I support inclusion of an urgent road safety investigation and capital works to address traffic speed and safety along Springs Road, Prebbleton between Blakes Road and Birches Road including pedestrian safety across Springs Road. This should be given urgent priority given the current redevelopment of the former Meadow Mushroom site, the proposed commercial developments in Prebbleton and increasing traffic resulting from the growth of Lincoln. The currently situation is extremely unsafe particularly for school children given the speed and volume of traffic and driver behaviour resulting in regular near misses. Investigations should be made to urgently install flashing lights at the existing crossing as an interim measure until a more permanent crossing point is decided, designed and constructed. This could be addressed as part of the Springs Road/Tosswill Road Traffic Lights Project.

I support the Springs Road/Tosswill Road Traffic Lights Project being brought forward to commence planning and investigations in the 2021/22 financial year and capital works to commence shortly afterwards.

Consideration should also be given to commencing investigations and works to review traffic speed and safety along Tosswill Road particularly between Trices Road and Oakwood Mews where there are speeding issues. With increased residential development in this location, this work is becoming increasingly urgent. In addition, there is a culture of exceeding speed limits to get to and from the Prebbleton Reserve and some form of traffic calming and speed reduction is required to address current safety issues. In particular there is uncertainty where the speed changes from an urban to rural limit and the placement of speed signs is obscured by vegetation and is ineffective.

#### Q6 PREBBLETON COMMUNITY CENTRE

Support construction

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I support the new community centre being developed at an<sup>4</sup> alternative location to its current site. However, I consider that it should have some potential for at least mobile library services and also options for the location should be subject to further investigations and community engagement.

I do not support construction of another facility on Prebbleton Reserve (Domain) resulting in a net loss of open space. Sites closer to the town centre/expanded commercial centre should be investigated or alternatively options made for right of first refusal on undeveloped adjoining land. Careful consideration of the traffic generated and traffic safety issues, including the speed of traffic along Tosswill Road, should be considered as part of the site selection criteria and overall plans to develop the community centre (i.e. if the centre is located at the Domain any roading upgrades such as parking, speed management, traffic calming) should be considered and works undertaken as part of this development.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this Long Term Plan. In addition to my responses to the survey form, I have some additional comments on specific topics below.

#### Climate Change

Impacts and adaptation — I am glad to see a risk assessment will be carried out, but it is disappointing that this long term plan may not be able to address any of the risks. It states in the document that only minor changes are projected in Selwyn for the period of this long term plan — but it is essential that planning for the time periods beyond the next 10 years begins now. Critically, it's important that actions in the next ten years do not place us on a path that will lead to greater exposure and vulnerability in the longer term — with increasing costs for the Council and ratepayers. I don't see any evidence of this longer term planning for climate change in this plan.

Reducing emissions – while there are some words about measuring the Council's carbon footprint and placing climate change at the heart of the Council's work, there are no concrete steps in the plan to reduce emissions, or to enable residents to reduce their emissions. I do not get the sense the Council is taking this seriously at all. The investments in transport are dominated by roading and carparks, with some token cycleways and park and rides. We need to fundamentally change the way we design our urban areas and regions if we are to reach the Government's goal of net zero Carbon by 2050. The Climate Change Commission emphasises the importance of urban planning to support emissions reductions.

The way the region is developing and expanding is **locking residents in to high emissions lifestyles**, through the low density, sprawling nature of the developments, with no additional public transport measures. Electric vehicles are only part of the answer. There are many additional benefits from designing higher density urban areas with plenty of green space, as well as reducing the distances needed to travel (and reducing the impact on agricultural land – see below).

The sprawling nature of the development is also locking the Council and future ratepayers into maintaining larger areas of utility infrastructure.

#### Agricultural Land

A recent report (MfE and StatsNZ 2021) highlighted the extent to which agricultural land is being lost to urban sprawl. It is very disappointing to see nothing in this long term plan about how the Council is going to manage land in the Selwyn District over the next ten years. There does not appear to be any plan, and the consequences are irreversible, including:

- A loss of agricultural production
- Loss of wetlands
- Loss of biodiversity
- Loss of carbon storage
- Vulnerability to extreme events through the loss of flood regulation and other ecosystem services
- Locking the region into high future Carbon emissions through a sprawling suburban area with no public transport

This is a critical issue and I urge the Council to urgently consider its strategy in this regard.

#### Commercial developments

Many of the new commercial developments in Lincoln particularly are very badly designed (Rosemerryn and opposite New World). They are essentially a large carpark with some shops around the edges. It would be much more attractive and encourage more pedestrians and customers if the carparks were towards the back, with some green space, trees, places to sit in the centre, etc. The new developments beside New World are a little better, but still dominated by concrete and carparks. I urge the Council to require a higher level of design and planning in future developments like this.

Submission: Hororata Playcentre

Playcentre Aotearoa is a non profit organisation which values whānau as the first teachers of their tamariki. Playcentre support whānau to run a parent led early childhood education service for their own tamariki, and Playcentre is the only early childhood education service in the Hororata village. Playcentre also provides an environment that empowers its members, encourages continued adult education, and supports parents and their tamariki to play and learn alongside each other, which research suggests is best for tamariki.

Hororata Playcentre (HPC), operates from the current Hororata Community Hall, and has been a long term user of the Hall. HPC is a key gathering point for families with young children in the wider Hororata community. A place where parents and caregivers can support each other, and where both families and children develop the relationships that <u>create</u> community and wellbeing for the youngest members in the community and up.

While HPC is hugely grateful for the space provided to them it is fair to say that for continued long term presence in the community, improvements to the space provided are essential to continue to meet Ministry of Education licencing.

In principle, HPC's preferred option is Option 1 in the Selwyn Districts Long Term Plan consultation document. HPC see a new community centre as a real benefit to the continued cohesion of the community and feels that option 2 and 3 are not long term solutions for the community they are a part of. However, the reduced budget is of concern to HPC. The future needs of Playcentre were included in the initial feasibility study. Will the reduced budget allow the continued presence of Playcentre in the community? Playcentre is not a playgroup but a licensed ECE service which requires compliance with MOE regulations. If the council requires further information on these requirements, they are welcome to contact us.

Hororata Community has, in HPC's view, proven to be a highly motivated group as the actions of GoHororata, and also the Hororata Community Trust illustrate. These actions include the time and energy of GoHororata for a number of years in ascertaining the requirements of the community and working on draft plans, which have been transparent to the council along the way; and also the Hororata Community Trust's Highland Games and Night

Glow Festival which have become high profile events that benefit all of Selwyn. The continued support these groups are committing too will see the community, including HPC, to continue to thrive.

The existing Hororata Hall is now a heritage listed building in the Selwyn District plan. With the Hororata Historical Society plan to repurpose the existing hall, and potentially to house the Hororata Museum, the current space in which HPC operates will no longer be available.

HPC has been a part of Hororata community for well over 60 years. HPC request that the council will consider and support the benefits of Playcentre's key role in the community when moving forward with their decisions.

HPC also asks that the council reflect on the feasibility study to ensure that the community needs are understood and form part of the decision making ahead.

Submitter requests increased Council investment in heritage. Council funding for community projects Selwyn Community Grants Fund (SCGF) is available and used for activities associated with heritage activities although not exclusively. Creative Communities is a national arts and culture fund that Council administers that does fund some heritage / historic projects but not exclusively. There is also a Selwyn Heritage Fund (heritagefund@selwyn.govt.nz) available to assist property and reserve owners with work required to maintain and enhance buildings and protected trees in the district. Aside from above, there is currently no specific funding pool that is available exclusively for "heritage/ history". Submissions received varied in regards to purpose / criteria for such a funding pool. Overall trend of submissions was away from funding for capital works and supportive of funding to support and retain volunteers and volunteers' operational activities. Council capital building plans Planned Council building designs including Te Ara Atea and Leeston do give consideration for celebrating Selwyn heritage, however current plans support facilities that integrate history and heritage in to facilities (e.g. exhibition space and heritage display cabinetry) that also include other purposes such as a library, meeting rooms etc. No current capital expenditure planned for "single purpose museum only" building. Council activity related the activities of history / heritage groups Council (via ACLL team ) does undertake a range of programmes with local heritage / history groups that Council funds directly e.g. Selwyn Tours App (for providing online access to commentated heritage trails, local historic sites and artefacts, the history of particular townships etc) and for the digital archiving of a range of historic stories of Selwyn via Selwyn Stories. Council is currently engaged in discussions with Canterbury Museum re increasing travelling exhibitions, loans and educational programmes across the Selwyn network of key facilities (primarily Te Ara Atea and libraries). Council is involved with similar discussion with Lincoln University. Council also has plans and a modest budget to introduce a community scanning programme in the next twelve months that allows community groups to loan a scanner and generate their own digital files for preservation.

A Report is being prepared for Council regarding funding of "Strategic Partners" s identifying potential new strategic partners that have been identified through long term planning process. The Report will suggest a model anchored to 4 wellbeings.

#### Alignment to SDC priorities:

It is our belief that through participation in active recreation all people are grown to be better individuals and as a result better community members. A stronger and more prosperous group of individuals will always create and maintain stronger more prosperous communities.

The 2021-2031 LTP currently states assistance will be sought from the Selwyn Sports Trust to achieve the community outcome. It would be a privilege to continue to support the Selwyn District Council to facilitate and provide opportunities for Selwyn residents to enjoy healthy active lifestyles and support the activation of recreational, open space and community facilities.

#### Impact of Strategic Partnership:

The Selwyn District population will continue to grow at a medium-high rate, similar to that experienced over the past ten years. Alongside our current offerings the Selwyn Sports Trust has a number of new initiatives, activations and opportunities that are currently not viable largely due to financial/capacity limitations. Such examples include;

- Enhanced Community Connection empowering others who are invested in providing quality experiences and opportunities through support and guidance to develop their capability. This will include, but not be limited to professional development opportunities, assistance with governance and best practice examples.
- Coach Developer Programme and support network for community coaches and officials to access support, encouragement and best practice for the outcome of providing participants with a quality experience.

- Increased Activations for our Tamariki and Rangatahi being responsive to the needs of the community and as opportunities arise being able to provide these activations in a timely manner without barriers to participation such as cost and/or travel.
- Development and delivery of a more comprehensive annual events calendar the trust has a number of annual event ideas that we wish to make a reality, including but not limited to, multiport events, non-traditional sports tournaments for all ages, team building and family challenges.

We are careful not to directly compete with other providers and also not to set up our offerings that place an overt importance for our long term involvement. Empowering others and developing their capability is so important for long term success. The Selwyn Sports Trust Strategic Plan reflects this through our Leadership and Influence Outcome, and is an area of focus for us moving forward.

