The mayor's introduction to the online LTP submissions, states "When we were preparing this plan, you told us you wanted a sustainable Selwyn, <u>a place where people could live without needing to go anywhere else</u> and we want to deliver this."

Then he and the councillors need to decide that the residents at Selwyn Huts can continue to live here. With the sewer system being upgraded - not entirely at the council's expense - the Hut owners should be permitted to live there for at least the next 50 years, not the insulting potential offer of 15 years.

Add the Selwyn Huts to the District Wide Rating for their water and sewer.

- (a) We will soon be on the same sewer system as Leeston who pay DWR and we have previously paid for our sewer ourselves and a subsequent upgrade, the requirement we were told for being put on DWR.
- (b) We have already paid for the water upgrade.
- (c) We should not be discriminated against and should be treated like everyone else in the district.
- (d) We already pay DWR for Recreation Reserve Rate; General Purpose Rate; Library Charge; Community Centre Rate; Uniform Annual General Rate; Water Race (Amenity) Rate; Area Board; Swimming Pools; Canterbury Museum Levy; and Land Drainage. We should also be added to the DWR for Sewer and Water like everyone

else.

(e) Towards25 LTP Document stated:

"The Council is proposing to introduce a new way of funding water and wastewater, community centres/halls and recreation reserves. These services are currently funded through targeted rates and the Council is proposing to meet the costs of these services by introducing standard district-wide rates. Underpinning this proposal is the view that Selwyn should be seen as one integrated district, rather than simply a series of detached townships. The Council acknowledges that where residents across the district receive a similar level of service for key infrastructure, the cost to residents should also be consistent. In the case of water and wastewater this proposal will also help keep these services affordable for smaller communities."

This document also has USH specifically listed in the "Proposed district-wide rate for urban water compared with existing targeted rates" table.

From this we conclude there was a clear intention to include USH in the DWR for sewer and water. This is even more relevant now we will soon be on the same sewer system as Leeston.

- (f) Buddle Findlay's Legal Opinion dated 04/03/2019 states "We note that the Council has recently tended to move to a model where the costs of provision of network infrastructure (such as waste water infrastructure) are spread across the district (ie under district wide targeted rates). It would go against the trend for the Council now to look to recover the greater costs of continuing to provide water services to the [Upper Selwyn] Huts solely from that community."
- (g) Council has already agreed to fund 70% of the sewer upgrade, indicating the district is prepared to pay towards USH sewer upgrade. There is no good reason why the Council couldn't find the full amount. This was proposed in 4.12.4 of the "Upper Selwyn Huts Future Occupancy Strategy" report dated 04/03/2024.
- (h) The cost and operational charges for the pipeline continue to change so being on the DWR would give the community certainty. It would also mean that if people choose to leave the settlement early the cost will not increase for the remaining owners.
- (i) Additionally we also request that our reticulation system be replaced by SDC as they have been responsible for this since 1989 and have had ample time to replace this.

Given the reasons above there is no reason why USH Can not be put on the DWR for Sewer and Water like everyone else.

1. Historical value

...

The Mayor says in the Long Term Plan that "we're focussed on looking after what we already have" - how about you look after us!

An 1881 plan shows the reserve on which the huts would come to be established was in existence and by the 1890's at the latest there were huts established there, mainly for fishing and hunting. Given this ...

... are short term and ultimately for a finite period'. At its 13 March 2024 meeting Council resolved to accept option 2 (of 4 options) and offered Residents a final 15 year term for occupation of their huts.

We request this historical significance be recognised and for the Selwyn Huts to be listed as an historical site on the District Plan and for the term for us being here to be extended to protect this history.

District wide rates

Selwyn Huts need to be put on DWR for Water and Sewer. The reasons being:

- (a) We will soon be on the same sewer system as Leeston who pay DWR and we ...
- ... pay towards USH sewer upgrade. There is no good reason why the Council couldn't fund the full amount. This was proposed in 4.12.4 of the "Upper Sekwyn Huts Future Occupancy Strategy" report dated 04/03/2024.
- (h) The cost and operational charges for the pipeline continue to change so being on the DWR would give the community certainty. It would also mean that if people choose to leave the settlement early the cost will not increase for the remaining owners.
 - (i) Additionally we also request that our reticulation system be replaced by SDC as they have been responsible for this since 1989 and have had ample time to replace this.

Given the reasons above there is no reason why Selwyn Huts cannot be put on the DWR for Sewer and Water like everyone else.

- The Selwyn Huts should be listed as a history site on the District Plan. It pre-dates the 1900s so is an archaeological site under Heritage Pouhere Taonga Act
- All homes and all people should be protected. It's inhumane and disgusting to evict the Selwyn Huts residents from their home. Review the 15 year finite term and let us stay. This also helps preserve our kiwi history!!!
- It's unfair not to include Selwyn Huts on the District Wide Rate for water and sewer. Excluding a community in the district goes against the purpose of introducing the DWR in the first place. The legal opinion from Council's own lawyers has highlighted this. We should not be discriminated against and should be treated like everyone else in the district
- Replace the reticulation system. Council have been in charge of this since 1989 and dropped the ball by not doing any
 maintenance and upgrades over the last 35 years. Don't use your incompetence as an excuse to make us pay or to kick us
 out







Prebbleton – An area of significant population size and projected population growth, and the existing community hall is no longer suitable or able to cope with demand. The existing Hall is on a small site (already has maximum site coverage) and there are currently issues with a lack of on-site car parking with the facility located on a main arterial road. The Strategic Plan (2013) made a recommendation to replace this facility with a larger more flexible 'hub' facility, to cope with population growth and provide support to smaller 'local' facilities nearby (Ladbrooks, Broadfield). A site for the facility has yet to be confirmed, but options include the Prebbleton Domain where it could consolidate facilities and create a community recreation hub. There is no

area for future expansion of either the building or parking on the existing site. A larger facility would also assist with local school needs, who have outgrown their current hall. The project is currently planned for 2019-21 with an indicative cost of \$5.5 million.

