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1. Historical value

The Mayor says in the Long Term Plan that "we're focussed on looking after what we already have" - how about you look after us!

An 1881 plan shows the reserve on which the huts would come to be established was in existence and by the 1890's at the latest there were huts established there, mainly for fishing and hunting. Given this pre-1900 date, the huts are an archaeological site under the Heritage Pouhere Taonga New Zealand Act. There is a long historic and cultural association with the huts and community over the three centuries of occupation. The Reserve is Crown Land, administered by the Selwyn District Council. In 2015 the purpose was changed (by the Department Conservation) from recreation reserve to Local Purpose – Hut Settlement. On 8 May 2019, the Council unanimously determined that 'Hut licences and subsequent renewals are short term and ultimately for a finite period'. At its 13 March 2024 meeting Council resolved to accept option 2 (of 4 options) and offered Residents a final 15 year term for occupation of their buts.

We need to submit requesting this historical significance be recognised and for the Selwyn Huts to be listed as an historical site on the District Plan and for the term for us being here to be extended to protect this history.

2. District wide rates

Everyone needs to submit on the LTP asking for us to be put on DWR for Water and Sewer.

The reasons being

- (a) We will soon be on the same sewer system as Leeston who pay DWR and we have previously paid for our sewer ourselves and a subsequant upgrade, the requirement we were told for being put on DWR.
- (b) We have already paid for the water upgrade.
- (c) We should not be discriminated against and should be treated like everyone else in the district.
- (d) We already pay DWR for Recreation Reserve Rate; General Purpose Rate; Library Charge; Community Centre Rate; Uniform Annual General Rate; Water Race (Amenity) Rate; Area Board; Swimming Pools; Canterbury Museum Levy; and Land Drainage. We should also be added to the DWR for Sewer and Water like everyone

else.

(e) Towards25 LTP Document stated:

"The Council is proposing to introduce a new way of funding water and wastewater, community centres/halls and recreation reserves. These services are currently funded through targeted rates and the Council is proposing to meet the costs of these services by introducing standard district-wide rates. Underpinning this proposal is the view that Selwyn should be seen as one integrated district, rather than simply a series of detached townships. The Council acknowledges that where residents across the district receive a similar level of service for key infrastructure, the cost to residents should also be consistent. In the case of water and wastewater this proposal will also help keep these services affordable for smaller communities."

This document also has USH specifically listed in the "Proposed district-wide rate for urban water compared with existing targeted rates" table.

From this we conclude there was a clear intention to include USH in the DWR for sewer and water. This is even more relevant now we will soon be on the same sewer system as Leeston.

- (f) Buddle Findlay's Legal Opinion dated 04/03/2019 states "We note that the Council has recently tended to move to a model where the costs of provision of network infrastructure (such as waste water infrastructure) are spread across the district (ie under district wide targeted rates). It would go against the trend for the Council now to look to recover the greater costs of continuing to provide water services to the [Upper Selwyn] Huts solely from that community."
- (g) Council has already agreed to fund 70% of the sewer upgrade, indicating the district is prepared to pay towards USH sewer upgrade. There is no good reason why the Council couldn't find the full amount. This was proposed in 4.12.4 of the "Upper Sekwyn Huts Future Occupancy Strategy" report dated 04/03/2024.
- (h) The cost and operational charges for the pipeline continue to change so being on the DWR would give the community certainty. It would also mean that if people choose to leave the settlement early the cost will not increase for the remaining owners.
- (i) Additionally we also request that our reticulation system be replaced by SDC as they have been responsible for this since 1989 and have had ample time to replace this.

Given the reasons above there is no reason why USH Can not be put on the DWR for Sewer and Water like everyone else.



I couldn't see the line items of each project within the Long Term Plan - is this not visible for the public?

