to the New Zealand troops not to shell the town, to avoid any casualties among the 1600 civilian inhabitants.

Instead, some 300 flaming oil drums were fired onto the ramparts to create a smoke screen obscuring the assault by New Zealand infantry using long ladders to scale the outer walls and inner ramparts. The liberation of the town was completed with the capture of over 700 German soldiers, against just on 500 New Zealand casualties including 142 dead - the liberation was achieved without



the loss of a single civilian life. This is an achievement which the town and its people have never forgotten, even today - over 100 years later - which is now beyond living memory. They speak of the liberation with awe, still amazed that men would come from the far side of the world to free their town and citizens, to rescue them in their darkest hour.

The liberation of the historic walled town by the New Zealand Rifle Brigade just one week before the end of the Great War was a demonstration of Kiwi ingenuity and an act of courage. The story of Le Quesnoy is different from that of many other World War One sites – the town was liberated without being destroyed, and the residents


were not displaced, and in that respect, it is a story of hope. The town was preserved intact and stands as a place where memories are lived and relived to tell the story to all who will listen; of the price that was paid for freedom in a war that stole much from our world.

The Project

The NZ Memorial Museum Trust - Le Quesnoy (a non-profit charitable trust) believes it is time to build a permanent memorial to our soldiers who perished on the fields of Flanders and France in the "war to end all wars". Indeed, it did not end all wars and many more New Zealanders lost their lives on European soil in the Second World War. Over 12,400 New Zealanders are buried in France and Belgium. It is appropriate that the sacrifice of a significant number of New Zealanders, who will remain forever in a place far from home, is acknowledged and remembered.



The Trust has had the opportunity to purchase



The Trust is working towards the vision of creating "a Kiwi place in France where memory and relationships are alive". We are working towards this goal through the establishment of a Museum and Visitor Centre in Le Quesnoy where our story will be told across multiple platforms – through artefacts, interactive activities, movies, audio stations, an app and other media.



The museum itself will include space for exhibitions and interactive activities, both digital and manual, designed to encounter and explore the stories of New Zealand's liberation of Le Quesnoy, New Zealand's contributions to the war in Europe, the history of the town of Le Quesnoy, an introduction to New Zealand's culture and heritage to Europeans, and the unique relationship that has developed between New Zealand and the French in Le Quesnoy.

Our Objective

Through this project we seek to celebrate:

Freedom – which inspired our people to go to war

Friendship – the unique bonds which developed between the people of Le Quesnoy and New Zealand which are still strong 100 years on

Future – the opportunity to create a better future with a focus on how to avoid war

Our Partners

To fully realise the link between past, present and future, we have engaged New Zealand's most respected professional museum experts to help shape and guide the concept through strategic planning and interpretative masterplanning. We have recently approved the Internal Experience Design Brief for the Museum and Visitor Centre prepared by museum experts Lily Frederikse, Tim Walker and Karl Johnstone. The Feasibility Study prepared by French company, Lamaya, was signed off last year and our Māori Advisory Group has provided a Māori cultural framework to inform the overall visitor experience.

We are in discussions with the French government about a potential partnership. They are very supportive of the project.

We have raised \$8M to date towards the \$15M total. Most of this has come from private individuals and businesses, who are on board with the vision of establishing "a Kiwi place in France where memory and relationships are alive". This is not just a project about remembering the past but focuses on the future, developing an experience which is cross-cultural, connecting across nations, through educational experiences and exchanges, offering an opportunity to reflect and learn from the past as we step into the future. As it is so beautifully expressed in Te Reo:

Ka mua, ka muri

We walk backwards into the future.

Our Request

We have previously presented to your Mayor at the Rural and Provincial Council Sector meeting. We wish to request that you consider a funding commitment to this project as part of your Long-Term Plan.

Our submission is to request that Selwyn District Council supports the project to build a Museum and Visitor Centre in Le Quesnoy with a donation equivalent to \$1 per resident of your district, to remember those who gave their lives in the World Wars to give us freedom.

The funds are not required immediately and can be paid over the next three years. We are seeking a commitment from you towards the project at this point in time.

Soldiers came from this town and district as evidenced by your War Memorials. Their names stand in perpetuity here in our country. Their descendants live here and maybe even sit in this Council Chamber. New Zealand soldiers came from cities, towns and villages across New Zealand, not knowing what they were going to face on the other side of the world but stepping forward with a courage and belief in what was right and just and good for our country and our world. They went with a belief that tyranny and injustice threatened the very essence of our lives, threatened the freedom, friendship and future which, because of their sacrifice, generations that came after them have been able to enjoy.

In this day and time, we cannot even imagination what they must have faced on the battle grounds of Europe, but we can remember and honour them.

The NZ Memorial Museum Trust asks that you do just that through support of our project.

Thank you for the opportunity to make this submission which we hope will be favourably considered.

I support maintaining safe drinking water but I am concerned that the increase in nitrate levels in our aquifers mirroring mid-Canterbury increases must be addressed with seriousness by both SDC and Environment Canterbury. The increase in bowel cancer in the Canterbury DHB District over the past 20 years is well documented.

We are in our 60's ,we purchased our new build house in October 2020. One of the reasons we purchased the new build was because it was new and therefore nothing to be spent on it giving us financial security. It has a new Austin Bluewater septic system which works as intended. We like many other ratepayers in Darfield are not able to finance the scheme you are proposing and believe that if Council forces people to change their systems their decision will be grossly unfair to those very people they are supposed to represent and work for in a positive manner. Our understanding is there is no Environmental threat to the area from the exisiting systems therefore no need to replace them. We have also done research on hidden costs to the ratepayer e.g. \$2500-\$3000 (ballpark) to decommission a tank and in spite of a number of conversations with council there is no commitment to cost to the ratepayers only ballpark "guesstimates" and given that builders advise a 10-20% contingency for new builds councils estimates of cost to the ratepayer to replace their wastewater system are likely way short of the actual cost. If this scheme proceeds we will have no choice but to sell our home and move on as we will not be able fund a new system. Council needs to consider leaving existing perfectly sound septic systems as they are if Councils decision is to introduce a new Wastewater scheme.