Long Term Plan 2021 - 2031

\$6.3 million allocated to be built 2025 - 2026



note the Council's decision was to go ahead with construction starting in 2025/26

However the draft LTP 2024-2034 no longer has a date for building this facility. There is only a mention on page 51 of planning to do further investigations on the likely costs of these facilities (Prebbleton and two new proposals in Rolleston) over the next three years, with a plan to build them between 2027-2034, if consultation is positive once plans and costs are known.

This is simply not good enough. Prebbleton has waited long enough and needs this facility now.

We expect SDC to put this project back in the LTP for 2025/26, and to do the right thing by your constituents in Prebbleton, who are feeling distinctly uncared for and poorly represented.

Subject: Long Term Plan Consultation- Broadfield Garden

Ηi

The owner of Broadfield Garden enquired of the mayor in October 2023 whether SDC would purchase Broadfield Garden and make it free to visitors. The Mayors office replied suggesting that a submission be made when the 10 year plan was out for consultation.

An intention of the 10 year plan is to make the Selwyn District self sufficient in places to live, work and play. The purchase of Broadfield provides an immediate resource established 30 years, ready now for visitors at a cost and time much less that starting afresh.

It has 18 discrete areas, designed by an award winning Landscape Architect and is recognised by N Z Gardens Trust (an association of council and privately owned gardens that are open to visitors). The Trust assesses the members gardens 3 yearly and awards a grading (generally 3 to 6 stars). Dunedin Botanic Garden established 150 years and Hamilton Botanic Garden have both been awarded 6 stars. Broadfield has also been awarded 6 stars, a recognition by its peers. The soils are highly desirable Templeton silt loams with excellent drainage, a big plus compared to those at Lincoln and Prebbleton. Unusually it does not have a house to detract from its purpose as a significant garden. A dwelling would likely be an inconvenience and significant additional cost from a Councils perspective.

Gardens are highly biodiverse, a detailed biodiversity audit has been done on a garden in the U K, Great Dixter which is of similar size to Broadfield but much older and 2,400 different species have been identified. See 'Great Dixter biodiversity"

There is a garden known as Pukuiti in Taranaki established by a Private Trust that was open to visitors and was attracting 7,200 visitors p a charging an admission fee to assist with maintenance. It has been acquired by Taranaki Regional Council, made free to visitors and now attracts 57,000 visitors p a. It is located 23 km from the nearest significant population centre of New Plymouth and the distance from the built up area does not appear to be a significant detraction. Broadfield Garden is located midway between the 3 biggest population centres in Selwyn District 7 km from Rolleston library, 8 km from Lincoln library and 7 km from Prebbleton 'Station'.

Gardeners prominent in the N Z context, employed by Local Authorities that are familiar with Broadfield Garden that might be prepared to comment on Broadfields significance, design and planting include;

Other prominent gardeners familiar with Broadfield Garden that might be willing to comment include;

Margaret Barker Founder and Owner of Larnoch Castle and Garden Business

Alan Jolliffe President Royal N Z Institute of Horticulture

The motivation in offering the garden to SDC is that the owner is aged 74 has completed 30 years and his two sons are not enthusiastic about taking it on. Two couples that have shown interest in the property want it for a private dwelling site in which case it would be unlikely to be available to visitors. If SDC purchased it as a 'reserve' it might

increase the financing options and the hope is it would continue to be available to visitors, preferably free, like other Council owned gardens in N Z.

The key issue like any garden is to do the right things at the right time and as efficiently as possible. There are large areas that are low maintenance and much smaller areas that are detailed and higher maintenance. From my accumulated experience I can ensure this happens for as long as I am involved and could write a detailed description and maintenance manual.

The garden has been developed and maintained by the owner working 2 days a week, one contractor now working 5 days per week, (here 8 years and wants to continue under a new owner) and 1 man 1 day per week (here 14 years), total 8 man days per week, roughly equivalent to 1.6 FTE In addition I have a very good Lincoln student that does occasional days during term time, his second year here. A previous helper Dave Fals stayed 17 years. We have found it easy to attract and retain good staff. The owner is prepared to continue 2 days a week for at least 1 year, if health holds up longer and does not need to be paid.

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





As with the last SDC LTP, which SOC submitted on, the word 'sustainability' features in the introduction from Mayor Broughton and throughout the consultation document. We are encouraged that the idea of sustainability is front and centre to the Council and as indicated in the introduction is front and centre to the people of Selwyn district as it came through as such in the pre-consultation you did for this plan.

Last time we felt there was something of a mismatch between the intent and the content of the plan. We hope there is a better match this time between the intent and the content and feel encouraged to think this is the case by some of what we are being consulted on.

Big decision 1.

Public Transport.

SOC strongly support the public transport proposals in this plan.

We choose Option 2

We also support the \$75,000 being spent on a business case exploring new public transport services that might be provided by SDC given the restraints on ECan and the needs and wishes of the people of Selwyn.

We note that the people of Selwyn want to be able to "live without needing to go anywhere else". This sense of place is important to people but there also needs to be an ability for connection. Connection within the district and connection with the nearby metropolitan centre that provides the access to services and agencies that currently are not available locally to residents.

We also thank SDC for what appears to be your positive, constructive role in the Greater Christchurch Partnership, and thank you for joining with other councils to support Mass Rapid Transport and joined up thinking about public transport in the wider region.

Within Selwyn we support the people asking for connections between centres. SOC supported last LTP plans for cycleways; and while we know the distances between places make this perhaps

less attractive to many than public transport options we would still like to see cycleways planning and development as part of the mix. They do not have to be 'gold plated'.

It is exciting to see the recreational cycleways that you are investigating from Arthur's Pass through the region, and the one around Te Waihora- Lake Ellesmere and look forward to the completion of the studies on these. These should not be the total commitment to cycling in the SDC area though.

The Lincoln Town Centre upgrades need to include walking and cycling improvements as well as traffic calming. We note this is in the plan and urge Council to make sure these happen.

Big Decision 2

The development of the Leeston Library and Community hub.

SOC support Option 2

We commend that the plans for this to be built include the use of 21st Century materials and technology that place an emphasis on sustainability and appear to recognise the build is occurring as we face a climate crisis.

Libraries in Greater Christchurch are proven centres of community and the plans for meeting rooms and community space will ensure this is no exception. This development appears to be following best practice all round and the strong connection between Council and mana whenua in its development is pleasing to see. It is unfortunate that costs have escalated but it would be in our view false economy to stop this now.