There once was funding to support improvements to Springs Rd through Prebbleton in approx FY26/27, however I can't find this anywhere? There needs to be some District Wide transport improvements which encourage residents to travel down Shands Rd onto the Southern Motorway instead of through the middle of Prebbleton. The pedestrian crossing is unsafe especially at 6.30am in the morning in the dark (often 6 cars + go through before anyone stops). And I have concerns with continued growth in Lincoln etc. that this will only get worse. My children need to cross Springs Rd to go to school, it makes me nervous in the current situation.

Prebbleton Community Centre - could this be built alongside any future school in Prebbleton, then residents could have access to a library and full sized court when school is out?

Christchurch City Council have a new Urban Forest Plan that encourages tree canopy cover as well as Urban Forest Patches (native forest of a certain size). Could Selwyn move toward something similar, or at least have a policy where they plant 2 trees for 1, and have a budget to plant trees on road berms etc. to increase canopy cover. Look at the successful Tree story at Melbourne City.

When accepting subdivision plans - need to consider connection to wider community. Nearby we have Toswill Rd, and there is no drop down kerb on Prebbleton Domain side of road. This makes it tricky to cross when rugby is on, as there is no space between cars parking and its hard for small children to safely ride bikes/scooters. A refuge would be great too. We also have a beautiful storm water path that is missing connections into the main shops, would be a great walk if it did. And some

intersections have poor visibility as the wider area has not been considered.

My main comment is: Please keep in mind "nice to have" vs "must have" and "important to have." They are 3 different approaches. Major on the latter two.

In particular, the "upgrading" of Gerald Street. I am a pensioner who has recently moved into Liffey village. However I am familiar with Lincoln through working here for many years.

My recent impressions that Lincoln retains its "villagey" feel, despite significant housing developments in numerous directions.

My observation of people movements and commerce in the main shopping precinct end is that it is an area where residents wish to park, pop into a shop/business, and out again. It is not an area where a "pedestrian mall" with no traffic is warranted or needed. There are plenty of eateries where people can socialise inside and outside. Extra outside spaces are NOT NEEDED, particularly bearing in mind the colder months of the year and cooler winds year round. Gerald Street is an essential thoroughfare through to New World, and all the businesses along it. Any "development" that interferes with the traffic flow would be an unnecessary backward step for the population I believe. In particular, older residents do not need the dubious benefit of having to park in a back street in order to access cafes, post office, pharmacy etc.

Please consider this proposal in terms of "need to have" vs "nice to have." I am not in favour of the expenditure of the \$millions in the proposal in the LTP. At the very least, re-examine and pull back on the expenditure.

I believe Leeston is long overdue this facility so I am in strongly favour of Option 2 as I am hoping that as it is the favoured option by the SDC this might mean that progress in implementing the plan will be faster. At the moment we are very poorly served in terms of community spaces especially for community activities such as exercise/dance/hobby and other larger gatherings. Leeston's population is growing so there are more younger families needing better community facilities but also we have a significant proportion of older citizens who do not always have the means to travel to other Council hubs for such activities. This also applies to parents at home with young children - it's essential for the health and wellbeing of citizens to be able to access such resources in their own communities, especially as we should be trying to lower our use of private vehicles. 

Lincoln local history

1. Reserve landscaping at Liffey Cottage.

SDC's support for and recognition of Liffey Cottage as a heritage gem and key part of Lincoln and Districts Historical Society's Open Day events, and the Township Trail, as well as a learning destination for Children's University visitors is acknowledged. Over the last few years the increase in pedestrian, cycle and scooter traffic on the pathway from Heathridge & Rosemerryn has led to the rapid degradation of the grassed reserve area surrounding the Cottage, particularly under the oak tree, until it is now bare ground. While the awful visual impact on this heritage gem is obvious, the dust is a serious problem for both the heritage collections within the cottage, and the cottage itself.

The landscaping plan developed by SDC staff (and referenced in the L&DHS submission) to solve this issue should be implemented as soon as possible to prevent further damage, and to improve the site.