It is important to understand that while it would be easy to simply consider numbers year on year and reflect on whether they increase, it is of greater importance to the Trust that activations and operations are of a suitable quality and variety that they truly 'Inspire Participation'. We know that this approach will result in greater enjoyment and consequently longer term engagement in sporting and active recreational pursuits. The greater engagement levels will have a positive impact on the individual, their wider whānau and community, the sporting codes and their stakeholders, and our country as a whole.

What we can guarantee is that all additional capacity will be carefully and thoughtfully utilised to achieve our vision; 'Inspiring Participation through Opportunity and Leadership in Selwyn'. #### Investment:

Funding priorities for Sport NZ and Sport Canterbury have also impacted our revenue as the Selwyn District is not considered a deprivation community. With that being said we remain dedicated to further diversification of our funding streams and this is of greater importance now than ever before.

We are therefore asking the Selwyn District Council for an annual Strategic Partnership grant of \$48,000 for a three year term to assist the Selwyn Sports Trust to continue our offerings to the community and enhance and establish new initiatives, outlined above, to achieve our vision of 'inspiring participation through opportunity and leadership in Selwyn' and the Selwyn District Councils key community outcome of 'a healthy community'. Appendix 1 outlines our annual operating budget.

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Should we be successful in re-obtaining our strategic partnership funding we would not apply for Events Funding for the duration of this partnership.

#### Summary:

It is the Selwyn Sports Trust's hope that through providing a consistent and positive voice for the regular and varied involvement in sport, physical activity, play and active recreation the whole of the Selwyn District will thrive. #### INTRODUCTION

1. Summerset Group Holdings Limited (*Summerset*) is pleased to have the opportunity to submit on the Draft Development Contributions Policy 2021 (*Policy*) proposed by Selwyn District Council (*Council*).

#### **BACKGROUND**

- 2. Summerset is New Zealand's second largest developer and operator of retirement villages, which makes it one of New Zealand's largest home-builders. Summerset currently operates 29 villages across New Zealand and provides a range of living options for more than 6,200 residents.
- 3. Summerset develops and operates comprehensive care retirement villages, that provide a continuum of care, with its villages containing independent (villas, townhouses and apartments) and assisted living units and residential care (rest home, hospital and dementia level care) for those who require greater assistance. The average age of a resident entering Summerset's villages is 81 years. This resident demographic is associated with a typically low pattern of demand on community infrastructure, amenities and facilities.
- 4. Over the next 50 years the number of people over 75 in New Zealand is expected to grow by 245% from 315,000 in 2018 (6% of the population) to more than one million in 2068 (17% of the population). It is therefore vital that the regulatory environment recognises and provides for the development that is required to meet this growing demand, and funding for associated infrastructure, but does so on a fair and proportionate basis.

#### LOWER OCCUPANCY AND DEMAND PROFILE

- 5. Summerset acknowledges the Policy's recognition of retirement villages' lower demands on the district's infrastructure, reflected by the lower contribution rates for sewerage, water, stormwater, transport and outline development plan areas. However, Summerset considers that the Policy fails to take into account the full characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages and their occupants, and the extent to which they, on their own or cumulatively with those of other developments, substantially reduce the impacts of development requirements for infrastructure and community facilities in the district or parts of the district both at a citywide and local area level.
- 6. "Retirement village" is an umbrella term given to all types of retirement living, encompassing both "comprehensive care" and "lifestyle" retirement villages.
  - 6.1. As discussed above, comprehensive care retirement villages provide a full range of living and care options from independent living through to assisted living, rest home, hospital and memory care (dementia). The residential care component makes up a relatively high percentage of the overall unit mix.
  - 6.2. Lifestyle retirement villages focus mostly on independent living units with occasionally a small amount of serviced care on a largely temporary basis. When a resident becomes frail over time, usually they would be forced to move from a lifestyle village. This is because care provision is minimal and not suitable as a long-term solution.
- 7. There is a fundamental difference between a comprehensive care retirement village (as Summerset's new villages are) and a lifestyle retirement village. Each village attracts a very different resident demographic. As discussed above, the average age of a resident entering Summerset's villages is 81 years. For completed and fully occupied villages, the average age across all residents is closer to mid-80s. Residents are typically people that chose to live in their own homes for as long as possible and have moved to a retirement village primarily due to a specific need (such as deteriorating health or mobility challenges, or for companionship many of Summerset's residents are widows). By contrast, lifestyle villages cater for a younger, more active early retiree, with a higher proportion of couples. The average age of a resident moving into a lifestyle village is more mid-to-late 60s.
- 8. Summerset's villages typically provide an extensive range of on-site amenities that are suited to the older residents' specialist physical and social needs including on-demand mini-vans for residents' shopping and outings, a bar, café and restaurant, small residents' convenience shop, pool, gym, activities room, pool table, piano, hairdressing and beauty salon, treatment room, bowling green, hobbies shed, meeting rooms, theatre, library, communal sitting and lounge areas, residents' vegetable gardens and large park-like landscaped gardens. These on-site amenities greatly reduce, and in some cases eliminate, usage of Council's community amenities and facilities by Summerset's residents.
- 9. Summerset's average occupancy for its independent units is 1.3 residents per unit regardless of the number of bedrooms in the unit. Summerset's average occupancy for its care units is 1 resident per unit. The reduced occupancy per unit, together with the reduced demand per occupant, results in a reduced demand on both local infrastructure and community facilities when compared against the demand assumptions for a typical household unit.

- 10. Summerset notes that the reduced occupancy, and demand per occupant, for comprehensive care retirement villages has been thoroughly tested and is now provided for by Auckland Council which has defined "Retirement Villages" in the Auckland Unitary Plan and its Development Contributions Policy. This approach recognises the reduced demand placed on local infrastructure and community amenities.
- 11. Summerset considers that Council, in developing the Policy, has not given adequate consideration to the unique characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages, and the significantly lower demand profile when compared to lifestyle retirement villages, particularly due to:
  - 11.1. lower occupancy levels (1.3 residents per independent unit and 1 resident per care unit, compared to 2.9 residents per standard residential dwelling assumed by the Policy);
  - 11.2. reduced activity levels of the residents due to their age and frailty; and
  - 11.3. the provision of specialist on-site amenities provided to cater for the residents' specific needs.

#### POLICY NOT FAIR AND PROPORTIONATE

- 12. Summerset notes and supports the decrease in development contribution charges for retirement village units. However, the Policy does not distinguish between independent units and aged care rooms retirement villages and the Policy does not go far enough to account for:
  - 12.1. the lower occupancy rate of retirement units (1.3 residents per unit) and aged care rooms (1 resident per care unit) as compared to standard residential dwellings (2.9 residential per standard residential dwelling), which with a 0.5 HUE, does not even account for the difference in occupancy rates;
  - 12.2. the unique characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages, as compared to lifestyle retirement villages;
  - 12.3. the demographic characteristics of retirement unit and aged care room residents; or
  - 12.4. the extensive on-site amenities and facilities provided by comprehensive care retirement village operators.

#### **RELIEF SOUGHT**

- 13. To fairly account for the lower demand profile, both a population per unit discount (to account for the lower occupancy) and a demand factor discount (to account for the older demographic and on-site amenities) should be applied to set specific contribution calculations for comprehensive care retirement villages.
- 14. Summerset requests that a separate rate is set for retirement villages, consistent with development contribution policies being developed by other councils. This should distinguish retirement units, and aged care rooms, and provide separate rates for each.

- 15. Water and wastewater contributions should be assessed according to the demand factors for comprehensive care retirement villages calculated and agreed with Council at resource consent stage against those assumed for typical household equivalent units, to recognise the lower demand on those reticulated services.
- 16. Stormwater contributions should be assessed according to the demand factors for comprehensive care retirement villages based on the site-specific stormwater management outlined and agreed with Council at resource consent stage. Council need to clearly demonstrate the causal connection between any public stormwater infrastructure required as a result of the increase in demand (if any) directly attributable by the retirement village.
- 17. Taking into account both population per unit/room, and demand factors, Summerset suggests the rates in the table below. These are based on the equivalent rates in the current Auckland Council Development Contribution Policy, which were established after robust hearings processes including the calling of expert evidence in relation to demand.

Development type	Activity	Units of demand
Retirement unit	Transport	0.3 HUE per unit
	All others	0.1 HUE per unit
Aged care room	Transport	0.2 HUE per room
	Community infrastructure	0.1 HUE per room

#### **TIMING**

- 18. Summerset submits that the Policy should be explicit about the assessment and timing of payment for large staged projects that require both land use resource consent(s) and building consent(s). Summerset submits that where both a land use resource consent and a building consent are required, the activity should be assessed for development contributions based on the relevant Policy applicable at the time that the resource consent application is lodged, with payment of the total assessed development contributions staged such that a proportionate amount is payable prior to uplift of the code of compliance certificates for each staged building consent. That manner of assessment and payment is fair and reasonable and gives developers certainty of the development contributions payable on large, staged projects such as comprehensive care retirement villages.
- 19. Section 3.2 of the Policy provides that the initial development contribution assessment will be conducted on application for a resource or building consent, however under section 3.4, the development contribution will be reassessed if the time between the initial assessment and the time the invoice is payable is more than 24 months, or if there are changes in scale or intensity of the development. Section 3.3 of the Policy states that the development contributions are payable before the grant of a s224(c) certificate or a code compliance certificate. Summerset requests clarification under section 3 of the Policy as follows, in line with the above approach:
  - 19.1. Where a building consent is required to be issued for the development proposed, then the development contributions should continue to be payable on the issue of associated

code compliance certificate(s) rather than at the time at the request of the first inspection of building works. That is the point at which the land use could lawfully be given effect to without breaching the Building Act 2004. Given occupancy is permitted at that point, it is also the time at which any additional demand on Council infrastructure would arise. In a larger staged development, this may mean a series of payments over time as the building work under each staged building consent is completed and signed off.

19.2. It should be clarified that in terms of the timing of the assessment and the version of the Policy that applies, the development contributions would be calculated and assessed against the relevant Policy at the time that the land use consent application was lodged but payable at the time of code compliance certificate(s).

#### **FINAL COMMENTS**

20. Summerset is grateful for the opportunity to submit on the Policy and looks forward to engaging with the Council during the consultation process. Summerset would be happy to meet with the Council or attend at a hearing to discuss this submission further if that would assist.