Selwyn is a region with enormous potential and stunning natural assets from the Liffey Stream to Te Waihora, to a township in the middle of a national park. These natural features and the biodiversity within them desperately need your protection. We urge SDC to prioritise this work, and continue to support work with community groups, to protect (as the first priority), enhance and where necessary restore habitat for biodiversity. The Upper Waimakariri is an area of significance in terms of endemism and the responsibility to care fo our biodiversity 'back yard' falls to all including SDC.

Looking after the natural world does not need to mean the end of economic development. We support the \$9 million dollar spend but wish to pull out and emphasise the terms "Sustainable and strategic" and "innovative business growth" used in that section of the consultation document. The potential for business, local government and community to partner in creative ways that support the natural world and that might potentially mitigate against the climate and ecological crises we face is no more apparent than in the proposal of Lincoln University and Orion and to partner around transitional sustainable energy solutions for the district.

Te Waihora while not the lake it should be is still an amazing place and the commitment and combined efforts of mana whenua, Council and others to take better care of it into the future mean things will hopefully improve over time.

To have really successful ecological efforts, however, we do need wide community understanding and buy in. This requires research, as well as education and awareness raising. We must return as a society to making evidence- based intelligent responses to the real world challenges we face. We ask that SDC support this including supporting monitoring and other programmes designed to gather the information needed for positive change.

Congratulations to SDC for your excellent recycling centre.

With the demographic of the Selwyn region veering toward more youth, having sustainability oriented services, public transport and active transport options and valuing the natural world are all things SDC should be embracing.

The days of Selwyn being lauded (at least by some) as the land of "milk and money" must be seriously in the rear view mirror. The damage done must be addressed including the costs associated with securing safe low nitrate drinking water. Beyond that there is pay back to the natural world that paid such a heavy price for that 'prosperity'.

The younger people in this community hoping to live out healthy, happy lives; many are looking for change. They are not the only ones. It is good to see the ways in which the Selwyn District Council appear to be listening.

Selwyn District Council 2024-34 Long Term Plan submission

The Rolleston Residents Association (RRA) would like to thank the Selwyn District Council (SDC) for the opportunity to submit on the Councill's draft 2024-34 Long Term Plan (LTP).

The Rolleston Residents Association would like to present and speak to its submission at a suitable hearing date and time.

The Rolleston Residents Association requests that it be given a longer time to present thiis submission to Council given the number of submission points (29) in this submission.

The RRA is generally in support of the draft LTP. We acknowledge the efforts of SDC staff and elected members in preparing the draft LTP in these difficult economic times.

New Items not already in the draft LTP

1) Selwyn Aquatic Centre Weekend Opening Hours

The RRA requests that the weekend opening hours for the Selwyn Aquatic Centre be changed from 8am-8pm to 7.30am-7.30pm

Reason:

With the current 8 am opening time there is less than 30 minutes for pool users to use the pools before the swim school begins. Many, primarily older, users prefer to exercise outside of swim school hours. This is not possible with an 8am opening time.

If the Aquatic Centre opened at 7.30 am on weekends then users would have about 45 minutes to exercise before swim school classes begin. Speaking with many users this would be a sufficient time for them to exercise.

The swim school sees no problem with this as they w. ould not start earlier except for a small number of private 1:1 lessons. Lifeguards and Aquatic Centre management did not oppose this proposed changed. Lifeguards and Aquatic Centre management also report that the Aquatic Centre is generally very quiet from 7.30pm to 8.00 pm on Saturday and Sunday evenings.

Finally this is a cost neutral proposal as a the centre would still be open on for 12 hours on the weekend.

2) Libraries open on public holidays

The RRA requests the libraries open on public holidays excluding Christmas Day, New Years Day and Anzac morning.

Reason:

Libraries in our district are shut on most public holidays. This is perverse as public holdidays are the very day families could go to the library together. Programmes don't need to be run, but libraries should be open on public holidays.

3) Walking network of Park Benches in townships

The RRA request that 20 park benches / year for 10 years be installed in Selwyn's townships to establish a walking network in the townships to enable young and old to walk and sit and walk and sit as they move through out townships. (Maintenance will be required.) This is a district wide project not a Rolleston focused project.

This should be incorporated into Selwyn's Youth and Ageing strategies

Reason:

For parents with young children and older residents it is hard to walk longer distances without having somewhere to have a rest before continuing one's walk. This project would establish a network or path through our townships where people can walk, sit, walk sit. It could link our facilities (parks/reserves/community centres) with our town centres.

Staff report that the installed cost per bench is around \$3,271 so the cost of this project would be about \$66,000/year or about \$4/household/year – less than a cup of coffee per year.

Staff also advised that there is \$115,250 in the LTP for the whole 10 years for additional park furniture (seats, picnic tables) in townships which would fund 30-40 items. While acknowledging this the RRA considers 3-4 items per year to be insufficient and recommends the higher number (20 per year) of items be purchased & installed.

4) Boundary Planting at the District Park

The RRA requests that boundary planting at the District Park be undertaken in this (2024) winter or spring.

Reason:

With development of the District Park to happen in the next few years it is important to get boundary planting done early to give it some chance to establish prior to the park being used. Planting this season will give the boundary shelter extra time to establish.

Staff have advised against this advising "We are not in favour of planting up the boundary of the park yet as we do not have any plans completed for the layout of the park (Masterplan). Until we have an understanding of the general layout (eg. Roading, Carpark areas, entrances etc) we are not in a position to plant up the boundaries without risking having to remove large areas of planting"

While acknowledging staff concerns the RRA considers the benefits of boundary planting in 2024 outweighs the issues/objections from council staff.

5) Tennyson Street traffic control/signage from reserve boundary to Kidman/Byron Street. The RRA requests further speed limit signage and road markings in Tennyson Street from the reserve boundary to the Kidman/Byron Street intersection.

Reason:

Residents have observed and reported that many vehicles heading northbound on Tennyson Street are not observing the 30 kmh speed limit once the vehicles have passed the entrance to the reserve carpark. Similarly a lot of southbound traffic doesn't slow down to 30 kmh until they reach the first raised platform.

Further traffic calming measures such as raised platforms and road markings or traffic signage are requested to altert drivers to the appropriate speed in this area.