2. Springs Water trough (Heritage item H324) The trough is a significant local heritage item, with links to both farming activity of The Springs Station and local engineers, Pearson Brothers, who made it c. 1907

Strongly recommended that it is protected before the development of this area begins, and that it is recognized on site as a heritage feature (history panel, fencing, local sculpture?)

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





The Kirwee Community Association would like to see a footpath from the corner of High Street up Tramway Road to the entrance of where the new carpark into Kirwee Reserve is going to be. Many people in Kirwee go walking through the Reserve and do a circuit, and having a footpath to walk on would be a great addition. We are not sure whether a footpath along Tramway Road is included in the upgrades set down in the Kirwee Reserve Development in the Long-Term Plan.

A playground in the grassy area beside the Tree House daycare centre in School Lane would be a great addition. We believe this has been talked about in the past, but as yet nothing has been done, and all that is there is the grassy area and a seat. There is a lot of new development in Kirwee and this area would be closer for children to visit safely than having to go the Reserve.

We have made this request previously that the speed through Kirwee Township be reduced, and 60 kph would be sensible. As you know when a speed limit is 70 kph the boundaries are always pushed. This is a busy stretch of road and at Kirwee Challenge there are over 430 post boxes (Kirwee does not have postal delivery) and therefore the Kirwee Challenge is visited by numerous community members every day. An added advantage would be a roundabout at the corner of State High 73 and Courtenay Road. This would slow the traffic through the township. The traffic at the

stop sign of Courtenay Road and SH73 has been monitored regularly by Kirwee Community Association members at different times of the day and year, and the results are horrendous with regularly in the vicinity of only 50 per cent of the traffic stopping.

Capital spending – as per the article on One News, the Minister has warned councils to prioritise the must haves over the nice-to haves. We recommend that the council cease all capital expenditure for the next three years and concentrate on completing all current works already in the current Long-Term Plan. By taking this stance this would reduce the need for significant rate rises over the next three years.

Clients are often referred to CAB from government organisations and our information is located on most government websites as a place where individuals can get reliable information.







1.0 Executive Summary:

The Rolleston Softball Club was founded in 2012 and has grown from 110 to 266 members from the last season, being 2022/23. Also grown are the officials, coaches, managers, scorers and umpires, as new teams are created. Based on these figures, the club envisages that the membership will grow again for the upcoming season due to the formation of the Premier Grades.

Last season, the club fielded two Premier Reserve teams (men's and woman's) and this year the first ever premier team (men's) will be submitted to Canterbury Softball Association (CSA) for approval. This will provide a basis for further development of our talented younger players to come through and provide sustainability for the Rolleston Softball Club. Priemer teams are scheduling games on the current turf, but to have the full round there or tournaments, held, another turf diamond is required.



Rolleston Softball had this year seven Canterbury Representatives and have had three Development

Junior Sox coming through and the club. We are increasing in representation and having additional facilities provides them the opportunity to remain at Rolleston Club as well as other emerging talent, and gives them the opportunity to go to the highest level in Softball.



With this level of growth, comes with the expectation on delivering premier quality games, thus the increase demand for training and game time increases. With Foster Park being used for winter sports, the premier teams are still able to use the artificial turf for off season training, which is a huge advantage. On this, the premier teams have already started pre-season training on the artificial turf for the upcoming season to commence in October 2023.

The demands on the single turf has become difficult over the last few seasons, especially when two clubs - Selwyn Baseball and Rolleston Softball, are both bidding for similar times on the existing singular turf diamond.



Note: at the time of writing this submission, the Rolleston Softball Club are unsure the status of the Selwyn Baseball Club and their membership will be for the 2023/24 Season.



2.0 Needs Analysis - growth of membership and development of our players:

Since commencing in 2012, the club has seen an increase of 140% in membership, which for a volunteer community-based sport, is a very successful result.