#### About Te Ara Kākāriki

Te Ara Kākāriki are a charitable trust with the goal of enhancing native biodiversity by creating a 'Greenway' – or corridor of native Greendots between the Waimakiriri and Rakaia rivers, linking the Canterbury Foothills to the sea and Te Waihora / Lake Ellesmere. Since 2009 we have planted over 120,000 native plants at 104 public and privately owned Greendot sites. We run two programmes; the Greendot Programme and the Kids Discovery Plantout Programme.

Through the **Greendot Programme** we assist Selwyn landowners to establish native plantings on their property, providing them with support in the form of restoration planning, volunteer planting, and a funding contribution through a SDC grant. Each year we hold four volunteer plantout events and several corporate plantout days, providing opportunity to educate and involve Canterbury communities in improving their local environment.

The **Kids Discovery Plantout Programme** is an award-winning collaboration between Te Ara Kākāriki and Enviroschools. We provide an educational opportunity for Selwyn students to learn about native biodiversity through hands on experience and work with the schools to incorporate lessons into the curriculum. Through planting and monitoring days the students take on a role of kaitiakitanga of a local site and together contribute to restoring the native ecosystem.

We would like to acknowledge our positive relationship with Selwyn District Council who have supported the trust financially over the past six years allowing us to assist landowners with restoration projects and involve and educate the community through our biodiversity programmes.

#### What we would like to see included in the Long-Term Plan 2021 – 31

- 1. A long-term commitment to financial support of Te Ara Kākāriki including commitment to increasing funding as costs and interest in planting natives grows
- 2. Increased support for landowners restoring parts of their land through SNEF and through TAK
- 3. Funding for Enviroschools
- 4. Covenants made accessible for indigenous plantings
- 5. Protection of water races
- 6. Native plants at new and upgraded reserves
- 7. More Significant Natural Area assessments

#### 1. Selwyn District Council support of Te Ara Kākāriki to continue and increase

Te Ara Kākāriki have a proven reputation for successfully working with landowners and the council to restore sites for our common goal of enhancing our natural landscape. SDC funding is essential to our achievements and our ability to plan ahead, it contributes to restoration planning, community education and events, planting, the Kids Discovery Plantouts and administration. We request the following:

- A commitment to continue funding Te Ara Kākāriki for the next ten years
- An increase in the annual funding for Te Ara Kākāriki, allowing us to increase restoration work and provide additional landowner grants

#### 2. Increased Landowner support

There is an urgent need to plant more indigenous species in Selwyn to add to the critically low level of natural native cover remaining and extend habitat for native wildlife. It is fantastic to see Selwyn landowners understanding this need and wanting to take action. Successful restoration projects require expert knowledge, land, financial input and time from landowners, which benefits all Selwyn residents and future generations. Landowners who do this deserve support. We request the following:

- Increasing the oversubscribed Selwyn Natural Environment Fund
- Increasing Te Ara Kākāriki funding to enable us to provide more landowner grants

#### 3. Enviroschools funding

Our Kids Discovery Plantout Programme is a collaboration with Enviroschools, our partnership enables us to provide a comprehensive educational experience installing in students a lifelong appreciation of biodiversity and the environment. Without Enviroschools the educational experience would not be as in depth or work so well with the school curriculum so we are calling for Selwyn District Council to increase Enviroschools funding so that all schools can take part in the programme.

Enviroschools works in the classroom, incorporating the environmental focus into the school curriculum, these lessons are reinforced through hands on activity during our Kids Discovery Plantout and Monitoring Days. Feedback from schools is always positive, students are engaged and eager to put what they have learned into practice and many more schools are eager to take part in this programme.

ECan's long term plan is currently being reviewed with the possibility of a higher rates option allowing 40 more Canterbury schools to take part in the Enviroschools programme. If this goes through there will still be Selwyn Schools that are not Enviroschools, and we believe all schools should be able to be part of this fantastic programme. If ECan does not get the higher rates option through, SDC support for Enviroschools will be essential as there is a waiting list of schools eager to be part of this valuable programme. We recommend:

Selwyn District Council assign funding to Enviroschools

#### 4. Covenants

There is a need for an affordable and accessible covenanting process for landowners who have restoration projects on their property. This is to acknowledge the importance of such sites and protect the good work and resources put into restoration planting projects. All our landowners have a signed agreement with us committing them to protect and maintain their planting sites in perpetuity but there is growing concern among the trust and landowners about what happens to the projects once the landowners move on from the sites. Most of our landowners would be willing to put their Greendot into a covenant if this was available and Te Ara Kākāriki would be willing to assist them. We are available to discuss with the council how this might work.

#### 5. Water races

Te Ara Kākāriki supports the council's decision to keep water races and ensure they keep flowing. As the landscapes have been altered, wetland/riparian species have accumulated in water races and considering how little biodiversity remains, this makes them valuable sites. As the purpose for the water races changes from providing for individual landowners to providing biodiversity and habitat services of value to all residents, all ratepayers should contribute to the cost of maintaining them.

#### 6. New Reserves

SDC has several new reserves and reserve upgrades in the pipeline. We would like to see each reserve use eco-sourced native seedlings for the plantings and where space allows, for each reserve to have a Greendot project planted by a local school over multiple years through the Kids Discovery Plantout Programme. A good example of where we have worked with council on something like this is in Foster Park where Rolleston Christian School has planted for several years.

#### 7. More Significant Natural Area (SNA) assessments

Canterbury biodiversity is at a critical point with less than 1% of natural native cover remaining on the plains. Our local biodiversity is unique and cannot be replaced, because of this high priority must be given to identifying and protecting what remains. We call for more resources to be made available for this.

I look forward to discussing this submission at the upcoming hearings.

Council recognises the significant contribution that TAK make towards the restoration and management of indigenous biodiversity in the District.

We have been investigating the possibility of Covenants for native planting sites and discussing the significance of our water races as biodiversity corridors and associated management actions.

Council continues to undertake and develop plans to plant and manage native species at a number of reserve sites across the District, and continues to work with our community in this regard.

Council recognises the need to protect and manage indigenous biodiversity in the District through its SNA programme and as such has two staff working on this, and associated funding streams.

Funding has been incorporated into LTP budgets, particularly through the SNEF fund and SNA assessment projects. SNEF is currently oversubscribed with the existing arrangements in place. With the increase in subscriptions to SNEF and the impending National Policy Statement for Indigenous Biodiversity, which will likely increase Councils responsibly and resource commitment in this area increased funding has merit for consideration and may be required in the future.

A Report is being prepared for Council regarding funding of "Strategic Partners". This Report will consider potential future strategic partners, as identified through long term planning process, as well as reviewing those that Council has previously funded over the previous 3 years. The Report will suggest a future funding model anchored to 4 wellbeing's' environmental wellbeing, cultural wellbeing, social wellbeing and economic wellbeing.

Q1 KEEPING WATER SUPPLY SAFE

Support Proposal

We hear more and more about Nitrate levels reaching critical levels in our drinking water. In view of this Lincoln Envirotown feel that �community expectations � should be seen as very high and that �regulations � should reflect high expectations. It is to be hoped that the standards by which �safe � drinking water is measured remain at the highest level.

Q2 PAYING FOR WATER SUPPLY

Support Proposal

The annual fixed rate should give a basic water supply with increasing marginal incremental pricing to high consumers. This reflects that water is an essential commodity for households of all incomes, but that it is also a scarce resource and high usage should carry a clear price indicator of this scarcity.

Q3 DARFIELD AND KIRWEE WASTEWATER

Support Proposal

**Q4 ROAD MAINTENANCE** 

Lincoln Envirotown sees the maintenance of existing roads, especially in the area of safety, as the priority, rather than the building of large new projects. As we stated in the consultation document there is a need to keep the priority of cycle lanes which in the long run may reduce road maintenance costs and to look to increasing pedestrian friendly environments which reduce the need for motor transport.

Q5 FUTURE ROADING AND TRANSPORT PROJECTS

Support proposed programme

Seems to satisfy our preferences as expressed above with cycle lanes planned and capital costs largely for projects which make roads safer such as junction upgrades, and traffic lights. In general, we would be opposed to a high proportion of costs being directed to new car parks which take up large areas of land at a time when we should be directing energy away from car use.

Q6 PREBBLETON COMMUNITY CENTRE

Support construction

Whilst not being directly involved in Prebbleton decisions,  $\sqrt[70]{6}$  see tasteful new buildings replacing old as a move towards more environmentally friendly structures which should be designed to serve growing populations and provide the facilities required by the community.

Whilst accepting that new buildings are required Lincoln Envirotown spreference would be to see these built on the sites of the existing facilities. This is obviously sometimes impossible. However, we would make a strong submission to the effect that where green space is lost on domains or reserves, an equivalent area of green space is made available for the community se enjoyment and recreation.

#### Q7 LEESTON LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY CENTRE

#### Support proposal

We cannot determine a specific preference on this except to say that if buildings are seen to require costly reinforcing against Earthquakes then the option of a new building would seem to be best which should be designed to meet the needs of the communities and thereby encourage more people to use them.

Whilst accepting that new buildings are required Lincoln Envirotown spreference would be to see these built on the sites of the existing facilities. This is obviously sometimes impossible. However, we would make a strong submission to the effect that where green space is lost on domains or reserves, an equivalent area of green space is made available for the community se enjoyment and recreation.

#### **Q8 HORORATA COMMUNITY CENTRE**

#### Support proposal

As above • new buildings built with environmental sustainability, community needs, and a greater capacity requirement in mind would seem to be required at this juncture in Selwyn s development.

Whilst accepting that new buildings are required Lincoln Envirotown spreference would be to see these built on the sites of the existing facilities. This is obviously sometimes impossible. However, we would make a strong submission to the effect that where green space is lost on domains or reserves, an equivalent area of green space is made available for the community se enjoyment and recreation.

#### **Q9 SIGNIFICANCE AND ENGAGEMENT POLICY**

We found this impossible to comment on as we were unable to find the changes to any detail in the existing Significance and Engagement Policy.

#### Q10 OTHER COMMENTS

In a separate attachment we detail the work of Lincoln Envirotown which is aimed at improving our community swell-being with many projects and events and encouraging environmental concern, sustainable living and resilience. We recognize that all council activity should improve well-being. The well-being aims and indicators that the Council espouses are to be applauded, but it is disappointing to see very few actions which specifically target these objectives. Similarly, the recognition of climate change as a major threat and the requirement for decision making to take account of it is commendable but again specific detail seems sparse.

# Lincoln Envirotown Trust 2021 Budget Submission to Selwyn District Council.



As our district continues to grow, so does the work of Lincoln Envirotown Trust (LET). We continue to partner with other organisations and businesses to keep our mission successful. This year we have implemented our usual events and initiatives and completed refinement and review of others. We are also in the process of implementing some exciting new initiatives for 2021.