Council could also request further enforcement action from Police in this area.

6) Anzac memorial monument in the Rolleston Town Centre

The RRA requests that funding be allocated for the design & installation of a new Anzac Memorial Monument (and flag poles) in the Rolleston Town Centre.

Reason:

The Rolleston Anzac Parade and Service has been coordinated by the Rolleston Residents Association with the Rolleston RSA and other community groups supported by the Selwyn District Council.

The RRA thanks the SDC for the ongoing support of this event.

The 2024 Rolleston Anzac Parade and Anzac Service was successfully shifted to the newly completed Rolleston Town Centre. This is a safer, better location than the Clock Tower Reserve at the intersection of Tennyson Street and Rolleston Drive.

If the Rolleston Town Centre is to be the long term location of the Anzac Parade and Service then an Anzac Memorial Monument (and flag poles) is required. The new location saves \$15,000/year in traffic management/road closure costs – funds that should be redeployed to seed fund the design, creation & installation a new monument for the Town Centre.

7) Broadlands Drive extenstion

The RRA requests that Broadlands Drive be extended from its intersection with Nicolau Ave through to Lincoln Rolleston Road as soon as possible.

Reason:

With the continued growth in this area and the construction of the new Rolleston Pak'nSave the extension of Broadlands Drive through to Lincoln Rolleston Road will provide more effficient traffic flows through the area including students travelling to & from Rolleston College.

As Council owns the associated land costs can be recovered when the land is eventually used or subdivided.

8) Free Room Hire for Residents Associations

The RRA requests that Residents Associations be granted use of an appropriate room in a council faciliity for upto 11 meetings per year.

Reason:

Having Residents Associations to apply for council grants to pay for room hire in council facilities is a very inefficient use of both council staff time and volunteer time. It would be simpler and more efficient to grant the Associations room hire and "cut out the middle men."

After all, at the end of the day both council and resident associations are meant to be working toether for the benefit of our community. A grant of free room hire would show goodwill from council to the associations.

From the Draft LTP Big Decisions

9) Big Decision 1 - Public Transport

The RRA supports the development of public transport infrastructure and supports Council's Option 1 "Build three new Park and Ride facilities at Lincoln and Rolleston, and upgradepublic transport infrastructure, but only if Council receives co-funding from NZTA Waka Kotahi"

The RRA asks that it be involved in the selection of park & ride sites for Rolleston commuters.

10) Big Decision 2 - Waihora Whata Rau 2b – Leeston Park.

The RRA supports in principle the construction of the new community facility in Leeston and <u>some</u> upgrades to Leeston Park.

The RRA supports Council's Option 2 for Whata Rau and Option 2 for Leeston Park and additionally requestst that value engineering principles be used to ensure the best value for the ratepayer be achieved in these projects.

Reason:

The RRA acknowledges the need for suitable community facilities for the communities of our district. The RRA takes an inclusive view of our district and supports other communities in our district as we would hope they would support Rolleston.

Facilities need to be appropriately sized for the community where the facility is to be built and to built with the aim of acheiving "the best bang for the ratepayer's dollar."

11) Big Decision 3 - Malvern Recreation and Sports Facility

The RRA supports upgrading the existing Darfield Recreation Centre including the addition of two indoor courts, Council's Option 3.

The Darfield Recreation Centre is under unitilised and should be improved to encourage greater use.

When developing (more) indoor court space it should be ensured that all appropriate sports get a fair and reasonable allocation of space and time. No single sport should be able to dominant court space bookings at the most popular times.

Reason:

The RRA acknowledges the need for suitable community facilities for the communities of our district. The RRA takes an inclusive view of our district and supports other communities in our district as we would hope they would support Rolleston.

From the Draft LTP Mattters for Community Guidance

12) Closure of the Sheffield Memorial Pool

The RRA supports the proposed closure of the Sheffield Memorial Pool.

Reason:

The cost of operating & maintaining the Sheffield Memorial Pool is very high considering is low utilisation.

The site has difficult, some might say dangerous, access to the state highway. Many communities in our district have to travel to use a swimming facility. Council has to make a tough, but rational, decision and close this facility.

13) Economic Development

The RRA <u>does not support</u> the proposed \$900,000 per year expenditure on economic development. In the constrained economic environment this is an excessive amount of expenditure to be funded from the genearl rate.

The RRA <u>could support</u> a smaller amount, say \$200,000 or \$300,000 per year to be reviewed and reconsidered in the 2027-37 LTP.

Reason:

Despite the rationale given & claims made in the Consultation Document the amount requested is excessive and needs to be reduced to a more reasonable level.

RRA members suggest money and effort might be better spent/utilised in speaking directly to existing businesses to find out what the council could do to better support and enable the growth of their businesses. It was further suggested that elected members and senior staff could meet with business leaders directly for this.

14) Investigating and implementing improved digital technology solutions \$1.3M/year

The RRA generally supports this proposal but notes the lack of detail in the Consultant Document.

Public online access to resource consents and consent applications should be improved – as an example – in this process.

Keeping our community informed

14) Water – Chlorination

The RRA supports the Council's recommendation to continue to chlorinate community water supplies.

15) Water - Low Nitrate water sources

The RRA supports the Council's proposal to investigate centralis some water supplies on the plains to come from one low nitrate source.

16) Water – Fluoridation

The RRA does not support the fluoridation of council water supplies and supports the Council's recommendation to make no provision to fund this.

In addition the RRA asks that the Council lobbies LGNZ and Central Government to ensure that our district is not forced to fluoridate our water supplies.

17) Transport - Exploring new public transport services

The RRA has called for a MyWay PT service for Rolleston (potentially include Prebbleton, Lincoln & West Melton) in submissions to the RLTP, Transpot GPS & Ecan LTP.

The RRA requests that Council supports this proposal and makes provision for any required infrastructure.

17) Transport - Lincoln Town Centre upgrade

The RRA supports the concept of this project but questions the cost/value/affordibility of the current proposal. Due to cost escalations the extend of this project needs to be reviewed and possibly reduced in scale and cost.

18) Transport - NZTA Waka Kotahi Rolleston transport improvements

The RRA supports the budget for works to support these projects.