As the membership grows, this does place more of a demand on the club to provide facilities, marked diamonds and space for all our members to train or play on. Once the teams have all the equipment they need, then it turns to gaining access to the turf diamond for training.

For the 2022/23 season the club saw multiple cross-over of our junior players starting to play in more senior grades. This development is encouraged and has been a focus over the last few seasons.

The club need to provide a development pathway for our younger players not just to enhance for their own personal development but also for the sustainability of the club.

To ensure that we keep hold of our emerging talent, we need to provide facilities for our players, which includes an additional playing turf for Rolleston Softball, but also additional add-ons like dugouts and lighting.






3.0 Location:

PROPOSED FUTURE STATE: 2nd ARTIFICIAL TURF






4.0 Submission Details - why now?

Over the last 2-3 seasons the club have struggled to allocate time to one artificial diamond, not only due to sharing this resource with Selwyn Baseball, but also sharing amongst our own senior and competitive junior grades.

For Selwyn Baseball, training days was every Tuesday and Friday evenings, and game day being every Sunday. At times Baseball was allocated to another club's diamond on the Sunday as the season progressed. Having to share the turf placed a lot of time pressures on our club as Selwyn Baseball had only four teams, whilst Rolleston Softball had nineteen teams, of which eleven of these were competitive teams all wanting time on the turf diamond.



Coupled with this demand, the senior competitive grades, and u18/u15s, we found it exceedingly difficult to allocate teams to the one turf, and had to rotate all grades around the ballpark, utilising painted diamonds 2 & 3 throughout the season.

Allocating senior grades to the artificial turf became a priority, due for the safety of people passing by but also to our junior grades. At times, our u7s – u11's



practised right beside our premier reserve or men's teams which would have been a bit frighting for our young players. The club tried to avoid this as best we could, but there were times this could not be avoided.

With the restraints from Selwyn Baseball as well as demands from within our own club, it is time now to look at the installation of a second artificial turf at Foster Park.

It is our understanding that a second turf is in the Selwyn District Plan, and we would like to see this pushed forward in this or next financial year allocation.



5.0 Dugouts, Lighting and Scoreboards:

The game of softball is played within the summer months, and that means a lot of sunshine and, normally under intensive heat in Canterbury. Access to shade is increasing in demand especially when a player has been on the diamond for some time, and getting a reprieve from the sun/heat is most welcomed by all players and officials. It is now becoming a safety issue that there is no shade available to the players in the form of a dugout, as well as seating and shade for spectators during the season.



The club has placed two gazebos in the past to shade the players, but these are perishing under the harsh conditions and now the covers are ripping and need replacing. Also access to the gazebos is difficult as, when these are needed, often these cannot be accessed as the committee members are playing elsewhere on that day. The club are requesting the installation of dugouts on the second turf diamond, as well as the existing one.

For the dugouts, we also request that lockable chests are installed on the end of one of the dugouts (on each diamond) to house the turf fixed running bases. This would provide coaches with an ease of access to grab these more and be available at trainings.



As well as game time, the need for lighting is becoming more urgent. Lighting for evening trainings during winter, hosting evening games during the season and the opportunity to provide premier or national tournaments that can run late into the evening.

Electronic scoreboards are another resource on the rise for all clubs. Having lights and an electronic board, gives our club the opportunity to host premier teams to Rolleston for national tournaments and key premier games. This will be a game changer for our club and to have this resource, will place our club on the radar for these key events.



6.0 Existing Artificial – upgrades:

As previously mentioned, the need for installation of dugouts on the existing artificial turf, is becoming a safety issue in where players need to have shade from the heat and no there is no option for shade available at the turf, in its current state.

As part of this submission for the 2nd Artificial Turf, we also request that current artificial turf have dugouts installed on either side of the diamond to accommodate the home team and the away team, and lockable chest to place the turfs running bases.