We estimate that we have provided over 6,000 hours of voluntary time into the community over the past year. We have several part-time employees or contractors to help us achieve our goals including; Project Manager, Project Coordinator, Garden Coordinator, Timebank Coordinators, and Responsible Business Awards Coordinators.

We continued to implement our three year strategic plan (2020-2022) with three main focus areas being;

MISSION: To educate, support, research and promote sustainability, by working with the community, for the community and in partnership with others.

- 1 CONNECTING: Getting our sustainability message out into Selwyn District.
- 2 COMMUNITY: Ensure our projects are of a high quality and reach our target audience.
- 3 EDUCATION: Provide environmental education.

### Lincoln Envirotown Trust's Long Term Plans from 2021

The huge success of our projects and events last year is the subject of another report to Council. However, the successes of the past year both of our ongoing work in the community, and especially of new developments, have provided incredible scope for future years.

The year 2020 – 2021 was defined by the number of people and organisations that approached us asking for specific help with their projects and in many cases requesting that we run suggested initiatives. In nearly all instances we have been happy to do this and thereby added a number of additional services which will continue as part of our ongoing programmes.

Here is a brief overview of some growing relationships we have seen this past year and how they have fitted in with the main elements of our mission statement:

- 1 CONNECTING: A major strengthening relationship was with the Community Team at Selwyn District Council. This resulted in new collaborative ventures which will be detailed later in this application. Likewise, we have been in close contact with the Community and Economic Advisory team at Council which has resulted in new initiatives set up for our Responsible Business Network. All these new relationships and projects will continue into the future. We have enjoyed closer consultation with Waste Management at Council and look forward to this continuing as the Reconnect Project takes shape, where we hope to offer such things as Repair Cafes to the community.
- 2 BUILDING COMMUNITY: Selwyn Timebank saw a huge amount of appreciation shown for their work in keeping in close touch with their members during lockdown. This period showed the contribution they made to building a strong feeling of community. After lockdown the Community Team at Council asked Timebank to participate in a number of their seminars and run an international cooking event. These will form additions to the Timebank calendar going into the future.
  - Our Community Gardens and Timebank participated in the SWELL programme organised by Council
- 3 **EDUCATION**: We have been asked to assist with a new **Junior Enviro Group** which looks to be growing strongly after winning our film competition! A local business owner has asked us to run a **"waste art" competition** this year; plans are well underway and this is also likely to become an annual event.

Whilst these new developments create additional work we view them with excitement as we see our role developing rather than remaining static and that the community is responding favourably to our efforts.

## **Selwyn Timebank**

Apart from developing new relationships as discussed above, this continues to be a very strongly growing project for us. Membership stands at over 250 people and we are seeing this increasing with each new social get together. This growth is largely brought about by new people coming to our District who clearly benefit from this way of making early contacts in their new home. The membership comprises of many nationalities and age groups. Members conducted 250 "transactions" (free exchange of services) between each other last year.

## **Community Gardens**

These continue to provide a way for people to connect, learn to grow their own food, and an educational space for younger members of our community (regularly attended by the local kindergarten children and Girl Guides). We will continue to provide numerous workshops every year; these cover diverse topics from basic "Veges 101" to more specific interests such as "Backyard Biodiversity" and "Earthworms – our underground army".

There is a possibility that these gardens will have to move to another location. Although we hope this will not be the case we have sought and considered options in the event of this.

### **Maintenance of Mahoe Reserve**

Lincoln Envirotown continues to plant and maintain the native vegetation and infrastructure in this reserve. It has become a focus for interested groups both from schools who undertake field work there and the public who attend the monthly working bees. Recently in consultation with council it became one area of focus for our **Predator Free Trapping Projects.** Trapping is ongoing with results regularly reported to council. The other area in which this initiative is active is the **Lincoln Wetlands.** 

### **Responsible Business Network and Awards**

After a slow start the Responsible Business Network now seems to have become well established and in close connection with businesses in Selwyn regarding the opportunities to become more sustainable. Meetings with the growing number of interested business owners are held regularly and last year we locally produced an excellent film about minimising waste in the building industry. This film has been circulated by council and is shown at building enterprise open days. The Responsible Business Coordinator is liaising with council regarding possible joint workshops or events regarding local tourism and food production.

The Awards are conducted every two years with participating businesses assessed on their efforts to minimise their environmental impact and engage with their local community. A great deal of work has gone into establishing a good "user friendly" assessment process which is also challenging. We see participation growing – 76 businesses participated in 2019 and we are aiming to get 100 this year.

## Selwyn Trap Library

The success of this project has exceeded expectations. Traps are lent free of charge to householders after a careful briefing on their use and safety measures. Borrowers report on their results. Twenty traps have been constantly out on loan and it has been necessary to find funding for more traps.

## **Kim Hill Hot Topic**

This annual discussion about an environmental issue is chaired by the broadcasting personality Kim Hill. We select a panel of people with expertise on the issue and after they deliver their views questions are invited from the floor. It has attracted a "full house" audience of over 300 for many years now and we see no reason why this will not continue to be the case as long as we ensure topics of interest and high quality panellists.

### **KidsFest Craft and Science Day**

This is a hugely enjoyable event. High School students determine an environmental theme and then devise the craft and science activities which they demonstrate and mentor to younger children on the day. It is accompanied by various exciting activities such as crawling through the traditional tunnel which High School build to demonstrate the theme. It gives immense pleasure and value both to those organising and those attending.

This event in some ways became too successful with numbers approaching unmanageable. This has resulted in it becoming our only ticketed event.

## **Water Testing and Observation**

We hold this with Waterwatch during "Keep New Zealand Beautiful" week. A mixed group of Kindergarten, Primary, and Secondary school children carry out various activities from observation to actual water testing depending on their age. The results are recorded and maintained by us.

### **Environmental Film Competition**

This competition continues to be of interest to people of all ages. The competitors produce short films on any environmental concern that they or their teachers or producers have. Category prizes and an overall prize are presented at an Oscar like awards evening at which all films are shown. As long as this level of interest is maintained we would expect to run this event each year for the foreseeable future.

### **Easter Sunday Nature Hunt**

We established this small event during lockdown but because of the interest it generated we have continued this year and it looks as if it will stay. People are invited to go out into nature on Easter Sunday and record the life they observe through the "inaturalist" app. The app helps with identification and the results for the event are recorded on it.

### **Waste Art Competition**

As explained above this is a new event for us which we have instigated at the request of a prize donor. Working individually or in pairs High School students will use only waste materials to produce a 3d work of art. The pieces will be displayed for judging and we hope to display winning pieces publicly for a short time. We are working with schools and with Community Services at Council on this project.

## **Repair Cafés and Clothes Swaps**

These events were part of a "Sustainability Trail" set of events we ran in 2019. Many of the events which made up the trail were "one offs". However, these two proved so popular that we continued and will continue to run them. They are aimed at preventing household items and used clothing going to landfill.

We vary the repair cafes from the initial event which conducted all repairs. Last year was only a clothes repair cafe and this year we are looking to do bikes and electronics both of which attracted numerous "customers" in 2019.

The clothes swap event will be annual as it is proving to be very popular indeed with a full hall each year.

### **Matariki Kite Making**

This was undertaken at the request of the Community Team at Selwyn District Council. We worked with the **International Students of Darfield High School**, a group we had not previously met. The students made and filmed the making of the kites and the film links were made available through us and SDC for children to make kites and fly them as part of **Selwyn's Matariki Celebrations**. We hope that a similar project will eventuate each year and are keeping in touch with council as to what form such a project would take.

How the work of Lincoln Envirotown Trust relates to Selwyn District Council's proposed long term plan.

## **Our Growing District**

All the work of Lincoln Envirotown Trust is carried out in the community; with community and environmental needs in mind. As the district grows so community needs grow and change. As the district grows so do pressures on the environment grow, but so to do the number of people with concerns about it. We endeavour to provide relevant services which adapt to community change as well as knowledge and events which keep us aware of our environmental obligations.

A specific project which caters most to this element of the long term plan is the **Selwyn Timebank.** Much of the Timebank's growth in numbers and provision of help for one another has been due to new people coming to the area and seeing this organisation as a way of connecting with their new community.

Another source of interest in Timebank is the ageing population that is contributing to this growth in numbers. These people are attracted to Timebank as a social meeting place but also as a means of obtaining help with tasks that they would previously have performed themselves such as dog walking, help around the house, or transport.

## **Improving Our Wellbeing**

The whole aim of organisations like Lincoln Envirotown is to improve all aspects of our wellbeing.

**Environmental Wellbeing** - is a major goal for our organisation. Such activities as the **Community Gardens** and a well maintained **Mahoe Reserve** provide for the biodiversity and green space that is essential. They also give the areas where people both young and old can be shown the importance of maintaining our threatened environment.

Most of our events are aimed at encouraging concern and care for the environment. **The Kim Hill Discussion** looks at environmental issues; the **craft day** has an environmental theme; the **film competition** encourages people to air their environmental concerns.

**Social Wellbeing** – Lincoln Envirotown promotes free events and projects to which all are invited. We provide recreation and the opportunity to volunteer and enjoy working together at such things as plant outs, working bees, and events. All of these chances to meet and work with a common purpose we see as offering something towards social wellbeing. The exchanging of services by Timebank for all income or age groups also serves this purpose.

**Cultural Wellbeing** – our projects and events welcome people of all cultures and in fact a feature of Timebank is the number of different nationalities represented in its membership. We will continue to work with council to play our part in the important **Matariki Celebrations** and hope to continue our engagement with international students.

**Economic Wellbeing** – essential for our society. Our **Responsible Business** ethos is that businesses consideration of sustainability and community makes for strong economic performance in the long run. We highlight the achievements of our local businesses both through the **Awards** they gain but also through media as we deliver stories about their initiatives and successes. Consumers are encouraged to shop local and made aware of what are local businesses are providing.

## **Climate Change**

Lincoln Envirotown applauds the inclusion of this as a major policy determinant of the Long Term Plan.

We recognise this as a major challenge and in fact all our environmental initiatives and education indirectly impact on climate change. We encourage the people of Selwyn to think about these issues through our educational events such as Film Competitions and Discussions.

More directly we strive to build healthy communities which are also active communities, through promoting walking and cycling. We have had speakers and demonstrations on electric bikes and cars. We publicise through social media car sharing tools and promote the use of cycleways and walking tracks.

A large proportion of our **submissions to council** relate to reducing the need for motor vehicle transport and fossil fuels.