19) Resource recovery and waste management - Compulsory organics kerbside collection Whilst acknowledging the rationale behind this proposal, the RRA requests that Council works with LGNZ & Central Government to remove the compulsory element of this proposal and/or alternately seeking funding support for those in the community who cannot reasonably afford this extra cost.

20) Property & Assets - Community Infrastructure Development Contributions

The RRA supports the proposed Community Infrastructure Developement Contribution and

asks that this proposal also included funding for public toilets in neighbourhood reserves.

Reason:

Many parents have reported problems with the lack of toilets in neighbourhood reserves as young children cannot reasonably wait to return home before going to the toilets. This leaves parents with an unreasonable choice – let the child toilet in the bushes or let the child soil their clothing. More toilets are needed and therefore more funding. Developement brings families and children to our towns and therefore developement contributions should help fund the solution.

21) Property & Assets - Council's Rolleston Office Improvements

Most ratepayers and residents don't use the Rolleston HQ and will question the need and/or value of this proposal.

The RRA support the principle of this proposal but asks that the project be reviewed for value and that staffing levels be appropriate and not continue to grow.

Any upgrades for the CE & Mayoral spaces are nice-to-have and shouldn't be done. The Mayor & CE should show restraint and lead by example in making do with what is a recently constructed space.

22) Property & Assets - Strategic Investment Strategy

The RRA supports this proposal. A new strategy is needed. It needs to be better communicated to our community.

23) Property & Assets - Planning further community facilities

The RRA supports this proposal ackledging the need for a new community centre in Prebbleton as well as a community centre to service the southern area of Rolleston. The RRA notes the need to secure appropriate land for these facilities before houses are build on what would be suitable sites.

The RRA supports redeveloping the Rolleston Community Centre for new and existing users.

24) Property & Assets - Fees and Charges.

The RRA supports to proposed changes to fees and charges.

The RRA supports the projects listed in the Consultation Document and asks that the RRA projects 3 - 7 above be added to the appropriate project list.

If Mana Whenua want representation at Council then they should support the creation of Māori Wards. To oppose the creation of one or more Māori Wards but want appointed councillors is undemocratic and unfair to other residents and ratepayers.

28) P67 District Park

- a) The RRA supports the funding for the development of the District Park.
- b) The RRA request sthat shelter tree plantng around the perimeter to the District Park be done this year, with renegotiation of the lease if equired so that the shelter has time to grow before other developments start.

29) Indoor Courts for Eastern Selywn

- a) The RRA requests that provision be made in the LTP within 2024-2034 for the design and construction of more indoor court space in Eastern Selwyn (as well as in other areas of the district).
- b) The RRA requests that provision be made for an extension to the Selwyn Sports Centre within the 2024-34 LTP period.

Reason:

The Infrastructure Strategy lists *Budget \$16m Strategy: 2027/28 Build 2041/42* for indoor court space in Eastern Selwyn. This is surprising given the reports that some sports already cannot get court space — at reasonable times - in Eastern Selwyn.

Staff have advised that the utilisation of the Selwyn Sports Centre is only 30% - is this 30% of any time or 30% of popular (after school and weekend) times as it doesn't match community experience?

Staff have also advised that there may be more court space available in Christchurch City. Is it reasonable and/or feasible to expect our sports people to commute to Christchurch City to train and play (particularly our youth)?

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
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

Please find below a submission on the LTP relating to the planning of further community facilities.

From: West Melton Garden Club, representing 135-140 financial members.

We have recently become aware that the 3.5 ha Broadfield Garden (an internationally recognized garden) and a botanical jewel in Selwyn's crown, is now for sale, as the creator David Hobbs, is planning to retire. This well-established garden has been developed over the past 30 years, and Selwyn does not have any comparable public space.

We also understand that SDC is currently looking to create a park/gardens on the land they purchased some 8 years or so ago on Levi/Weedons Road. The idea is fine, but we can only imagine the massive cost of developing a botanical garden and park from scratch. It would be at least 15-20 years before it began to resemble a mature area, and would need to have something special to warrant international and national visitors planning to visit.

With this in mind, it would be criminal for the council to not consider purchasing this "ready-to-go" treasure - Broadfield Garden. As it is already very well established, it will immediately continue attracting visitors to the district where they will also support other businesses, and is an amazing venue for so many activities, functions etc. The concept ties in so well with one of the Council's main purposes, that being "to improve the social, economic, environmental and cultural well-being of the residents and communities".

We believe that the purchase of Broadfield Garden as an established botanical garden and park for residents will assist in attaining all of these aspirational aims.

- o Social well-being will be improved through access to a calm and peaceful well-designed garden to enable residents to connect with nature. o Environmental well-being will be enhanced through preserving and maintaining an important botanical environment containing a huge collection of New Zealand indigenous plants.
- o Cultural well-being will be enhanced through acquiring a garden which has been recognised by the NZ Gardens Trust as being of international significance and which contains a collection of plants, many of which are rare or uncommon in general cultivation.
- o Economic benefit for the district will come from the many visitors which the garden will continue to attract including many international visitors and tours. Those visitors will support other businesses in the wider Selwyn District.

With regards to the Levi Road land, more playing fields as planned in a park-like setting is a great idea, but there could also be other

options, and I suggest the council ask the public for ideas on this.

While we are aware that many of the councillors may not have a personal interest in "gardens" as such, as a botanical treasure this can not be overlooked. It is only by visiting and talking to the creator that they can appreciate it's value on a national and international level. Action is required now to prevent other potential purchasers taking action, and the district losing this treasure forever.



Kia ora Sam,

Canterbury Regional Council welcomes the opportunity to make a submission on your draft Long-Term Plan 2024-34.

As a regional council, ahead of developing our own long-term plan we refined our Council's strategic direction. Our focus is on accelerating regeneration of the natural environment, enabling improved water and land use outcomes, and empowering communities to ensure they are resilient and prepared. Also important to us is championing safe, reliable, multi-modal transport choices, including a commitment to providing modern, affordable public transport services that gives our communities choice as urban areas grow. We recognise that strong action is needed to address climate change for the benefit of current and future generations, and our Ngāi Tahu partnership is central to all of our work. We acknowledge the strength of your partnership with Ngāi Te Ruahikihiki ki Taumutu and Ngāi Tūāhuriri whose takiwā covers your district.