Please note there was a quote supplied in 2021 by Fair Dinkum, but due to some restraints out of our control, the club did not pursue it further at that time. The club feels now that time to provide these extra resources, especially the installation of dugouts, has become a "safety need" than a "nice to have." Since the facility is council

owned, there should be an agreement to add dugouts for players, as it is a safety need. Currently we are using gazebos but these are need of replacing as being used more often, and putting them up and down more frequently is causing damage.

The quote is included with this submission is a guide to erecting dugouts on the existing turf, and the club will be willing to get this re-quoted if requested. The quote provides for two dugouts on the existing diamond, with seating and ventilation.





7.0 Submission Detail:

- 1. Installation of dugouts on the existing Artificial Turf Diamond, one on each side.
- 2. Lockable chests installed in both turfs, accessed in one of the dugouts to house the turf running bases.
- 3. Installation of the 2nd Artificial Turf Diamond at Foster Park, with Dugouts and Lighting.
- 4. Consideration for an Electronic Scoreboard, installed for the use on the 2nd Artificial Turf Diamond.
- 5. Consideration for seating and shade installed for spectators.





2. Waihora Whata Rau - community facility and reserves upgrade Leeston

After consulting with the community, in the last Long-Term Plan we proposed a new community facility for Leeston, called Whata Rau, which would be built alongside the park, providing a 'hub' for Ellesmere where residents can gather, play, and learn.

After consulting with Ellesmere residents during the last Long-Term Plan, we agreed to build a new library and community centre called Whata Rau, next to Leeston Park. LTP submission - Sheffield Memorial Pool

Dear Council Members

On behalf of the Sheffield Waddington Residents Group, we extend our appreciation for the Council's ongoing efforts to enhance the liveability and cohesion of our community. This submission is presented with a unified voice from our members, expressing our commitment to maintaining and developing the Sheffield Memorial Pool, not only as a critical community asset, but also as a treasured war memorial.

The Sheffield Memorial Pool stands as a pivotal community hub, providing invaluable health, educational, and social benefits. It is a place where children learn to swim, a skill that is both a rite of passage and a crucial safety measure in our beautiful, water-rich country. It is where families and friends gather, reinforcing the social fabric of our community. The importance of such a facility in fostering a vibrant, active community cannot be overstated.

Preserving Our Heritage - The War Memorial & Issues around land ownership

The status of our pool as war memorial adds a profound layer of significance. It serves as a living memorial to our war veterans, a lasting tribute to those who have served, representing our collective memory and ongoing respect for their sacrifices. The memorial is a focal point for remembrance and reflection, crucial for teaching future generations about the values of courage, sacrifice, and community.

On the 6th of November 1950 there is confirmation from the Malvern County Council confirming that the Council accept the Sheffield Memorial Swimming Baths as a War Memorial for the district. The New Zealand Memorials online register, administered by the New Zealand Government, identifies both the Sheffield Cenotaph and the Sheffield Memorial Pool as war memorials. It is difficult to understand how the SDC could no longer have this registered on the District Plan, but this may have occurred at the time the Malvern, Ellesmere and Paparua County Councils merged in 1989. Though this begs the question as to why the Council did not investigate further considering the pool is called the "Sheffield Memorial Pool."

In the Council records, there are documents from 1953/54 regarding the transfer of section CB602/67 from Mr John Jebson Senior to the Malvern County Council. In these documents the lawyers refer to the abandoned section CB376/73 (Estate of William Wilson). The point being that 70 years ago the lawyers advised that Harper, Pascoe, Buchanan & Penlington (now Anthony Harper), were dealing with this issue. It seems odd that the Council acquisition of this section never progressed any further despite it being identified as abandoned (ie no beneficiaries of the estate could be found) as it could then have been amalgamated with section CB602/67 resolving some of the issues that have been raised as 'difficulties' with the current pool. Potentially it was put in the 'too hard basket' at the time and then forgotten. However, as it has now been an abandoned section for more than 70 years, this would mean that an application under the Public Works Act 1981 to acquire the land would not be difficult.