The council provides tremendous support for soccer, rugby, hockey, swimming, tennis and has extended this further with the newly built indoor courts facility. However, there are other sports that hold significant importance in our community. in 2018, Affinity Gymnastics Academy Incorporated was formed to address a gap in the provision of gymnastics in the Selwyn

District. A registered charity, affiliated under Gymnastics New Zealand, the club had no choice but to lease premises in Izone. Despite having significantly higher operating costs compared to other Canterbury clubs who are supported by CCC, Affinity Gymnastics Academy has grown it's membership to nearly six hundred members, 95% of which come from the Selwyn District.

In addition to having a significant membership base, Affinity Gymnastics Academy has a number of senior competitive athletes that compete at National & Internal events. Among the club's twenty staff are highly qualified gymnastics coaches, former common wealth games athletes and a current Olympic athlete.

We believe that the council should construct a facility to accommodate not only gymnastics, but also other gymsport codes and minority sports that are currently under-represented in the region that can offer recreational participation through to competitive pathways.

In 2020, Affinity presented to Selwyn District Council a proposal for the construction of a new sports hub which would accommodate; artistic gymnastics, trampoline, cheerleading, tumbling, judo, fencing and boxing; all under one roof.

In respect of gymnastics, the Selwyn District has been highlighted by Gymnastics New Zealand as a significant growth area and they have outlined the need for a club to be established as either a Sub-regional Hub for Canterbury or an additional Regional Hub to compliment the existing Regional Hub that is Christchurch School of Gymnastics. This would necessitate either a building provided by the District Council or a leased premises with a sufficiently long lease tenure. This proposal would certainly underpin the council's goal of improving well-being across the district.

Coordinated by Go Hororata, representing a diverse range of community groups and independent citizens, the process to identify the need for a new community centre was supported by Council. Whilst it is great to see the new centre is still in the current LTP for 2023/24, we need to be certain that the proposed building is still suitable for the community needs.

Hororata Reserve is the largest in the Selwyn portfolio. It is unique in that it hosts a range of sports (tennis and rifle club are strong), provides equestrian use off our roads with an excellent array of cross country jumps, and still has a functioning race horse training track. The Reserve Board have invested in a very well used walking track around the perimeter of the Reserve and the native plantings continue to enhance the area. Restoration of the ornamental lake provides another beautiful and peaceful area in the Reserve. The Reserve and a new community centre would make a strong focal point for our Hororata community.

Siting a new Community Centre on the Reserve would not only meet our community needs for a fit for purpose community building but also increase the attractiveness of the Reserve as a venue for more events. Proximity to Christchurch and the unique size of our Reserve lends itself to corporate hire and revenue streams.

We need to understand exactly what SDC is proposing with the reduced investment, to ensure it is what our community wanted. It is disheartening to have had SDC so involved over the past three years with our journey to establish the community needs, to have it scaled back without notification or information. It is unfair to pull back the scale on "mixed community views" when it is apparent there are only a couple of vocal dissenters. That dissent is apparently based on an expected rate increase without understanding of district wide rates, nor an appreciation the alternative option 3 of status quo would leave us with a deteriorating facility. I note the Leeston community consultation, driven by council, states "not everyone was in support of a new build" yet there appears to still be a large scale build proposed.

A number of submitters believe that the council has not adequately engaged/consulted on the reasons for the reduced budget being proposed for the new community centre. Council believe it has appropriately informed the community and Go Hororata. A summary of points was provided to Go Hororata on or about 19 April in a letter signed by the Mayor.

The key council actions in the last 12 months as follows:

- During 2020, council planning for the Hororata Community was based on the \$4.7 million proposal included in the 2018-2028 LTP.
- Council made the decision to include the Hororata Hall as a heritage asset within the District Plan. This perhaps is not a major issue for the proposed new community centre build, but the council was no longer able to guarantee that it would be able to sell the hall or the endowment land to an individual or organisation that might pay the budgeted funds from the sale of these assets for funding the new community centre. That decision removed \$400,000 from the council funding commitment
- Council and the Selwyn community have had to respond to a variety of Covid 19 related challenges. From a strictly financial perspective, the council has had to look at its future financial commitments for all activities and make appropriate decisions. With regard to the Hororata Community Centre, the council made the decision to remove the proposed new centre from the draft 2021-2031 providing some limited financial provision to maintain the existing hall. This decision was advised to Go Hororata
- After representations from Go Hororata to council representatives in mid December, the council amended its position on the Hororata Community Centre and agreed to consult on the options listed in the draft LTP. The options though are at lower costs being either the:
- o Option1 costed at \$3 million being a 350m2 building with associated carparking, fitout, landscaping and wastewater contribution
- o Option 2 costed at \$3.3 million. This options involves the existing hall being renovated a new annex constructed. This costed option was one of the 4 costing options provided to Go Hororata Representatives at a meeting on 14 December 2020. That meeting was held in the offices of Duncan Cotterill. I have attached those 4 costings but please note that option 2 is the only costed option of the 4 that has progressed.
- o Option 3 which is a minimal spend option on the existing hall.

The club has grown exponentially over the last 5 years, currently sitting at 321 active members ranging from juniors to senior (adult) teams, and has utilised the current facility in Rolleston for junior club games, social competitions, training sessions, have a go fun days, Koru games, local school trials, umpire & coach development. We have even worked with Selwyn United Football Club on using the turf for football practice when the grass fields were unavailable.

To continue the positive growth, offering Selwyn residents the option to be physically active and improve their physical well-being, and to continue to deliver the club strategic plan we now require a full sized facility which will help us deliver to that plan.

As we work towards our goals of providing a friendly environment and a meaningful hockey experience for all, we find ourselves needing a facility which can cater for adult players and which would be closer to where players live and/or work. This year our senior teams are travelling into Christchurch for practice sessions and games, a facility at Foster Park would allow those sessions to be held locally, encouraging more people to come to the club and the Selwyn district.

As a parent of club members I would like the Selwyn District to be able to offer the same high quality facilities, and therefore opportunities, for players within the district to remain with a local club • not being required to move to a town based club in order to develop. A full sized facility would see the club being able to offer local games with local support plus, the potential to show case the sport to a wider community.