As part of our Long-Term Plan structure we have moved away from portfolios of work and focused our work into the three core services that Environment Canterbury delivers: Environmental Regulation and Protection, Community Preparedness and Response to Hazards, and Public Transport. We will provide comment on your long-term plan in that context.

While we focus on our core services, we recognise the importance of a collaborative, joined-up approach from the region's councils in a number of areas. We look forward to continuing to work together through established channels to advance shared aspirations for our communities.

Feedback on your Long-Term Plan 2024-34

Public transport

Thank you for setting out so clearly our councils' respective roles in the provision of public transport service in your consultation document.

Big decision 1: Public transport

Environment Canterbury supports the building of three new park and ride facilities at Lincoln and Rolleston, and upgrades of public transport infrastructure. We acknowledge that your preferred option is to do this with co-funding from NZTA Waka Kotahi.

We understand that more and frequent public transport services are important to your community and we support funding for a business case to improve infrastructure aligned to the Public Transport Futures programme, noting that we have been advised by NZTA that only a Public Transport Authority can run public transport services.

We look forward to working together to support the outcomes of the Public Transport Futures programme, and seeing service improvements for the main urban centres in Selwyn District. This will help to address public transport needs in Greater Christchurch with continuing population growth and increased public transport patronage.

Community preparedness and response to hazards

We would like to acknowledge the good working relationship between our Councils' staff, particularly during flood events. We would particularly like to acknowledge your Civil Defence and Emergency Management (CDEM) team who are amongst the most proactive responders in the region.

As a regional council and the administrating authority for the Canterbury CDEM Group, we value strong coordination with other Councils and the collaborative approach in preparing for, and responding to, Canterbury's extremely active hazard scape.

Environment Canterbury supports all initiatives that mean communities are more prepared, and resilience to future flood events is increased, including infrastructure resilience and protection of lifeline infrastructure. We encourage you to ensure future development on floodplains is appropriate.

As we consult on and consider a proposed targeted rate for flood and river resilience work for your district through our long-term plan, we acknowledge and appreciate your Council's comments on this matter.

Environmental regulation and protection

We support Selwyn District Council's continued investment in infrastructure for reticulated wastewater treatment and disposal systems and stormwater drainage systems across the district, and your strategic planning for development and increasing population density. We commend the Council for its investment in rolling out reticulated wastewater infrastructure for the townships of Darfield and Kirwee. We ask that Council urgently consider extending wastewater reticulation in Kirwee to cover the subdivision of Ascot Park where a large number of human effluent discharge consents will soon be expiring and where we understand some properties are subdividing into smaller sections.

We encourage you to continue to work on new infrastructure and the maintenance and upgrading of existing drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure to ensure compliance with national standards and resource consents, reduce the environmental impacts and respond to the impacts of climate events.

We support Selwyn District Council's initiative to investigate the feasibility of centralising a source of water that is low in nitrate to supply some drinking water supplies on the Canterbury plains.

We acknowledge our shared involvement in co-governance arrangements for Te Waihora. Through the Whakaora Te Waihora work programme, we are delivering on our shared objectives and we look forward to continuing to work collaboratively on these and other work programmes that will protect and enhance biodiversity and cultural values.

Canterbury Regional Forums

We very much appreciate your contribution and commitment to working alongside Mayoral Forum colleagues for the benefit of Canterbury and its communities. The Canterbury Mayoral Forum, and the regional forums and working groups that support it, provide valuable mechanisms for local government in Canterbury and are a key means of demonstrating a strong and unified voice on the priority issues for our region. The value of this strong and unified voice cannot be underestimated. We look forward to continuing to work with your Council as we implement the Canterbury Regional Forums' work programmes, particularly the *Mayoral Forum's Plan for Canterbury*, over the remainder of this local government term. In particular, we acknowledge your Chief Executive Sharon Mason's role as Chair of the Canterbury Economic Development Forum.

We would like to acknowledge the experience, expertise and time of your staff and elected members on the Canterbury Climate Change Working Group and Councillor Reference Group under the Canterbury Mayoral Forum. Your Council's contribution in this area in the coming years will be important as implementation of the Canterbury Climate Partnership Plan begins. Canterbury councils will have to increase our efficiency and effectiveness as we respond to climate change, and work together on best practice climate adaptation.

We also acknowledge your efforts to make climate change mitigations and adaptation a core part of your planning and decision making, and your work to take actions to reduce your own carbon emissions.

Greater Christchurch Partnership

We value the collaborative relationship with you under the Greater Christchurch to address the strategic opportunities and challenges facing the sub-region. This includes the recent focus of the Partnership to develop the Greater Christchurch Spatial Plan – a shared blueprint for how the sub-region will grow and change over the next 30 years and beyond, and remain an attractive place to live, learn, work, visit and invest. There is the opportunity for us through this Long-Term Plan to begin to deliver on the Spatial Plan, and in doing so, deliver on our communities' aspirations for the future of Greater Christchurch and the places within it.

Canterbury Regional Transport Committee

We thank you for your continued support and contribution to the work of the Canterbury Regional Transport Committee. This includes the Committee's recent focus on preparing the Canterbury Regional Land Transport Plan (RLTP) 2024-34. Investment is planned to almost double over the next decade in the region's land transport network. This highlights the significant investment that central and local government need to

make to create an innovative, resilient and low emission transport system that helps Canterbury thrive for generations.



Submission on Selwyn District Council Draft Long Term Plan 2024-34

Thank you for the opportunity to submit on the Council's 2024-34 Draft Long Term Plan. We value the opportunity to provide feedback.

The Rod Donald Banks Peninsula Trust is a Christchurch City Council controlled organisation founded in 2010 for the benefit of Banks Peninsula/Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū residents and visitors. Our vision:

Ko te whakawhanake kaitiaki taiao nā te whakahōu ara hīkoi, ara paihikara, te whakaniko rerenga rauropi, te whakamana mātauranga me te mahi tahi ki ngā tāngata e kaingākau kaha ana ki Te Pātaka o Rākaihautū hoki.

Developing environmental guardians of the future through improved public walking and biking access, enhancing biodiversity, promoting knowledge and working in partnership with others who share our commitment to Banks Peninsula.