Council's Ownership and Maintenance Responsibility

It is important to acknowledge that when the Council took over ownership of the Sheffield Memorial Pool from the community, it inherited not just a pool asset, but a responsibility. This responsibility was to maintain and care for the pool to an acceptable standard. Unfortunately, the current structural issues plaguing the pool did not develop overnight but have been accumulating over the last 10-15 years.

The Council's oversight in addressing these maintenance needs incrementally has led to a situation where the costs and efforts required for repair have escalated, challenging the feasibility of straightforward solutions.

Challenges and Misconceptions Regarding Pool Usage

Recent discussions by Council on pool closer have sited low visitation numbers as a significant factor. It is essential to recognize that

- the 2020/21 season was heavily impacted by COVID-19
- the 2021/22 season suffered due to unseasonably cold weather
- reduced hours in 2022/23 led to diminished use

• increased awareness and better weather in 2023/24 led to significantly increased numbers

In response to low visitation numbers, we collaborated with the Head of Sport and Recreation to adjust operational hours for the 2023/24 season to better suit the needs of the community (based on a community poll). Coupled with improved summer conditions and proactive community engagement, the pool attendance rose to 4,170 visits up from 2,490 in the previous season. This demonstrates the communities strong desire to retain the facility in their community.

At the end of this year's season we held a community pool party with sausage sizzle and entertainment. It was a huge success with 118 attending and again demonstrates the need for a facility in our township for the community to come together.

It is cited by Council that "the pool...could remain open for the 2024/25 summer season without capital investment if the condition and costs allow". With pool visitation numbers in the 2023/24 season almost double the previous year, we urge Council to proceed with this as an option for the upcoming season and honour its social conscience to the community.

Addressing the Location and Facility Usage

In the "Community Facilities Activity Management Plan 2024 (section 12)" concerning the Sheffield Pool End of Life, the Council highlighted issues with the current site, suggesting the use of the "enhanced Darfield facility" as an alternative. This overlooks the needs of nearby communities such as Springfield and does not account for the existing capacity issues at Darfield, which were exacerbated during the 2023/24 summer season when it frequently reached full capacity.

Furthermore, with seventy new residential sections pending approval in Sheffield and a projected population increase of 50% in the coming years, the need for local recreational facilities will only intensify. These factors clearly indicate that relying on facilities in Darfield is not a viable long-term solution.

The issue of pool depth

An issue that has been raised by stakeholders in the pool is the necessity to keep the pool at its current maximum depth of 2.3 meters to allow for children to learn to swim in deep water.

In the context of learning to swim in New Zealand, "deep water" typically refers to water that is beyond a swimmer's standing depth and where they are unable to touch the bottom of the pool or water body with their feet. This definition may vary slightly depending on the specific swimming program or instructor, but generally, it indicates water depths where swimming skills such as floating, treading water, and proper stroke techniques are necessary for safety.

For beginner swimmers, deep water can be intimidating, and learning to swim in deeper water requires confidence, proper supervision, and gradual progression in skill development. Swimming lessons in deep water often focus on building water confidence, teaching buoyancy techniques, and developing essential swimming skills to ensure safety and competence in deeper aquatic environments.

A depth of 1.2 to 1.5m ensures safety for beginners while providing enough water for them to learn floating, treading water, and swimming techniques without touching the pool bottom.

Deep water for the purposes of learning to swim in New Zealand refers to water depths where swimmers cannot touch the bottom and must rely on swimming skills to stay safe and navigate effectively.

- For children in Year 1 (around 5 to 6 years old), the average height typically ranges from about 110 to 120 centimetres.
- In Year 2 (around 6 to 7 years old), children usually grow a bit taller, with average heights ranging from approximately 115 to 125 centimetres.