## **Solid Waste Management**

One of the main issues in the **Responsible Business Awards** survey is business's initiatives in relation to re-using, recycling, and problems they encounter in Waste Management. The **networking** events are aimed partially at exploring these processes and possible solutions.

Our most recent AGM was preceded by an excellent talk by Andrew Boyd on the **Reconnect Project** and we look forward to collaborating with Council on this exciting development where we can.

We are consistently aiming to **divert waste from landfill** either by running events solely with this purpose in mind such as **Repair Cafes and Clothes Swaps** or through our media advising households of how to do this.

### IN CONCLUSION

The Lincoln Envirotown Trust appreciate the privileged position we enjoy as a recipient of "strategic partnership" funding. We are very much aware that it would be impossible to provide what we do without the generous long term support we receive.

We believe we deliver many services, events, and other forms of contribution to our Selwyn community and certainly intend to keep doing so.

We hope for, and look forward to a continued productive partnership with Selwyn District Council.

I know you mentioned net funding is available which is great but a wicket would be equally important for the community.

Two small grounds for 5-6 year old games at Brookside Park<sup>97</sup>on smaller wickets in outer corners, was part of the original replan for Brookside when the lights went in to make a total of 6 cricket grounds.

Weedons 3 to be developed in the old entrance corner, there were issues about golf shots but at the moment a large wasted space. Access to it would be a path by the hedge running from the carpark, could be done really well for junior cricket only (5-8 year olds).

Since 2017, Go Hororata has been working on the new Hororata Community Centre project with the Selwyn Council. Through an independent feasibility study and community consultation Go Hororata has proven that a new purpose-built community centre on the Hororata Reserve is needed.

The Hororata Reserve is a unique public asset in the Selwyn District. It is Selwyn so biggest reserve which hosts a wide range of recreation activities and events that don take place anywhere else in the district. A new community centre on the Hororata Reserve would be a great improvement for such a well-used community space. This facility will enhance existing activities and create new opportunities which benefit all of Selwyn.

Go Hororata is a group made up of representatives from 9 different community groups and 3 community representatives. This is a motivated collective that is committed to working together to plan for the development of infrastructure to meet the future needs of the community. Every group involved have signed a statement of intent, this is proof that Go Hororata is a collective of groups representing a majority of the community, not a group of individuals representing their own interests. (See attached statement of intent).

In principle, Go Hororata agree with the preferred option 1 in the Selwyn Districts Long Term Plan consultation document. This is a revised proposal from the original project which was included in the previous LTP in 2017. The original budget was \$4.7 million based on the feasibility study that identified a building that would meet the needs of the community. The fact the Hororata Community Centre project remains in the Long-Term Plan is positive for our community however we question the Council on the new \$3 million budget. Does a \$3 million building meet the needs of our community outlined in the independent feasibility study?

♦ What was taken out of the building to reduce the budget by \$1.7 million? ♦ Is \$3 million the total project cost (i.e. car parks, landscaping) or it is it just the build budget? ♦ Will a \$3 million building on the Hororata Reserve bring the opportunities to all of Selwyn, will it be multi-purpose? ♦ No other community has been asked to invest two-thirds of the costs of a community facility. Is this reasonable? ♦ If the Hororata Community Trust can contribute \$2 million to the \$4.7 million build, SDC will fund \$800,000 - \$1 million from the Reserve Development fund and the sale of the endowment land next to the existing hall. If the ratepayer contribution is \$1.7 - \$2 million, what effect would this have on the district-wide rate?

Over the past four years, we have been working with our community and the Selwyn District Council developing a plan for the new Hororata Community Centre on the Hororata Reserve. With support from the Hororata Community Trust, there has been \$32,000.00 of community money invested towards its development. It is frustrating and disappointing after such a good working relationship being formed over the past four years that the Council just reduced the budget of the build not based on evidence or research but convenience and with no discussion with Go Hororata.

We know with support from the Hororata Community Trust that our united community can achieve the fundraising for this project, but we need the Council to back our community and work with us. There is no other community in Selwyn that has invested so much upfront or is prepared to fundraise as much as Hororata towards a facility that will benefit all of Selwyn. Our community needs this community facility. We have proven time and time again we are a community that works together and succeeds. The Hororata Highland Games, Hororata Glow Festival and all the other community activities that take place on the Hororata Reserve are proof of this. Our community as successes have been proven to benefit the wider Selwyn district.

The existing Hororata Hall is a heritage-listed building in the Selwyn District plan. It has been a well-used and much-loved facility in our community since the 1890 s, however it does not meet the needs of our community moving into the future. The Hororata Historical Society is looking into options to repurpose the existing hall, potentially to house the Hororata Museum. Go Hororata support this concept.

Go Hororata asks the Council to reconsider the Hororata Community Centre project to ensure that the budget meets the needs as identified in the independent feasibility study. This project is worth investing in for the future of the Selwyn District. Go Hororata ask that the Council takes into consideration our actions, our track record and our efforts to date, we may be a small community but we make big things happen. This facility will serve an immediate community need, it will create a hub but it also will bring many opportunities to the wider Selwyn district. ## Statement of Intent 6th April 2021

#### **Background**

Formed in February 2017, Go Hororata is a group made up of representatives from different community groups who are committed to working together to plan for the development of infrastructure to meet the future needs of the community.

The group is focused on developing infrastructure which will see our sense of community retained and enhanced for our future generations.

Go Hororata commissioned an independent feasibility study to identify the community's needs, determine the potential to upgrade the existing Hororata Hall and explore options to better utilise the Hororata Reserve. This study identified three key aspirations within the community, these being;

- 1 Increase the use of the Reserve;
- 2 Have a "fit for purpose" community and event space;
- 3 Develop a Village centre/hub, making best use of existing assets and building on local heritage.

The Proposed Solution is for a modern, multi-purpose Community Centre, to be located in the Reserve, that will;

- serve as the central meeting place, the hub of the community which directly contributes to the wellbeing of people in the rural area surrounding Hororata,
- support cultural, sporting and recreational activities,
- incorporate historic elements, trophies and memorabilia,
- bring new opportunity and use to the Hororata Reserve which benefit all of Selwyn.

The 2017 feasibility study estimated that the new Hororata Community Centre will cost from \$3.3m – \$4.2m (excl. GST). Based on this, GO Hororata has been working collectively to raise community funds to contribute to the project and has been success in having the project included in the Selwyn District Council Long Term Plan for 2023/2024. In the past four years and has, through the Hororata Community Trust, Go Hororata has invested \$32,000.00 towards its development.

In the past 18 months the existing Hororata Hall has been listed as a heritage building in the SDC district plan. The Hororata Historic Society are embarking on a feasibility study to assess the potential of repurposing the existing hall to house and display the Hororata Museum collection.

## Meeting re the Hororata Community Centre 14th December 2020

Held at Duncan Cotterill 4pm - 5.30pm

#### Attendees:

Richard lang (HCT, Chair), Mark Stewart (HCT), Ainsley Walter (HCT), Olive Webb (HCT), Craig Blackburn (Go Hororata), Margaret Cross (Go Hororata/Hororata Citizen Committee), Cindy Driscoll (HCT), Douglas Marshall (SDC)

### **Apologies:**

Dee Innes

Douglas Marshall opened meeting by explaining current situation:

- The new Hororata Community Centre project is not in a positive space
- Post COVID the Councillors asked Douglas to relook at all projects in the annual plan
- As a result of this the project has been removed from the SDC long term plan
- Other community centres there were in the plan Leeston (to still go ahead but possibly reduced), Prebbelton has been pushed back to 2023, the repurposing of the Rolleston Community Centre has been pushed back
- Douglas engaged Hamish Shaw to work on high level costings for three alternative options for the existing hall as an alternative. Hard copies of the proposal were presented to the meeting. These were:
  - Stripping back the hall to its original heritage structure (this would mean no playcentre, no meeting room on the side, no toilets, no kitchen)
  - Stripping back the hall to its original heritage structure but adding onto for Playcentre/kitchen and toilets
  - Re locating the building to the Domain and rebuilding replica of original hall and added on space for playcentre, kitchen and toilets
- As part of this process HSA looked at the existing hall structure and found that there are no heritage elements under the cladding (i.e. no original weatherboards), there is bora in the framing, really the only thing of architectural value is the ceiling. HSA is also producing a report on the heritage value of the building which appears to be more social/cultural than architectural
- Douglas advised that funding for any of these options was not available and there was no funding towards the maintenance of the existing hall in long term plan
- Mark explained where the \$2 million of funding the HCT had committed was coming from (\$2 million from Mark and Ainsley, HCT had \$300,000 in the bank, \$100,000 fundraising event and remained from community/grans etc). There is no doubt the HCT has the ability to put this money into a project. By the Council pulling the project they are walking away from this money. It is likely some current HCT Trustees would resign from the Trust at which point the ability at raise the \$2 million in a short space of time goes. The Council are choosing to leave this money on the table rather than work with the HCT to achieve something for the long-term benefit of the community

It was asked why funding for Hororata had been cut completely from the long-term plan, Douglas explained:

• The Council need to tighten its budget to reduce the rates increases. The targeted rates increase is around 2.99% over the next 10 years

#### Further discussion included:

- The HCT had invested \$32,000 in this project to date in good faith that it was going ahead, this money should be paid back to the HCT by the Council
- Douglas said it is not uncommon for feasibility studies to be done and not used
- This was reputed in that only half of this is the money for the feasibility study the remaining has been spent since the project was included in the long-term plan as the community was of the understanding once it was in the plan it was a sure thing
- The needs of the community for a hall have been proven by an independent study, those needs have not changed
- Douglas expressed it is staggering that the Council's best fundraising partner is the Hororata
   Community Trust and yet the project or any spending in Hororata has been pulled
- Douglas stated the heritage listing on the current hall was unexpected and has complicated the project
- Douglas is not pushing the sale of the farm land at present
- The new waste water dripper field for the new toilets on the Domain can be used for the community centre it was pointed out that where the dripper field was currently planned for was right in the middle of event space on the Domain and this needed to be addressed
- Douglas said there were two halls which had been renovated/rebuilt since earthquakes
  Greenpark and Lakeside, the use of these facilities is still low and Council question if this was
  a wise investment. They see Hororata in the same light as these communities. This view
  completely ignores the events that Hororata already hosts and how active the community is.
  University of Canterbury study found the Hororata Highland Games alone brings a economic
  benefit to Selwyn of \$370,000 annually, this is over \$4 million in the last 10 years, the
  Council is not recognising this
- It was asked what the impact of COVID had on the Council income mostly this was the Orion divided. Lots of projects were already under contract when COVID hit and these all continued. The reducing of projects in the long-term plan was about keeping the rate increases low