I do not support the proposal to connect Darfield to the Pines wastewater treatment plant in Rolleston on the following grounds:

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- (1) In the SDC 30 Year Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051 (p102) it says ... there is minimal environmental or public health impact from the existing septic tanks ..."
- (2) The charging model is punitive and expensive for those affected. My rates (being in Stage 2 of the proposal) would increase by 57%. I would also have to pay up to \$20,000 to connect. The cost benefit analysis for me, and I will extrapolate to many of my neighbours, does not stack up compared to continued use of our existing septic tanks. The proposal also exempts many households in the Darfield area from any financial obligation which is deeply unfair.
- (3) Supporting arguments for the scheme from the report of the Public Meeting on 27 June 2019 are weak saying the scheme '...may enable future commercial and industrial development and more intensive residential development in the area'.
- (4) The Council has not publicised this change to affected ratepayers effectively. Three of our four immediate neighbours were completely unaware that the proposal would drastically increase their rates.

In summary:

The Council has not demonstrated that the proposed reticulated system is required from an environmental standpoint. The proposed reticulated system, if it goes ahead, will adversely affect many residents financially. In my opinion, by not including all properties in the district to pay for this proposal the Council is effectively playing 'divide and conquer' hoping to reduce the number of received objections to this. The Council has not shown that lack of the proposed reticulated system is preventing any development.

I therefore urge the Council to abandon this proposal and continue with the status quo.

DEVELOPING A NEW WASTEWATER SYSTEM IN DARFIELD AND KIRWEE

Thank you for the opportunity to provide a submission on the Selwyn Long Term Plan 2021-2031.

I do not support the proposal to connect Darfield to the Pines wastewater treatment plant in Rolleston during the period 2021-2026 on the following grounds:

1. The case for change on environmental or public health grounds has not been made

In the SDC 30 Year Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051 (p102) it says "Although there is **minimal** environmental or public health impact from the existing septic tanks, the community has shown interest in a reticulated wastewater system."

Community support for change

In my view the community 'showing interest" is not sufficient grounds on which to embark on a \$38m infrastructure project. Analysis of the community consultation undertaken in 2019 by the Council on this matter shows that 42 people attended workshops to discuss Darfield wastewater. The population of Darfield in 2018 was 2724 (2018 Census). Even assuming that all these people supported the connection to the Pines, that is only 1.5% of the total Darfield population. As of the date of writing, the SDC quick poll has had 487 responses. Of these, 79% support the status quo and 20% support connection to the Pines – so 384 people (14% of the 2018 population) support the status quo. The consultation undertaken, even including the on-line quick poll, has not, in my opinion, demonstrated that a mandate exists for the proposed scheme.

Environmental and health grounds for change

As illustrated above, the Council's own reports do not support a change on environmental or health grounds. The *Public health risk assessment of sewage disposal* by onsite wastewater treatment and disposal systems in the Darfield and Kirwee Communities (2014) concluded that:

"Contamination of the towns' water supplies by effluent from onsite systems is extremely unlikely because of:

- a. the location of each bore with respect the onsite system clusters
- b. the distance of the bores from the nearest onsite systems
- c. the depth of the bores/ the thickness of the vadose zone
- d. the depth below the water table from which water is abstracted.

Consequently, in the absence of cross-connections between drinking-water and wastewater systems or other unforeseen incidents, at present there is a very low likelihood of exposure of the Darfield' residents to sewage through their water supplies.

The public health risk resulting from ingestion of nitrate through direct exposure to sewage is negligible. The volume of sewage that would have to be ingested to cause illness is beyond what could be reasonably expected."

The Darfield and Kirwee Wastewater Strategy 2017 reports (section 9.3) that "Environmental drivers have not currently been identified that would require deviation from the existing scheme configuration of decentralised treatment and land application".

Furthermore, at the 2019 public meeting ground water monitoring by Liquid Earth, February 2019 found that: "sample results indicate groundwater quality in the

Darfield/Kirwee area is high with little indication of contamination likely to be associated with on-site wastewater disposal".

The Executive Summary and Section 5.1 of the Darfield Wastewater Business Case (2019) concludes as follows:

Public Health Risks

The public survey and public workshops identified that the principal driver that would cause people to change their perceptions and support implementing a scheme is the increased public health risk either through failing systems and direct contact, or ground water contamination.

Suitable housing for the future

The need for smaller land lots or suitable low maintenance property lots suitable for retiree in the area was repeatably mentioned and discussed in all the public workshops. However, these comments did not show in the same importance in the public survey.

Commercial Restrictions

The high ongoing maintenance cost, future consent concerns and restriction of commercial growth / opportunities were another key driver raised. This driver was emphasised in the survey responses and was reiterated by businesses during the workshops.

Strategic Alignment

Although a wastewater scheme would align with the long-term objectives of the Ministry of Health, in the case of Darfield and Kirwee there is no public health reason to change the existing onsite wastewater disposal methods as there is no evidence of determinantal effects or greater risk to the public compared with a reticulated solution.

Key observations drawn from the information gathered as part of this assessment;

- Community-Wide Scheme: There is little evidence to support the identified opportunity for a full township wastewater management scheme for Darfield and Kirwee, or for Darfield alone. There was little support from the wider stakeholder group for a scheme to be developed unless required to protect public health and that the capital contribution from ratepayers did not create a burden.
- Partial Scheme: There is some evidence to support the identified opportunity of a central Darfield wastewater management scheme. There was feedback from the central business community of potential benefits for growth and for reducing onsite treatment costs.

So, what is the reason for change if there are no environmental or public health grounds? The answer is found in the report of the Public Meeting on 27 June 2019: "the establishment of a reticulated scheme is an option for consideration as it may enable future commercial and industrial development and more intensive residential development in the area." Note the hesitancy in the language – 'option for consideration', 'may enable'.

Given the arguments described above, I submit that for those with existing residential properties in the affected area there is currently no case to change from the status quo to connect Darfield to the Pines wastewater treatment plant.

2. The cost to Darfield ratepayers to pay for the connection is levied unevenly, is disproportionate and unreasonable.

My house is in Stage 2 of the proposed scheme and I have a resource consent to use a septic tank, which was installed in 2005, until 14 March 2038. My rates are currently \$2,318.50 per annum. The LTP consultation document states that for existing properties the estimated net increase in rates from 2025/26 will be \$1,321, payable for 40 years thereafter. The cost to physically connect to the scheme is in addition and is estimated to be approximately \$5,000, with properties set back further from the road estimated at \$20,000.