- By Year 3 (around 7 to 8 years old), children continue to experience growth, with average heights ranging from around 120 to 130 centimetres.
- In Year 4 (around 8 to 9 years old), children may see a slight increase in height, with averages ranging from about 125 to 135 centimetres.
- By Year 5 (around 9 to 10 years old), children may experience another growth spurt, leading to average heights ranging from approximately 130 to 140 centimetres.
- In Year 6 (around 10 to 11 years old), children are typically approaching adolescence, and their average heights may range from about 135 to 145 centimetres.

Whilst there are obviously children over 1.5m by year 6, these are not the majority of the children and therefore one can conclude that 1.5 to 1.8m is sufficient depth for children to learn to swim in safe water.

In March 2023 we conducted a community wide survey. This survey was completed by 230 of the residents in our community (approximately 68% at the time). This is the voice of community as a whole, rather than just that of key stakeholders, and must not be ignored. A copy of the survey and the results are included at the end of this submission.

There was overwhelming support to reduce the depth (over 90%) in order to remove the need for lifeguards, increase access hours, reduce ongoing costs to the Council and return the pool to being keyholder access.

The results of this survey were provided to our Councillor, Lydia Gliddon, Mayor Sam Broughton and James Richmond, Head of Sport and Recreation in May 2023 and so members of Council should be aware of this. However, we would like to highlight the importance of this information again.

The SDC Sports and Recreation team have, on numerous occasions, highlighted the risks associated with the pool depth to key stakeholders and attempted to raise the issue of reducing the depth to no avail. The voice of the community is clearly in favour of considering this option and with the key points highlighted above to show that a depth of 1.5m is sufficient and reduces the risk associated with a deeper pool.

The ideal depth for the community would be between 1.5m and 1.8m and we note 1.8m, is the depth of several pools, both lifeguarded and keyholder access, in the Malvern Area and Canterbury Wide.

- Darfield 1.8m (lifeguarded)
- Kirwee 1.2m (keyholder)
- Hororata 1.8m (keyholder)
- Springfield 1.0m (keyholder/school families only)
- Southbridge 1.8m (lifeguarded)
- Leeston 1m (keyholder)
- Windwhistle 1.0m (keyholder)
- Greendale 1.0m (keyholder)
- Glentunnel 1.0m (keyholder/school families only)

A depth of 1.8m (compared to a depth profile of 2.3m) will not only reduce the risk associated with such as a dangerous depth profile, but also the cost of operating the pool such as insurance, water, chemicals, electricity and so on. This mitigates concerns raised by the SDC Sports and Recreation team and also one of the main reasons for the recommendation to close the pool. Despite a few (not the majority) of the community wishing to keep the diving board and the 2.3m depth profile, we are certain that if the risk and cost associated were clearly explained that they would appreciate that a depth reduction is a more feasible option.

Taking all this into account, we believe that the issues around the depth can be resolved, and a consensus reached leading to a way forward that will meet the needs of the whole community.

We therefore urge the Council to conduct discussions around a suitable depth with not just the key stakeholders, but also with the members of the whole community who, based on the pool visitation data for the last few seasons, are the ones who use the pool over 60% of the time each season.

Proposals for the Future

Understanding the complexities surrounding the maintenance and potential redevelopment of the pool, we propose a holistic approach that considers both immediate needs and long-term sustainability

We recognize the proposed costs of \$800,000 to \$1,000,000 to repair the pool may not be economically viable.

However, we urge the Council to work with the community and Sheffield Contributing School to find a solution. Whether this involves co-managing a repair of the existing pool or constructing a new facility on an alternate site, the importance of community involvement in the decision-making process is paramount.

The community has access to funding options not available to the Council, but by considering an alternative, such as the Council remediation the land and dealing with the land ownership issues, and the school and the community working together on funding and grants to rebuild the pool a positive outcome could be achieved for wider community and future generations.

Conclusion

The Sheffield Memorial Pool represents more than just a recreational facility; it stands as a significant part of our community's heritage and social fabric. As outlined in our submission, this pool serves not only as a vital health and social resource where families and individuals gather but also as a important war memorial, honouring the sacrifices of our veterans.