## What can the HCT do to get this project back?

- Douglas recommended the HCT meet with elected members Bob Mugford, Jenny Gallagher and Sam Broughton and be prepared to present to Council January or February
- This was met with questions on why should the HCT do that. This had already been done, the need for the community had been proven and now was being removed from the longterm plan without consideration or consultation. The Council should be coming to the HCT as a fundraising partner and offering an alternative project (i.e. one of the low cost options in the HAS presentation tabled) not the other way around
- The HCT is reaching the end of its patience to continue to move forward with projects, spend community money on projects when the Council are not working in good faith and have pulled the rug out from underneath them

- It was asked if the HCT could fund the building could it be built on the Domain without funding from Council, with the HCT being in control of the entire project (contractors etc)

  Douglas said yes it could with a lease agreement and yes the HCT would have full autonomy over the build project)
- It was asked if this was done would the Council then take ownership of the building and pay for its maintenance. Douglas said this would need be put to Council
- It was asked if the community could agree that the new hall be built on the Domain if the current hall land could be sold and money used for the project. Douglas said yes that could happen.
- It was asked if the community agreed to the new hall be built on the Domain if the \$600,000 from the Reserve Development fund could still be allocated to the project. Douglas said yes that could be possible. It would need to be included in the long-term plan
- Douglas said he would support the new building on the Domain with SDC providing funding from the sale of the existing hall land and the development fund, the HCT funding the remainder. It was unclear if this plan progressed if it would be run as a Council project or by HCT.
- The Council had a workshop on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> December 2020 and Douglas would raise the HCT's disappointment and frustration with the project being removed from the plan and would as Council to consider other options i.e. as per above point

Dear Craig

Thank you for your letter of 8 April.

Council is currently consulting on its 2021-2031 Long Term Plan with submissions closing on 30 April.

One of the big decisions in the LTP relates to the Hororata Community Centre and you are seeking further information. In looking back on a number of emails and correspondence between Go Hororata and council representatives in December 2020, I believe that 2 documents being a meeting minute and an email exchange summarise the council position and these are attached.

I can though summarise the council actions in the last 12 months as follows:

- During 2020, council planning for the Hororata Community was based on the \$4.7 million proposal included in the 2018-2028 LTP.
- Council made the decision to include the Hororata Hall as a heritage asset within the
  District Plan. This perhaps is not a major issue for the proposed new community centre
  build, but the council was no longer able to guarantee that it would be able to sell the
  hall or the endowment land to an individual or organisation that might pay the budgeted
  funds from the sale of these assets for funding the new community centre. That
  decision removed \$400,000 from the council funding commitment
- Council and the Selwyn community have had to respond to a variety of Covid 19 related challenges. From a strictly financial perspective, the council has had to look at its future financial commitments for all activities and make appropriate decisions. With regard to the Hororata Community Centre, the council made the decision to remove the proposed new centre from the draft 2021-2031 providing some limited financial provision to maintain the existing hall. This decision was advised to Go Hororata
- After representations from Go Hororata to council representatives in mid December, the council amended its position on the Hororata Community Centre and agreed to consult on the options listed in the draft LTP. The options though are at lower costs being either the:
  - Option1 costed at \$3 million being a 350m2 building with associated carparking, fitout, landscaping and wastewater contribution
  - Option 2 costed at \$3.3 million. This options involves the existing hall being renovated a new annex constructed. This costed option was one of the 4 costing options provided to Go Hororata Representatives at a meeting on 14 December 2020. That meeting was held in the offices of Duncan Cotterill. I

have attached those 4 costings but **please note** that option 2 is the only costed option of the 4 that has progressed.

- o Option 3 which is a minimal spend option on the existing hall.
- Consultation is underway on the draft LTP which as stated above include proposals on the Hororata Community Centre. The feedback we receive will help the council with its decision making but also help with the question you raise as to whether the proposed options meet the community's needs.

Cr Bob Mugford has attended numerous Go Hororata meetings. Similarly council elected members and the council's Group Manager of Property Douglas Marshall have also attended meetings as required. We will continue to provide opportunities for the community to meet and discuss project opportunities as they advance over the coming months.

We look forward to receiving your LTP submission.

Dear Mayor Sam Broughton,

Formed in February 2017, Go Hororata is a group made up of representatives from 9 different community groups who are committed to working together to plan for the development of infrastructure to meet the future needs of the community. The group is focused on developing infrastructure which will see our sense of community retained and enhanced for our future generations.

As you know Go Hororata has been working on the new Hororata Community Centre project for the past 4 years. Through an independent feasibility study and extensive community consultation Go Hororata has proven that a new purpose-built community centre on the Hororata Reserve is what our community needs. This facility will be well used for public and private functions which will have a positive impact on the wellbeing of our rural community. Go Hororata has been working with the SDC on this project for the past four years and has, through the Hororata Community Trust, invested \$36,000.00 towards its development.

In principle, Go Hororata agree with the preferred option 1 in the Selwyn Districts Long Term Plan consultation. However, this is a revised proposal from the SDC from the original project which was included in the previous LTP in 2017. As the SDC did not consult with Go Hororata on these changes we request further information on how the SDC see this project proceeding;

• The original budget for the Hororata Community Centre project accepted into the SDC LTP 2018 was \$4.7 million, this was a multipurpose building which would meet the future needs of the community, based on an independent feasibility study. The proposed reduction of the budget to \$3 million needs to be clarified as to the type and size of the facility and what carparking/landscaping can be achieved with this budget.

What has been reduced/removed from the project to achieve this reduction? Will a \$3 million build still meet the needs of the community?

• The split of Community fundraising vs the SDC investment in this facility is being questioned. The Hororata Community Trust (HCT) funding previously discussed of up to \$2m was in direct relation to the proposed Hororata Community Centre project which was included in the LTP 2018, this was a 50/50 split. The new proposal from the SDC is that the community fundraise for 2/3 of the project and the SDC commit 1/3. There has been no agreement or formal discussion with the HCT or Go Hororata around this funding proposal.

The HCT remains supportive of a community-backed project in Hororata. HCT funding for a community project may be available, but that is subject to the project being supported and approved by the Hororata community (primarily through Go Hororata, at which both HCT and SDC are represented) and in turn approved by HCT. The level of any funding will relate to the specific project and cannot be assumed to be the \$2m figure previously discussed in relation to the Hororata Community Centre project which was confirmed in the 2018 LTP. Any commitment to funding will also be conditional on entry by HCT and SDC into a legally binding agreement clearly defining each party's roles with respect to any project to be funded.

Could you please provide feedback on these questions by the 21st of April in time for the next Go Hororata meeting.

A number of submitters believe that the council has not adequately engaged/consulted on the reasons for the reduced budget being proposed for the new community centre. Council believe it has appropriately informed the community and Go Hororata. A summary of points was provided to Go Hororata on or about 19 April in a letter signed by the Mayor. The key council actions in the last 12 months as follows: During 2020, council planning for the Hororata Community was based on the \$4.7 million proposal included in the 2018-2028 LTP. Council made the decision to include the Hororata Hall as a heritage asset within the District Plan. This perhaps is not a major issue for the proposed new community centre build, but the council was no longer able to guarantee that it would be able to sell the hall or the endowment land to an individual or organisation that might pay the budgeted funds from the sale of these assets for funding the new community centre. That decision removed \$400,000 from the council funding commitment. Council and the Selwyn community have had to respond to a variety of Covid 19 related challenges. From a strictly financial perspective, the council has had to look at its future financial commitments for all activities and make appropriate decisions. With regard to the Hororata Community Centre, the council made the decision to remove the proposed new centre from the draft 2021-2031 providing some limited financial provision to maintain the existing hall. This decision was advised to Go Hororata. After representations from Go Hororata to council representatives in mid December, the council amended its position on the Hororata Community Centre and agreed to consult on the options listed in the draft LTP. The options though are at lower costs being either the:o Option1 costed at \$3 million being a 350m2 building with associated carparking, fitout, landscaping and wastewater contribution o Option 2 costed at \$3.3 million. This options involves the existing hall being renovated a new annex constructed. This costed option was one of the 4 costing options provided to Go Hororata Representatives at a meeting on 14 December 2020. That meeting was held in the offices of Duncan Cotterill. I have attached those 4 costings but please note that option 2 is the only costed option of the 4 that has progressed. o Option 3 which is a minimal spend option on the existing hall.

- 1. With regard to budgeted item to upgrade the overflow (west) carpark at the Lakeside Soldiers Memorial Hall In discussions with Douglas Marshall (23 April 2021) we are advocating a change in priority of this item. The upgrade of the carpark to be postponed to the 2024/2025 financial year.
- 2. The 2021/2022 budget to now be allocated to the construction of a viewing platform, to be built on the east bank Harts Creek adjacent the steps down from the formal lawn. This will provide further enhancement of the site's facilities by creating:

The Hororata Community Trust (HCT) is proud to be part of the Go Hororata collective. This group has worked collectively towards developing the Hororata Community Centre project.

The Council has also been part of Go Hororata from the outset, and staff and Councillors have been there every step of the way. Council staff have advised Go Hororata of what processes needed to be followed to develop this project, Go Hororata have followed these processes and along the way asked the Trust to invest in the project to help move it forward. So far HCT has already invested \$32,000 in the planning for the Community Centre projects.

The HCT committed to raising \$2 million towards the Hororata Community Centre project which was adopted in the 2018 Selwyn Long Term Plan. This was for a \$4.7 million project. The Trust had negotiated with a donor who was willing to donate a significant portion of the \$2 million to be contributed by HCT. HCT has made it clear to the Council on a number of occasions that the \$2 million contribution was only guaranteed for the \$4.7 million project, given this was the project needed by our community as outlined in the Octa Independent Feasibility study and supported by Go Hororata. The \$2 million contribution from the Trust still stands for the \$4.7 million project.

However, the scope and budget for the Hororata Community Centre project included in the 2021 LTP has been substantially revised. The Trust has requested a proposal outlining the scope and design of the revised Hororata Community Centre project as it has been tabled in the 2021 LTP consultation document. This has yet to be tabled therefore the Trust is not currently in the position to commit to any specific level of funding for the modified Hororata Community Centre project. The Trust is guided by Go Hororata and will continue to work as part of this collaborative. Any project that the Trust commits to fundraising for must be approved by Go Hororata, our community.