The Rod Donald Banks Peninsula Trust supports:

- Selwyn District Council's work to maintain and improve its sections of the Little River Rail Trail, and the Council's active collaboration with other key parties involved in the trail.
- The improvement of walking and biking access to the western Port Hills such as Gerkins track to the Summit Road. Access to green spaces are something Selwyn residents hold with high importance. Access to recreation in nature on the Port Hills and the Little River Rail Trail is particularly beneficial for mental and physical wellbeing and helping to create environmental guardians of the future.
- Contribution of biodiversity funding for the Port Hills, such as for post fire restoration and pest and weed control, including contributions to Pest Free Banks Peninsula.
- A new cycle trail around Te Waihora Lake Ellesmere connecting to the existing Little River Rail Trail.
 A new cycle trail connecting Arthur's Pass to the east coast and to the Little River Rail Trail. These would support regenerative tourism.

The Rod Donald Banks Peninsula Trust seeks in addition:

A \$3,000 SDC Community Fund Grant for the 2025 Banks Peninsula Walking Festival. The Banks Peninsula Walking Festival recently marked its 11th year milestone, hosting 25 events across the Christchurch and Selwyn Districts over four weekends, including one weekend in November 2023. Drawing in over 600 participants from diverse backgrounds, the festival offered a wide array of themes, distances, and objectives, encompassing everything from foraging and history to geology and conservation. It has become a cherished and eagerly anticipated fixture on the region's recreation calendar. In 2022, the festival was fortunate to receive a \$3,000 SDC Community Fund Grant, which provided crucial financial support and enabled the successful delivery of several

popular walks in the Selwyn District. A presentation to the full council in early 2023 by the walking festival coordinator garnered positive reception, underscoring the event's significance to the wider districts. At its core, the festival is dedicated to promoting exploration, sharing information, and fostering an appreciation for the breathtaking natural landscapes of the Banks Peninsula. Over the years, it has grown into a meticulously organized affair, attracting participants from across Canterbury and beyond. Previous editions have been lauded for their diverse range of walks, knowledgeable guides, and the enthusiastic participation of landowners.

- Extension of public access from Gerkins Road to Ahuriri Reserve boundary. Gerkins Road is a legal road that works its way uphill from Cossars Road. For much of its length it is aligned with a four-wheel drive track and is a popular biking route. The Walking Access Map shows that the legal road no longer extends through to Ahuriri Reserve boundary. The Trust requests that the Council make provision for the marking and construction of this route suitable for walking and biking on an alignment that matches either the legal road or is on a track that is most acceptable to adjacent landowners. If necessary, the Council should use an easement or land exchange to enable the conclusion of the most acceptable route.
- Funding support of \$20,000 per annum to Summit Road Society as 28% of their land is in Selwyn District Council and they provide an excellent role in fostering public access for recreation and for biodiversity enhancement. Support for access to Omahu Reserve and weed and pest control.

Short-term Rental Accommodation (STRA)

- 11. The STRA sector has grown rapidly and it is now a key part of the tourism industry in New Zealand. Rapid visitor growth and a lack of commercial accommodation development in many of the busiest tourist regions have also created increased demand for STRA. While competition in any sector is healthy, the unregulated nature of STRA presents an uneven playing field vis a vis traditional commercial accommodation providers.
- 12. Commercial accommodation operators are seeking a fairer playing field around rates and regulations, particularly targeted at STRA properties that are whole-of-house rentals operating more than 90 days a year. The STRA sector operates mainly in residential areas, only pays residential rates, operates with less regulation, and often escapes appropriate
- 13. In some parts of the country, the preference for rental property owners to convert to Airbnb or similar, is resulting in a lack of available long-term rental accommodation for workers and families, and impacting on the community feel of suburbs.

- New South Wales Government has developed a 24-hour Economy Strategy aimed at building a vibrant and strong 24-hour economy where the principal activity is not about the consumption of alcohol. The strategy covers things like integrated planning to encourage collaboration, diversification of night-time activities, enhancing mobility and connectivity Hour Economy Strategy also envisages "playbooks" and support services to help businesses 20. SDC is a key partner in the Central Plains Water Enhancement Scheme

In May 2000, the Central Plains Water Enhancement Scheme Steering Committee, a joint committee of the Selwyn District Council (SDC) and Christchurch City Council (CCC), was established and funded to assess the feasibility of water enhancement schemes for the Central Plains area. This feasibility study confirmed the validity of an affordable scheme. In April 2003 the Central Plains Water Trust (**CPWT** or **the Trust**) was established to replace the Steering Committee and progress the project. The Trust is a public venture, with Trustees appointed by SDC, CCC and Ngāi Tahu. The first role of the Trust, following establishment, was to raise sufficient share capital to fund the process to obtain the resource consents necessary to proceed with the project. The consents were granted and are owned and administered by the CPWT which licences the use of these consents to Central Plains Water Limited (CPWL). CPWL reports to the CPWT quarterly on compliance with resource consents, strategic initiatives and the status of projects receiving CPWL Environmental Management Funding each year (this Fund is further discussed later in this submission). CPWL also prepares an annual report to the Trust detailing the effects of the scheme on water quality and water levels in the Selwyn Waihora Catchment. This report is independently reviewed and forms the basis of the Trust's Annual Sustainability Report. Further, CPWL provides support to the Trust when the Trust is reporting to SDC.

About the Scheme

CPWL was established in September 2003 and is responsible for the implementation and operation of

The Scheme is a large-scale community irrigation scheme that provides reliable and cost-effective water to farmers in the Selwyn District, with the consent to irrigate 63,000 hectares of farmland between the Rakaia and Waimakariri Rivers, from the Malvern foothills to State Highway 1. It is the largest irrigation scheme in the South Island and its establishment cost was in the order of \$474M. The Scheme is currently owned by 397 farmer shareholders and operates on co-operative principles. Shareholders The Scheme was constructed in three stages between 2014 and 2018. include dairy, cropping and beef and sheep farmers. The Scheme has been designed to have an 80-year lifespan with an expectation that 100 years of service will be achieved. As such it is a multi-generational investment providing long term community The Scheme's business activities, increased food production resulting from reliable water, and environmental outcomes directly benefit the Selwyn District, while also benefiting the Canterbury Region and beyond.