The pool has faced numerous challenges, but despite these challenges, community engagement has remained strong, as demonstrated by the increased attendance following operational adjustments and successful community events.

Importantly, there are ongoing concerns regarding the pool's depth and safety, which need to be addressed collaboratively. The community's preference, as evidenced by our survey, leans towards reducing the pool depth to enhance accessibility and safety while mitigating operational costs. As we did in March 2023, we still believe this to be the best and most cost effective solution to move forward.

Looking ahead, we propose a holistic approach that considers both immediate repair needs and long-term sustainability. This could involve collaboration between Council, Sheffield Contributing School, and the community to explore funding options, ensuring that any future decisions are made with robust community input and continue to honour the pool's status as a war memorial.

We urge Council to listen to the collective community voice, to maintain open lines of communication with the whole community (not just key stakeholders) and to keep the pool operational for the upcoming 2024/25 season to allow time for collective decision-making. This approach will not only address the immediate needs but also ensure the preservation of a facility that significantly contributes to the community's well-being and cohesion.

We appreciate your consideration of our submission and look forward to the community and Council working together on solutions that reflect our community's values.

Future of Sheffield Community Pool

The Locals Club, working closely with the Council, invite you to complete the enclosed survey.

Sheffield Community Pool – Current Situation – The Facts

- The pool tub is at the end of its useful life. To ensure the future of our pool we need to act now.
- The pool tub needs to be stripped back to bare concrete, repaired, and resurfaced. Painting without stripping will not work as it will just peel off. Cost to strip, repair, resurface is around \$100,000 and would give the pool another 20+ years.
- Due to the current depth of the pool, legislation requires that qualified lifeguards be on duty during opening hours. This has been in place for the last 7 years, hence the 'key holder' option could not continue and hours had to be limited.
- The cost to provide the lifeguards exceeds the income from pool entries each season. It is not economically sustainable for council to continue or invest in the future of the pool if it is to continue to run at a loss.
- The Locals Club are also working closely with the council on the issue of crossing the state highway safely for both access to the pool and the school. This is being done as part of the Government "Road to Zero" strategy that came into effect in May 2022.

Potential Solution for the future of our Pool

- Council have suggested reducing the overall pool depth and removing the diving board (which currently does not meet the pool safety code) at the same time as carrying out the repairs and repainting of the pool tub.
- A reduced depth means lifeguards would no longer be required, and we could return to key holder access
 with extended opening hours. The pool would continue to be maintained by the council with support from
 community volunteers to assist with water testing etc.
- The cost for the council to do this would be approx \$250,000+ and would give the pool another 20+ for the future of our growing community. The cost savings of this proposal would make it economically viable for the council and worth their investment over time.
- Reducing the depth would not affect the exposure to deep water for children having swimming lessons and would make it easier to provide swimming lessons in a more suitable pool. The pool is not currently set up well for teaching with different depths and a fast drop off slope. The shallow end is approx .8m with the deepest part in the middle at 2.3m and the deep end is 1.8m. Children can still experience deep water in a pool at a lesser depth.
- Reducing the depth would bring the Sheffield Pool in line with similar pools in the district that are run without lifeguards and key holder access.

This **initial survey** is to gather support from the community for this proposal, which we will then present to the council for consultation with the community. Once this has been done there will be community consultation meetings arranged in the Sheffield Hall if we are to progress with this proposal.

No decisions will be made on based on this survey – it is to gather information only.

Subject: Urgent Review and Adjustment of Speed Limits in Sheffield and Waddington for Enhanced Community Safety

As a resident deeply invested in the safety and well-being of our communities in Sheffield and Waddington, I am writing to submit a pressing request for the Selwyn District Council to consider a thorough review and necessary adjustment of speed limits in these areas as part of the Long-Term Plan.