Funding the new scheme will therefore result in a 57% increase in my rates, for which I would receive no benefit unless I choose to spend an additional amount (up to \$20,000) to connect to the scheme. My property is 200m down a right of way so I can reasonably assume that my connection costs would be at the higher end of the range. With my septic tank consented until 2038 there is no incentive for me to join the scheme, given that my average annual costs for maintaining my septic system are substantially lower than the \$1,321 cost of the reticulated option.

The argument of paying targeted rates for the greater good could be used in this instance as a counter argument. I would argue that the targeted rate in this case is too great a proportion of total rates to be used as a justification. For example, the current library charge is \$225 pa and the swimming pool charge is \$125 pa. These are 9.7% and 5.3% of my current rates respectively – a much more reasonable proportion.

Also the proposed increase in rates would not apply to all ratepayers in Darfield. This obviously means that many ratepayers would not be contributing to a system for the greater good. I am generally in favour of the Council requiring ratepayers to fund projects and facilities that serve the greater good. These levies must be applied to *all* ratepayers, regardless of whether they directly benefit or not. This is similar to my taxes being used to pay for roads in Auckland.

In addition, the Council must consider the ability of residents to pay for such a scheme. Many township residents are older and on fixed incomes and the imposition of both one-off and continuing costs would be an unreasonable burden for them.

Next Steps

Now that the costs and the mechanisms for payment for the scheme have been provided I would expect that affected ratepayers would, by a large majority, support the status quo. The Council has not demonstrated that the scheme is required and on these grounds it should be abandoned.

However, it would be in the Council's interest to continue with the next steps outlined in the Darfield Wastewater Business Case (2019). Further public consultation and a survey of all affected parties (especially those in Stages 1-3) must be undertaken to accurately gauge the willingness of those affected to connect to the scheme and their willingness to pay. No further work should be undertaken until this is done, as I am sure the Council would not want to put the scheme in place and then find that very few residents are financially willing or able to connect to it but continue to face a large increase to their annual rates bill.

tourist and visitor attractive district. We submit that Council has an important enforcement role to establish, and ensure, that the our roadsides do not become visually polluted by non-compliant signage.

3. Darfield swimming pool usage numbers suggest low numbers use the pool but many Darfield people drive to Rolleston to use the indoor pool for lessons, fitness and recreation. Darfield pool should be replaced with an improved facility sooner than planned in 10 Year Plan. This would also reduce fuel emmissions and make a small change to climate change.

My submission on behalf of Springston Cricket Club relates to management and facilities at Springston Recreation Reserve where the club hosts its training sessions and games each weekend of the cricket season. The ground and facilities are also used by the public and representative Canterbury Country Cricket teams.

- 1. The main astroturf wicket is likely to need replacing by winter of 2028 (10 year so life). This could be extended depending on how the wicket is wearing, which will depend on game and training pressure.
- 2. Ground maintenance. Since the new council regime for reserve management has begun costs have increased because volunteer labour is no longer exploited. The year 2020-21 funds have been exhausted covering mowing, fertilizer and herbicide costs. More needs to be budgeted to cover these costs plus the necessary drilling and grass seed required between rugby and cricket seasons
- 3. Ground re-leveling. The ground at the western boundary of the reserve was damaged after windfall of trees in a pine shelter belt in 2013. That damage has created undulations in the surface that pose a threat to rugby players running at speed, and create variability in water distribution during irrigation.
- 4. Irrigation system. Currently the irrigation of the reserve is done by volunteer labour using a kayline irrigation system. The quality of the turf is reliant on availability of volunteer labour to permit regular shifting of the irrigator. The current system often leads to under and over-watering. With the likelihood of increasing droughtiness with climate change, overwatering is highly undesirable, and under-watering will lead to a suboptimal turf, and likely higher costs due to more frequent turf renewal and maintenance. The reserve needs investment to establish a pop-up irrigation system that is controlled by soil moisture sensors.
- 5. Extra storage- the current storage for sports gear at the reserve is insufficient. There are currently two unattractive containers used for storage for rugby club gear. A new purpose-built shed would supplant this temporary storage and

allow other clubs extra room.

6. The pavilion needs a reliable internet connection. Cell covergae in Springston is very poor, having many unserviced areas. Internet connection is necessary use of eftpos in the bar and for submitting scores of cricket matches, which is all done on-line now. Fibre is laid in Springston, and a connection from the fibre terminus to the pavilion needs to be put in place.

Extra storage: Council has not generally provided for club storage and this has been viewed as the responsibility of clubs. It is agreed that the current storage facilities on the reserve are unsightly.

Internet connection: Fibre connection to the Errol Tweedy Pavilion could be investigated and cost estimates prepared for future consideration.

Int. J. Cancer 2018). Nitrate in drinking water and colorectal cancer risk: A nationwide population-based cohort study

Nitrate in drinking water may increase risk of colorectal cancer due to endogenous transformation into carcinogenic *N*-nitroso compounds. Epidemiological studies are few and often challenged by their limited ability of estimating long-term exposure on a detailed individual level. We exploited population-based health register data, linked in time and space with longitudinal drinking water quality data, on an individual level to study the association between long-term drinking water nitrate exposure and colorectal cancer (CRC) risk. Individual nitrate exposure was calculated for 2.7 million adults based on drinking water quality analyses at public waterworks and private wells between 1978 and 2011. For the main analyses, 1.7 million individuals with highest exposure assessment quality were included. Follow-up started at age 35. We identified 5,944 incident CRC cases during 23 million person-years at risk. We used Cox proportional hazards models to estimate hazard ratios (HRs) of nitrate exposure on the risk of CRC, colon and rectal cancer. Persons exposed to the highest level of drinking water nitrate had an HR of 1.16 (95% CI: 1.08–1.25) for CRC compared with persons exposed to the lowest level. We found statistically significant increased risks at drinking water levels above 3.87 mg/L, well below the current drinking water standard of 50 mg/L. Our results add to the existing evidence suggesting increased CRC risk at drinking water nitrate concentrations below the current drinking water standard. A discussion on the adequacy of the drinking water standard in regards to chronic effects is warranted.

Nitrate is leached to the aquatic environment, originating mainly from human activities, especially the use of fertilizers in intensive agriculture, and is a frequent drinking water pollutant. Denmark is among the countries with the most intensive agriculture with two-thirds of its area under cultivation, resulting in pronounced nitrate pollution of groundwater. The Danish drinking water structure is decentralized and based exclusively on groundwater. The drinking water standard of 50 mg/L as nitrate ion was established to protect

This standard is almost equivalent to the United States Environmental Protection Agency's maximum contaminant level of 10 mg/L as nitrogen.