The HCT was formed specifically to support and enhance the Hororata Community. The HCT is active in achieving its objectives. Amongst other things the HCT has developed two successful major events in Selwyn, these events alone bring

approximately 19,000 people annually to the Hororata Reserve. An economic impact study confirmed that the Hororata Highland Games generates \$370,000 pa for the region, this includes \$110,000 of induced economic activity (or additionally generated spending in the Selwyn District). Additionally, the HCT supports four community events in the Reserve annually. All these events, be they major or community-based, provided input into and would benefit greatly from the original Community Centre facility.

The HCT is committed to supporting our community to develop facilities that will benefit future generations. To date, the HCT has independently invested over \$22,000 in Reserve improvements to assist community events, in addition to the investment of \$32,000 in the development of the original Community Centre Plan referred to above.

The HCT asks the Council to reconsider the reduced budget for the Hororata Community Centre in the 2021 LTP. Consider the effort our community has invested into this project so far. Consider all that the community has independently achieved.

The HCT backs our community, we are asking the Council to do the same.

#### Our Hills, Our Heritage

The Summit Road Society was formed in 1948 to further the vision of Harry Ell to preserve and protect the Port Hills and provide for public access. We own and manage four reserves on the Port Hills, including Omahu Bush and the adjacent Gibraltar Rock Reserve, both of which are within the Selwyn District. We also lead the backyard and community project 'Predator Free Port Hills'. We appreciate the opportunity to provide feedback on the Draft Long Term Plan.

#### **Environmental Wellbeing and Climate Change Mitigation**

We support the well-being statement: "Selwyn's natural landscape and biodiversity are protected". The Selwyn District has some of the finest examples of old remnant bush left on the Port Hills, Omahu Bush being one example. We are facing a climate and ecological emergency and nature-based solutions will be crucial in the days ahead. In 2020, the Council committed to making climate change mitigation and adaptation central to its planning and decision-making.

However, in the 31 pages of the consultation document there is little mention of protecting, restoring and enhancing biodiversity. It is an obvious gap. There is slightly more detail in the full long term plan but it is a very small part of a very long document. We urge the Council to increase its efforts and focus on the natural environment and, most importantly, to ensure these programmes are well-resourced.

#### Increase in the Annual Grant for the Summit Road Society

This is the long term plan. Therefore, we ask the Council to take a long term view. Traditionally we have received a small annual grant/donation from the Council to support our work at Omahu Bush. This funding has been very helpful for future planning and has been used to support weed, pest and predator control as well as track maintenance. However, it is simply not enough to enable us to protect this precious remnant and we are on a funding treadmill to source the money required. Looking forward, we ask the Council to give serious consideration to increasing this annual amount to \$5,000 a year.

#### Support for Pest Free Banks Peninsula and Predator Free Port Hills

Much of the southern Port Hills area is within the Selwyn District. Both Pest Free Banks Peninsula and Te Kākahu Kahukura have a goal to reduce predator numbers to low levels within the southern Port Hills area. Te Kākahu Kahukura is a landscape scale project that seeks to restore a thriving and resilient indigenous forest to the southern Port Hills.

We have a very intensive predator trapping programme at Omahu Bush and are now extending this to include the grazing block and Gibraltar Rock. We are also working to control and eradicate feral deer and pigs, which pose a serious threat to the understory of the bush.

We have been working closely with local residents to grow Predator Free Tai Tapu. Our programme relies on local connections, neighbours talking to neighbours. Tai Tapu residents are excited and enthused about the notion of taking personal action to bring back our native birds, lizards and invertebrates.

At the moment, Selwyn District Council does not financially support either Pest Free Banks Peninsula or Predator Free Port Hills.



### **Selwyn Natural Environment Fund**

We fully support investment in the Selwyn Natural Environment Fund. This is a contestable fund that provides landowners with support to protect and enhance indigenous biodiversity. However, the amount in the fund is much too small, given the climate and ecological crises we face. The fund should be significantly increased, with a dedicated portion set aside for the southern Port Hills.

### Access from Tai Tapu to the Summit Road

We have been working with Council staff around options to improve recreational access from Tai Tapu to the Summit Road. At the moment, the closest access to the Summit Road is via Gebbies Pass or Dyers Pass. This issue has been raised many times by local residents – the community want the opportunity to access the hills from the Selwyn District side. While this project is still in its early days, we ask the Council to plan ahead for the resourcing needed, such as staff time and signage.

We would like the opportunity to speak to our submission.

With the increase in subscriptions to SNEF and the impending National Policy Statement for Indigenous Biodiversity, which will likely increase Councils responsibly and resource commitment in this area increased funding has merit for consideration and may be required in the future.

## **Submission to Selwyn District Council Long Term Plan 2021-2031**

#### 1. What are we asking for?

That previous strategic partnership funding for 24-7 YouthWork services in Selwyn be renewed as part of the Long-Term Plan 2021-2031. This would be in support of the Council's social wellbeing goal.

## 2. Why is this needed?

Selwyn District has a rapidly increasing and relatively young population. Selwyn's population is projected to rise about 25% by 2031. This implies a rapidly rising demand for youth work services over the next decade and beyond. Table 1 below shows the relative youthfulness of Selwyn District's population.

Table 1: Percentage of Population aged 0-19 years by sex.

Selwyn District has a significantly higher proportion of children and young people than Christchurch City and New Zealand overall. On a population basis alone Selwyn District has above average need for youth work services and will have for a long time to come. Combine this with a rapidly growing context where services of all kinds are scrambling to keep up and the need is intensified.

#### 3. Why 24-7 YouthWork?

24-7 YouthWork is a proven research-backed model for providing wide coverage low intensity, youth work. It is highly compatible with more intensive counselling or social work services and multiplies their impact. 24-7 YouthWork was founded by veteran youth workers who realised that the best way to connect with young people was to go where they are and for most young people a lot of the time that is school. A connection made there enables connection to services and groups outside of school.

Additionally, 24-7 YouthWork is local, for everyone and inexpensive.

- a. 24-7 YouthWork is New Zealand's largest provider of school-based youth work with 175 workers serving 83 schools but it is a decentralised, intensely local network. It is about the local community, schools and churches working together for the benefit of their local young people. The national network provides support, advice, and quality control but every service is locally autonomous and locally responsible.
- b. 24-7 YouthWork is designed to serve every young person, not just those in crisis because positive preventative work is also powerfully beneficial. Schools often deploy youth workers for specific groups of young people, but our service is available to any young person regardless of their race, gender, religion, background or choices.
- c. 24-7 YouthWork is inexpensive. A typical two worker service costs about \$40,000 per year with funding built around a shared community/school/church partnership.

## 4. What is the current situation?

Presently services have been established in seven schools in Selwyn with youth workers being sent by fie different groups as described in table 2 below.

Together these youth workers serve about 5,300 young people. We expect additional schools to request services within the next 12 months.

### 5. Why can't we fund this stuff without inclusion in the Long-Term Plan?

Historically Selwyn District Council has been a generous supporter of 24-7 YouthWork services but Council funding schemes outside of strategic partnership are not really set up to support extensive social services. Take the Selwyn Community Fund for example; since 24-7 budgets include school funding all 24-7 YouthWork services are ineligible in their entirety for this fund according to the stated criteria. This combined with the end of the previous strategic partnership funding could be a fatal combination for some services.

Certainly, groups can and should look to extend their funding pool from sources such as Lotteries, Rata Foundation, and other funders but there is no 'silver bullet' in community fundraising. Funding for community organisations is endemically unstable.

#### 6. How can Council be sure that the local services are doing a good job?

All the groups involved are already known to Council and for the sake of brevity we haven't included a lot of their data in this submission. However, we have attached two term reports and a newspaper article to convey the flavour of what we do. When we submit in person, we will also provide a short but comprehensive statistical overview of all services.

Monday has been a great day for Mana to be in school as he has enjoyed the quiet setting with some of the students away at tech. It has given space to spend more time with different students.


It's been nice also being our second year in school and being able to build on relationships from last year rather than starting from scratch. We've valued times in the staffroom also and being able to get to know staff better.


overcome the tasks and challenges that Ben set for them.

Many ratepayers (especially those in tourism, hospitality, retail sectors) are still struggling with impact of Covid and every aspect of our rates appears to be in for large increases. The SDC cannot expect reduction in water usage when they are approving large developments, where water use will be high in the first couple of years as the new ratepayers are establishing lawns and gardens. #### **Staff Comments**

Malvern Aquatic facilities: The demand analysis work on aquatic facilities undertaken leading into the preparation of the LTP did not support a new indoor pool for Darfield in the earlier years of the plan. The current plan is to upgrade the existing pool to keep it running and to improve water quality and temperature to enable time to consider future aquatic facility options for Darfield. This would include assessing the demand from population growth plus the impact on demand from the extension to the Selwyn Aquatic Centre. The intention is to carry out more planning work in 2027/28 to gauge demand and a provisional budget for a new facility is provided in 2030 in the LTP. The planning work will also help to determine the best location for the pool and other ancillary service/facilities that could be considered.

Coalgate Reserve Toilets: The current level of use for this reserve makes it difficult to support public toilet provision. It is not used for any organized sport but has some recreational facilities for casual use (tennis court, BMX track, walking track etc.) and overall use is relatively low. It is, however, one of the larger recreation spaces that does not have a public toilet available. If Council was to support this submission it is estimated that it would cost \$160,000 to \$200,000 to provide a single cubicle toilet in this location with the cost of installing an effluent system likely to be high. This includes installation of a water supply and drinking fountain. Annual operating costs are estimated to be \$10,000 per year. A toilet with a holding tank would be less to install (\$100,000) but would have higher ongoing operating costs (\$12,500 pa). This project would need to be mainly funded by rates (targeted rate for recreation reserves) but a small portion of growth funding (reserve DCs) could be applied.

Kirwee Reserve Development: Budgets have been provided in the LTP to continue development of the reserve in accordance with the master plan. A total of \$1.1 million is provided over the 10 years for this project.

Council acknowledges the Boards support for the activities already in the proposed LTP. It is noted the waterway concern with the Coalgate Bridge which has been directed to Road maintenance staff, however as it will be appreciated, any river works require the approval of ECan subject to the conditions they will apply. Through Councils Safe Network Programme identified with the NZTA there is a planned project to install safety barriers on the Waimakiriri Gorge Rd through the cuttings down to the bridge in 2021-24. Council has raised the issue with the Rakaia Gorge Rd SH77 approach to the NZTA previously. Their view may change with the advent of the national Safe Network Programme being introduced as part of Road to Zero. The funding for the construction of a cycleway between Kirwee, Darfield and Springfield is programmed to occur starting with in Kirwee - Darfield 2032/33, Darfield to Sheffield 2038/39 and Sheffield to Springfield 2043/44. The combined estimated cost for this is \$9.2 million. It is intended to first consider the feasibility and need for these links as part of the "Mountains to Sea" Cycleway feasibility study planned for 2022/23 before any further actions are undertaken or decisions taken on these projects, which on their own are expected to have a low

use rate compared <sup>180</sup>the cost and complexity involved. These projects are identified in Councils 2018 Walking and Cycling Strategy and Action Plan which considered how to best link townships together with cycleways. The suggestion to install a cycleway on top of the proposed Darfield to Burnham/Rolleston sewer pipeline installation does not follow any effective route as part of Councils strategy to progressively link Selwyn Central and Malvern main townships together. At an estimated cost of up to \$5.8 million for the pipeline route this would go some significant way to fund the preferred township cycleway linkages that sit outside this proposed LTP.