Economic benefits

BERL the Scheme had a direct expenditure for the year of \$268 million, which generated direct gross domestic product of \$150 million, while contributing a total (direct, indirect, and induced) benefit of \$293 million to Canterbury's gross domestic product. In the same year, the Scheme generated direct employment of 893 full-time equivalents and 1,816 indirect full-time equivalents in the Canterbury The Scheme contributes significantly to Canterbury's economy. In a 2022 assessment undertaken by

Environmental benefits

Key to establishment of the Scheme was SDC's and CCC's desire to protect the quality and quantity of water in the Canterbury Plains, including switching land users from groundwater abstraction to low nutrient alpine sourced water. With this, the Scheme's development was closely aligned with the vision of the Canterbury Water Management Strategy (CWIMS) and the Scheme is a key contributor to achievement of the CWMS Outcomes. CPWL's activities contribute to improving and protecting the values associated with Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere which is the most important wetland habitat of its type in New Zealand. CPWL strives to be a world leader in environmental and sustainable practice by protecting and enhancing the surrounding waterways. This is principally achieved by:

- Protecting the aquifers By taking low nutrient alpine water from the Rakaia River in a farmers no longer have to abstract water from groundwater wells and artesian supplies controlled way, as provided for by the Rakaia River Water Conservation Order (RWCO), thereby leaving that water in the aquifers; and
- Controlling and reducing loss of nutrients Nutrient levels on farms in the Scheme are monitored and audited, and reductions in nutrients lost is one of the key environmental pillars on which the Scheme is built. (q)

In 2014/2015 100 million cubic metres (\mathbf{m}^3) of shareholders consented annual groundwater volume (the total consented annual groundwater take is over 200 million m³) was used by CPWL shareholders. This decreased to 32 million m³ in the 2022/2023 irrigation season (i.e., approximately 16% of the consented annual groundwater volume used). Leaving the water in the aquifers improves the flow in streams that are linked to Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere. CPWL requires that all Shareholders have Farm Environment Plans (FEPs) to ensure that farmers are The FEPs ensure that nitrogen and phosphorous losses resulting from farming activities are reduced to allow water quality to improve over time. CPWL's resource consents require reductions in nitrogen/nitrate losses. By 2022, dairy 2013) and dairy support by 22%, irrigated sheep and beef farmers by 5% and arable farmers by 7%. Directly benefiting Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere, the Scheme has to date contributed \$350,000 to the Te Waihora Environmental Management Fund that is managed by Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu for the CPWL also contributes 12.5% of the annual costs, approximately \$44,000 per year (on average) to open the Lake to the sea. restoration of Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere.

Also benefiting Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere is the CPWL Environmental Management Fund (EMF). This fund is administered by a Trust that includes representatives from the community, iwi, environmental and recreational interests, and Trustees that are appointed by SDC and CCC. The Trust makes the minimising nutrient losses to lowland streams and riparian planting. To date the EMF has distributed over \$630,000 to environmental-related initiatives including the protection of wetlands and decisions on which projects to fund, with projects selected to date addressing wetland enhancement, Significant Natural Areas, and planting over 70,000 native trees. CPWL's pipe network, which includes a 2.4m diameter pipe under the Hororata River, also supports This project enables the recharge of groundwater with surface water in an area of the south bank of the Hororata River. The recharged groundwater then supplies the Hororata River and other lowland streams downstream from the recharge point in dry years to support flows, fish populations, invertebrates, and additional improvements in the ecology of the rivers and streams. This NRR project is world leading in terms of its scale and environmental focus. The project relies on CPWL's Rakaia River intake, Stage 1 headrace, Canterbury Regional Council's three cumec Near River Recharge (NRR) project. and Stage 2 pipe network.

Adding to community resilience

At its very core, CPWL's provision of reliable irrigation and stock drinking water bolsters the farming community's resilience to the potential effects of climate change. At the same time, the Scheme's infrastructure has the potential to benefit communities in ways that go well beyond the 'on-farm' benefits. For example, the Scheme currently provides 20 connection points to supply water to Fire and Emergency New Zealand for firefighting purposes, and the pipeline has the potential to supply raw water to drinking water treatment plants should an event adversely impact council infrastructure. CPWL has a particular interest in maximizing the value gained for communities from the Scheme's infrastructure (within the constraints of the resource consents held for the Scheme) and advancing community resilience to the effects of climate change and natural disasters such as earthquakes and extreme weather events.

CPWL welcomes the comments in SDC's Long Term Plan 2024-2034 Consultation Document on the need to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and plan for resilience to climate change. CPWL commends SDC for being one of the earliest signatories to the New Zealand Local Government Leaders' Climate Change Declaration 2017, for developing and implementing plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and for contributing to the Canterbury Climate Change Risk Assessment (2022). Sound district planning and emergency management planning is key to ensuring long-term resilience in the Selwyn District.

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Doyleston Residents Committee LTP submission

The Doyleston Residents Committee have been the custodians of Osborne Park since 1911, and of the hall since 2000 . Until the summary dissolution in 2022 we were a community committee of the Selwyn District Council (SDC).

The committee have continued to meet on a regular monthly basis and made every effort to stay recreation and was held by the Crown. The hall was gifted and established by local community engaged with the SDC. The land was gifted to the Doyleston community for the purpose of members.

All of the maintenance and planting of the grounds has been undertaken by the committee and the local community on a voluntary basis. Funding where needed has come from donations, grants and the SDC. In recent times the SDC has been progressively centralising control of community assets (held on behalf of the community). This deliberate de-localisation has been done without any meaningful consultation with the communities involved. Osborne Park and its facilities have been maintained and presented to a very high standard as a party that he is dismissed from his job as of July 2024 and CORDE will take over. This action by mana as a result of the constant erosion of local input and engagement during the process of John McCartin (who is a 2023 SDC award winner for volunteer work) has been told via a third result of a very engaged committee and community members. Recently our groundskeeper the SDC is the final straw for the Doyleston community, who have suffered a diminution of centralisation. The Doyleston Residents Committee are unanimously resolved in the presentation of this submission to regain our role of Kaitiaki of our park.