However, physiological pathways of possible chronic effects have been suggested, due to endogenous transformation of nitrate into genotoxic *N*-nitroso compounds. Most *N*-nitroso compounds are animal carcinogens, and nitrate has been classified as probably carcinogenic to humans under conditions that favor endogenous nitrosation. Colorectal cancer (CRC) is the third most frequent cancer worldwide, with an age-standardized incidence rate of 43.6 (males) and 33.8 (females) per 100,000 persons per year in Denmark.

Previous epidemiological studies on the association between nitrate in drinking water and CRC are few and yielded inconsistent results.⁶ An ecologic study in Slovakia found a positive association between nitrate levels in drinking water and cancers in all digestive organs and CRC in particular.¹¹ A case–control study in Iowa showed an increased colon cancer risk at elevated nitrate levels in drinking water among susceptible subgroups with elevated endogenous nitrosation, that is, low vitamin C and high red meat intake.¹² A prospective cohort study of women carried out in the same area with a similar exposure assessment found no significant association between colon cancer and the quartile exposed to

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What's new?

Nitrate is considered a probable carcinogen in humans owing to its potential for endogenous transformation into genotoxic *N*-nitroso compounds. Cancer risk related to nitrate pollution in drinking water, as a consequence of intensive agriculture using fertilizers, is of particular concern. Here, analyses of water quality data and health registry data with a high spatiotemporal resolution for 2.7 million people in Denmark reveal an increased risk of colorectal cancer (CRC) in association with nitrate exposure. CRC risk was elevated at nitrate concentrations below the current drinking water standard.

the highest concentrations, while the second and third quartiles showed increased risks, and an inverse association was observed for rectal cancer.¹³ A case–control study of women in Wisconsin found no overall association with colon or rectal cancer, but an increased risk of proximal colon cancer at nitrate levels around the drinking water standard.¹⁴ A recent case–control study from Spain and Italy showed the higher the intake of nitrate from drinking water, the higher the risk of colon and rectal cancer, also at levels well below the drinking water standard.¹⁵

A common limitation of previous studies is the limited ability to access historical nitrate exposure for study subjects. To identify potentially small chronic effects, long-term follow-up of a large population is necessary. Large studies with well-characterized long-term exposures and inclusion of private well users were called for⁶ assessing populations with large exposure contrast, even if concentrations are below the drinking water standard.¹⁶

We addressed these limitations by using the rich population-based Danish registers including longitudinal health and residential information, ¹⁷ linked in time and space with the likewise longitudinal information on drinking water quality with high spatial and temporal resolution, covering the entire country from 1978 onward. ^{5,18} The link of these unique nationwide and longitudinal data sources enabled us to study the association between nitrate in drinking water and CRC on an individual level.

Methods

We followed all Danish residents for development of CRC considering nitrate in drinking water as the exposure of interest. Details are described in the following sections.

Study design and population

The unique personal identification number, which is assigned to all Danish residents, was used as key identifier to accurately link data from several registers. Prospectively collected and continuously updated information on date of birth, sex, residential history and vital status were retrieved from the Danish Civil Registration System. The study period was January 1, 1978 to December 31, 2011, as residential history was geocoded for this period. We defined the cohort as all residents of Denmark, alive on their 35th birthday. We followed each individual from their 35th birthday until the

onset of colon or rectal cancer, the end of study (31 December 2011), death, emigration or disappearance. Diagnoses of colon cancer (ICD-10 codes C18 and C19), rectal cancer (C20) and all other cancers were retrieved from the Danish Cancer Registry, which has a high validity and degree of completeness.¹⁹

Exposure assessment

The approach of assigning each household to its annual nitrate concentration is described in detail elsewhere. In brief, we assigned annual average drinking water nitrate concentrations, registered at waterworks level, to the 2,852 public water supply areas and the 2,382,445 publicly supplied households within these. Privately supplied households (81,663) were identified and assigned nitrate concentrations of their private well. In total, 208,706 drinking water samples with precise sampling date and location were used in this study. We interpolated concentrations for years without available nitrate measurements at household level. An exposure assessment quality level based on the number of years to the closest nitrate sample was calculated for each household and year (for detailed explanation of the levels, see results from sensitivity analyses in Table 2).

We calculated each individual's average nitrate exposure between their 20th and 35th birthday by linking their residential history from 1978 onward in time and space to the longitudinal drinking water nitrate concentration data at the Danish households. To be able to calculate an individual's exposure, their exposure window had to overlap with the study period, that is, their 35th birthday had to be after the beginning of study (January 1, 1978) and before the end of study (December 31, 2011). For the main analyses, we included only individuals with a high exposure assessment quality, having lived at least 75% of the time at households with an associated nitrate sample taken within 1 year.

Covariates

Covariates were selected *a priori*. Socioeconomic status was based on the *highest attained education* of each individual from the educational registers and included in four categories: (*i*) primary school only, (*ii*) shorter education (high school and short vocational training), (*iii*) medium long education (vocational training and bachelors) and (*iv*) long education (academics).²⁰ We included information on any *previous cancer*

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


Figure 1. (a) Average drinking water nitrate exposure between age 20 and 35 of the study population (subjects exposed to > 50 mg/l [0.58%] not shown here). Hazard ratios (HR) and 95% CIs of nitrate exposure quintiles for (b) colorectal, (c) colon and (d) rectal cancer. Base adjustment.

diagnosis other than the outcome of interest, and year of birth in two-year bands to address birth cohort effects.

Statistical analyses

We assessed the association between drinking water nitrate and colon and rectal cancer as separate outcomes, and the combined outcome CRC. We used Cox proportional hazards models to estimate hazard ratios (HRs) using age as the underlying time scale while stratifying the baseline by sex. We included nitrate exposure as quintiles according to the distribution of nitrate exposure in the total population. The base adjustment controlled for age, sex, year of birth and

previous cancer diagnosis. Additionally, we adjusted for highest attained education (2nd adjustment). We calculated a summary trend estimate, measuring the effect on a person exposed to the highest decile of nitrate concentrations in drinking water (≥16.75 mg/L) compared with a person exposed to the lowest decile of nitrate concentrations in drinking water (<0.69 mg/L), utilizing data from the inbetween deciles (nominal scoring of deciles). Results are reported with 95% confidence intervals (CIs). We checked the validity of the proportional hazards assumption by assessing the null hypothesis of a zero slope of the Schoenfeld residuals on time. Analyses were done in STATA 13.1.