We wish to be heard in support of our submission.

#### Summary

In November 2018, the Council was one of 14 foundation signatories to the Pest Free Banks Peninsula / Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū Memorandum of Understanding. This formalised the community lead programme to protect and enhance biodiversity on the Peninsula through the widespread eradication of animal pests.

Substantial progress has been on this project. With significant funding support from the Department of Conservation and Environment Canterbury, we now have a \$10M, 5-year programme, employing 13 staff and targeting eradication programmes for Kaitorete and the Extended Wildside (20,000ha on the south-eastern Banks Peninsula). These are the first areas in a progressive programme to eradicate animal pests, such as possums, rats, stoats and feral cats from the Peninsula. Alongside this there is a programme to remove feral goats from the Peninsula and a substantial work programme to engage with households and community-based groups for local trapping programmes. In the southern Port Hills we have proudly supported Te Kākahu Kahukura alongside other community and organisational partners.

In the 2021/2031 LTP, we are seeking Council support to expand the community-based trapping programme, the control of larger feral animals (such as feral goats, pigs and deer) on the Port Hills around Tai Tapu, and the control of smaller animal pests adjacent to the south-western end of Kaitorete.

#### **Funding sought**

In this context we ask the Council for funding of \$20,000 per annum, starting in the 2021/2022 financial year, to protect biodiversity from animal pests through the community lead Pest Free Banks Peninsula / Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū programme.

#### The community based trapping programme

The purpose of this programme is to compliment the eradication programmes (which undertaken mainly undertaken with paid staff or skilled volunteers) with a programme for households and community groups. We have a goal of having 4,000 households actively involved in local trapping for rats, stoats and possums by 2024. Throughout New Zealand, there is a rapidly growing interest for the vision of being predator free. Here in Greater Christchurch, we continue to see growing interest and participation.

Experiences in other centres across Aotearoa New Zealand have demonstrated this demand will continue to grow rapidly. In Wellington, for example, there is now extensive coverage of these groups across the city and a Wellington City Council survey found 92 percent of rate payers supported the initiative. We want to stay ahead of this high level of demand and have the systems in place to coordinate and support these community-based efforts for effective eradication of pests and enhancement of native wildlife.

There are many willing volunteers, but they need knowledge and organisation to make their efforts rewarding and effective. The funding requested would enable us to provide that. This support is provided collaboratively with a number of other community groups such as the Summit Road Society, Predator Free Port Hills and other groups.

#### **Eradication of larger browsing animal pests**

Pest Free Banks Peninsula has a goal of eradicating feral goats from the Peninsula by 2024. Past efforts have demonstrated this is an achievable goal with dramatic benefits for biodiversity, the economy and carbon sequestration. This programme is a genuinely collaborative effort, with widespread community input and support across the Peninsula, and supported by staff from the Department of Conservation, Christchurch City Council and the Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust.

The photos to the right show before and after the removal of goats. This demonstrates the biodiversity and climate change (carbon sequestration) benefits, which remain persistent and urgent issues that are widely supported by the community and require continued and sustained effort.

In addition to goats, feral pigs and feral deer are causing extensive destruction of biodiversity in public and private land, including areas around Tai Tapu. Council assistance is



sought in controlling these animals and reducing the damage they cause.

#### About Pest Free Banks Peninsula / Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū

Pest Free Banks Peninsula / Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū is a collaborative programme to protect and enhance biodiversity on the Peninsula through the widespread eradication of animal pests. In November 2018, it was formalised through a Memorandum of Understanding signed by 14 foundation signatories, including the Council. Other signatories include the Department of Conservation, the Rod Donald Banks Peninsula Trust, the Summit Road Society, Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust, Environment Canterbury, the Cacophony Project, Living Springs, Ōnuku

Rūnanga, Selwyn District Council, Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke (Rāpaki) Rūnanga, Te Rūnanga o Koukourārata, Te Taumutu Rūnanga, Wairewa Rūnanga and the Quail Island Trust.

Community based initiatives, such as this, have many benefits. While nominally this is about protecting and enhancing biodiversity, it also creates a sense of belonging and connection between people, their neighbours and communities. In good times, such initiatives provide a sense of purpose and achievement. In times of crisis, as we have experienced too often over recent years, the connections with others are even more critical: they provide a network through which people communicate and share, helping our emotional and mental well-being.

As a biodiversity initiative, there numerous benefits. It provides a connection to our natural world and supports a healthier environment through various mechanisms, such as less erosion leading to better water quality in rivers and streams. It supports improved mahinga kai. It provides economic benefits for tourism and farming, as well as innovators such as the Cacophony Project. For climate change, the removal of wild browsing animals supports carbon sequestration. In our operations, we are working closely with the Ngāi Tahu Rūnanga on Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū.

This submission has been prepared by the Pest Free Banks Peninsula Project Management Group, established as part of the governance and management arrangements outlined in the Pest Free Banks Peninsula MOU.

With the increase in subscriptions to SNEF and the impending National Policy Statement for Indigenous Biodiversity, which will likely increase Councils responsibly and resource commitment in this area increased funding has merit for consideration and may be required in the future.

Hororata needs appropriate community facilities but I am concerned that it has been suggested that when the proposed new centre is built at Hororata that the Glenroy Hall will be closed and groups currently using the Glenroy Hall will be expected to instead travel to the further away new centre at Hororata. The Glenroy Hall is a heritage building and the heart of a dispersed rural community that has no other community facilities. We highly value our community hall at Glenroy and it is the core of our rural community and regularly used for a multitude of different uses. Rural communities are at risk of depression and this risk is increased when people become isolated - the Glenroy Hall is conveniently central to the rural Glenroy farming area and used as a meeting place for many community events and is how new arrivals to the area meet their neighbours. While it may seem to council staff based in Rolleston that the distance from Glenroy to Hororata is not great, this extra travel distance (we would be travelling past the hall) will unfortunately be a barrier to users of the Glenroy Hall relocating and most user groups are unlikely to relocate - also importantly Glenroy Community events would be lost. The Glenroy Community Hall is also the Civil Defence centre for the Glenroy area and is strategically located on the Inland Scenic Route (SHW77)

#### Q10 OTHER COMMENTS

Darfield swimming pool - Pool current usage is stated as one the reasons for not replacing the poor pool facilities but current usage is depressed by the state of the facility and the lack of year round usability. While growing at a slower rate than Rolleston the western areas of Selwyn centred around Darfield are still growing. Learning to swim is very important and travelling large distances to lessons at Rolleston Aquatic Centre is a barrier to many families. The Darfield swimming pool needs replaced with an all year round facility.

Climate Change - There seems to be a strong focus on centralising ammenities and facilities on Rolleston and an expectation that Selwyn residents will all travel to Rolleston but this leads to negative environmental effects due to vehicle use. As a district Selwyn needs to do more to ensure facilities and ammenities are available in all areas of the district so residents can minimise their carbon footprint from transport. For example currently residents in the Glenroy/Windwhistle area are expected to drive a 100km or more return trip to Rolleston to the Pines Resource Park to drop off their recycling as there are no recycling facilities for this part of Selwyn.

The Edge Connector is a great service that has the added benefit of reducing distances rural residents have to travel - please ensure it continues to be funded as we really love it.

Q1 KEEPING WATER SUPPLY SAFE

Avoid chlorination

Chlorinated water is not safe. Safe from pathogens mostly, yes. But not safe in terms of damaging effects to the Body over time, particularly: 1. The Micro-biome in the gut, which is THE most important factor in ensuring a healthy immune system. When the damage to the Micro-biome becomes permanent, degenerative diseases will manifest as a result of malnutrition. No amount of Pharmaceutical medicine will cure those problems. If both are healthy, and function as nature intended, we are making huge progress towards being or becoming disease free) 5. When we will shower, the Chlorinated water will over time have lasting effects on our scalp and our hair. Our scalp will dry out, and our hair will become thinner and in places not re-grow. The Ladies particularly, won't be happy with that! In addition, there is an acidic reaction to the skin, interfering with its function and health. Also, extra moisturizers will be required. 6. Finally, our Lungs can also be damaged from regularly inhaling chlorine fumes when in the shower. Again, this especially affects young kids, as their lungs are more vulnerable to the exterior environment.

Dear Council, our water right now is simply FANTASTIC! Every time I drink water, I am grateful and happy that we enjoy such fantastic water. I am proud that my Council delivers such wonderful water. Let's maintain this at all costs. The illnesses that Chlorine will cause, will result in MASSIVE costs to the Health system, and thus to the Taxpayer, down the line. Those costs will FAR outweigh the savings of using Chlorine in our water now. And what about the miseries caused to the patients? This is also why I am mystified why the Government allows Chlorine in our water...... Perhaps they are not aware of the consequences of doing so. Finally: Countries like Holland, Denmark, Austria, etc have outlawed Chlorine in the water, as a consequence of knowing the consequences and refusing to look the other way. We too can do what's best for our ratepayers in the long term. If Holland, such a tiny country, only the size of Canterbury, where over 18 million

people live & work, with massive industries and extremely dense living can have a clean & chlorine free water system, why can't we? Sorry, but isn't it a no-brainer? Our greatest Wealth is our Health.

I would prefer to see a portion of the proposed transport budget set aside for alternatives. In the 10 year summary of proposed roading and transport improvements there is \$8m of a total of \$132m for alternatives. This is 6%. There are cities that have committed 25% of their transport budget to active transport. I think the council should be aiming for at least 10%. The proposed walking and cycling facilities are for areas where few trips are made. Active transport needs to be an alternative to the short trips residents are undertaking in town centres so spending needs to be prioritised in these area. Rolleston has 86% of their population traveling to work by car, most of which are single occupancy. The national average is 73%. This is not something to be proud of. This high car use has negative impacts on each of the four well-being goals identified by the Council. Taking serious steps to provide viable alternatives is required if teh Council wish to improve the well-being of its residents.