Sensitivity analyses

Using the trend estimate, we assessed the robustness of our results considering potential bias due to private well users and quality, length and period of each individual's exposure assessment. We excluded persons with a previous cancer diagnosis other than the outcome of interest and residents of the Capital Region.

Ethical considerations

In keeping with Danish legislation, the Danish Data Protection Agency, the Danish Health Data Authority and Statistics Denmark approved this study.

Results

Of the 2,833,825 Danish residents whose exposure window concurred with the study period, 1,742,321 (61%) met the high exposure assessment quality criterion and were included in the main analyses. Persons who had a diagnosis before initiation of follow-up were excluded (CRC: 228; colon: 165; rectum: 66). The distribution of the average nitrate exposure between age 20 and 35 for this study population is shown in Figure 1a. During the 23 million person-years of follow-up, 5,944 persons were diagnosed with CRC, 3,700 with colon cancer and 2,308 with rectal cancer (Table 1 and Supporting Information, Table 1).

Figure 1 shows the HRs of the nitrate concentration exposure quintiles for (b) CRC, (c) colon and (d) rectal cancer. For both CRC and rectal cancer alone, the two highest exposure quintiles ($>3.87\,$ mg/L) showed statistically significant increased HRs. For colon cancer alone, only the highest exposure quintile ($\geq 9.25\,$ mg/L) was associated with a statistically significant increased HR. In the following, we focus on the trend estimate.

Individuals exposed to the highest level of drinking water nitrate (\geq 16.75 mg/L) had an increased risk of CRC [HR: 1.16 (95% CI: 1.08–1.25)] compared with individuals exposed to the lowest exposure level (<0.69 mg/L; see Table 1, base adjustment). Additional adjustment for education had only limited influence. Similar results were obtained when considering colon and rectal cancer as separate outcomes. Effect modification by sex was not observed (CRC: p=0.49; colon: p=0.44; rectum: p=0.99; second adjustment). Stepwise

reincluding individuals with a lower exposure assessment quality increased the study population to ultimately 2,692,508 individuals, followed for \sim 44 million person-years (Table 2). As exposure assessment quality decreased, the observed effect sizes decreased as well.

Additional sensitivity analyses yielded robust results (Table 3). The proportional hazards assumption was not violated in any of the presented models. A previous cancer diagnosis other than the outcome of interest was associated with increased HRs for all outcomes, and a protective effect of increasing levels of education was observed (results not shown).

Discussion

This is the first nationwide population-based study using a historical longitudinal assessment of long-term drinking water nitrate exposure to assess the associated risk of CRC. Our results showed the higher the level of nitrate in drinking water, the higher the risk of CRC. Considering colon and rectal cancer as separate outcomes, we found similar results. Results for CRC combined and rectal cancer alone showed statistically significant increased HRs in the two highest quintiles of exposure (>3.87 mg/L). For colon cancer, this was only seen in the highest quintile (≥9.25 mg/L), still at concentrations substantially below the current drinking water standard of 50 mg/L. This suggests a need of lowering the drinking water standard to adequately protect the public against chronic adverse health effects of nitrate in drinking water.

From Figure 1, a dose–response relationship is suggested, which is supported by the results for the trend estimate of 1.14 (95% CI: 1.06–1.23) for CRC, 1.14 (1.04–1.26) for colon cancer alone and 1.13 (1.00–1.27) for rectal cancer alone in the full adjustment. Hazard ratios were similar in all adjustments, indicating little influence of the included covariates and sensitivity analyses showed stable and robust results. Interestingly, the higher the exposure assessment quality, the higher effect sizes were observed (Table 2). Lower exposure assessment quality levels were due to interpolation of nitrate concentrations for years with no sample taken at the respective waterworks. Consequently, effect sizes were expected to attenuate with increasing levels of misclassification.²¹

Our results showed a statistically significant positive association between nitrate in drinking water and CRC at levels well below the current drinking water standard, which is in agreement with the findings of a recent case–control study. Espejo-Herrera *et al.* found an increased risk for colon cancer from 5 mg/d waterborne nitrate intake (corresponding to drinking water concentrations of \sim 4.3 mg/L), and for CRC and rectal cancer from \sim 8.6 mg/L. Espejo-Herrera *et al.* had individual-level data on endogenous nitrosation factors, diet, lifestyle and water consumption, allowing controlling for established CRC risk factors and additional covariates. They observed higher effect sizes in groups with high red meat intake, in agreement with a previous study. 12

While we could not include individual-level data on diet and lifestyle, the strength of our study lies in its large population size and the comprehensive long-term exposure assessment. By including the entire population (up to 2.7 million persons followed for up to 34 years), we avoided selection bias. Register data used in this study are deemed to be of very high validity and completeness. All administrative, health and drinking water quality data were prospectively collected, thereby eliminating bias due to differential recall and loss to follow-up.

In contrast to previous studies, our exposure assessment was based on exhaustive longitudinal drinking water quality data, registered in one nationwide database. We did not need to model historical nitrate concentrations at the waterworks, but could rely on the actual measurements of nitrate concentrations

in drinking water samples taken and analyzed by certified laboratories.²² We used the physical drinking water supply areas to assign nitrate concentrations to each household and knew the precise residential history of all study participants. Here, our exposure assessment is superior to earlier studies that needed to model historical exposure both spatially and temporally, or estimated exposure by nitrate concentrations at a given location at a single point in time.

Estimating waterborne nitrate intake from residential tap water is reasonable in the Danish context; the annual bottled water consumption is the lowest in Europe with 26 L per person.²³ Furthermore, it has been shown that nitrate levels do not change within a given distribution system and that seasonal variations in drinking water nitrate levels at public supplies are negligible in Denmark.²⁴ Groundwater abstracted

for drinking water production has a typical age (time since recharge) of 10–60 years.²⁴ We do not have adequate data to assess seasonal variability in private wells. However, seasonal variability in shallow wells has been observed in other locations.²⁵ Private wells are often shallower than public supply wells; therefore, we cannot exclude seasonal variability in private wells. Since Danish waterworks abstain from using chemical disinfection, confounding by disinfection byproducts was not a concern in this study.²⁶ Water samples used in this study were taken after all treatment steps at the waterworks. The use of in-home water treatment installations to reduce nitrate concentrations is uncommon in Denmark and authorities have been restrictive in giving permission to use such installations at private wells.²⁷

The possibility of including information on private wells is another strength of our work. It was earlier shown that the drinking water sampling frequency for private wells is much lower compared to public supplies.^{5,18} Therefore, residing a long time at a privately supplied household decreased an individual's exposure assessment quality level. The stepwise inclusion of lower exposure assessment quality levels into the model was therefore crucial to include those who lived many years with private well supply. Even though we could only retrieve nitrate concentrations of approximately half of the 55,752 private wells that we identified,¹⁸ we knew the location of the remaining wells and could therefore exclude their users in our sensitivity analyses.

Given our study design, we were limited to include only covariates available in nationwide registers. We could for example not control for individual-level information on lifestyle and diet. A study on the dietary intake of nitrate in the Danish population estimated an average nitrate intake of 61 mg/d for adults.²⁸ Therefore, at elevated levels as seen in parts of the Danish population (Figure 1a), drinking water will be a major source of nitrate exposure. As diet (e.g., red meat), alcohol intake, smoking and lifestyle factors such as physical inactivity are established CRC risk factors that we could not include in our analyses, the possibility of confounding our results needs to be considered. To address this issue, we adjusted our analyses for highest attained education, an especially appropriate proxy for lifestyle, smoking and diet in the Danish population.²⁹ Furthermore, studies suggest that dietary nitrate intake is not associated with CRC, or even has a protective effect, because of antioxidants and nitrosation inhibitors in nitrate-containing foods.⁶ Nevertheless, any observational study of human health, including the present, cannot exclude the possibility of residual confounding by unobserved factors.

Another limitation is the omission of drinking water nitrite levels in our models. Nitrite is an intermediate in the

endogenous transformation of nitrate into genotoxic *N*-nitroso compounds. Nitrite occurs in groundwater in the anoxic nitrate reducing zone but can also be formed at the waterworks due to oxidation of ammonium. Drinking water samples are historically not measured for nitrite to the same extent as nitrate. The restrictive drinking water standard of 0.01 mg/L nitrite is complied with at the large waterworks³⁰; however, little is known for smaller waterworks and private wells. An earlier study showed that even though nitrite is taken up through drinking water and food, up to 77% of the total exposure to nitrite is due to the reduction of nitrate *in vivo*.³¹ Furthermore, nitrate in drinking water could also be a proxy for additional agricultural pollutants, such as pesticides, which we did not consider here.

We used the average nitrate concentration an individual was exposed to between their 20th and 35th birthdays as the exposure estimate. We assumed that this exposure period was representative of the relevant relationship between exposure and outcome. As geocoded residences were available from 1978 onward, our main analyses included the early cases of CRC only, with an age at diagnosis below 69, before incidence rates peak. Shifting the exposure window to age 30–40, we could include more cases (until age 74), however, at the expense of moving the exposure closer to the time of disease onset. We observed a high agreement between the estimated nitrate exposures in the two competing exposure models. Changing the exposure window to age 30–40 did not substantially change the associated HRs.

In conclusion, our study adds to the growing body of evidence that suggests an increased risk of CRC at nitrate levels in drinking water below the current drinking water standard. Several studies carried out in different locations with different designs and each of their strengths and limitations imply this association. While our study contributed with a large study population, the resulting statistical power, and a detailed exposure assessment, other studies' strengths lay in the inclusion of a number of additional covariates. Considering all evidence, not only in the light of the precautionary principle, a discussion about a reduction of the drinking water standard is warranted.

Dear Sir/Madam

On behalf of the Southbridge Rugby Football Club (hereafter referred to as SRFC) and the wider community, we would like to submit an application to the council for new training and playing lights at the Southbridge Domain. We have recently had verbal discussions with members of the Selwyn District Council, (hereafter referred to as SDC) they have encouraged us to put forward our submission for your consideration.

- The SRFC was established in 1876. The club is now 145 years old and we are the oldest serving club in Selwyn and a founding member of the Canterbury Rugby Football Union. Several successes over recent time, has resulted in our club continuing to be an attractive option for Selwyn residents to both play for, and support. This has led to an increase in our current playing numbers, across both our Senior and Junior grades.
- The SDC is well aware of the condition and safety concerns relating to our existing lighting towers. The current condition of these lights in fact pose a concerning health and safety risk to our community members using the domain throughout the year. In conjunction with the SDC we have attempted to repair the lighting towers and wiring this year to ensure that they are at a standard fit for use in 2021, and possibly 2022, however, any use in the longer terms is doubtful, unsafe, and unsustainable. We would like to have new lights in place well in advance of our 150th celebrations at the club in 2026, although ideally, we would appreciate having new lights installed by 2023.
- It is clearly evident that our club numbers are continuing to grow across the senior grades, and we are hopeful of adding another open grade side to our club. With the wider Ellesmere population growing, we are seeing a requirement that in the future more of our younger teams will need to train at night under the lighting towers. There is also an expectation in

the wider community that the Southbridge Domain should have adequate or improved facilities to support training at night, as has been seen at other clubs throughout the district. We are concerned that due to the current condition of our lights, that existing and future club members may move elsewhere due to differing facilities which may compromise our future potential successes. As a community, we may also expect that if our lighting facilities are improved, that other community, schooling, and sporting groups may also want to utilise these facilities, which would only be seen as an asset to our community. We also believe that, with people continuing to have busy lives that there will be more of a requirement for sporting events to be held at night. Aside from this, we are also not the sole user of the Domain throughout the year. The Leeston-Southbridge Cricket Club also use the Domain from September through till March each year. Two of our lighting towers are temporary, meaning that they have to be taken down and put back up which impacts on the joint utilisation of the Domain for both cricket and rugby during this time. The installation of permanent towers will result in maximum benefit and minimal disruption throughout the year, as these will not have to be removed and/or installed on a regular basis.

- In our verbal discussion with the SDC we were made aware that there was \$180,000 in the budget to be used towards new irrigation at the grounds. As discussed at the time, we believe this money would be better utilised at this time, towards new lighting towers. With the SRFC being the main user of the Southbridge Domain we believe that our current irrigation system is more than suitable for its purpose, and perceive that a more sustainable and appropriate use of these funds would be better put towards new lighting towers, and would provide more benefit to the wider community.
- The SRFC is unique compared to other clubs throughout the district, as over time we have brought significant benefit to the wider community in terms of generating a global reputation, image, and benefits to the local economy. We regularly have international and domestic tour groups visit the club and the community for a tour. Even during COVID-19 we still have experienced domestic tourists visiting Southbridge and the wider community. Before the pandemic, we would have 2-3 tour groups visit each month, who not only would just visit our club but also stop into local cafes, pubs, and stores in the wider community. Overall, this means that because the SRFC is viewed as a destination for tourists, several local businesses are also recognising the indirect economic benefits associated with this tourism.

In conclusion, it is clearly evident that the addition of new lighting towers is not only a necessary measure in terms of health and safety, but will also provide significant benefit to our community through ensuring that we have state-of-theart sporting facilities for our local community. We appreciate your time in considering this submission and hope that we can work together to make this come to fruition.

Coalgate Reserve Toilets: The current level of use for this reserve makes it difficult to support public toilet provision. It is not used for any organized sport but has some recreational facilities for casual use (tennis court, BMX track, walking track etc.) and overall use is relatively low. It is, however, one of the larger recreation spaces that does not have a public toilet available. If Council was to support this submission it is estimated that it would cost \$160,000 to \$200,000 to provide a single cubicle toilet in this location with the cost of installing an effluent system likely to be high. This includes installation of a water supply and drinking fountain. Annual operating costs are estimated to be \$10,000 per year. A toilet with a holding tank would be less to install (\$100,000) but would have higher ongoing operating costs (\$12,500 pa). This project would need to be mainly funded by rates (targeted rate for recreation reserves) but a small portion of growth funding (reserve DCs) could be applied.

Upgrading the area near the Coalgate Bridge: Currently there is no project or maintenance funding allocated to undertake improvement work on this site. It is noted that the land is not under Council ownership but has historically been used as a layby/access area. Staff do not currently have an understanding of the scope or costs for work but could assess improvement and maintenance requirements if Council supported this project.

No specific archiving or museum technology funding currently allocated in Council budget for community groups. Council funding for community projects Selwyn Community Grants Fund (SCGF) is available and used for activities associated with heritage activities although not exclusively. Creative Communities is a national arts and culture fund that Council administers that does fund some heritage / historic projects but not exclusively. There is also a Selwyn Heritage Fund (heritagefund@selwyn.govt.nz) available to assist property and reserve owners with work required to maintain and enhance buildings and protected trees in the district. Aside from above, there is currently no specific funding pool that is available exclusively for "heritage/ history". Submissions received varied in regards to purpose / criteria for such a funding pool. Overall trend of submissions was away from funding for capital works and supportive of funding to support and retain volunteers and volunteers' operational activities. Council capital building plans Planned Council building designs including Te Ara Atea and Leeston do give consideration for celebrating Selwyn heritage, however current plans support facilities that integrate history and heritage in to facilities (e.g. exhibition space and heritage display cabinetry) that also include other purposes such as a library, meeting rooms etc. No current capital expenditure planned for "single purpose museum only" building or storage / archive facilities.

Council activity related the activities of history / heritage groups Council (via ACLL team) does undertake a range of programmes with local heritage / history groups that Council funds directly e.g. Selwyn Tours App (for providing online access to commentated heritage trails, local historic sites and artefacts , the history of particular townships etc) and for the digital archiving of a range of historic stories of Selwyn via Selwyn Stories. Council is currently engaged in discussions with Canterbury Museum re increasing travelling exhibitions, loans and educational programmes across the Selwyn network of key facilities (primarily Te Ara Atea and libraries). Council is involved with similar discussion with Lincoln University. Council also has plans and a modest budget to introduce a community scanning programme in the next twelve months that allows community groups to loan a scanner and generate their own digital files for preservation.

Finally , a Report is being prepared for Council that summarises existing Strategic Partners and identifies potential new strategic partners that have been identified through long term planning process. Report to be anchored to 4 wellbeings.

Coalgate Reserve Toilets & Drinking Fountain: The current level of use for this reserve makes it difficult to support public toilet provision. It is not used for any organized sport but has some recreational facilities for casual use (tennis court, BMX track, walking track etc.) and overall use is relatively low. It is, however, one of the larger recreation spaces that does not have a public toilet available. If Council was to support this submission it is estimated that it would cost \$160,000 to \$200,000 to provide a single cubicle toilet in this location with the cost of installing an effluent system likely to be high. This includes installation of a water supply and drinking fountain. Annual operating costs are estimated to be \$10,000 per year. A toilet with a holding tank would be less to install (\$100,000) but would have higher ongoing operating costs (\$12,500 pa). This project would need to be mainly funded by rates but a small portion of growth funding (reserve DCs) could be applied.

The comment about fire fighting is noted. Ponds always seem a great option when they can be balanced with an aesthetic benefit but how many ponds would you need to make a difference. Fire & Emergency have a number of potable dams/ponds which they can deploy on fire grounds to provide the type of water source being described. Locally Fire & Emergency has agreements with CPW to use their off takes and canal assets during a fire event.



Staff Comments Coalgate Reserve Toilets: The current level of use for this reserve makes it difficult

to support public toilet provision. It is not used for any organized sport but has some recreational facilities for casual use (tennis court, BMX track, walking track etc.) and overall use is relatively low. It is, however, one of the larger recreation spaces that does not have a public toilet available. If Council was to support this submission it is estimated that it would cost \$160,000 to \$200,000 to provide a single cubicle toilet in this location with the cost of installing an effluent system likely to be high. This includes installation of a water supply and drinking fountain. Annual operating costs are estimated to be \$10,000 per year. A toilet with a holding tank would be less to install (\$100,000) but would have higher ongoing operating costs (\$12,500 pa). This project would need to be mainly funded by rates (targeted rate for recreation reserves) but a small portion of growth funding (reserve DCs) could be applied. Upgrading the area near the Coalgate Bridge: Currently there is no project or maintenance funding allocated to undertake improvement work on this site. It is noted that the land is not under Council ownership but has historically been used as a layby/access area. Staff do not currently have an understanding of the scope or costs for work but could assess improvement and maintenance requirements if Council supported this project.


